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Granville Cemetery Historic Walk

Editor's Note: This is the first in a series of stories written about the great history of Putnam County as depicted through the various cemeteries of the lives of the people who settled here many decades ago. We hope all of you enjoy this presentation by our dedicated history writer.

The Historical Society of Putnam County presents a Cemetery Walk each year with presenters who depict the lives of our early settlers. Presenters for the Granville Walk were George and Louise Hawthorne, who portrayed William and Emma Hawthorne; Sydney Whitaker, who told the story of Wilhelmina Whitaker; Jay McCracken and Elizabeth Clausen, who portrayed Ralph and Lucinda Ware; Barbara Kessler, who portrayed Mrs. Joel Willis Hopkins and told the story of her husband and father-in-law, Joel Willis and A.W. Hopkins; Larry Kessler, who told the story of his great-grandparents, Samuel and Margaret Kessler; and Brad Popurella who told the story of Gustaf and Phoebe Naumann.

The scripts were developed by both the Cemetery Walk Committee and the presenters from information gleaned through research and personal knowledge. Guides were Pam Boussein, Ellyonna Glenn, Shelia Haage, Karen Mecagni, Lonna Naumann, Lorraine Terando and Rotary Interact Club Volunteers. Loretta Schrowang and Verna Reed were in charge of the guest book and Karen Bailey was in charge of refreshments.

The Granville Cemetery dates from 1863 to present. Some burials predate that year because stones were moved from the old cemetery in order to

preserve them. This was a historical remembrance of Granville and Putnam County's past which came alive at the annual Cemetery Walk at the Granville Cemetery this year.

The Walk showcased Putnam County residents from over 100 years ago.

PART I

"Good afternoon. I am George William Hawthorne, one of the six living grandchildren of William Edward Hawthorne. Today I am portraying my grandfather and telling you of his life as though he were speaking."

"Our family were true pioneers of this area. My grandmother was widowed in Ohio when her husband, William Hawthorne, died. She came with her parents, the Parrs, to Illinois in 1832 and married Shepherd Moore, settling west of Mark. She brought her son William, my father, and two sisters, Hannah Jane who married

A.P. Dysart and Mary Ann who married Orin C. McCord."

"Dad married Susannah Douglas Findley and homesteaded SW of Standard. He lived in a log cabin. my older brother, Shepherd David, was the first born. He lived most of his life in Michigan. I, William Edward, and my twin Orin Edwin ("Ode" to all of us) were born June 7, 1859. Ode lived in Missouri. My little Sister, Susan Jane (Jennie - Mrs. H.M. Mills) was born in 1864. My mother died a few months later and we children went to live with Grandmother Moore."

"During the four years with her, we boys attended school at the Moore one room country schoolhouse which my sons called "Rathole Seminary." We lived with the Moores only until our father remarried the widow, Emalina Fields Humphrey. Except for Jennie, who stayed with the Moores, we then lived in Normal and Indiana. I attended Indiana Normal School at Valparaiso."

"I did not follow with my father and stepmother, who went to the Dakotas, and there raised a second family. We were never close to my half-brothers and sisters, and Glenn and Ear in time lived in California."

"During the years of 1880-84, I taught in Michigan, Indiana and at Florid, where I walked every morning from Granville. On March 14, 1882 I married Emma Emelia Opper, daughter of Christian George and Anna Elizabeth (Schneider) Opper who immigrated from Germany in 1855 and 1856 respectively. (Mr. Opper and his mother came together, but sadly she died enroute and was buried in the Atlantic Ocean leaving him a mere teenage boy to arrive alone.) Both Emma and I taught in Vermontville MI

and Essexville MI. Emma and I shared 58 years of wedded bliss."

"In 1884 we returned to Granville and purchased a home at the SW corner of McCoy and front Streets and lived in it the rest of our lives. Our six children were born here. Twins William Henry and Orin Lawrence in 1890, twins Helen and Marie in 1895, Charles Findley in 1898, and Edward Everett in 1902. We have 13 grandchildren, 25 great-grandchildren, and seven step-great-grandchildren. The number of great-great-great slips my mind. Two grandchildren and three greats live in Granville, but there is no one here still bearing the name of Hawthorne."

"I was always concerned with education and in 1898 I was elected County Superintendent of Schools and served eight years. I served on the Board of Education of both the grade school and Hopkins Township High School. I had worked very hard promoting the establishment of the high school."

"My endeavors were many and extreme. I managed Bate-man's General Store, established a hardware and grocery store with G.L. Brando, was Marshall and later secretary of the Granville Literary Society, held positions of Township Clerk, Village Clerk, Village

Treasurer, undertaker before the days of chapels and mortuaries, was Postmaster twice under Benjamin Harrison and Theodore Roosevelt, secretary of the Granville Telephone Company organized in 1897, organized the Granville Mercantile Company which was sold to Schafer and Leighton, ran unsuccessfully for the State Legislature, was a member of the Anti-Saloon League Committee of One Thousand which went to Washington in cause of Prohibition. I was always a stalwart Republican but in 1912 I strayed to the Progressive Party and was Assistant Sergeant at Arms at the National Convention. With John Spencer Burt I authored the history book, 'Past and Present Marshall and Putnam Counties Illinois.' I was secretary of the Selective Service Board throughout World War I. Some years later I conceived and proposed the adopted plan to sell bonds to pay for the 1st Legion Post home in Granville. I served as President of the First State Bank in Granville. I was a Presidential Elector when Coolidge was named U.S. President, and was an alternate delegate to the National Presidential Convention in 1932."

"I founded the Granville Echo

History From the Files of the PC Record

10 YEARS AGO OCTOBER 4, 2000

The facelift of the old *Putnam County Record* building back was completed and the construction team of Chuck Templeton, Jay Hammell, Andre Crockett and Deon Wright were applauded for a job well done.

PC Schools were accenting reading during the current school year. PCEF helped fund an expansion of the Accelerated Reader Program in the school with a new program to begin at Hennepin School as well.

The Lions Club held a brick sale to help in the purchase of park equipment at Boyle Park in Hennepin.

PCEF Announced their 2001 theater schedule. Many new performances were in the works. It promised to be a fun year.

National 4-H Week was celebrated October 1-7 with many activities taking place in the county.

Granville and neighboring villages set their trick or treat hours for October 31st.

PCAS seniors were putting together their plans for their annual Bazaar on Oct. 22nd.

It being an election year the *Putnam County Record* was starting to see many political ads come in.

Robert J. and Emma Lou (Walling) Ashley of rural Tonica celebrated their 50th wedding anniversary with an open house at the Immanuel Lutheran Church. The open house was given by their five sons and their families.

Mike Garcia, representative for the PC School auditorium project, received a check from Rotary President Bill Klein in the amount of \$1,000. A check for \$50 was also given by Jeanne Alleman who had received the Rotary Citizen Service Above Self Award and donated the award money to the project.

PCES-Hopkins held their annual Open House where students had the opportunity to share their classrooms and school with parents and family.

Secretary of State and State Librarian Jesse White awarded \$13.3 million in grant monies to various libraries in the State. PC Public Library received \$7,074.54 in grant funds.

