Food Service Refresher Course

A 5 hour Sanitation Managers Refresher Course will be held at the BC Health Dept. in Princeton on Oct. 12 from 9 a.m. to 3:30 p.m. Registration will be the day of the course from 8:30 to 9 a.m.

PC EMA Holds Disaster Drill

Between 50 and 60 EMT's, firemen and law enforcement personnel attended the PC Disaster Drill at the Granville Fire Station on the 26th of September. James Goldasich, PC Director of the EMA, called the meeting to order and explained what they were going to do that day.

Quinten Buffington, Sr. Planner with fifteen years as Safety Officer, gave out the instruction to the participants including maps. He told them this was not an emergency so drive at speed limit, stop at stop signs. Use red as today's code on the radios but if you hear the work Putnam, that meant STOP what they were doing because there was an emergency somewhere.

The reason they asked everyone to come in their vehicles was they wanted them to respond in them as they would on any normal day. They were not to use sirens or lights because it was not an emergency. This was not a one-way street, but a two way street. They could call a halt if they did not get the situation taken care of before certification.

Jim finished by saying that when they got back to the fire station for lunch, after the exercises were completed, the facilitator's would give them a synopsis of what they observed and all who participated would have a chance to speak. This was a learning experience. They were thanked for being there and were told to have fun but be careful because they were all trained emergency personnel. 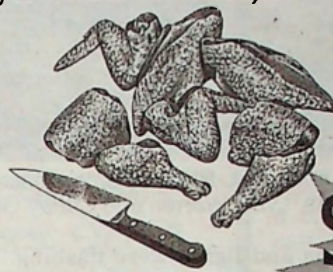

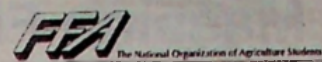

IL Crop Report

Corn stocks in all positions on September 1, totaled 298.9 million bushels, up three percent from last year's stocks of 289.1 million bushels. Off-farm stocks, at 208.9 million bushels, accounted for 70 percent of the total. The indicated disappearance from all positions for the June - August quarter was 517 million bushels, 16 percent more than a year ago.

Stocks of soybeans on September 1, 2009 totaled 21.9 million bushels, 37 percent less than last year's level of 34.7 million bushels. This is the lowest recorded amount of soybeans in storage at this time of year since September 2004. Off-farm stocks, at 14.9 million bushels, accounted for 68 percent of the total. The indicated disappearance from all positions for the June - August quarter was 69.0 million bushels, 11 percent less than at this time last year.

The PC FFA Livestock Team headed to Austin MN to compete at the prestigious National Barrow Show. The PC FFA Livestock Team attended a collegiate livestock evaluation workout at the Richard Hahn Farm in Toluca. Hahn hosted the workout again this year for Midwest College teams. Mr. Hahn is a top purebred short horn cattle breeder who has one of the top shorthorn herds in the Midwest. Eight classes of beef and sheep were presented. The team members got to view Simmental, Main-Anjou, and Limousin bloodlines of beef, which are somewhat rare in the area.

PC FFA member helped three past senior classes pay tribute to an outstanding High School Science Instructor, Mike Heth. His many years of service to the school and academic assistance to hundreds of PCHS students will be remembered and honored. High School Baseball Hall of Fame Coach Joe Massino Baseball Field dedication was held September 26th at the PCHS baseball field in Hennepin at 12:30 p.m. with the lights on the field, the fog and light rain dissipating. A large crowd of Joe's family, former players, and friends gathered behind the first base dugout visiting and shaking Joe's hand.

Massino was the grandfather of PC baseball and Coach Jenkins was the father of PC baseball. They brought the long tradition of PC winning baseball. David introduced Hennepin Mayor Kevin Coleman who said, "Back in March PC Sup. Jay McCracken and PCHS Athletic Director Dave Garcia, came to the Hennepin Village Board, and asked about using the baseball field and naming it after Joe Massino. We thought it was a great project, especially

Superintendent Jay McCracken spoke and said, "I am honored to be here today for the dedication of this field to a fine man, Coach Joe Massino and thanks to all the individuals and businesses responsible for this field. A special thanks to the Village of Hennepin and Mayor Coleman, and all the workers. A huge thanks you to Dave Garcia and Trent Griffith. Coach Garcia has worked out here watering the field, I can see him from my

not expect this many people, since it has been 34 years since I retired from coaching baseball. My players that are here now have to be at least 50 years old to have played for me. The field is awesome. PC has two of the finest baseball fields in the State of Illinois. I would like to recognize a couple of people who helped the program. The first is Don Ketter. Don was very loyal and very understanding when I would steal one or two of his best players each year for the varsity. Don was always for the players and the team. When Don quit coaching and went into construction, he did most of the building of this field. Ed Paxon was mayor at this time in the 80's. You taught them about life, and set the example by being a role model for them. There was no showboating, you did not accept losing so your players did not either, you are such a competitor, and that carried over

to your players. You treated everyone with respect on the field and your players did the same by your example. You are a dignified and humble man. Even Saturday at the dedication, you took time to shake hands with this year's varsity PC baseball players, besides shaking hands with everyone who came to the dedication.

Thanks, Coach, for coming here to live and teach and be a part of our community.

Joe went on to say, "Thanks to the School District, Superintendent McCracken, Board of Education, and Athletic Director Garcia for putting the field together, to the Village of Hennepin and Mayor Coleman also. Thanks to Trent Griffith for his work and raising lots of money for the field, and all the volunteers, too. I would like to say without the fine young men I coached through the years, and had the privilege of coaching, we would not be standing here for this presentation today. To me it is just as much an honor to them as it is to me. Maybe the sign should say Massino and former players field. They had just as much to do with it as I did, except I was there every year and they were there only four years. I want to thank my two boys and my wife for supporting me all these years, when we lost a ball game it was never very nice in my house for a few days. This is one day that I will never forget, and I feel very humble. Thanks for everyone coming."

David reiterated that to make the dedication happen, it took a combination of three months planning, two month's labor, and generous donations of the Friends of the program and then 10 days of the worst rain on the field. He personally thanked the School Board, Supt. Jay McCracken, and Principal Bob Peterson, who allowed everyone to move forward with the project in order to have two of the best facilities in Central Illinois. It took 28 loads of dirt for the infield, plus sod. He thanked the Village of Hennepin and Mayor Kevin Coleman for paying for all the fence, which was a huge donation, and the mayor personally for helping with his labor. David thanked Bar and Trent Griffith for their donations and efforts raising money for the Friends of the Program and thanked all the donors to the program.

David stated that he never got to play for Coach Massino but he thanked him for hiring Coach Jenkins. He said one person told him that Coach



Pumas Win First Ever State Tournament

For the first time in school history, the Putnam County Lady Pumas can call themselves state champions. On Monday, September 28, the Lady Pumas defeated Maroa Forsyth 12-2 in six innings to clinch the title.

"I can't even explain it. I am almost crying my eyes out. It really hasn't sunk in yet," said Carly Gonet, who went 3-4 in the game, scoring three runs. "We just wanted to execute everything and get the job done," Gonet added. De-

spite a rocky first inning, in which the Trojans put up two quick runs, Putnam County (17-3) rallied. With two outs in the first inning, Gonet laced a triple to the right field fence. She would score on an error by the Trojan third baseman.

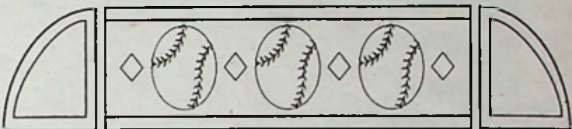

ing to understand (what we have accomplished)."

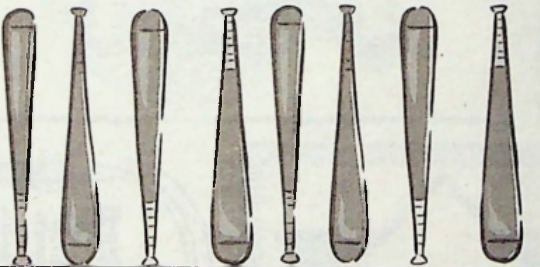

part of it. They are an incredible group of young ladies. They have dedication in every step of the way.

