Walter Durley Boyle Charitable Trust Makes Major Distribution

In March, the Walter Durley Boyle Charitable Trust distributed \$110,862.24 for alterations to three of our four buildings made in 2016 and 2017. The distribution was made following the terms of Durley Boyle's Will. It covered replacing the roof of the Carriage House at Pulsifer House, replacing the utilities and roof of the Meeting House, doing interior renovations

(including handicapped accessible bathrooms) in the Meeting House, and installing a concrete floor and LED lighting in the Annex to the Agricultural Museum. Photos of many of these alterations were included in the Annual Fund Drive letter in December.

Work is now underway on a lean-to exterior storage/display area on the east side of the Agricultural Museum for tractors and larger equipment.



Historical Society Introduces Miner's Certificate

The Putnam County Historical Society will now issue Miner's Certificates to direct descendants



of those who came to Putnam County to work as miners between the dates of 1903 and 1928. As with Pioneer Certificates, we hope to encourage family research in an effort to increase our knowledge of the miners, their work, and their rich cultural addition to Putnam County. The information received will be kept at Pulsifer House as an additional genealogical resource. A fee of \$20.00 will be charged for the certificate.