The Fall Swing Show was a success at PCHS on Sept. 26 with over 225 people in attendance to watch and participate. Emcees Kevin Long and Falon Reasons amused the audience with jokes and introductions.

Members of the Granville UCC pledged \$250 to stamp out hunger when they sponsored church members for the annual IL Valley CROP Walk on Oct. 1. Bob and Patti Dawe coordinated the effort. Walkers were Bob and Patti Dawe, David, Jennifer, Emily, Abby, Nathan, Hannah and Mary Smith. Boggio's donated apples as a treat at the end of the walk.

Earth Day poster contest participant Tommy Lawse of Hennepin 4th grade, was the featured poster courtesy of Exolon-ESK Company in Hennepin.

The Annual Standard's Women's Auxiliary Bus Trip was planning for November 5th to Woodfield Mall.

25 YEARS AGO OCTOBER 2, 1985

The Peter Rabbit Preschool children visited a hog farm in rural McNabb owned by the Carr Brothers and got to see baby Hampshire pigs.

The Village of Granville was already planning its 150th birthday for 1986. The Pre-150th Celebration winners were announced.

The County Clerk's office was open on Saturday for the purpose of last minute voters registration for the Nov. 5th Non Partisan election.

PC Schools received their Report Card for the district.

Editor Elin A. Arnold's "Off the Record" was on "How to Report a Hazardous Material Spill" to the EPA.

Class representatives were elected for the ensuing year at the Junior High School by the Student Council. The executive officers selected were Jenny Urnikis, president; Edward Okono, VP; Krysti Boggio, secretary; and Eric Hrovat, treasurer.

Fran Chiapelli returned to her home in Mark after spending three weeks in Yugoslavia visiting.

DEATHS: Walter F. Flesburn, 94 of Ottawa died Sept. 26 in OCH; Hallie H. Leonard, 87 of Bureau died Sept. 27 in PMH, Princeton; Russell T. Phillips, 70 of rural Hennepin died in the SMH ER, Spring Valley; Debra S. Wealer, 25 of rural Putnam died Sept. 24 after a 15 year illness; Samuel "Sam" Lawrence, 71 of Granville died Sept. 27.

35 YEARS AGO OCTOBER 2, 1975

The program and dedication of the Putnam County Bicentennial Flag took place on Sept. 28 in front of the courthouse in Hennepin.

American's Bicentennial is an appropriate time to pause and reflect on our country's history, assess where we as a citizenry stand today among ourselves, and where our country stands in the eyes of other nations. The Bicentennial period is a time to look ahead to new horizons.

The Board of Education approved an increase in the substitute teacher pay scale to \$27.50 per day.

45 YEARS AGO SEPTEMBER 30, 1965

Mrs. Helen Kunkel of the Putnam County Public Aid office attended a two-day planning meeting and workshop held in Springfield.

Granville completed its initial zoning when the village board, in an adjourned meeting, adopted the Zoning Ordinance, as presented by the local Zoning Commission.

Miss Helen Poindexter of Geneva and Olin E. Massey

of Mt. Holly NC were married in the home of the bride's sister and husband, Charles B. Robinson.

Rev. John M. Johnson, 74 of Sterling, former pastor of Immanuel Lutheran Church, died unexpectedly Sept. 24 while visiting in the home of his daughter, Mrs. John Erickson.

The first election of a board of education of School District #535, Putnam County Community School Unit, was held Sept. 23 in six precincts with 11 candidates on the ballot. Elected were Dr. R.M. Germang, Edward F. Coss, Ernest Bassi, Ellsworth Zellmer, Francis A. Boyle, Robert Keegan and Arthur N. Johnson. Dr. Stork says: Sp/4 and Mrs. Lee Burr, Jr., the former stationed at Ft. Gordon, GA, a son on Sept. 21; a son to Mr. and Mrs. Glenn Charlson of Lansing on Sept. 26, a grandson of Rev. and Mrs. D.V. Charlson; David Allen, first child of Mr. and Mrs. Charles Jones on Sept. 26 in SMH, Spring Valley.

55 YEARS AGO OCTOBER 6, 1955

Fred S. Kessler, 61, of Granville Township, died Sept. 29 in SMH, Spring Valley.

MM3/c John Redshaw was aboard the USS K.C. Campbell, one of the escort ships for the USS Missouri, when the surrender was signed between Japan and the U.S.

Pfc. Niel B. Glover arrived home from France where he was located with Supreme Headquarters. Before being transferred to England and France he had spent considerable time in Iceland.

TSgt. William Bell, son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert Bell, arrived home after 40 months in the Pacific Theatre. As an artilleryman he took part in the invasion of New Guinea, Hollandia, Biak and the Philippine Islands.

TSgt. William Kostellic arrived home from Ft. Sheridan on a 45 day furlough after spending 23 months in the Southwest Pacific for the most part in New Guinea with the Headquarters of the Far East Command. He was also in Australia and the Philippines.

Pfc. Dale Kiely of McNabb returned home after serving 32 months in the European Theatre of Operations. He participated in campaigns in North Africa, Sicily, Italy, France and Germany with the famed 33rd Division under General Omar Bradley.

75 YEARS AGO OCTOBER 3, 1935

Miss Mary Venturelli, daughter of Mrs. Emily Venturelli of Mark, became the bride of Deno Orlandi of Dalzell in Sacred Heart Church in Granville on September 29th.

The work on the new river bridge between Putnam and Bureau counties at Spring Valley was nearly completed. The steel work, save some diveting on the center span, was all done and the floor on the north half laid, including the concrete.

The mules were lowered at the Mark mine and preparations were going on with the expectation of hoisting coal within a week. Can it be that "happy days are here again" for the mining population and ditto for the users of coal? It will make a difference to the unemployment in this community.

newspaper in 1903 and built the building at the SE corner of Hopkins Avenue and McCoy Street to house it in 1907. I purchased the Putnam Record founded in 1868 by I.H. Cook in Hennepin, which was operated by his son, Charlie Cook, and combined it with the Echo to establish the Putnam County Record in 1927. (Putnam County Records had been the name of the paper for one year back in its beginning.)

"This probably had the greatest impact on my family. My eldest son, William Henry, published two papers, the Chenoa Clipper Times and the Gridley Advance; Lawrence though involved in some journalistic pursuits, was a poet; Helen worked for the paper for a number of years; Marie wrote a weekly column for the paper; Charles worked on the paper and eventually was a linotype operator in Ottawa; Edward carried on in Granville and eventually spent over 55 years at the family paper. Four grandsons have been similarly involved. My eldest grandson was the Managing Editor of the Minneapolis Star and Tribune, another was a linotype operator for R.R. Donnelly in Chicago, another with a Peoria paper, and one with American Greeting Cards in Ohio."

"I am a devout Christian and active in many church activities locally as well as the Chitauquas in earlier days. I was Sunday School superintendent

for 25 years. In my last years I have been Deacon Emeritus of the First Congregational Church of Granville."

"This cemetery was established in 1863. Records show it was not totally organized nor properly operated in the early years. I was a member of the Board and in 1891 I was directed to acquire a book and put everything in order. In 1940 I retired as Secretary after serving 50 years. The monument at the base of the flag pole in the front of the cemetery was a gift of my daughter, Helen, and her husband, William I. Tyler."