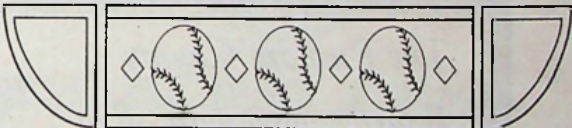

Deer Hunting Season Changes

As hunters across Illinois are gathering their gear and honing their skills for the season, State Senator Dan Rutherford (R-Pontiac) is reminding sportsmen about recent changes in laws.

"Recent changes in Illinois laws are intended to lengthen the deer hunting season for sportsmen," Rutherford said. "These changes are more hunter-friendly and will provide an opportunity for more deer to be harvested."

The fall deer season began on October 1, with archery hunters taking the first crack at the herd.

- Archery - October 1 - January 17
- Youth - October 10 - 11
- Firearm season - November 20-22 and December 3-6
- Muzzleloader only - December 11-13
- Late Winter - December 31 - January 3 and January 15-17

Deer permits that remain after the daily drawing period will be available for over-the-counter sales on October 20. Hunters will be able to purchase these licenses through the Department of Natural Resources and approved retailers.

Rutherford also urges hunters to practice safety. "As all sensible sportsmen know, hunting can be a dangerous sport. It is important that all young and new hunters go through a safety education course. I hope our Central Illinois hunters will have a safe and bountiful season."

The New Conservation Stewardship Program

The funding by the federal government of a Farm Bill benefits us all. Not only are you assured of sufficient food and fiber at a reasonable cost, you are participating in conserving soil and preserving water quality. Since 1985 programs of the Farm Bill have provided financial and technical assistance to producers so that they can better conserve and enhance soil, water, air, and related natural resources on their land.

The Conservation Stewardship Program (CSP) is a new voluntary conservation program that provides opportunities to both recognize excellent stewards and deliver valuable new conservation. The program provides equitable access to all producers, regardless of operation size, crops produced, or geographic location. Eligible lands include cropland, grassland, prairie land, improved pastureland, rangeland, nonindustrial private forestland, and agricultural land under the jurisdiction of an Indian tribe. Applicants must be the operator of record in the USDA farm records management system for the eligible land they wish to enroll.

CSP provides participants with two possible types of payments. An annual payment is available for installing new conservation activities and maintaining existing activities. A supplemental payment may be earned by participants already receiving an annual payment who also adopt a resource-conserving crop rotation. (Crop rotation is thousands of years old - a method of maintaining soil fertility and structure by planting a field with alternating plant species, for example corn one year and soybeans the next.)

"This is the stewardship program that's going to reward for existing conservation that's on the ground and it's going to encourage new conservation on the ground. Key thing here, it's a working lands program. It is not a land retirement program," explained Dave White, Chief of the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), "We want the farmers and ranchers to keep producing and to recognize the commodities that they produce like clean air, clean water, and abundant wildlife and a healthy environment for all of us," continued Chief White. "And hopefully through this we'll also be able to help producer's bottom line because all the conservation in the world is not going to do us a bit of good if those men and women can't continue to make their living off the land. So we're very cognizant of that. Sign up for this program began Monday, August 10th. It's going to occur nationwide. It will be a continual sign-up. Producers can go in at any time."

Staffs at your county USDA/NRCS Field Office and Soil and Water Conservation District (SWCD) are prepared to explain the program and to help you take advantage of what it has to offer.

Dear Parents and/or Guardians,

Homework. The term often spells dread among students and parents alike. Consider these ideas to help your child reduce the stress of homework and be successful in school:

- Provide a consistent environment where homework is completed. Doing homework in a different place every day or in cluttered spaces don't provide much needed order and structure.
- Work in an area with proper lighting that avoids glares and reflections.
- When sitting in a chair, encourage the child to sit with his/her back supported against the backrest.
- Slanted work surfaces help promote good postures when doing activities, such as reading or writing. For example, prop up books with another book.
- Get rid of unnecessary distractions. Homework isn't meant to be multi-tasked with television, text messaging, fixing dinner, or other chores.
- To reduce stress, focus on one homework assignment at a time.
- Encourage arm and hand warm-ups such as pushing palms together or stretching before beginning homework.
- Follow the "20/20/20 Rule"—Take a rest break every 20 minutes, stop for 20 seconds and look at least 20 feet away from your homework or the computer monitor.

Homework is a necessary part of school. It helps the students develop individual responsibility and increases academic performance.

Crooks & Creeps

Excerpts From A New Book by Greg Stanmar

Edwin Meese

Sometimes friendship and loyalty can tarnish your place in history, as former Attorney General Edwin Meese proved in his defense of a popular president during the Iran-Contra scandal in the 1980s.

Meese, believing his boss, Ronald Reagan, would love to support right-wing causes even if it meant skirting the law, was instrumental in a plan to sell some anti-tank and aircraft missiles to Iran, using some of the \$45 million in proceeds to fund the Contra insurgency goings-on in Nicaragua against a left-of-center leader.

Iran propelled Reagan into the Presidency when his predecessor, Jimmy Carter, was ineffective in stopping that country from taking embassy workers hostage. With hostages released on Reagan's inauguration, Iran then turned its attention to its neighbor, Iraq. Meanwhile, other hostages were taken in Lebanon and it was mistakenly believed that if we could just help out Iran in their bloody border war, the shared Islamic beliefs with Lebanon terrorists would fix that situation.

As might be expected, American outcries of dealing with terrorists and giving military aid to people who held embassy people captive whipped things up so much that the former movie actor dipped to an all-time low in popularity (He recovered, of course.)

But blame had to be fixed and congress began looking at the National Security Council that had planned the fiasco. Meese worked very hard at being Reagan's friend and defender, ignoring the fact he was supposed to be the country's chief upholder of the law. A couple of bodies fell at the NSC, but Reagan survived. After all, it was just a matter of giving help to someone we did not hate as much as the Iraq leadership. And Meese found it easy to convince Americans that it was just too complicated for his friend, the President, to understand it all.

Lingering questions about Meese's honesty also failed to result in an indictment. The Yale man who returned to California for his law degree began his long association with the Governor/President in 1967 on Gov. Reagan's staff at the age of 36.

Bart Kassabaum at Quarterly Meeting

Bartlett Lee Kassabaum, former Granville man and now of Princeton, was guest speaker at the Putnam County Historical society Fall Program on Sunday afternoon at the Agriculture Museum in Hennepin. PC Historical Society President introduced the award winning artist. Bart started out by telling about himself, by saying he inherited genes from the Bartletts who had some artistic talent. His Dad, Charles Kassabaum's mother, was a Bartlett. Bart's older brother, Craig, has done the genealogy on the four branches of their family, Kassabaum, Kunkel, Bartlett and Meyers. On the Bartlett side Craig found there were a lot of people who had artistic talent. The most famous one was Ray S. Bartlett, grandmother Lottie's first cousin, 1885-1951. Ray did western prints, Bart showed slides of his family and of Ray's paintings, which are pretty valuable.

Churchill Bartlett was the first person to sign the Declaration of Independence. He signed on the right side of the document and one can see his signature. He lived in New Hampshire. Bart said he had no formal education in art. There was no art education in the Granville grade school or Hopkins High School, although the closest he came was in 1st grade from Nina Geng. She always had a stack of pictures by her desk. If you got your work done, you could take one back to your desk. Bart did that a lot.

Bart was one of nine children. His mother, Marilyn, said they always knew what to get Bart for his birthday and Christmas - a paint set. Bart said on Sunday mornings after church there was a drawing program on the TV and he always watched it.

