ArcelorMittal Hennepin Closing Could Devastate Putnam County Area

Hennepin Steelworkers of America Local 7367 have been fighting to be heard by ArcelorMittal since the plant closed in late March. But the plant closing is not just their concern.

Granted they are the first to be affected due to the impact of losing their jobs but they certainly won't be the last affected. Every person or business owner in Putnam County will be affected by the loss of tax revenue along with the loss of the spending power of the over 70 employees that are residents of Putnam County.

The information presented in the rest of this article was gathered and put together by Hennepin Village Clerk, Jennifer Petersen, with the help of PC Treasurer, Kevin Kunkel. Although the figures are plus or minus 3% they definitely

show the devastation that will play havoc with taxing body budgets in Putnam County. It is my hope that every one will read this information, see the situation from a realistic perspective and join the steelworkers in their fight to bring another company to the mill in Hennepin.

This is not just the fight of the workers - it is the fight of all living in Putnam County and should be put at the front of everyone's priorities until it is settled favorably for PC. The continued shipping of American jobs to countries with much lower economic values will not bring them up to the level of America - it will take America down to their standards of living. The question every resident needs to ask themselves is: Is that where I want to be?

based on the current average per acre assessed value for ArcelorMittal property, the total real estate taxes for the 441.96 acres would be approximately \$1791 (vs. the current \$417,607.) **This could mean an approximate devastating amount of \$415,816 less in Real Estate Tax income alone to the local taxing bodies.** This does not include the incidental business that ArcelorMittal-Hennepin creates in the area with Trucking companies, machine companies, restaurants, etc.

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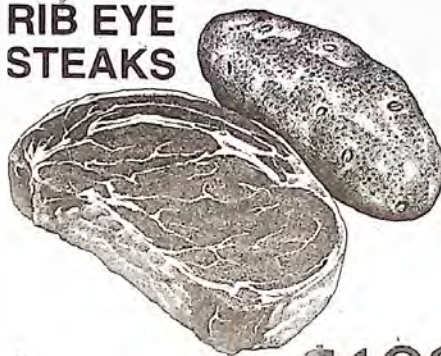

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Canine Distemper Reports Raise Concern

Dr. John Ehrhardt, Putnam County Animal Control Officer, has shared that a number of canine distemper cases have been reported in the State of Illinois this spring leading the Illinois State Veterinary Medical Association (ISVMA) to urge dog owners to be certain their animals have been vaccinated.

"Canine distemper is a contagious, incurable, often fatal, multi-systemic viral disease that affects the respiratory, gastrointestinal, and central nervous systems," according to Dr. Sheldon Rubin, President of the ISVMA. Distemper is caused by the *Morbillivirus* which is closely related to the human measles virus.

Canine distemper occurs among domestic dogs and many other carnivores, including raccoons, skunks, and foxes. Canine distemper is fairly common in wildlife. "All dogs are at risk but puppies younger than four months old and dogs that have not been vaccinated against canine distemper are at increased risk of acquiring the disease," Dr. Rubin added.

"Puppies and dogs usually become infected through airborne exposure to the virus contained in respiratory secretions of an infected dog or wild animal," Dr. Ehrhardt added.

According to the American Veterinary Medical Association (AVMA), the first sign of distemper is eye discharge

that may appear watery to pus-like. Subsequently, dogs develop fever, nasal discharge, coughing, lethargy, reduced appetite, vomiting, and diarrhea. In later stages, the virus may attack the nervous system, bringing about seizures, twitching, or partial or complete paralysis. Occasionally, the virus may cause footpads to harden. Distemper is often fatal.

Veterinarians diagnose canine distemper on the basis of clinical appearance and laboratory tests. There is no specific drug available that will kill the virus in infected dogs. The treatment consists primarily of efforts to prevent secondary infections, control vomiting, diarrhea, or neurologic symptoms; and combat dehydration through administration of fluids. "Sick dogs should be kept warm, receive good nursing care, and be separated from other dogs."

"An infected animal's prognosis depends on the strain of canine distemper virus and the dog's immune response," according to Dr. Ehrhardt. After the initial fever subsides, the disease can progress in a number of ways.

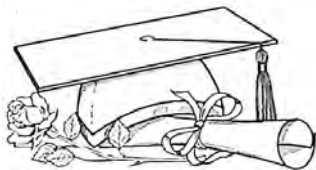
More than half of all dogs die between 2 weeks and 3 months after infection, usu-

ally from central nervous system complications. Most veterinarians recommend euthanasia for dogs that suffer progressive, severe neurologic complications.

In order to protect your dogs, pet owners should be sure that their distemper vaccination is up-to-date. Ask your veterinarian about a recommended vaccination program for your dogs."

Panthers Season Ends in Regional Championship

Fundamentals always can make or break a game, and such an instance occurred Saturday, May 23 at Jenkins Field in Granville, where Putnam County's baseball season ended to Dwight in the Regional Championship 2-1.