Stepping out of character:
William Edward Hawthorne died June 22, 1940. He was a highly respected man and his opinions were sought by all levels of government. His archives bear not only volumes of letters, editorials, and surveys, but many speeches and poetry as well. He was a true patriarch as well and expected his orders to all the family to be obeyed. One example that amused the family was his letter to Editor Edward the week prior to his death while he was in the hospital. A "filler" had been "run" in the space generally devoted to his editorials and this was not to happen again.

He was our "Grandpa Hawthorne," but to many he was "Will," and to others, simply "W.E."

Illinois Youth Take On Water Quality and Climate

Change Trends

On October 6, youth throughout Illinois will join hundreds of thousands of young people across the nation to simultaneously conduct a three-tiered science experiment to learn how heightened levels of carbon dioxide can impact water quality and climate change. Thanks to a generous contribution from Caterpillar, each Illinois Extension Office will receive three, 4-H-O educational kits allowing youth to contribute to the 4-H National Youth Science Day activities.

William Million, an Extension specialist in youth development with the U of I State 4-H Office, said, "This year's experiment will teach young people how increased amounts of carbon dioxide can affect aquatic animals, plants and other living organisms in lakes, streams, rivers and oceans. Using workbooks and online guides, the nationwide experiment will help youth relate their 4-H National Youth Science Day experiences back to their own lives by teaching them how to measure a carbon footprint and how to estimate energy savings by looking at gas and electric bills."

Million said participation in the 4-H National Youth Science Day experiment launches the second year of Science Excited programming. Science Excited programs are designed to engage youth in hands-on science experiments to increase their interest and excitement in science and related fields within Illinois youth.

To combat a national shortage of young people pursuing science college majors and occupations, 4-H National Youth Science Day works to spark an early youth interest in science and science careers, said Million. "Currently, more than five million youth across the nation participate in 4-H science, engineering, technology and applied math

people involved in 4-H are:

- Nearly two times more likely to get better grades in school;
- Nearly two times more likely to plan to go to college;
- 41 percent less likely to engage in risky behaviors; and
- 25 percent more likely to positively contribute to their families and communities.

"Engaging youth in scientific exploration early on provides the necessary platform that they need to build a long-lasting interest in the field, and to make ongoing contributions to the sciences," said Million, "Science is often an overwhelming and consequently overlooked subject for young people, but 4-H National Youth Science Day makes science exciting, accessible, and relevant. Kids will learn about cutting-edge technologies and will be encouraged to continue their science exploration by applying what they've learned in their communities and their homes."

As part of the Cooperative Extension System of the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) and implemented by the nation's 109 land-grant colleges and universities, 4-H has been educating youth in the sciences for more than 100 years. In fact, the land-grant colleges and universities have been deeply involved in climate change research for some time and will showcase their work to inspire youth on 4-H National Youth Science Day.

"4-H's robust, university research-based science curriculum, combined with new initiatives like 4-H National Youth Science Day, will arm youth with the necessary technical skills to help America maintain its competitive edge in the global marketplace," Million concluded. This year's national science experiment, 4-H-O, was developed in conjunction with North Carolina A&T State University and the North Carolina Cooperative Extension Program. Letter to the Editor

As autumn weather arrives, time is also fast approaching for the annual raking and burning of leaves and traditional bonfire-weenie roasts on cool evenings. This year I'd like all parents and individuals to take a moment and consider how to safely start these fires. Please use newspaper and kindling to get the job done most safely without the hazardous explosive pyrotechnics. Try keeping some starter logs on hand. They provide a safe alternative for lighting that bonfire. Most importantly, talk to your children no matter what their age about the dangers involved by using any liquid accelerants. In the wrong hands these are proven to be catastrophic if not deadly!

Every year, too many individuals are seriously burned due to the careless use of liquid accelerants. Liquid accelerants come in many forms such as gasoline, diesel, kerosene, lighter fluids, alcohol and rubbing alcohol. Read your household labels. Flammable liquids are marked with a warning and should be stored at all times in a safe place where they are kept away from fire, sparks and flame. Remember if attending a bonfire, beware of any individuals providing and/or using liquid accelerants. They may be willing to assume the risky practice but are not always responsible enough to guard the safety of those around them.

Be vigilant and watch out for individuals throwing anything into an already lit fire. You never know what it is and the results are often explosive and you could be the unwitting victim of a reckless individual's act. If you see someone about to do something stupid, speak up! Issue a loud warning to them and/or others in attendance. It just might save someone the devastating results of being burned.

Victims of burns live with those consequences for the rest of their lives! Believe me when I say, you never want to experience nor watch someone you love experience the pain and agony both physically and mentally of being burned. Burn victims suffer a lifetime of results.

Please have the courage and common sense to incorporate the simple steps mentioned above regarding fire safety. The extra effort and time it takes to start your fire can mean the difference between the instantaneous combustion of an accelerant and someone being burned. If you're hosting a bonfire, don't be afraid to set the ground rules for everyone in attendance. Be safe and have a happy fall, enjoying all the sights, smells and activities of the season.

"The Savvy Caregiver"

The Alzheimer's Association introduces "The Savvy Caregiver" a new program designed to provide clinical level training for family caregivers. This six week series will be offered on consecutive Wednesdays, beginning October 13 and will run through November 17th, at Illinois Valley Community Hospital, 925 West Street, Peru.

The Savvy Caregiver program is a unique approach to family caregiver education. Pipeline Safety For Putnam & Bureau Counties

- Alertness Pays

A complex system of sub-surface pipelines crisscrosses Bureau and Putnam Counties. This network of underground highways is used to transport a variety of gases and petroleum products to distribution companies and power plants.

Failures occur infrequently along the pipeline system; however, problems are often caused by damage incurred from excavation activities adjacent to the pipeline. Pipeline right-of-ways are monitored for unauthorized digging, but the pipeline companies and the Bureau / Putnam County Local Emergency Planning Committee (LEPC) requests your help too. You also can keep an eye out for digging or other suspicious activities on the pipeline right-of-ways and call local law enforcement if you see something out of the ordinary.

Be alert for any signs of pipeline leaks including: blowing or hissing sounds; dust blowing from a hole in the ground; continuous bubbling in wet or flooded areas; gaseous or hydrocarbon odor; dead or discolored vegetation in an otherwise green area; and flames, if a leak has been ignited. If you witness any of these conditions, your personal safety should be your first concern. Abandon any equipment being used in the area and leave the area immediately. Do not start or turn off any motor vehicles/electrical equipment in the area and avoid introducing any sources of ignition to the area, such as using cell phones, pagers and 2-way radios. Call 911 or contact local fire or law enforcement. Do not attempt to extinguish a natural gas fire and do not attempt to operate any pipeline valves.