His first job was at Josten's in Princeton where he did some artwork for them, and he learned a lot about water colors, how to use black paper, and how to use the basic tools. He studied his favorite artist, learned to

take photos to do a composite for his art picture, how to use a computer, and sketches. Bart first got started at an art show at the Drake Hotel in Chicago. It was a decoy collector show at

Oakbrook. He was one of the first artists to go there. There was an artist there about 30 years older than Bart and he gave Bart the best advice he ever got. Bart was not sure he could keep drawing and did not know if he had the talent to keep drawing better and did not know how to create pictures. The artist told him not to listen to anybody, just draw, and get it done: do whatever it took, use a lot of mediums and put them together. Bart said he was fortunate to win the IL Duck Stamp Show Contest in 1980 in Springfield. He was struggling at the time, but he got paid \$1,000 for the prize and got some notoriety for it. He won it three more times; 1982-85-87, every time he entered. Then in 1989 they opened the show for the whole country and moved it to Chicago, changing the rules. They wanted a big name artist to win. Bart told about one of his prints being pirated by Walmart with his name forged on it. His brother's daughter, Bart's niece in Las Vegas, found them for sale there.

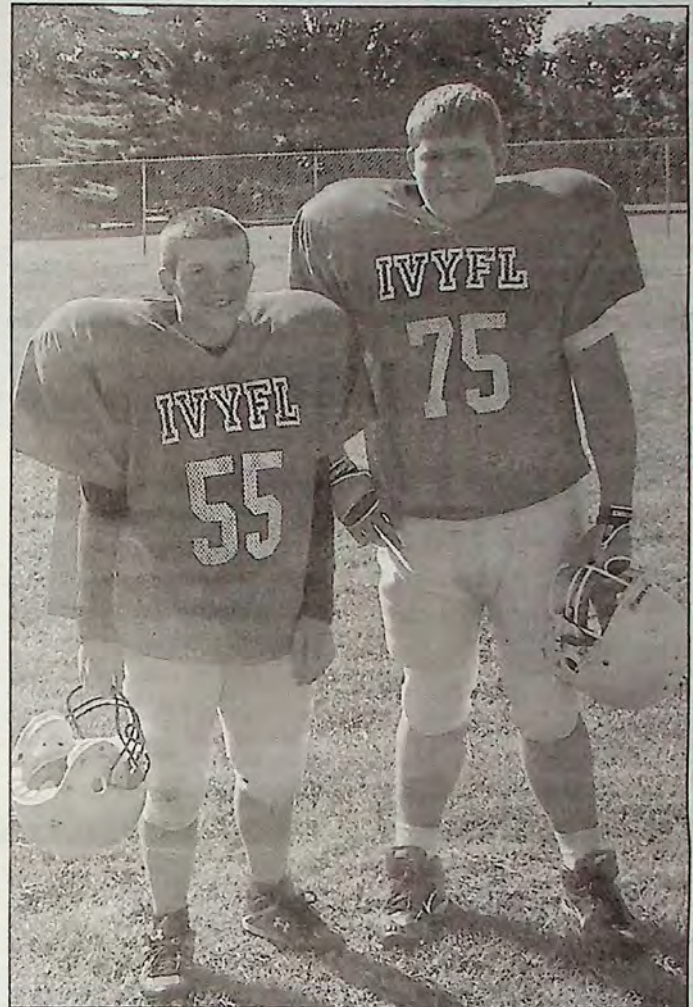
He used to have to make at least 250 prints, but now he can make one at a time all by himself. This has cut down on his storage for he can make them when he sells them so he is self-contained in doing his own printing, packaging, and shipping. He also can make a color print out of a black and white one.

He told about some of his projects like working on the Wild Bill Hickok collection, his painting of the "No Free in Freedom" which depicts his father, Charles Kassabaum and John Dove, local WWII Veterans, the Princeton Train Station and the Red Covered Bridge, the Granville Sacred Heart Church, the Peterson barn going west on I-80, restoration of the sheriff prints in the PC Courthouse and donating half of his time for that and all of the wild life paintings.

His newest painting, "Early Morning Walk" depicts a collie dog walking in front of a farmer leading two Clydesdale horses out to pasture, with a bright

red barn in the background. After the program everyone had refreshments while looking over all of Bart's great paintings.

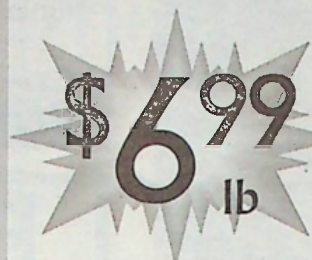

Fire Prevention Week at PC Primary School

On October 6th members of the Granville Fire Department were at the new PC Primary School in Granville to give the children instructional information on what firemen and fire prevention is all about.

As one of the preschool classes came in, they gave each of the firemen pictures they had made of a firetruck. They were ready to learn all about what was going on.

Keenan Campbell explained that the firemen were their friends and were only there to help them if they needed them. Even though the firemen look scary in their fire togs, they only want to get the people and pets out of the way of danger in a fire and they are really very friendly and are only there to help. Two of the firemen donned their fire outfits, with breathing apparatus, and crawled among the children so they could touch them and hear them as they talked to them through the breathing masks. They do sound very different when talking through the breathing mask and it was essential that each child understand that they were there to help. There were a few who just didn't really want to reach out and touch them but they were intent on listening and learning.

It was pointed out that every fireman has a number on his helmet and when they see the number, they can know that this is a real fireman and they are safe and it is OK to go with the fireman. Since children are taught to never go with a stranger, it is very necessary that a child understand that those in special positions are there to help them, not hurt them.

Each child, and their teachers, was given a fire hat to wear and to keep, along with a Fire Prevention Week sticker on each helmet.

The children got to go outside to the fire truck and Art Ramey told them all about the truck, what it does, and how the firemen ride in it to get to the fires in order to help the people who are in danger.



The children sat in semi-circles around the room and listened as they were told about the various firemen and the need for them. As they sat there, the firemen crawled among them so the children could touch their outfits and listen to them talk with their masks on. Each

student also received a fire helmet they could keep. Once outside they were able to see the fire truck and listen to Mr. Ramey tell all about how it was used.

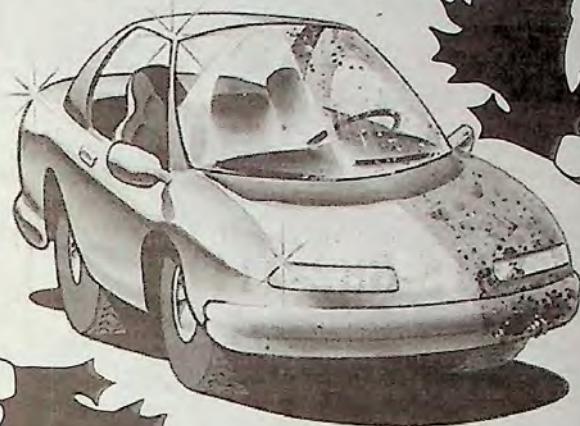

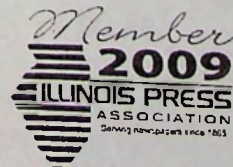

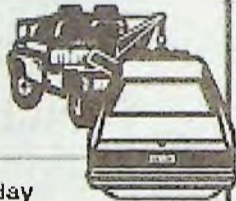

Joining 4-H is a very easy process. New members decide on a club, attend a meeting and receive the enrollment forms from the 4-H leader. PC County Board Meeting Minutes

The regular meeting of the Putnam County Board was called to order at 4:00 p.m. on Monday, September 14 in the boardroom at the Putnam County Courthouse by Board Chairman Duane Calbow.

Roll Call was taken with Calbow, Gil Tonozzi, Chauntelle Biagi-Bruer, Sheila Haage and John O'Neill answering.

Minutes from the August 10 meeting were approved on a motion by Biagi-Bruer and a second from Haage.

County Highway Engineer George Meister presented his August report to the board. He informed the board that the Hennepin Township ESK Road Project is being delayed until the township resolves some R.O.W. issues. The board informed Meister that work is beginning on the fiscal 2010 budget and his initial draft of his budget was due September 21. Other County Highway projects included checking country roads, mowing roadsides, making grates for drop boxes on Power Plant Road to eliminate the need for guard rails, and servicing the highway and sheriff's vehicles (Meister's reports are on file at the Office of the County Clerk for review by interested parties.).

Sheriff Kevin Doyle presented his August report to the board, Doyle discussed the need to remove two of the four trees on the east side of the north parking lot. The board agreed to remove the trees but to replace them with new trees (Doyle's reports are on file at the Office of the County Clerk for review by interested parties.).