Following a leadoff single in the third inning, Travis Rueder laid down a bunt. However, no Panther infielder covered first base, allowing both runs to reach safely. Following a wild pitch and with one out, Dan Grubbs would hit a single, scoring both runners, giving the Trojans a 2-0 lead. "We have been bunting all week because we knew small ball stuff would win a game here. The execution of the bunting by the bottom of the lineup won the game for us," said Dwight coach Dan Kaiser.

The Panthers rallied however in the top of the fourth inning. After Luke Haun singled and stole second base, Anthony Ahlers would plate Haun with a single, cutting the lead to 2-1. PC had another opportunity in the sixth inning. Following walks to Haun and Alan Augspols, a failed bunt attempt, a strikeout, and a flyout ended the scoring chance. "We tried to bunt them over and failed to execute. (Cahill) had some pop on the ball, and we couldn't get around him," said PC Coach Dave Garcia.

"Defense and right pitches, and Cahill spotted some pitches. He is a great changeup pitcher. He had those kids thinking fast-ball and threw the changeup and they were ahead of it," Kaiser said moments before getting a Gatorade shower.

"We battled. Not a lot of people thought we would be here, and we had some underclassmen step up and improve. They exceeded a lot of expectations that people had. We asked a lot of guys to play in positions they were not use to, but they did and compete. I had three great seniors that made this year special. Our inexperience made us come up a little short today," Garcia added.

"PC has good tradition, good coaching, and they are young. They are going to be something to reckon with in the future. This was a tough regional, and we didn't take anybody for granted," Kaiser added.

Brad Passini took the loss for the Panthers. The senior pitched a complete game, giving up only two runs off five hits, while striking out eight and walking none. "I can't say enough good things about him. He has improved tremendously since last year," Garcia said of Passini. Leading the Panther offense was Ahlers, who went 2-3 in the game. "Anthony did not come out for the last three years, and he did a great job for us in his first year of high school baseball," Garcia said of the 6-7 Judson College recruit. "Kevin Fay is probably one of the greatest kids I was able to coach. He is a great athlete but extremely coachable and talented," said Garcia of his other senior Fay.

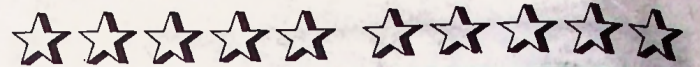

First and foremost, while many of the faces of those in attendance were familiar from years past, there were many new attendees that should be particularly thanked for attending the "wet" ceremonies.

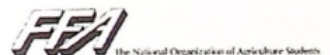

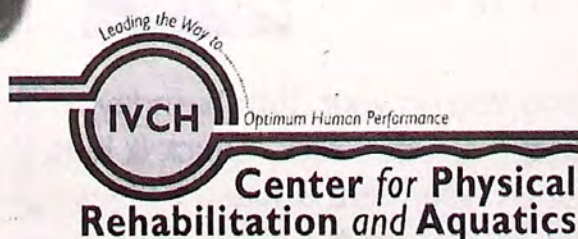

Hear His Word



"The Pearl of Great Price"

Since this is the graduation season at the time I write this article, I believe we should congratulate the Class of 2009, those graduating from college, high school, and junior high. I believe an appropriate scripture verse for this time is Matthew 13:45-46. This is one of the shortest gospel parables about the kingdom of God, which tells of a merchant who was searching for fine pearls. On eventually finding one of great value, he went and sold everything that he had so he could buy it.

The narrative is easily pictured in our imaginations. It implies that the merchant is engaged on a quest for precious, fine pearls. Perhaps he has already found some, accumulating a small collection. Delighted with the success of his search, he was about to return home. Then he came across another pearl, and everything changed. It was so beautiful and valuable that the others seemed dull and worthless. The outcome? He sold all the pearls he already had in order to possess and own the only one worth having. What he had once thought to be the best, turned out merely to be good; and being good just was not good enough, only the best would do.

It is a telling illustration. Life is indeed a journey. Of course, the pearl that the merchant found was God, the most valuable pearl of all. A second pearl to discover on our life journey is what Socrates said ages ago: "Help thyself." One must discover their mind, heart, and spirit within themselves before they can discover the third pearl, which is to discover your place in the world, in other words, what is most meaningful to you in life and in this world.

To illustrate such a journey in life, there is an old Indian story. In this particular tribe, before being named a brave, all the young men had to take a journey by themselves and climb a sacred mountain, and bring back a symbol of their climb. The tribe waited for the young men to return. The first young man returned after a couple of hours, only climbing to the rocks, and bringing back a rock to symbolize his journey. The tribe was impressed. Then the tribe waited a few more hours for the second young man to return; he had climbed to the timber line of the mountain, and brought back an evergreen branch. The tribe was impressed. The tribe waited for the third young man to return; they waited a day or two, but no sign of him. They were about ready to give up when they saw in the distance a person on the road that would walk a step or two and then fall down exhausted. The tribe went to meet him and assist him. It was the third young man. They asked what symbol he had brought back to symbolize how high he had climbed the mountain. He replied, "I brought back nothing." The tribe was about ready to leave, when the young man said, "But, wait. I have climbed to the top of the mountain and seen the ocean on the other side?" Of course, the third young man had climbed the highest, and what he brought back was his vision, a valuable pearl.