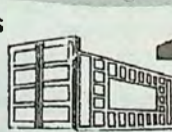

NOTICE OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT THAT WILL BE SUBMITTED TO THE VOTERS NOVEMBER 2, 2010

To the Electors of the State of Illinois:

The purpose of a state constitution is to establish a structure for government and laws. The Illinois Constitution provides citizens with rights and protections; creates the executive, judicial, and legislative branches of government; clarifies the powers given to local governments; limits the taxing power of the State; and imposes certain restrictions on the use of taxpayer dollars. There are three ways to initiate change to the Illinois Constitution: (1) a constitutional convention may propose changes to any part; (2) the General Assembly may propose changes to any part; or (3) the people of the State by referendum may propose changes to the Legislative Article. Regardless of the method of initiating change, the people of Illinois must approve any changes to the Constitution before they become effective.

The proposed amendment, which takes effect upon approval by the voters, adds Section 7 to the Suffrage and Elections Article of the Illinois Constitution. The new section would provide the State's electors with an option to petition for a special election to recall a Governor and for the election of a successor Governor. At the general election to be held on November 2, 2010, you will be called upon to decide whether the proposed amendment should become part of the Illinois Constitution.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE III — SUFFRAGE AND ELECTIONS
Section 7 — Initiative to Recall Governor

- The recall of the Governor may be proposed by a petition signed by a number of electors equal in number to at least 15% of the total votes cast for Governor in the preceding gubernatorial election, with at least 100 signatures from each of at least 25 separate counties. A petition shall have been signed by the petitioning electors not more than 150 days after an affidavit has been filed with the State Board of Elections providing notice of intent to circulate a petition to recall the Governor. The affidavit may be filed no sooner than 6 months after the beginning of the Governor's term of office. The affidavit shall have been signed by the proponent of the recall petition, at least 20 members of the House of Representatives, and at least 10 members of the Senate, with no more than half of the signatures of members of each chamber from the same established political party.
- The form of the petition, circulation, and procedure for determining the validity and sufficiency of a petition shall be as provided by law. If the petition is valid and sufficient, the State Board of Elections shall certify the petition not more than 100 days after the date the petition was filed, and the question "Shall (name) be recalled from the office of Governor?" must be submitted to the electors at a special election called by the State Board of Elections, to occur not more than 100 days after certification of the petition. A recall petition certified by the State Board of Elections may not be withdrawn and another recall petition may not be initiated against the Governor during the remainder of the current term of office. Any recall petition or recall election pending on the date of the next general election at which a candidate for Governor is elected is moot.
- If a petition to recall the Governor has been filed with the State Board of Elections, a person eligible to serve as Governor may propose his or her candidacy by a petition signed by a number of electors equal in number to the requirement for petitions for an established party candidate for the office of Governor, signed by petitioning electors not more than 50 days after a recall petition has been filed with the State Board of Elections. The form of a successor election petition, circulation, and procedure for determining the validity and sufficiency of a petition shall be as provided by law. If the successor election petition is valid and sufficient, the State Board of Elections shall certify the petition not more than 100 days after the date the petition to recall the Governor was filed. Names of candidates for nomination to serve as the candidate of an established political party must be submitted to the electors at a special primary election, if necessary, called by the State Board of Elections to be held at the same time as the special election on the question of recall established under subsection (b). Names of candidates for the successor election must be submitted to the electors at a special successor election called by the State Board of Elections, to occur not more than 60 days after the date of the special primary election or on a date established by law.
- The Governor is immediately removed upon certification of the recall election results if a majority of the electors voting on the question vote to recall the Governor. If the Governor is removed, then (i) an Acting Governor determined under subsection (a) of Section 6 of Article V shall serve until the Governor elected at the special successor election is qualified and (ii) the candidate who receives the highest number of votes in the special successor election is elected Governor for the balance of the term.

EXPLANATION

The Illinois Constitution provides the General Assembly with exclusive authority to remove a Governor through the impeachment process. The Illinois Constitution also provides that the order of succession to the office of Governor shall be the Lieutenant Governor, the elected Attorney General, the elected Secretary of State, and then as provided by law. The proposed amendment would provide the State's electors with the ability to initiate a special election to recall a Governor and elect a new Governor.

To begin the recall process, an elector must file an affidavit of intent to circulate petitions to recall a Governor no sooner than 6 months after the beginning of the Governor's term of office. The affidavit must include signatures of the proponent of the recall petition, at least 20 members of the House of Representatives, and at least 10 members of the Senate, with no more than half of the signatures in each chamber from the same political party. After filing the affidavit with the State Board of Elections, the proponent has 150 days to circulate a petition. The petition must include signatures equal to 15% of the total votes cast for Governor in the preceding gubernatorial election, with at least 100 signatures from a minimum of 25 counties. Within 100 days, the State Board of Elections must certify or reject the petition, and if the Board certifies the petition, a special election must be held within 100 days after the certification. The special election ballot shall include the question, "Shall (name) be removed from the office of Governor?". The Governor is immediately removed if a majority of the electors voting on the question vote to recall the Governor.

Persons seeking to be elected to serve as the successor Governor may circulate nomination petitions. A petition must be signed by 5,000 electors. If multiple candidates of the same party file petitions, a special primary election will occur on the same day as the recall election.

If a Governor is recalled, a special election to elect the successor Governor must take place within 60 days. An Acting Governor, as determined by the order of succession, shall assume the duties of the Governor until the electors choose a new Governor. The special election ballot will include the names of the candidates nominated at the special primary election, as well as any independent or new party candidates, on a special election ballot. The candidate receiving the highest number of votes shall be elected Governor for the balance of the term.

Voters that believe the Illinois Constitution should be amended to provide for a special election to recall a Governor and for a special election to elect a successor Governor should vote "YES" on the question. Three-fifths of those voting on the question, or a majority of those voting in the election, must vote "YES" in order for the amendment to become effective. Voters that believe the Illinois Constitution should not be amended to provide for a special election to recall a Governor and for a special election to elect a successor Governor should vote "NO" on the question.

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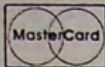

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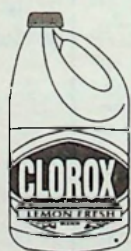

Granville Cemetery Walk - Part II

Sidney Whitaker told the story of Wilhelmina Whitaker. He stated that Nathaniel Whitaker and Hannah Bacon Husted were married in New Jersey in 1814. They moved with their eight children to Indiana in 1835 at the same time that Nathaniel's brother, Joel, moved his family to Putnam County. Nathaniel, Hannah, and six sons followed Joel to Putnam County in 1843. They settled on the farm where David Holly currently resides north of Standard.

Five of their sons left Putnam County; however, their sixth son, John Irelan Whitaker, married Wilhelmina Schoettler and they moved two miles east. The Schoettlers were Mennonites who emigrated from Germany in 1835 and eventually settled in Bureau County.

John and Wilhelmina had six children: Effie, Clara, Sidney, Linna, Eugenie and Charles. Sidney Whitaker married Martha Belle Hopkins in 1898. They moved to a farm a mile east of Granville across the road from her parents. They had six children: Sydney Hopkins, John Hopkins, Joel Hopkins, Sara Hyde, Wilhelmina Schoettler, and Richard Hopkins.

After his marriage, Sidney no longer farmed. He became a businessman, starting an electric company and a telephone company for Granville and he installed electricity in the Standard coal mine.