County Treasurer Kevin Kunkel was not present for the meeting. The board reviewed his financial reports for the month of August. The working balance of the General Fund for August was \$3,862.46, compared to \$1,735.18 one year ago. General Fund Income for the month was \$83,274.76 compared to \$251,924.97 for last year. In Kunkel's review of the "General Fund Accounts Balance by Month - 2009," the General Fund balance for August was \$27,068.68. The General Fund Savings balance was \$1,403,842.53

The Illinois Fund - General Fund balance was \$48,071.75. Kunkel's report also included a review of the budget for the current fiscal year ending August 31, 2009 (Kunkel's reports are on file at the Office of the County Clerk for review by interested parties.).

Putnam County Circuit Clerk Cathy Oliveri and County Probation Officer Andy Ceresa both had nothing to report and were not present at the meeting.

County Supervisor of Assessments Tammy Mihalic had nothing to report and was not present. The board reviewed Mihalic's letter of response to the resignation letter of Darlene Cofoid. The board requested Mihalic attend the October board meeting to discuss this further.

County Zoning Officer Jim Burger presented zoning reports for July and August. During those two months, his office issued 12 permits, 21 permit inspections and 2 flood-related re-inspections. Burger also informed the board of the resignations of Sharon Clausen and Marion Bentlin from the Planning Commission. He had contacted Kristina Popurella and Shane Smith to fill the vacancies on the commission with both accepting. The board will check for conflict of interests with Popurella, as she is also a school board member (Burger's reports are on file at the Office of the County Clerk for review by interested parties.).

The board went into Executive Session for close to an hour to discuss personnel issues.

Putnam County Emergency Management Agency Coordinator Jim Goldasich presented reports for July and August. He reported he met with the circuit clerk regarding a Continuity of Operations plan required by the Illinois Supreme Court for the State Court System. Goldasich also reported that he attended the annual EMA conference in Springfield where he was recognized for completing the Professional Development Series. He also received the title of Illinois Professional Emergency Manager (Goldasich's

reports are on file at the Office of the County Clerk for review by interested parties.).

County Death Investigator Robert Cofoid presented his reports for the months of May through August. Six deaths were reported to his office during this time period. Cofoid also thanked the board for the opportunity to attend the 16th Annual Medicological Death Investigation Conference in August (Cofoid's reports are on file at the Office of the County Clerk for review by interested parties.).

Under Old Business:

- Haage reported the Health Department's flu vaccine budget had passed and vaccines will be available for the public.

- The board gave approval for iFocus to design the county governmental website.

Under New Business:

- The board reviewed the model resolution proclaiming full support and participation in the 2010 Decennial Census. After brief discussion, the resolution was passed on a motion from Tonozzi and a second from Biagi-Bruer.

- The board reviewed and approved a request from Ron Gallo of R & M Ranch to sell buffalo burgers during an as-yet undetermined weekend in the near future. The approval was contingent on Gallo filing the proper licenses and permits with the county clerk.

- The board agreed to continue to examine the BASSETT program to determine its feasibility and application for the county and discuss it further at the October meeting.

- The board scheduled Finance Committee meetings to work on next fiscal year's budget on September 21 and 28 at 4:00 p.m.

- The board reviewed and paid the bills for the month of August.

- The board reviewed and approved a request from Payno's Burger Bar for the sale of beer at their grand opening and golf playday scheduled for October 3. The approval was contingent on the filing of a "Liquor Agreement."

The regular meeting of the Granville Village Board was held October 6 at 6:30 p.m. with President Gimbal calling the meeting to order. Roll was called Pettit, Leckonby, Borio, Norris, and Coleman answering roll. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited. Minutes of the last meeting were read. Motion by Norris, second by Leckonby to accept minutes as read with correction of public hearing of September 17 was for the purpose of Liquor Commission hearing on a liquor violation. All Trustees voting aye. Bills were presented and reviewed. Motion by Borio second by Pettit to pay bill out of their respective funds. All Trustees voting aye. Motion by Pettit, second by Coleman to pay the Watch Guard invoice in the amount of \$3,507.00 from Vehicle Replacement and \$1,300.00 from the DUI Equipment funds. All Trustees voting aye. Motion by Coleman, second by Pettit to pay Graffix Shoppe invoice for \$340.51 from Vehicle Replacement fund. All Trustee voting aye. Motion by Borio, second by Leckonby to add Charles Helmig invoice to current bills. All Trustee voting aye.

Guest William Faletti presented a petition from himself and neighbors concerning complaints about the condition of the junk yard on School Street. Attorney Charles Helmig said they will discuss possible litigation in executive session. This property is a non-conforming use with the possibility of being cited with ordinance violations. Mr. Helmig also said he will look into increasing fees for certified death certificates and have other ordinances ready for the next meeting.

Mr. Larry Good of Chamlin Engineering spoke to the board about stand by generation at the waste water plant. This has been added by the EPA for issuance of a permit for a proposed lagoon and sludge project at this plant. Cost estimates for these stand alone generators are \$45,000.00 for powering equipment in the event of power failure, and \$55,000.00 for powering equipment that would include raw sewage pumps, storm sewer pumps, and chlorination, lighting and heating for the plant. It would not power the blowers. This was not included in the price of the project when original plans were completed. It was the consensus of the board to include the larger unit for purpose of applying for this permit. Mr. Good will look into whether use of diesel or natural gas would be best for this project.

President Gimbal asked the board for approval to hire Mike Mertens, Clay Kasperski, and Michael Burr as extra snow plow help. Motion to accept these drivers by Coleman, second by Leckonby. All Trustees voting aye. He also told them he would like to replace ten trees as there have been many that have had to be removed. Motion by Borio, second by Coleman to purchase five trees from Tonica Nursery, and five trees from Garden Stop at the cost of not over \$1,500.00 including rental of equipment to plant them. All Trustees voting aye.

Committees were called, Sean Coleman said that Officer Tim Margis has been helping with extra patrol with the resignation of Officer Lendy. Sheli Starkey reported that the two ton street truck has had the brace rebuilt where cracked and it is being repainted. Dan Seigmann has repainted the bed on the one ton street truck. The new spreader is in at the dealer and will be brought to them and installed. The plows are ready and salt ordered for the winter driving season. Hydrants will be flushed on Wednesday and Thursday of this week. Notice has been published.

Charles Helmig asked to speak to the board about possible litigation and personnel in executive session. Motion by Leckonby second by Pettit to go to executive session. All Trustees voting aye. Motion by Borio second by Pettit to come out of executive session. All Trustees voting aye.

Discussion was held on hiring Brandon Doden effective October 7 as full time help with the street department at \$11.00 per hour with .50 increase after fulfillment of requirements during his 90 day probation period. Motion by Norris, second by Leckonby. All Trustee voting aye.

Motion by Coleman, second by Pettit to adjourn. All Trustees voting aye.

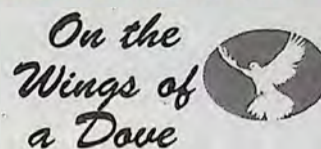

Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor:

The "Cash for Clunkers" program for new cars may have ended, but the IRS wants to remind taxpayers that many people might overlook another special break available. If you buy a new vehicle this year, there's a special federal tax deduction available that can help you save money, in some cases hundreds of dollars. This tax break will allow people who buy a new vehicle in 2009 to deduct the sales and excise taxes they pay when they file their tax return next year. The tax deduction is available on the 2009 federal tax return even for those who claim the standard deduction.

The deduction is part of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009 and applies to taxes paid on up to \$49,500 of the purchase price for qualified new cars, light trucks, motorcycles or motor homes. Generally, vehicles weighing 8,500 pounds or less qualify. This means that most new cars and many new trucks will qualify. New motor homes qualify regardless of weight.

Buyers are entitled to a partial deduction if they earn between \$125,000 and \$135,000 (\$250,000 and \$260,000 for joint filers). The deduction is eliminated for those who earn over these amounts.