We wish the best to the Class of 2009. And we hope that no matter what their future endeavors are; they will be able to see the world from where they live.

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Crooks & Creeps

Excerpts From A New Book by Greg Stanmar

Mark Foley

Perhaps it should be a warning bell for either political party that when a politician begins talking too loudly about laws protecting minors from sexual exploitation, one had better look into that guy's closet.



Such a thing happened to Mark Foley, a Florida Republican congressman who had to resign in disgrace just before his re-election. In fact, the scandal provided a tongue-in-cheek campaign slogan from the man quickly put up to run for Foley's seat.

Florida State Rep. Joe Negron was tapped to take Foley's seat, though it was too late in 2006 to change the ballots. It was hoped that the "Punch Foley for Negron" campaign would salvage that traditionally Republican district for the party. It did not. Democrat Tim Mahoney narrowly beat Negron, who then called for a full investigation of Foley.

Even Foley's Scientology church disowned him after Republican House Speaker Dennis Hastert told him nothing short of resignation in his sixth term would do. When the scandal became public the Church of Scientology removed any mention of Foley as one of its strong supporters.

Foley had the lethal combination of being a powerful homosexual drunk who had access to e-mail while intoxicated. It was his suggestive e-mails that brought him down, though it was never proven he acted on those fantasies.

Foley was born in 1954 in Massachusetts, with retired Red Sox star Jimmy Piersall as his baptismal godfather. At the age of three Foley moved with his family to Lake Worth, FL. After a stab at post-high school scholastics at the local junior college, Foley, at the age of 20, opened a restaurant and then went into real estate.

Three years later he was on the Lake Worth City Council. By 1990 he was elected to the Florida House and two years after that was a state senator. Even though questions about Foley's sexual orientation began to be raised, at least in the alternative press, he was elected to the U.S. House in 1994. He called allegations of his love life "disgusting," though never denying the reports. He was well on his way to a bid for the Senate in 2003 when those rumors caught up with him and he took himself out of the race, citing his father's health as the reason.

As House whip he spearheaded legislation protecting children from predators. Prosecutors are trying to use some of those laws to get Foley but two years after he resigned they still have not gained access to his computers, the courts citing constitutional problems with the request.

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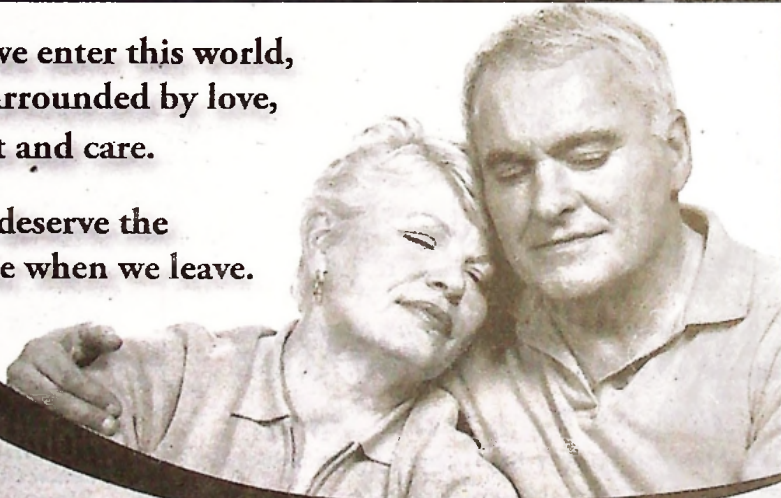

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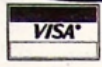

It has come to the attention of the Record that Putnam County and the Village of Mark will begin to receive tax revenue funds again from the Hartney Oil Co. Kevin Kunkel said that the IDR is allowing sales tax revenue generated by Hartney Oil to again start coming monthly to Putnam County.

In the state case it was reported that the office in Mark was a dead-letter office only and that revenues generated by the firm should have been going to another Hartney Oil office. It was stated that the Chicago firm representing Hartney would have until June 11 to respond to Hartney's pleadings and a June 25 deadline for the lawyers to file briefs. 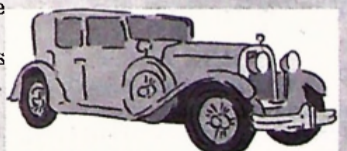

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Letter to the Editor

ArcelorMittal vs. National Security and What's Critical to Our Country

I know that many from the USW local 7367 at Hennepin will be writing about how the closing of our finishing mill will affect them and their families. My heart goes out to all of them. But if I may, I'd like to present a viewpoint that some, if not most, have not heard yet.