John married Barbara Haws from Magnolia in 1921 but returned to his parent's home in 1926 with two children after Barbara died. Sarah married James Maze of Peru in 1925. Joel returned home from college in 1926 to be the manager of the Granville Cooperative Company. Wilhelmina returned home from college in 1925 and began

teaching at Hopkins Township High School.

When the depression began, Sydney's business and his health failed and the main income in the household came from Wilhelmina and Joel. Wilhelmina was teaching and managing a household of seven adults and two small children until Richard married Helen Patterson in 1929 and went to Iowa to farm.

Then Joel married Marion Saunders and moved to Granville and his brother, Sydney, married Marion Hawthorne in 1933 and moved to Peru.

Wilhelmina continued to manage the remainder of the household until both children married and both parents died. Wilhelmina moved to Granville in 1951. Sydney and John divided the farm, Sydney renovated the old farmhouse and moved there from Peru. John remarried and built a new house a mile east.

Wilhelmina inherited the John I. Whitaker farm following the death of Eugenie in 1950, and rented it to her brother, Richard. Wilhelmina taught mathematics from 1925 to 1970. When she started teaching she also taught girls physical education despite a bad hip that forced her to use a cane. She organized a women's club in Granville so that girls could continue with sports after graduating. When she retired she had taught three generations from most families. No effort was too great to help one of her students succeed. In addition to her teaching career, she was a charter member of the Putnam County Historical Society and its first curator. On December 26, 1978 she hosted a family gathering attended by 55 relatives. Three days later she had a heart attack shovelling snow and died.

It was stated that the board tried to work with Mrs. Paxton to rebuild and were working with others to build a grocery store. Nothing was resolved.

Gov. George Ryan awarded M-P SWCD with \$65,000 in grant monies for preservation programs for IL farmland.

David Shore was named a Commended Student in the 2001 National Merit Scholarship Program.

Illinois Medal of Honor Recipient: PFC Richard G. Wilson, U.S. Army, Marion

Private First Class Richard G. Wilson of Marion, was a medical aid man with the U.S. Army's 187th Airborne Infantry Regiment. He accompanied a unit on a reconnaissance patrol near Opari, Korea on October 21, 1950 when the unit came under heavy mortar and small arms fire. The company suffered a large number of casualties while fighting its way out of the ambush. Private Wilson moved among the wounded to administer aid while under constant enemy fire, and helped move the wounded to safety when his unit was ordered to withdraw.

After the American unit had pulled back, Private Wilson learned that a comrade who had previously been thought dead was seen trying to crawl to safety. Wilson returned to the area under enemy fire to search for the wounded man. Two days later a patrol found Wilson lying beside the man he had returned to assist. Wilson had been shot several times and severely wounded while trying to shield the other wounded man.

Private Wilson became the third of eight Illinois recipients of the Medal of Honor during the Korean War.

Key events during the Korean War, October 1950

October 1950 began with United Nations forces in full pursuit of the retreating North Korean People's Army, and for the first time the war was taken into North Korea. All seemed to be going well for the U.N. armies, but few people knew that Chinese Premier Mao Tse-tung had already decided to send Chinese troops into the war. By mid October, large numbers of Chinese troops had crossed the Yalu River and secretly infiltrated into Korea.

President Harry Truman met with General Douglas MacArthur on October 15 at Wake Island in the Pacific. The two discussed the military situation in Korea, and MacArthur expressed his confidence that enemy resistance would end by Thanksgiving and that U.S. forces could withdraw by Christmas. When Truman asked MacArthur about the chances of Chinese intervention, the General replied "very little." By that time, at least 120,000 Chinese soldiers had snuck into North Korea.

The North Korean capital of Pyongyang was captured by United States and South Korean forces on October 19, forcing North Korean Premier Kim Il-sung to hastily establish a new capital on the Yalu River at the Chinese border. Soldiers from Thailand, Turkey and the Netherlands joined the U.N. contingent in Korea.

On October 20, as the remnants of the North Korean Army retreated farther north, some 68 American POWs were massacred near the Sunch'on Tunnel north of Pyongyang. Advancing American troops discovered the grisly scene the next day.

The first ominous sign of worse things to come occurred on October 25, when Chinese forces attacked a South Korean unit, and a Chinese soldier captured near the Chosin Reservoir stated that large numbers of Chinese soldiers were in the area. Few military leaders believed the prisoner's claim. The next day a South Korean unit reached the Yalu River.

The First Marine Division landed at the North Korean port city of Wonsan in late October and was ordered to

replace battle-weary South Korean units in the Chosin Reservoir area. On October 29, the 7th Infantry Division landed at Iwon on the northwest coast of Korea. The Marines and soldiers of X Corps were unaware that they were headed on a collision course toward the largest, most savage battle of the war, one that would be fought in almost unimaginable conditions.

Illinois Korean War Memorial

The Illinois Korean War Memorial is located in Springfield's Oak Ridge Cemetery, the same cemetery that contains the Lincoln Tomb. Oak Ridge is the nation's second most visited burial ground behind only Arlington National Cemetery.

Dedicated on June 16, 1996, the memorial consists of a 12-foot-tall bronze bell mounted on a granite base. At the circumference of the base are four niches, each with a larger-than-life figure representing a branch of the armed services. Inscribed on the base are the 1,754 names of Illinoisans killed in Korea.

The Illinois Korean War Memorial is administered by the Illinois Historic Preservation Agency and may be visited daily free of charge.

Korean War Veterans Oral History Project

Abraham Lincoln Presidential Museum

The Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library and Museum's Oral History Program offers "Veterans Remember," a collection of interviews with Illinois residents about their wartime experiences, at the Library's website, www.alplm.org/oral_history/home.html. The audio interviews concern the experiences of Illinois veterans who fought in several conflicts, including the Korean War, as well as the experiences of those on the home front. Visitors to the website can listen to or watch the interviews in their entirety. Several of the interviews have transcripts, and most have still images as well.

Website visitors will need a computer capable of playing MP3 audio files or MPG compressed video files in order to listen to the interviews. The transcripts and still images are also accessible. Volunteers conducted and edited many of

the interviews and developed the transcripts that accompany them.

Korean War National Museum

The Korean War National Museum (KWNM) celebrates the 60th Anniversary of the Korean War with a new Board of Directors, new professional staff, and a renewed focus on getting a world-class museum built now, in the lifetime of the Korean War veterans. Recent news media reports outlined a proposal of the KWNM to obtain 7,000 square feet of prime space on Navy Pier in Chicago for a state-of-the-art, world-class museum where visitors could come to honor and learn about the service and sacrifices of the Americans, South Koreans and their UN Allies in the "forgotten victory." Those plans are continuing to be developed, and the KWNM hopes to be able to share some exciting news soon. Meanwhile, the Denis J. Healy Freedom Center, located at 9 South Old State Capitol Plaza in Springfield, is open Tuesday through Saturday from 10 a.m. to 5 p.m. Admission is free, but donations are accepted. The KWNM welcomes donations of photographs, documents, diaries, and artifacts of those who served in the Korean War. To learn more about the KWNM, or to volunteer or donate, please visit www.kwnm.org or look for the Museum Facebook.