To qualify the vehicle must be new and purchased in 2009 after Feb. 16 and no later than Dec. 31. There is still time left but the clock is ticking.

Volunteers Gather Prairie Seed at Wetlands Refuges

About 30 people gave a helping hand to nature on Saturday, October 3rd, by harvesting native prairie seed at the

since 2001. "By gathering this seed, we'll be able to plant it on



Dixon Waterfowl Refuge at Hennepin and Hopper Lakes near Hennepin.

Approximately 50 to 100 pounds of seed were collected, estimated Gary Sullivan. As senior restoration ecologist for The Wetlands Initiative, Sullivan has been the site's primary architect of the restoration efforts at the 2,600-site

other parts of the prairie that lack the diversity or density of these areas we harvested," Sullivan said. "This represents a very valuable resource and we are thrilled to be able to use these seeds to further the restoration effort."

Volunteers from throughout the region filled approximately 25 buckets plus two trash

cans full of white indigo, blazing star, pale Indian plantain, compass plant, prairie dock, and several other native Illinois species. All of these species had been planted in recent years by staff and crews of the Wetlands Initiative to establish the prairie.

During the fall and winter, the seeds will be dried, sorted, and cleaned by Rick Seibert, site manager, and Mark Bogner, assistant, at the refuge. They will plant the seeds in winter and spring in the Dixon refuge.

Prior to restoration, the site had been drained and planted with corn and soybeans for most of the 20th century. The Wetlands Initiative created, and now manages, the restoration site to bring back the native landscapes of the Illinois River, including backwater lakes, wetlands, prairies, fens, seeps, and savannas.

Excerpts From A New Book by Greg Stanmar

John Mitchell

The old saw, "Just because you're paranoid doesn't mean they're not out to get you," finally got a psychological syndrome's name, thanks to a side show in the Watergate period in American history.

In the early 1970s Martha Mitchell, wife of legally-besieged John Mitchell, kept calling newspapers about the as-yet unrealized depth of the Washington scandal that would eventually put her husband in prison and make the president voluntarily



deposed and disgraced. Mitchell's wife was dismissed by the White House as a paranoid drunk. When her claims were eventually proved the Martha Mitchell Effect went into the psychological books as someone with fantastic stories that prove to be true.

Multiple Myeloma, a cancer affecting immunity cells, killed her in 1976, three years after her husband left her and all but re-runs of the Watergate drama were over in America. Former President Richard Nixon told television listeners in 1977 that

if it weren't for Martha, Watergate would still only be known as a nice hotel and office building.

But this chapter isn't about Martha Mitchell. It's about how her husband, seemingly winning the crap game of life as a war hero and successful attorney, could fall so far so fast.

John Mitchell, born in 1913, grew up to be the first U.S. attorney general ever convicted and imprisoned. Before that the Detroit native picked up a law degree from Fordham University a couple of years before our entry into World War II. He did not use his law degree to get himself a safe, boring job with the Navy's legal command. Instead he became a P.T. boat commander, serving in the same unit at John Kennedy.

While in the Pacific, Mitchell picked himself up a couple Purple Hearts and the Silver Star.

With his three years of service behind him, Mitchell went back to practicing law in New York City and eventually became partners with Richard Nixon through a merger of firms. He became friends with Nixon and in 1968 became his campaign manager in the run for the presidency. Nixon liked the organizational skills of Mitchell and turned over day-to-day operation to him. After the win, Mitchell was appointed attorney general.

His attacks on Vietnam critics, non-support of civil rights' issues and catching the bad guys without the niceties of strict adherence to the Constitution marked his three years in office before going back to managing Nixon's second presidential campaign.

Mitchell's belief in his politics, as opposed to the opposing party's beliefs, led him to sending burglars to put bugs in the National Democrat headquarters at Watergate. When he apparently shared this move with his boss, both were in trouble: Mitchell for doing it and Nixon for saying he knew nothing about it.

As the story began to unfold as his wife had predicted, Mitchell warned a Washington Post reporter that his publisher is "gonna get her" tender parts "caught in a big fat wringer." Kathryn Graham's bosom survived but Mitchell's career did not. He was sentenced in 1975 to up to eight years in a federal prison for obstruction of justice, perjury and conspiracy. He was let out 19 months later because of health problems and would die of a heart attack in 1988.

Mitchell was buried in Arlington Cemetery with full military honors.

"The Flames Caught Us"

•• 1909 Cherry Mine Disaster 100th anniversary exhibit opens November 1 at Presidential Library

It's a story of tragedy, heroism and survival, an event that occurred one hundred years ago in a small Illinois community, grabbed the world's attention, and forever changed the face of a major industry.

The Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library will open a major exhibit November 1 to mark the 100th anniversary of the Cherry Mine Disaster, "The Flames Caught Us": Cherry Mine 1909, which will run through March 31, 2010. The exhibit commemorates a tragedy that killed 259 people and inspired the passage of coal mine safety legislation to the same degree that the sinking of the Titanic would affect maritime safety laws three years later. The exhibit may be viewed free of charge Sunday, November 1 and then Monday through Friday from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. in the Presidential Library Atrium. Viewing will be closed on Thanksgiving Day, Thursday, November 26, but the exhibit will also be open that weekend, Friday, Saturday and Sunday, November 27, 28 and 29, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. each day.

"While informing the public about the coal mining industry, immigrant labor, and mine safety at the turn of the 20th century, the exhibit will take them beyond the tragedy to understand the changes the Cherry Mine Disaster made in the advancement of labor welfare and mine safety enjoyed by miners in the 21st century," said Illinois State Historian Dr. Thomas Schwartz.

A round table discussion and book signing with authors who have written about the disaster will be held Saturday, November 7 at 6 p.m. at the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library to coincide with the exhibit opening. Authors participating include: Karen Tintori, Trapped: The 1909 Cherry Mine Disaster; Dean and Lorena (Galletti) Cotton, Oneness: Angiolina, The 1909 Cherry Mine Disaster; Steve Stout, Black Damp: The Story of the Cherry Mining Disaster; and Ronald Bluemer, Fire Below! Musician Ray Tutaj Jr. will offer a musical performance dedicated to the Cherry Mine Disaster. Books may be purchased during the November 7 event, or those attending may bring their own copies for the authors to sign. The exhibit will be open for viewing following the program.

Artifacts featured in "The Flames Caught Us" exhibit include: Typical 1909 mining equipment such as a miner's pick, fuel canteen, coal shovel, coal fork, lamps, dynamite case, miners' caps, hammers, tin flasks, and a lunch pail; a mule collar and chain, used on the animals that moved coal from one area of a mine to another; a canary cage to hold the birds that were used to measure air quality in many Illinois mines; mine rescue equipment; a funeral ribbon for victims of the Cherry Mine Disaster issued to United Mine Workers of America members; check tags used to record which miners were in the mines; numerous government reports on the disaster; and several personal narratives including one printed in Italian, the language of many Illinois coal miners of the era. Many of these artifacts have been loaned by private individuals specifically for this exhibit. The exhibit will also feature materials from the collections of the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library, including photographs, coroner's reports, oral histories, published books, newspaper articles, government reports, music, and manuscripts.

The St. Paul Coal Company Mine in Cherry began operation in 1905 and supplied the Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul Railroad with 300,000 tons of coal annually for its locomotives. The mine featured the latest equipment and operated smoothly until November 13, 1909, when a torch caught a load of hay on fire about 300 feet below the surface. Of the 490 men and boys in the mine at the time, a total of 259 died from the fire or the poisonous gases it produced. Heroic rescue efforts, including one in which 12 rescuers died, filled newspaper accounts of the disaster. The one incredible survival story involved the "eight-day" men, a group of 21 trapped miners who sealed themselves off from the fire and were rescued eight days later by a team that had been sent below to retrieve bodies. As a result of the Cherry Mine Disaster, safety regulations were implemented throughout the mining industry, and a liability act, which became the basis of the Illinois Workmen's Compensation Act, was enacted.

The Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library is open free of charge weekdays from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. The adjacent Abraham Lincoln Presidential Museum is an immersive, state-of-the-art experience that gives visitors an emotional attachment to the Abraham Lincoln story. Paid admission is required to tour the Museum, which is open daily from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m.