The ArcelorMittal finishing plant at Hennepin is the most productive facility of its size that they own in the US. It produces a better quality product than the rest of their facilities in this country and it has always been profitable, even in bad economic times (48 million dollars in 2008). Its max capability is 1.2 million tons of finished steel per year. And they can do it with fewer employees than any of their other facilities. So why in the world would any company close such a facility? I propose that the real reasons are as follows:

In Hennepin, we have what is called a Cold Roll Reduction Mill, known to us that worked there, as the Tandem Mill. It is the most powerful of its kind in this country and perhaps the world. It has no equal. It is capable of producing types of specialized steel not possible anywhere else in this country. ArcelorMittal wants that Tandem Mill; but not in this country. As I understand it, this valuable equipment will be going to Brazil. You heard me, Brazil. It will be taken out of the US industrial arsenal without ever being replaced.

The facility at Hennepin also has a 2 stand Temper Mill. It is the 'running mate' of the Tandem Mill. Its extension capabilities far exceed those elsewhere and as a result, it is the plant of choice from which our customers wanted their products. Orders for high strength steel for automotive applications were also run at Hennepin because the other mills failed in their attempts to produce it. Like its running mate, the Tandem Mill, this is a powerful Temper Mill. As I understand it, this production mill will be going to France.

These valuable resources are critical to maintaining the status of our steel producing capabilities and would be invaluable in times of a national emergency.

I understand that foreign steel imports are restricted as long as US steel production has not reached 100 percent. Once our mills reach 100 percent, the steel import floodgates are opened to match the demand. ArcelorMittal is the largest steelmaker in the world and they are not a US steel company. So what we have done here is allowed the largest foreign steelmaker in the world that is not a US company to directly reduce the US steel production capabilities so they can import more steel using equipment exported from US steel mills. So, once the US steel production reaches 100 percent (which will now be 1.2 million tons sooner), we will start importing steel made on US exported equipment from France and Brazil. I'm not sure if that should be legal.

If President Obama does not know this is happening to our country, someone, somewhere, somehow, should inform him. The fact that a foreign company can steal our most valuable resources, things that have made us so great, and use it against us for the sake of a buck, borders on industrial terrorism. What is happening is critical to our nation. If ArcelorMittal gets away with it, so will others. We need to stand up and set a precedence. If this activity goes unchecked, it will be a model for other foreign companies to follow. In the guise of national security, we need to remain vigilant and understand the ramifications of our decisions; especially with our most precious military assets. WAKE UP AMERICA!

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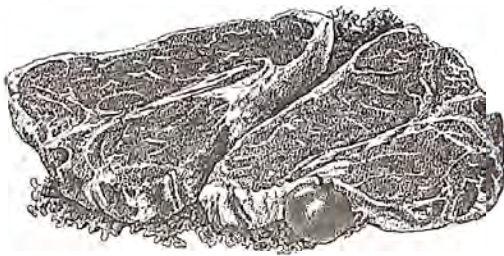

U of I 4-H House Celebrated 75 Years in May

The University of Illinois 4-H House at Urbana-Campaign campus celebrated its 75th anniversary in May. It is a cooperative sorority. The 4-H House has been home to

the U of I campus. The first two years the women paid \$10 a month and rented a house. In 1938 they purchased a house and paid \$25 a month. In the 50's the women were determined to build a house

over 1,000 women since its founding in 1934.

The 4-H house was begun by Mary McKee, a U of I professor, who wanted to make the U of I education accessible for rural IL women, because of the economic hardships of the depression. She organized the house as a cooperative where women paid house dues in canned goods, cooked their own meals and did their own housekeeping.

To this day the 4-H House remains as the only one in the nation, and still upholds its original standards. The house began with 16 members and today houses 55 young women; a minimum of five years of 4-H membership is required for house membership. The cost of living at the 4-H house is very small compared to other university housing options.

The 4-H house has been in three different locations on

and began a catering business and ultimately raised enough money for the project. The present 4-H House opened in 1961.

In the 40's 2/3 of the members majored in Home Economics. Today it is no longer a field of study at the U of I. A lot has changed in the past 75 years, but the women in the 4-H House still come from farms and small towns, bringing with them strong family values and being a good neighbor. The 4-H roots and style of living, and the ability of the house to be a home away from home makes it an ideal place for young women.

The 4-H House was a special place for my family, and especially for our daughter, Debra. Debra wanted to go to the U of I, but we were concerned at that time about the riots that had gone on throughout colleges in the U.S. We had seen newspaper pictures where store windows were broken and boarded up. Jeanne had gone back to college after Scott went to first grade and was going to IL State in Normal. We wanted Debra to go there.