Korean War Booklet

The Illinois Korean Memorial Association, an all-volunteer organization, has published a booklet, A Brief History of the Korean War, copies of which have been provided free of charge to public libraries, high schools and junior high schools in Illinois. Tax deductible donations are welcome. One hundred percent of all donations go to the book project and to the upkeep of the Illinois Korean War Memorial.

New Hennepin Truck Route TR-36 Open to Traffic

When Marquis Energy announced in 2006 they would be building a new 100 million gallon per year ethanol facility north of Hennepin, they asked Hennepin township to consider making improvements to the existing ESK Road that would carry the additional truck traffic to the plant. Hennepin Township did even better. Instead of simply modifying the existing ESK Road, Bill Shafer of Illinois Valley Surveying had a vision of a new road location, providing several advantages over simply modifying the existing road.

Over 600 trucks per day use this new class II 80,000 pound truck route to reach local businesses including Marquis Energy, Tricon Materials and Advanced Asphalt, Washington Mills, and the Dynege Hennepin Power Plant. The design of the new road provides several benefits to these businesses, as well as local residents and motorists. Businesses benefit from better infrastructure and convenience for their customers, while residents of the existing ESK Road will enjoy the elimination of truck traffic.

Both truck and automobile traffic will benefit from the better visibility, and the elimination of hills and treacherous intersections.

Mark Marquis, President of Marquis Energy, applauded the cooperation of both businesses and government in working together to plan, fund, and construct this project. Marquis Energy and Marquis Grain made a \$100,000 donation to the engineering of the new road, which was constructed by Advanced Asphalt, a local highway construction firm. Additionally, the new tax base created by Marquis Energy should pay for the township's portion of the road over the next eight years.

Marquis commented, "This project exemplifies the benefits of business and government cooperation, leading to additional jobs and infrastructure improvements for the community."

PC FARM UPDATE

As of October 1, the corn for grain yield in Illinois was expected to drop 14 bushels from the September 1 forecast to 160 bushels per acre. Production would be 1.98 billion bushels, 3 percent less than last year's crop. As of October 3, 74 percent of the crop was harvested which compares to 5 percent last year at this time and a five year average of 31 percent. This year's harvest progress is just 1 point behind the record level of 75 percent in 1991 and advanced throughout the month of September right at that pace.

The October 1 forecast yield for soybeans was expected to be 52 bushels per acre, up 1 bushel from the September 1 estimate. Production was expected to total 470.6 million bushels, 9 percent above last year. Acres planted and harvested were revised down to 9.1 and 9.05 million, 200,000 less than the previous estimates. As of October 3, 50 percent of the crop had been harvested compared to 5 percent last year and the five-year average of 28 percent.

Controlling Weeds After Fall Harvest

Fall herbicide applications are becoming a common practice for Illinois farmers. Recent interest has focused on applying herbicides after fall harvest to control winter annual weed species, such as common chickweed, henbit and various mustard species.

"Winter annual species can create dense mats of vegetation prior to spring planting if not controlled before the onset of winter," said Aaron Hager, University of Illinois Extension weed specialist. "Applying a herbicide in the fall to control these weeds and prevent them from producing seeds are important objectives of fall herbicide applications."

Before rushing into fall herbicide applications, Hager offers a few suggestions.

"Scout fields before making any application to determine what weeds are present and if their densities are high enough to warrant treatment this fall," he said. "Given the wide range of precipitation across the state, I suspect emergence of some winter annuals might be reduced in dry areas compared with areas where late-summer and fall precipitation was higher."

Many herbicides are not labeled for fall application so check labels first. For example, Atrazine is widely used before and after corn emergence, but is not labeled for fall application. Some herbicides approved for fall application have application timing and geographical restrictions. Before applying a treatment that does not possess much soil-residual activity (for example, 2,4-D or glyphosate), schedule the application to occur after the majority of winter annual species have emerged.

"Instead of applying such a treatment in early-October, a mid- to late-October application might provide better results," Hager said. "On the other hand, if your fall application will include a herbicide with soil-residual activity, then the application could be made sooner."

Combinations of one or more herbicides can broaden the weed control spectrum which can become quite valuable if winter annuals have emerged before the application is made. Combining 2,4-D and/or glyphosate with soil-residual products can improve control of emerged species and help control biennial or perennial species. Include the appropriate spray additives with all applications.

In addition, Hager said location in the state can influence fall herbicide applications. Fall applications seem to "fit" better in areas of central and southern Illinois, possibly due to generally milder average winter temperatures as well as earlier resumption of weed growth in the spring.

"Fall applications that include soil-residual herbicides may not always result in a clean field by planting time next spring," he added. "Delays in spring field work may allow the fields to green up before the crop can be planted. Additionally, we have found that if we successfully control the suite of winter annual weed species, the emergence of summer annual weed species (such as common lambsquarters and smartweed) sometimes occurs sooner than if the winter annuals were still present."

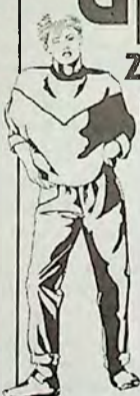

Total inventory of all hogs and pigs on hand September 1, 2010 was 4.40 million head, up 4 percent from last year. Market hogs, at 3.91 million head, were up 3 percent from a year ago, while breeding hogs, at 490 thousand head, were up 4 percent.

The June - August pig crop of 2.48 million pigs was up 7 percent from last year. There were 260 thousand sows that farrowed, up 6 percent from last year. The average number of pigs per litter was 9.55, up from 9.50 during the same period last year.

NOTICE OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT THAT WILL BE SUBMITTED TO THE VOTERS NOVEMBER 2, 2010

To the Electors of the State of Illinois:

The purpose of a state constitution is to establish a structure for government and laws. The Illinois Constitution provides citizens with rights and protections; creates the executive, judicial, and legislative branches of government; clarifies the powers given to local governments; limits the taxing power of the State; and imposes certain restrictions on the use of taxpayer dollars. There are three ways to initiate change to the Illinois Constitution: (1) a constitutional convention may propose changes to any part; (2) the General Assembly may propose changes to any part; or (3) the people of the State by referendum may propose changes to the Legislative Article. Regardless of the method of initiating change, the people of Illinois must approve any changes to the Constitution before they become effective.

The proposed amendment, which takes effect upon approval by the voters, adds Section 7 to the Suffrage and Elections Article of the Illinois Constitution. The new section would provide the State's electors with an option to petition for a special election to recall a Governor and for the election of a successor Governor. At the general election to be held on November 2, 2010, you will be called upon to decide whether the proposed amendment should become part of the Illinois Constitution.