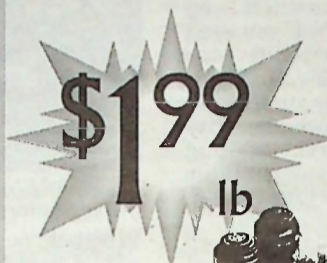

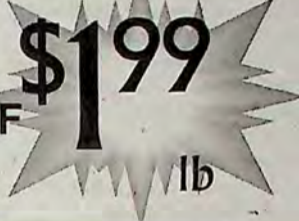

Moving? Keep in Touch With Your SS Benefits

If you've recently moved to a new address, chances are some of your former neighbors and friends from the community asked you to be sure to keep in touch. If you receive Social Security benefits, we'd like you to keep in touch too. In fact, you need to let us know about your new address. Even if you receive your payments by direct deposit, Social Security needs your current mailing address so you can continue to receive important notices about changes in benefits.

Don't worry; changing your address with Social Security can be as convenient and easy as logging on to your computer. Just go to www.socialsecurity.gov and select the "What You Can Do Online" link in the top left corner. The fourth item down is "If you get benefits." That's where you'll want to go. Then select "Change your address or telephone number."

Once there, the web page will tell you exactly what you need to do to change your address with Social Security. If more than one person receives benefits at an address (such as a husband and wife), each person has to make the address change.

If you have a password with Social Security, that is all the information you will need to provide. It's that easy. Once your address is changed, you know you'll continue to receive important notices from Social Security when needed, such as letters telling you about changes in benefit amounts.

State Treasurer Alexi Giannoulas Guest Speaker

Schock Cosponsors Legislation to Protect Seniors Social Security COLA

Congressman Aaron Schock (R-IL) announced today he will cosponsor H.R. 3677, the Save Our Seniors' Social Security (SOS) Act, which give Social Security beneficiaries a one-time payment of \$280 in 2010 in lieu of a Cost-of-Living Adjustment (COLA). This benefit would be paid for using unspent stimulus money.

"In 2010, or the first time in 35 years, Social Security Administration (SSA) has determined Social Security beneficiaries will not receive an increase in their Social Security through a COLA, said Schock. "It is imperative we provide our seniors with the resources they need during this economic downturn. We must redirect the irresponsible and reckless stimulus spending to those who need it most."

Almost 70 percent of beneficiaries depend on Social Security for 50 percent or more of their income. Social Security is the sole source of income for 15 percent of beneficiaries.

Governor Quinn Signs Legislation to Save MAP Grants

Covers Second Semester Funding for 138,000 Illinois College Students

Governor Pat Quinn today signed legislation to cover critical second-semester MAP funding for nearly 138,000 eligible students. Senate Bill 1180 appropriates full funding for the need-based student aid program, allowing both students and colleges to plan for the Spring 2010 college term.

"I salute the General Assembly for their swift response to what could have been a serious setback to students across the state who rely on MAP funding for their education," said Governor Quinn. The Illinois Monetary Award Program is a need-based grant available through the Illinois Student Assistance Commission (ISAC). Budget cuts in the Spring 2009 legislative session severely limited student aid for the 2009-2010 academic year, causing approximately 138,000 MAP grant recipients to receive only 50 percent of their award, covering only the Fall 2009 school term. In addition, an estimated 130,000 eligible students, who applied in Illinois after May 15, would have received no MAP aid at all.

Over the past few months, Governor Quinn has participated in rallies with students, parents, teachers, administrators, lawmakers and other interested citizens across the state in the last few weeks to draw attention to the critical problem facing students who rely on MAP grants. Governor Quinn has addressed MAP rallies at Bradley University, Black Hawk Community College, John Wood Community College, University of Illinois at Champaign, SIU Carbondale, SIU Edwardsville, Northern Illinois University, University of Illinois at Chicago and in Springfield at the Illinois Education Association Center.

The legislation takes effect immediately.

Walter C. Griffith, a well-known businessman and life-long resident of McNabb ("Buddy" as he was known to everyone) was born April 23, 1899 at the family farm.

He graduated in 1918 from Swaney HS and then the U of I in 1923. In 1918 he enlisted and served in France during WWI. In 1930 he married Mary Kendall of Downs in Bloomington.

In 1936 he established the hybrid seed corn enterprise of the Griffith Seed Company, and involved himself in a life-long career of promoting progressive developments in agriculture.

In addition to membership in professional seed organizations, he was a birthright Quaker and a member of Clear Creek Society of Friends, the Magnolia Grange, the McNabb Legion, the Varna Rotary, the U of I Alumni Assn, and was inducted into the IL Valley Baseball Assn Old Timers Hall of Fame in 1983.

Buddy was an avid sportsman, and supporter of athletic programs for the youth of Putnam County. He was a life-long member of the PC Historical Society.

He and Mary had three children; Mrs. Tilden (Robin) Glisson, Kendall, and W. Lynn Griffith. He passed away on May 6, 1989 at the age of 90.

Hubert J. (HJ) Mennie was born September 25, 1942 in Mark; attended Mark Grade School, graduating from Hopkins HS in 1960. He married Cheryl Koch on July 14, 1962 in Granville.

He worked at Westclox in Peru for seven years and graduated from the tool and died apprenticeship program.

He, Cheryl and their family moved to Santa Monica CA where they worked cleaning pools of Hollywood stars and other jobs. They decided they wanted their young children to attend school in Putnam County and in 1970 Hubie

founded the Mennie Machine Shop in their garage. He and Cheryl took odd jobs to provide the best for their children.

The machine shop grew over the years in size and business, which finally culminated building a new, state-of-the-art machine company on Rte. 71, with the help of his family; Cheryl, sons Bill (Janeen) of Mark and David (Annette) of Granville; two daughters, Jennifer (Joe) Smoode of Granville, and Amy (Jake) Cimei of Mark.

Hubie was a member of Sacred Heart Catholic Church, and a Board Director of Granville National Bank. He and his family have made generous donations to the area schools, charities, and many organizations. Hubie's legacy is of his family-built business which supports his families, and also the many families in the local area.

Bob Kinney's great-grandfather, Oliver Wilson, was probably one of the most famous persons to ever live in Putnam County. Oliver Wilson was born in 1849 of Quaker ancestry and died in 1924. He never lost interest in his religious attachments where he was a birthright member. He was known for helpfulness in community affairs, his loyalty to educational work in which he profoundly believed the Grange could and should play a part. He believed even small achievements might count in the end for much. During his lifetime he became a very popular and well-known person in the U.S. Oliver was a very dedicated person who helped develop the National Grange.

His services were in great demand as speaker at farm picnics, Grange meetings, and many other kinds of gatherings. He traveled all over the U.S. developing the Grange movement. He became the nation's Grand Master of the Grange.

He lived on the Kinney farm after becoming so active in the Grange. He moved to Peoria in 1902, to be near the railroads for his travels around the country. Oliver hired Perry Glover's dad to farm the land. Later Perry lived there and farmed the land, and on this farm Perry's son, Syd Glover, grew up.

President Woodrow Wilson appointed Oliver to his cabinet as the Special Office of Domestic Affairs. Oliver Wilson is buried in the Friends Cemetery.

At the Lady Pumas Regional Championship game I asked Barbara Griffith what she thought of the new scoreboard. She answered me by saying, "It's beautiful."

State of IL Health Care

HFS' Medical Programs Division administers the All Kids program. Illinois is the first state in the nation to guarantee access to affordable health insurance for all uninsured children.

The Illinois Healthy Women program has provided family planning and related reproductive health services to more than 65,000 Illinois women.

In fiscal year 2008, the average monthly count of enrolled individuals for which HFS provided means-tested medical coverage was over 2.4 million, including pregnant women, infants, children and teenagers, seniors and people with disabilities, people struggling with one-time catastrophic medical bills, and children and adults with chronic health problems.

Child Support Enforcement collections totaled \$1.33 billion, during fiscal year 2008, up eight percent over the previous year, and a record amount for the fourth consecutive year.