We knew Julia Edgerley had gone to the U of I and stayed at the 4-H House. We called Julia and she recommended that Debra go there, that it was safe and a good place for young women. I told Debra she could go to U of I if she could stay there. Debra and I took Jeanne to ISU one morning and then drove to the U of I to visit the campus and the 4-H House.

When we arrived at the 4-H House, we were met by Colleen Calshan who gave us a tour. We had never met her before but she became Debra's big sister there.

Several women from Marshall-Putnam counties have stayed at the 4-H House over the years. It proved to be a great place for a college freshman to go to college and be able to study and graduate from the U of I. The 4-H House is a great home away from home for young women.

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Fay Reflects on Second Year at Southern IU

Carlton Fay's second year was quite an improvement from his freshman year in Chris Lowery's Southern Illinois Saluki basketball program. Recently, Carlton was home on a short break from school, and talked about his sophomore season and other things about his career.

"I had a better year. I got more accustomed to playing college basketball. It is a huge leap and I didn't make it my first year, but I did my second year," said the 2007 Putnam County graduate. When asked what Lowery told him at the beginning of the year, Fay said, "I had to be more aggressive. The reason that they brought me in was to score the basketball. I feel I did a better job on that this year, and hopefully I can do that next year."

Affectionally known as "Big Country" down in Carbondale due to him being from a town with no fast food restaurants or stop lights, Fay took the Missouri Valley Conference by storm, opening up with a quick start, placing him among the top of several key statistic sheet. However, that quick start by the all-time leading scorer at Putnam County High School was quickly noted by other conference coaches, and that seemed to harm Fay in the latter stages of the season. "The scouting report got out and I got a little bit worn down at the end of the year, so I don't want that to happen next year. Problem is I have to keep my condition up and hopefully I can do that," Fay added.

With Fay's success in his sophomore year, the son of Harold and Amy Fay will potentially be looked at as one of the main players on the SIU basketball squad in his junior year. In order to be one of those main players,

Fay realizes there are some parts of his game that he will have to work on during a summer that will see him play in international basketball and taking summer classes as well. "I have to work on my face up game. That is being able to score in the post and do more things instead of shooting. Hopefully I can rebound some more as well."

Fay's sophomore season also provided a unique and rare opportunity to play in the "World's Most Famous Arena." During the Thanksgiving Holiday, Fay and his Salukis traveled to Madison Square Garden in New York City in a tournament. The tournament was televised on the ESPN Television network and the Salukis faced nationally rated and recognizable teams such as UCLA and Duke. When asked about the experience, Fay commented by saying, "it was a real neat place. A lot of real good players played there, and to be in New York and play on such a big stage and on ESPN, that is why you start playing when you are little kid. Not a lot of people get to do that, and I am very fortunate to do that. It was also neat to see all the guys you see on TV over there as well."

Fay also wanted to discuss the community support he has received. Whenever SIU played at ISU, Bradley, or NIU, family and friends traveled to that arena to watch their native son play. "It is incredible (of all the support)," Fay said. "When we played at NIU, I had a lot of family, friends, and members of the community showing great pride that this place has got. It is proud for me when my teammates come up to me asking me where everybody is from, because they don't think anyone lives in Putnam County. It is neat to see everyone

out there. I am proud to say I am from here, and I think they are proud to say that I am from here as well."

On Friday, May 21, Fay left the United States for an opportunity to play international basketball in China. "I am going over there to play for two weeks, playing in about eight games, and getting to see a little of the countryside and get a little experience," Fay commented, adding that the opportunity came from SIU. "I am able to play through a program that one of my coaches hooked me up with, and I was able to be invited to play. I hope to get some more games under my belt. You can never play enough games, and it can help me get ready for next year."

We cannot depend on foreign imports to rebuild our nation's infrastructure or provide the needed materials for the defense of the nation. We only ask that for the sake of our communities they contact the elected leadership and convey the serious situation that we have been put in by foreign owned companies. As an aside, ArcelorMittal is the only major steel producer that is permanently closing American plants; not U.S. Steel, Nucor or others.

Freedom House Experiences Budget Cuts

In these hard economic times, charitable giving becomes a luxury many cannot afford. However, Freedom House's extended community continues to find ways to maintain its generous spirit through volunteerism, purchases and in-kind donations at Upscale Resale.

Proceeds from Upscale Resale, a resale shop located at 214 W. St. Paul Street in Spring Valley, directly benefit Freedom House clients and their children. Freedom House is a domestic violence and rape crisis center, serving Bureau, Henry, Marshall, Putnam and Stark counties.

"Freedom House, like other agencies, is experiencing budget cuts. We have also seen fewer monetary donations as many people have had to tighten their belts," said Connie Doran, Executive Director. "People have continued, however, to help in many ways, including calls to volunteer and through donating items to the store. These donations are either given free of charge to clients of Freedom House and other partnering agencies or, if sold to the public, the proceeds come directly back to Freedom House to serve clients.

"No matter what way you look at it," she continued, "your donations are helping others."