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE III - SUFFRAGE AND ELECTIONS Section 7 - Initiative to Recall Governor

- The recall of the Governor may be proposed by a petition signed by a number of electors equal in number to at least 15% of the total votes cast for Governor in the preceding gubernatorial election, with at least 100 signatures from each of at least 25 separate counties. A petition shall have been signed by the petitioning electors not more than 150 days after an affidavit has been filed with the State Board of Elections providing notice of intent to circulate a petition to recall the Governor. The affidavit may be filed no sooner than 6 months after the beginning of the Governor's term of office. The affidavit shall have been signed by the proponent of the recall petition, at least 20 members of the House of Representatives, and at least 10 members of the Senate, with no more than half of the signatures of members of each chamber from the same established political party.
- The form of the petition, circulation, and procedure for determining the validity and sufficiency of a petition shall be as provided by law. If the petition is valid and sufficient, the State Board of Elections shall certify the petition not more than 100 days after the date the petition was filed, and the question "Shall (name) be recalled from the office of Governor?" must be submitted to the electors at a special election called by the State Board of Elections, to occur not more than 100 days after certification of the petition. A recall petition certified by the State Board of Elections may not be withdrawn and another recall petition may not be initiated against the Governor during the remainder of the current term of office. Any recall petition or recall election pending on the date of the next general election at which a candidate for Governor is elected is moot.
- If a petition to recall the Governor has been filed with the State Board of Elections, a person eligible to serve as Governor may propose his or her candidacy by a petition signed by a number of electors equal in number to the requirement for petitions for an established party candidate for the office of Governor, signed by petitioning electors not more than 50 days after a recall petition has been filed with the State Board of Elections. The form of a successor election petition, circulation, and procedure for determining the validity and sufficiency of a petition shall be as provided by law. If the successor election petition is valid and sufficient, the State Board of Elections shall certify the petition not more than 100 days after the date the petition to recall the Governor was filed. Names of candidates for nomination to serve as the candidate of an established political party must be submitted to the electors at a special primary election, if necessary, called by the State Board of Elections to be held at the same time as the special election on the question of recall established under subsection (b). Names of candidates for the successor election must be submitted to the electors at a special successor election called by the State Board of Elections, to occur not more than 60 days after the date of the special primary election or on a date established by law.
- The Governor is immediately removed upon certification of the recall election results if a majority of the electors voting on the question vote to recall the Governor. If the Governor is removed, then (i) an Acting Governor determined under subsection (a) of Section 6 of Article V shall serve until the Governor elected at the special successor election is qualified and (ii) the candidate who receives the highest number of votes in the special successor election is elected Governor for the balance of the term.

EXPLANATION

The Illinois Constitution provides the General Assembly with exclusive authority to remove a Governor through the impeachment process. The Illinois Constitution also provides that the order of succession to the office of Governor shall be the Lieutenant Governor, the elected Attorney General, the elected Secretary of State, and then as provided by law. The proposed amendment would provide the State's electors with the ability to initiate a special election to recall a Governor and elect a new Governor.

To begin the recall process, an elector must file an affidavit of intent to circulate petitions to recall a Governor no sooner than 6 months after the beginning of the Governor's term of office. The affidavit must include signatures of the proponent of the recall petition, at least 20 members of the House of Representatives, and at least 10 members of the Senate, with no more than half of the signatures in each chamber from the same political party. After filing the affidavit with the State Board of Elections, the proponent has 150 days to circulate a petition. The petition must include signatures equal to 15% of the total votes cast for Governor in the preceding gubernatorial election, with at least 100 signatures from a minimum of 25 counties. Within 100 days, the State Board of Elections must certify or reject the petition, and if the Board certifies the petition, a special election must be held within 100 days after the certification. The special election ballot shall include the question, "Shall (name) be removed from the office of Governor?". The Governor is immediately removed if a majority of the electors voting on the question vote to recall the Governor.

Persons seeking to be elected to serve as the successor Governor may circulate nomination petitions. A petition must be signed by 5,000 electors. If multiple candidates of the same party file petitions, a special primary election will occur on the same day as the recall election.

If a Governor is recalled, a special election to elect the successor Governor must take place within 60 days. An Acting Governor, as determined by the order of succession, shall assume the duties of the Governor until the electors choose a new Governor. The special election ballot will include the names of the candidates nominated at the special primary election, as well as any independent or new party candidates, on a special election ballot. The candidate receiving the highest number of votes shall be elected Governor for the balance of the term.

Voters that believe the Illinois Constitution should be amended to provide for a special election to recall a Governor and for a special election to elect a successor Governor should vote "YES" on the question. Three-fifths of those voting on the question, or a majority of those voting in the election, must vote "YES" in order for the amendment to become effective. Voters that believe the Illinois Constitution should not be amended to provide for a special election to recall a Governor and for a special election to elect a successor Governor should vote "NO" on the question.

THE CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT WILL APPEAR UPON THE BALLOT IN THE FOLLOWING FORM:

FORM OF BALLOT Proposed Amendment to the 1970 Illinois Constitution

Explanation of Amendment

The proposed amendment, which takes effect upon approval by the voters, adds a new section to the Suffrage and Elections Article of the Illinois Constitution. The new section would provide the State's electors with an option to petition for a special election to recall a Governor and for the special election of a successor Governor. At the general election to be held on November 2, 2010, you will be called upon to decide whether the proposed amendment should become part of the Illinois Constitution.

If you believe the Illinois Constitution should be amended to provide for a special election to recall a Governor and for a special election to elect a successor Governor, you should vote "YES" on the question. 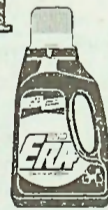

Farms are fun places — with all that fresh air, sunshine, and room to run around. But they're also places where real work gets done. And some of that work involves equipment that can be dangerous if someone doesn't know how to be safe.

Kids who live on farms really need to know what it takes to be safe. They probably help out on the farm and need to know the safety rules that can prevent injuries. According to the National Safety Council, farming is one of America's most hazardous jobs. Kids ages 10 to 14 are at high risk

for injury, often because they take on a job or task that they aren't ready to handle.

Pickup trucks, tractors, threshers, lawn mowers, and all-terrain vehicles (ATVs) are powerful machines. But these machines and all other types of farm equipment are not safe for kids to ride on (even with an adult present), play on, or even be around, no matter whether they are in use or not. It's really easy to get thrown from a tractor, thresher, or riding mower.

Here are some things parents and children should remember around farm equipment:

- Never ride in the back of a pickup truck or on the fender of a tractor.
- Never get on a tractor as an extra rider.
- Stay out of the path of moving equipment.
- Don't use electric power tools without adult supervision and always use protective equipment like gloves and goggles.
- Never ride on a grain wagon or enter a silo or grain bin. It's easy to be trapped by flowing grain, and the closed storage areas can fill in seconds and lead to suffocation.

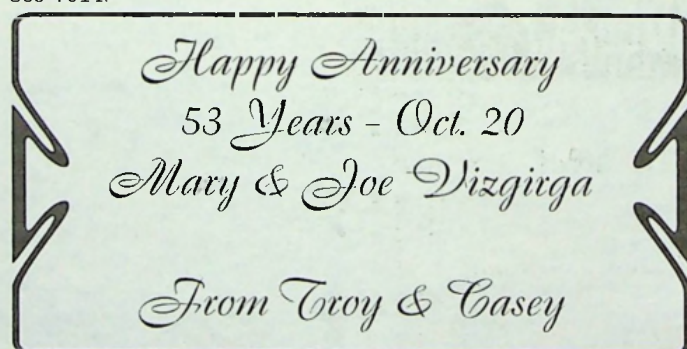

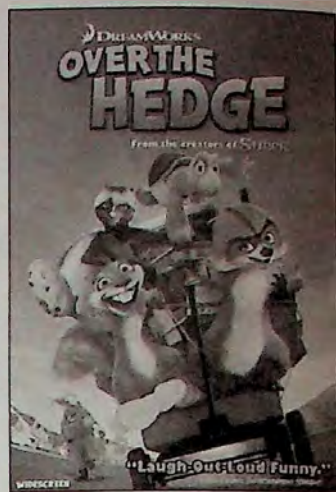

Granville Cemetery Walk – Parts III & IV

PART III

This is about Ralph and Lucinda Ware portrayed by Jay McCracken and Elizabeth Clausen.