In the first year of denying hunting and fishing licenses, collections totaled \$263,506 from previously non-paying parents, and since January 1, 2008, collections totaled more than \$13 million from 14,000 previously delinquent parents referred for driver's license suspension.

More than 15,000 employers now use the New Hire Reporting Web site, which resulted in more than \$47 million in collections for fiscal year 2008.

All healthcare purchasing for the state of Illinois is consolidated in the Office of Healthcare Purchasing (OHP), within HFS. OHP is responsible for all non-Medicaid procurement of healthcare services.

Department of Healthcare and Family Services

The Illinois Department of Healthcare and Family Services (HFS) is responsible for providing healthcare coverage for adults and children who qualify for Medicaid, and for providing Child Support Enforcement services to help ensure that Illinois children receive financial support from both parents. The agency is organized into two major divisions, Medical Programs and Child Support Enforcement. In addition, all healthcare purchasing for the state of Illinois is consolidated in a new Office of Healthcare Purchasing within HFS, and the Office of Inspector General is maintained within the agency, but functions as a separate, independent entity reporting directly to the governor's office.

HFS was formerly the Illinois Dept. of Public Aid.

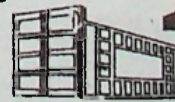

Lutes Family Reunion

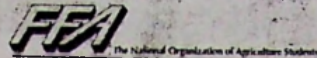

October

Crop Report

As of October 1, the corn for grain yield in Illinois was expected to be 179 bushels per acre, unchanged from the September 1 forecast. Production is estimated to be 2.11 billion bushels, down 1% from last year's crop. Planted and harvested acres were both revised down by 300,000 acres to 12.0 and 11.8 million based on recently available administrative data and reflect acreage prevented from being planted as a result of the wet spring. As of October 4, 41% of the crop was mature with 5% harvested. This compares to 73% mature and 9% harvested last year at this time.

The October 1 forecast yield for soybeans was expected to be 44 bushels per acre, unchanged from the September 1 estimate. Production was expected to total 411.4 million bushels, 4% below last year. Acres planted and harvested were revised up to 9.4 and 9.35 million, 300,000 more than the previous estimates.

As of October 4, 6% of the crop had been harvested compared to 20% last year and the five-year average of 40%.

The final yield for the 2009 winter wheat crop was 56 bushels per acre, down eight bushels from last year's yield. Acreage seeded in the fall of 2008 was 850 thousand acres, down 350 thousand acres from 2007. Farmers harvested 820 thousand acres for grain this year, down 29% from the previous year. This resulted in a total production of 45.9 million bushels, 38% less than the 2008 production.

Crooks & Creeps

Excerpts From A New Book by Greg Stanmar

Richard Milhous Nixon

One liberal wag, while listening to a conversation about the execution of Chicago serial killer John Wayne Gacey, and pretending to not realize the topic had switched to Richard Nixon, who had died two weeks earlier, agreed when it was suggested that he not get a Christian burial.

Most Americans, even in jest, don't believe there were not enough good things about Tricky Dick to warrant a proper burial.

Radio commentator Paul Harvey liked to tell his listeners of Nixon's college thespian years when he was renowned for being able to shed tears on command. Perhaps that might have helped when almost 40 years later he assured Americans that he was "not a crook."

That television appearance was not as successful as another memorable one in which he assured listeners he was not going to give back the donated family dog, Checkers, that they had grown attached to. What crook dresses his wife in a "Republican cloth coat" and not furs, he also pleaded.

That 1952 appearance kept him on the Dwight Eisenhower presidential ticket, where he served two terms as vice-president.

The 1974 speech did not stop the bipartisan movement to impeach him and he resigned before that could happen.

Today Watergate has become synonymous with unbridled political arrogance. But as time goes by Nixon is remembered for the long list of positive achievements as well as the unethical lapses that led to his ouster.

Nixon was born in January, 1913, almost two years before the start of World War I and the beginning of the American role as a global player. After Whittier College and Duke University law school he practiced in the family firm for a time, but found it dull. In a couple of years his boredom came to an end and his political career began at a South Pacific poker table while serving as an officer in the Navy reserves. "Nick," as he was called then, had enough spare time from his job handling cargo on the island of Nissen to play cards and put together enough money to finance his first run for congress when peace came.

When he left the service he took on California's 12th Congressional incumbent, Jerry Voorhis. In the twisted logic that would become common in early post-war years, Nixon was able to show Voorhis had to be a commie because of his labor union support. Two years later Nixon was able to put the spotlight on Alger Hiss, an advisor to President Franklin Roosevelt. Nixon accused Hiss of being a Soviet spy. It made Nixon a hero to anti-FDR people and a life-long enemy of most liberals.

In 1950 he moved to the U.S. Senate by defeating Helen Douglas, who he called the "pink lady," alluding to her communist sympathies. She in turn first gave him the Tricky Dick nickname that he would carry to his grave. He barely moved into his new office before Eisenhower picked him as his 1952 running mate. Nixon is credited with having turned that second-banana job into something meaningful and eight years later was ready to take on John Kennedy.

Nixon could not overcome Kennedy's charisma, the Kennedy bankroll, Eisenhower's lukewarm support or memories of the Checkers incident, and he lost. When he lost again in the race for California Governor, Nixon gave his classic miss-prediction when he said voters would not have him to "kick around" anymore. Reports of his political death were greatly exaggerated, as Mark Twain would have said.

Nixon came back to beat another vice president, Hubert Humphrey, and begin a sweet-sour career, including making communist China a friend and anticipating Ronald Reagan's move of forcing the Soviets to implode by trying to match us in military spending.

It took four years after his election to make good on his promise to end the Vietnam War but that too was accomplished.

His paranoiac personality finally ended his role in history when he became the only president to resign as his involvement unfolded in winning a campaign he probably could not have lost.

Search Begins for Albino Coyote

The Federal Department of Coyotes has been notified of sightings of an albino coyote in the immediate area. According to authorities it is extremely rare for this type of phenomena to occur; therefore, legendary Coyote expert Larry Doyle (2009 runner-up Coyote Hunter of the Year) has been selected to search and apprehend. Larry and a hand-picked group from the Triple D Coyote Club will begin their quest this fall in an effort to further studies into the habitat of a growing population of varmint that threatens our local community.

The albino coyote is known to travel alone, not in a pack or group, which is typical of the species. He will frequent residential areas searching for food, favoring pizza with sausage and mushroom toppings. A special warning notice has been issued to all area pizza delivery personnel to be on the alert during night time deliveries, and any attacks or sightings should be reported directly to Larry Doyle. Monitoring Requirements Not Met for Standard

Our water system violated several drinking water standards over the past year. Even though these were not emergencies, as our customers, you have a right to know what happened and what we did to correct these situations.

We are required to monitor your drinking water for specific contaminants on a regular basis. Results of regular monitoring are an indicator of whether or not our drinking water meets health standards. During 8/1/08 - 8/31/08 we did not include chlorine results on our coliform samples form and therefore cannot be sure of the quality of our drinking water during that time.

What should I do?

There is nothing you need to do at this time.

The table below lists the contaminant(s) we did not properly test for during the last year, how often we are supposed to sample for chlorine, how many samples we are supposed to take, how many samples we took, when samples should have been taken, and the date on which follow-up samples were (or will be) taken.

Dr. Ray Justi, Author & Historian: "A Short History of Mark"

April of 1994 Ray Justi sold his home in Miami FL where he had lived for 37 years. He returned to Mark where he had lived the first 18 years of his life. He was an only child, and came back to take care of his widowed mother. He had a plan that included two major projects. He was 70 years old, in good health and restless in mind with a lot of free time.

One would let him continue being physical, the other would keep him mentally active, which

white snow, with the blue sky, white clouds and the wooden cross standing tall on top.

The dump is on the east side of Milwaukee St. and a short way north from Ray's home. Italian was Ray's first language, as everyone else in Mark spoke it as well, and he did not learn English until he went to first grade at the Mark grade school where Mr. Leo Utterback of Granville taught.