Thanks in part to sales at Upscale Resale, Freedom House has been able to continue to offer free services to its more than 650 adult, teen and child clients, including a 24-hour staffed hotline, counseling and/or therapy, medical and legal advocacy, food and clothing, violence prevention education, support groups, and emergency and long-term shelter.

"When funds were cut, and there was a threat of having to disrupt or even stop services to our clients and their children, money from Upscale Resale was able to keep the free services continuing for our clients," said Doran. "There was no break in services, even for a short time, because of the work Upscale Resale does and thanks to Manager Raylene Ferrari, all the volunteers and to our customers. We are very grateful to have this entity as a means of support."

Freedom House recently graduated 17 new volunteers and its volunteer supervisor, Stephanie Cartwright, hopes more people in the community will follow their lead. "Upscale Resale cannot operate at its maximum capacity without the help of others. We always need volunteers to help us sort and display new donations; to assist customers; and, of course, to help our clients and their children shop for and receive what they need.

"Every hour a volunteer donates—in addition to every item donated—translates to much-needed services, such as free shelter, food, clothing and free counseling and/or therapy for victims of domestic and sexual violence," added Cartwright. "Your time and effort truly will make a difference."

Sorting nights are planned for Tuesday evenings from 5 to 7 p.m. and Upscale Resale is open Wednesdays and Fridays from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m.; Thursdays from 10 a.m. to 6 p.m.; and Saturdays from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m. Pick-up of large donations, including furniture, may be scheduled by calling (815) 664-2414.

"We have not had to cut services to our clients, but we are now having to make our dollars and employees' time stretch much further to support those who come to us for help," said Doran. "At this time, we are merely putting the plea out there to help in whatever way you can. We could certainly use monetary donations, gas cards, furniture donations and volunteer help at Upscale Resale, but we equally need the public to shop our store. The generosity of others is evident."

Ferrari accepts new or gently used donations, except stuffed animals and used mattresses, at the facility's side door.

"We are fortunate to receive high-quality, brand-name clothing and merchandise, furniture, household items and virtually everything you could need in your home, and we turn around and sell it for just a fraction of what it's really worth. We oftentimes have articles of brand-name clothing and shoes for only \$1," said Ferrari. "Because of this, we have people come to visit us from all over the area and throughout the state. We even have one customer (from the Chicago area) who'll make a whole weekend out of shopping at Upscale Resale and the Illinois Valley area just because she likes our merchandise so much.

"We're more than a resale shop," she concluded. "Our work helps make a better life for victims of domestic and sexual violence, and your shopping here, directly helps them. Everybody wins."

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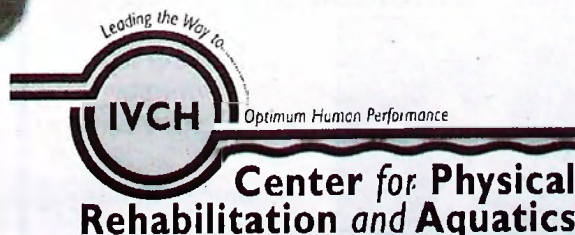

Before Tuesday, June 16 game in Hennepin, first year head coach Dave Yeager said that all of his minor league baseball team was starting to peak. The peak of his team was evident in a 14-4 rout of the Spring Valley Athletics that was called after five innings due to the mercy rule.

While Hennepin's offensive attack lasted the entire game, the main damage was done in the third inning. After a pitching change, Jon Witzman and Devin Forbes each plated two runs with singles making the score 11-2. "(Assistant Coach) Jared (Sale) is real aggressive on the base paths. He always wants everyone to steal at first and they did, and we got the bats going. Everything worked and I feel good about our upcoming games," said Yeager.

In the fifth inning, Bailey Brown and Jens Soderholm earned leadoff walks. Following a fielder's choice, a wild pitch would score Brown and an errant throw by Spring Valley's catcher would plate another. Up 13-4 and with the bases loaded, Christian Garza would earn his first base hit of the season, ending the game due to the mercy rule. "That was great to see him get a big hit like that. The effort has been here and he comes early to hit. He is always there wanting the team to win and helping everyone out. He is a great teammate," Yeager said about Garza and his game-winning hit.

While aiding his team by knocking in two runs in the pivotal third inning, Forbes also contributed on the pitching mound. Forbes would earn the complete game victory, giving up four runs off of seven hits in his first start of the season. He struck out five and walked none. Holocker finished the game perfect from the plate, going 3-3 with a triple, two singles, two stolen bases, and two RBI's. Forbes and Witzman ended the game going 1-3 at the plate, while Garza went 1-4. "Forbes threw well. We are short on arms this week with one having a sore arm and one throwing the other day," Yeager said. "To come out like that (tonight) is a great sign. Like I said earlier, we are peaking." Following the victory, Hennepin's record went to 2-3-1.

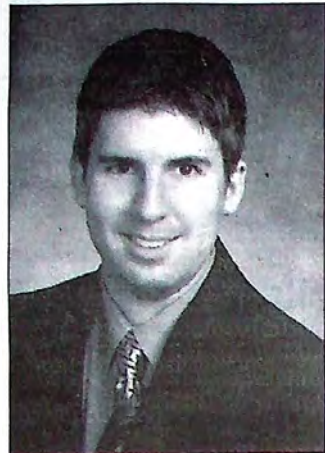

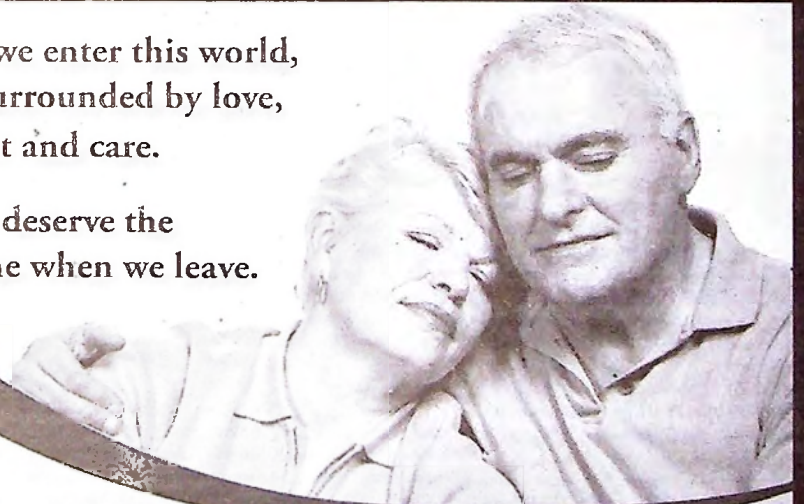

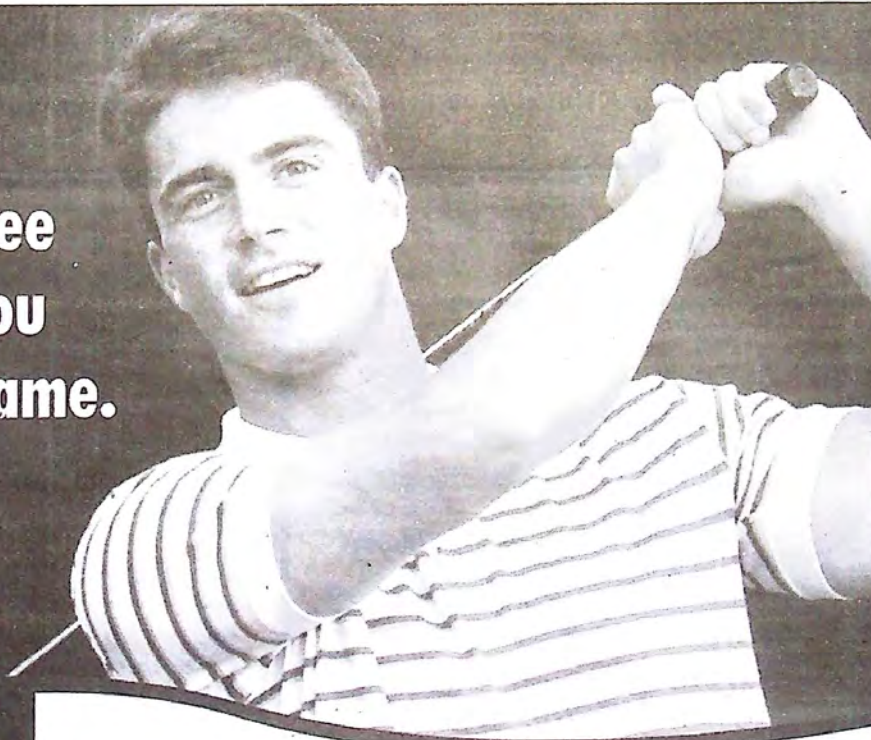

Hear His Word



Last week we celebrated what we call Trinity Sunday. It is the day that we honor and praise our God as One but existing in three persons, the Father, Son and Holy Spirit. The dogma of the Holy Trinity is our most important dogma and yet one of the most confusing. Nowhere do we see the actual word "Trinity" used in Holy Scripture but we have references to it throughout the Bible. The clearest reference can be found in the Gospel of Matthew, "Go therefore and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit...." (Mt. 28:19) Even in Jesus' prayer to His Father he prays, "Holy Father, keep them in your name, which you have given me, that they may be one, even as we are one." (Jn. 17:11)

During my sermon on the Solemnity of the Most Holy Trinity, I told my congregation that I could speak of the actual dogma of the Holy Trinity, but I would have to wake them up after I was done explaining it. I continued to say that it was enough to say that God wanted to reveal His love for us by revealing Himself to us, as He is, the Father, Son and Holy Spirit. And this is the point that I want to make today, God is love. In fact, there is no other true source of love outside of God.