Ray dedicated his book to his parents, August and Cleofa Guisti, his loving, generous, honest hard-working immigrants from Italy, who never hesitated to make sacrifices on his behalf in order that he might have a fair shot at his American dream. They gave up theirs and Ray became their American dream. Their hope was that someday Ray could become a man of respect and have a much better life than they had. They constantly emphasized the absolute necessity of a good education as the key to that

better life. For his three sons, Steven, Paul, and Jonathan, Ray has those same feelings of unconditional love (the tight family) Italian thing his parents and he always had and to his four grandchildren who were born and are growing up in a vastly different world from their paternal great-grandparents who immigrated to Mark in 1913.

When Ray went to Mark Fitzgerald and his wife in Tonica to type his manuscript, Mark told him that he had way too much there for a book. So Ray decided to publish a second book, a smaller one than the first Putnam County one. The part 2 book would only have 30 chapters, not the 37 that are in the first one. The second book would be titled, "A Short History of America and Putnam County."

Ray has a box full of the finished manuscript to take

to his typists. Ray plans on a third book about his father. There are no pictures in the book as it is an encyclopedia of sorts.

The following sentences are a few of Ray's quotes made to me as I interviewed him: "Commencement means go on. Someone said history would be a wonderful thing if it was only true." "Henry Ford once said, 'History is a lot of bunk.'" "If you read a book once a month you will stay educated." "You don't always have to tell the truth, but don't lie." "Damn the torpedoes, full steam ahead."

Ray said that he was always fascinated with words at a young age. It took him fifteen years of research and writing and editing his book of 455 pages. He writes of Mark's beginning years in part I, part II is about coal, coal miners and coal mining; III is about the Mark Mine; IV Mark's abandoned mined lands and their reclamation; part V is on alcohol in history and in Mark.

Ray is grateful to his many friends who always graciously filled in some of the details of his various questions. He hopes that the Dump, the only physical part of Mark's coal mining days, will continue to endure as the Indians would say, "for as long as the prairie endures and the waters of the IL River flow," and as a permanent monument and memorial to the memory and labor of all the coal miners who worked at the mine. May their memories never be forgotten.

hopefully he could remain in good mental condition. Ray said those two fundamental laws of physiology - a sound mind and a sound body - use them or lose them. The physical project consisted of completing the reclamation of the four abandoned mined lands that he owned.

The mental project would consist of writing a brief, informal history of Mark's first three years: 1903 when the mine was sunk, 1904 when coal was discovered, and 1905 when Mark (with 400 residents) was incorporated. These three chapters over the 15 years extended to the 37 chapters in the book (and more!).

Ray always wanted to write a book and thought it would be a little pocketbook, like an Atlas or geography. Ray always thought of the first immigrants, and wanted to preserve history. He used a 4X6 colored print of the Mark dump that his mother always had setting out in a small frame. On the cover of the book, "A Short History of Mark," is a winter scene of Mark's giant landmark, a reddish mountain-like formation covered in snow with the reddish purple clay, shale, sulfur and coal waste (slag) showing through the

HALLOWEEN SAFETY CENTER



Halloween can be a fun time for the family if a few safety tips are followed. Make sure you keep your children safe during this time of the year. Make Halloween a fun, safe and happy time for your kids and they'll carry on the tradition that you taught them to their own families some day!

- Help your child pick out or make a costume that will be safe. Make it fire proof, the eye holes should be large enough for good peripheral vision.
- If you set jack-o'-lanterns on your porch with candles in them, make sure that they are far enough out of the way so that kids costumes won't accidentally be set on fire.
- Make sure that if your child is carrying a prop, such as a scythe, butcher knife or a pitchfork, that the tips are smooth and flexible enough to not cause injury if fallen on.
- Kids always want to help with the pumpkin carving. Small children shouldn't be allowed to use a sharp knife to cut the top or the face. There are many kits available that come with tiny saws that work better than knives and are safer, although you can be cut by them as well. It's best to let the kids clean out the pumpkin and draw a face on it, which you can carve for them.
- Treating your kids to a spooky Halloween dinner will make them less likely to eat the candy they collect before you have a chance to check it for them.
- Teaching your kids basic everyday safety such as not getting into cars or talking to strangers, watching both ways before crossing streets and crossing when the lights tell you to, will help make them safer when they are out Trick or Treating.
- Know the route your kids will be taking if you aren't going with them.
- The best bet is to make sure that an adult is going with them. If you can't take them, see if another parent or a teen aged sibling can go along.
- Know what other activities a child may be attending, such as parties, school or mall functions.
- Make sure you set a time that they should be home by. Make sure they know how important it is for them to be home on time Explain to children the difference between tricks and vandalism. Throwing eggs at a house may seem like fun but they need to know the other side of the coin as well, clean up and damages can ruin Halloween. If they are caught vandalizing, make them clean up the mess they've made.

Granville Village Board Meeting

The regular meeting of the Granville Village Board was held October 6 at 6:30 p.m. with President Gimbal calling the meeting to order. Roll was called with Pettit, Norris, Coleman and President Gimbal answering roll. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited. Minutes of the last meeting were read. Motion by Norris, second by Pettit to accept minutes as read. All Trustees and President Gimbal voting aye. Bills were presented and reviewed. Motion by Coleman second by Norris to pay bill out of their respective funds. All Trustees and President Gimbal voting aye. The Treasurer's Report was read. Motion by Pettit, second by Coleman to accept report as read. All Trustees and President Gimbal voting aye.

Mr. Larry Good of Chamlin Engineering told the board he had nothing to report for this meeting. Charles Helmig, Village Attorney read Ordinance # 563, a refuse collection contract with Waste Management of Illinois. Motion to accept Ordinance #563 by Pettit, second by Norris. All Trustees and President Gimbal voting aye. This ordinance does not need to be published because it goes out past one year. He also discussed complaints about unkempt properties which have been received by Chief Moore. As they are not violating an ordinance there is nothing at this time to be done. 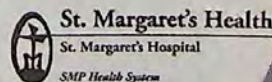

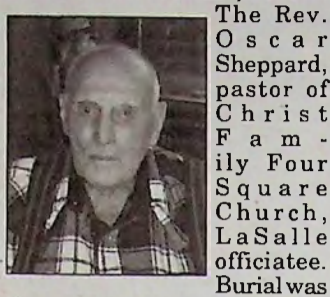

Crooks & Creeps

Excerpts From A New Book by Greg Stanmar

Walter Nixon

While the name Nixon conjures up all kinds of political nightmares, the one dealing with the president is covered elsewhere in this book. Walter Nixon, no relation, created a smaller stir in 1989 when he was removed from his federal appeals judgeship by the U.S. Senate.

What kept Judge Nixon in the news was his unsuccessful 1993 appeal to the U.S. Supreme Court about the impeachment and removal. That became part of the tools Republicans used when, five years later they went after bigger fish, President Bill Clinton, also covered elsewhere.

Born in 1928 in Biloxi MS, Walter Nixon never moved far from home. After graduating from Tulane University Law School at New Orleans in 1951 he moved the short distance back to Biloxi to begin private practice, taking time to put in two years with the Air Force.

He must have been doing something right, at least by Mississippi standards. In 1968 President Lyndon Johnson put him on the federal appeals bench for the southern district of Mississippi. Eventually his years on the bench made him chief judge in 1982.

By the mid 80s, he must have forgotten his ethics class lessons at Tulane and spoke to a county prosecutor about going easy or forgetting the marijuana smuggling charge against the son of one of his fat cat contractor friends. He was removed by the senate in 1989 for lying about that conversation with the prosecutor.

Though the lie was about good old boys helping each other and not about sex, the impeachment for perjury was enough for the U.S. House to remember the case when they wanted to do something with Bill Clinton.

"We fought this fight for five and one half years because we know we are not guilty of anything," Nixon told reporters after the removal.

His lying to a grand jury was not a milestone in judicial misbehavior. Two other federal judges were also removed in the 1980s.

They were Harry Claiborne of Nevada and Alcee Hastings of Florida. We also didn't forget to talk about them elsewhere.

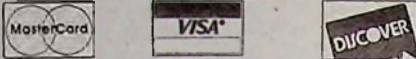