God, our Father, created us, not because He needed us to complete Himself, He was already complete in His unity. But God wanted to share with us His life and His love and thus invite us into His unity. Throughout the Old Testament we see evidences of the Father's love for His people. And even though the people often turned their backs on Him He never stopped calling them.

It was through the Father's care of His people that we were given a glimpse of His love for us. But He went further by sending us His only Son, Jesus, to become one like us in all things save sin. When Jesus took upon Himself our flesh, you could say that love took on human form. Not only could we see evidences of God's love, but now we could experience His love humanly and experientially. Jesus showed us His love by dying a most gruesome death in order to repair the damage we had inflicted upon ourselves. By His death we were given eternal life.

Then the Father and the Son sent us their Spirit, the Holy Spirit to dwell within us. It was through the Holy Spirit's coming at Pentecost, which Pastor Ann had written about last week, that brought love to dwell within us. God's love was no longer something I experienced out there but now could experience His love within me. And it is through this love that we are able to unite as one with our Lord God, Father, Son and Holy Spirit.

One more thing, it is through God that all miracles are pos-

Fireworks Pose Dangerous Risks

With planning for 4th of July celebrations already in full swing, Prevent Blindness America, is urging the public to refrain from purchasing or using fireworks. In 2007, approximately 6,300 Americans were treated in emergency rooms across the country due to fireworks-related injuries around the 4th holiday, according to the Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC).

Unfortunately, more than 40 percent of all fireworks injuries were to children under the age of 15. In fact, sparklers accounted for the most injuries that required medical attention to children ages 4 and under. Some may be surprised to learn that sparklers were associated with the most number of injuries to both adults and children. According to the National Fire Protection Association, "safe and sane" fireworks caused more injuries than illegal fireworks, especially to preschool children.

The second most common injury from fireworks is to the eyes, including contusions and lacerations, debris in the eye and burns. For example, a case was reported to the CPSC regarding a 6-year-old girl who was holding a Roman candle firework. The sparks that emitted from the Roman candle entered her eye and she required immediate medical treatment from an emergency room.

The term 'safe and sane' fireworks is heard and we think that they are harmless, but a sparkler can burn at up to 1,800 degrees. Roman candles, firecrackers and bottle rockets may seem enticing, especially to children. But they can be very dangerous and that is why Prevent Blindness America wants to make sure that consumers are aware of these dangers and make sure they protect their eyes.

Tragically, fireworks can go beyond injuries and even result in death. In 2007, a 7-year-old boy was killed when a 2-inch mortar shell tipped over just before igniting and struck the boy in the chest. And, a 4-year-old boy died after lighting fireworks he found in a closet. The intense heat of the fire in the home prevented rescuers from reaching him in time.

1) Private pool - term "swimming pool" is hereby defined as a receptacle for water or an artificial pool of water having a depth at any point of not more than two feet, intended for the purpose of immersion or partial immersion of human beings.

2) No portion of swimming pool shall be located at a distance less than eight feet from any property line.

3) Wading pools up to two feet deep shall not be left unattended. If unattended, water should be drained. Any pool over two feet deep shall require a fence of not less than five feet, and shall be fenced on all sides with a gate with a self latch (lock). Fence posts shall be decay or corrosion resistant. Security fence of either nine gauge metal or wood. Or a combination of both.

4) Every swimming pool over two feet shall be equipped with at least one throwing ring not more than 15" in diameter and having 20' of nylon rope permanently attached and one or more light weight, but strong poles with blunted ends not less than 12' long for rescue.

5) The health officer upon request of the pool owner or board has the right to inspect the pool and safety equipment, before and during each season. The pool cannot be filled if the fence is not in place.

The homeowner or person responsible for the pool is required by the Village Board to provide proof of liability insurance at the onset and any time during the entire time the pool is filled with water. Every year the pool is in use.

Chapter 24 Section 11-5-2, or who shall not keep the same yarded, or otherwise confined, or who shall permit any such dog or dogs, cat or cats, or other animal or animals to stray upon the premises of another, to the annoyance of the owner or occupant of each premises, shall be deemed guilty of keeping or creating a public nuisance.

SECTION 3: That any person or persons, firm or corporation who shall violate any section or provision of this ordinance, shall be fined as follows:

- A) \$50 plus current court cost, first offense;
- B) \$100 plus current court cost, second offense;
- C) \$200 plus current court cost, third offense, and subsequent offenses.

SECTION 4: PARTIAL VALIDITY. If any section, subdivision, or sentence of this Ordinance is for any reason held invalid or held to be unconstitutional, such a decision shall not affect the validity of the remaining portion of this Ordinance.

SECTION 5: Upon the approval and passage of this Ordinance, it shall rescind any and all other animal Ordinances.

SECTION 6: This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage, approval, and publication as provided by law.