Jay said, "I'm Ralph Ware and this is my wife, Lucinda. I was born February 15, 1804 in Conway MA. My wife was born September 14, 1808. We were married in 1833 after a two year engagement."

After the wedding they headed west and boarded a boat for Buffalo. The boat was long and clumsy going 4 miles per hour.

"From Buffalo we went to Cleveland on the Ohio River. We ended in LaSalle. I had heard accounts of Chicago and decided to explore the city. I checked out a location for a store and decided Chicago had no commercial potential. A childhood friend of mine also visited Chicago and came to a different conclusion. His name was Marshall Field."

"While on the way to St. Louis we heard of an outbreak of cholera there so we changed plans and stopped at Union Grove IL where we had friends. From Union Grove we went to Jacksonville, looking for land. My brother Thomas and his wife and Mr. and Mrs. Fairfield had joined us. I abandoned my quest for St. Louis to open a store. We left Jacksonville in buggies that were shipped from Conway, and started the trip to Granville."

Elizabeth, as Mrs. Ware, said "In 1833 Granville only contained a few cabins around the edge of the timber. The prairie was uninhabited. After

arriving we were taken in by an Irish family."

Jay said, "We purchased a tract of 160 acres south of Granville. We built a log cabin and in 1836 our daughter, Caroline, was born. In 1835 my mother, Anna, came west and my brother, John. Other family members followed, and for a while Granville was a Ware colony. Thomas and I plotted

the town and named it Granville after Granville MA."

Elizabeth said, "We lost our daughter, Ann Louisa, born between Elisha and Lincoln. She passed away with the croup."

Jay said, "I had a cousin, Mr. Denham, who was the first husband of Mrs. Owen Lovejoy. As you know Mrs. Lovejoy was a famed frontier abolitionist. Our families visited frequently, and Lovejoy preached and lectured in Granville often. I

helped operate an underground railroad. The Presbyterian Church of Granville was organized in 1839, and I was one of the Elders. I helped in a small way in the creation of America's land grant college system. In 1846 I became one of the founders of the Buel Institute, an organization of farmers interested in promoting agriculture improvements with further education. I was the corresponding secretary of the Institute in 1851 and wrote the invitation to Prof. Jonathan B. Turner to be the speaker at a convention of farmers for the purpose of helping establish an Ag School in some school in southern IL. Turner came and delivered a stirring address. I lived to see the passage of the Land Grant Act, but not the first institution to grow from it, nor did I see the end of slavery. I died in June 1863 from pneumonia."

Elizabeth said, "I spent the rest of my life with my daughter and her husband and passed away on August 24, 1897."

PART IV

Barbara Kessler portrayed Mrs. Joel Willis Hopkins who told the story of her husband and father-in-law, Joel Willis and A.W. Hopkins, respectively. This is her story.

"My first husband was Richard Harrison. We lived in the village of Florid just south of here. We farmed, unfortunately he died in 1849. Twelve other men died that winter in the village with the same infectious, contagious disease. He died three months after our son, Discus, was buried in the Union Grove Cemetery next to our daughter. He died just 12 days before his sister, Eleanor Harrison, first wife of Joel W. Hopkins. Joel and Eleanor had five children. Their first daughter, Edwina, died when she was only seven, a year before her mother died. Her second daughter, Mary, married Judge Right. Their daughter, Helen, married Rev. McCoy and they are buried here as well as their son Willis who died in 1879. Their only son was A. Willis Archibald Hopkins. They had a daughter, Eleanor, who died in 1858 at age nine. Joel and I married in 1862 and moved into his home he had built in 1854 on Silverspoon Avenue. That home has been remodeled and currently occupied by his great-grandson Archie and his lovely wife, Judy."

"In 1863 I gave birth to our

daughter, Martha, who married Sydney Whitaker. They lived just across the street from us. Down the road from us lived Melony, Archie's niece, and she married Ellsworth Edgerly and Joel's son is buried here too, with all the rest of the family."

"Joel was a very good man, very active in church and State and Federal politics. He went to the State Legislature for several terms and attended the Federal Convention that nominated President Harrison. He was very active in Granville also. He purchased three acres in the village of Granville, moved the homes off, planted trees, hauled in dirt, and donated the park to Granville. He planted over 100 trees along the streets of Granville. He also wanted the town to be progressive and started the National Granville Bank located on the corner of Hopkins and McCoy Streets. He called this the Lincoln block and encouraged other up and coming businesses to join him on the block."

"On Joel's death his son, A.W. took over the bank and also the family farm. A.W. liked animals. He had elk, buffalo and brought Hindu's from India and others. He did this for his own interest or for anyone who might stop in to see them. There were big celebrations at the Hopkins home at Thanksgiving and Christmas, with relatives and guests, 80 or so coming by hay racks, buggy and some by railroad and were met

at the local train station."

"Mr. Hopkins was very much into immigration. Joel, as well as his son, Archibald, would advertise in Europe to bring people to the new country. They would pay their taxes if they would come and work on the farm."

"Once they had worked off their expenses, which by the way in this time table he insisted they would learn the English language, learn how to read and write. He would help them buy their own property. Examples of this was the Kessler family. When he brought the Kessler family to America and they had worked off their expenditures, he helped them buy their farm on the County Line."

This writer would like to add to the Hopkins story by telling what my wife, Jeanne's mother Eda Anderson, had told her. Eda said that her husband, Nels Peter Anderson, and Jeanne's father first worked for Joel Hopkins as did Martin Nelson who married Eda's sister, Anna, when they came from Sweden to America. Eda said just about every immigrant farmer that came to the area worked for Mr. Hopkins.

Mrs. Joel Hopkins finished her story by saying, "Mr. Kessler is waiting at the next station to tell you more about the family."

EPA Greenlights Ethanol Increase in Fuel Blend

Decision a Good First Step for Illinois Ethanol Producers

Growth Energy, the national coalition of US ethanol producers which includes Illinois ethanol plants Lincolnland Agri-Energy, Marquis Energy, Caskata and Patriot Renewable Fuels among its members, today embraced as an "important first step" the Environmental Protec-

tion Agency (EPA) decision to raise the blend wall from E10 to E15 for 2007 and newer vehicles, in response to Growth Energy's Green Jobs petition. However, the coalition of U.S. ethanol supporters said much more must be done to reduce America's dependence on foreign oil, create jobs here in the United States and improve our environment.

Today's decision will apply to more than 42 million vehicles - about 20 percent of the current fleet of passenger cars and light-duty trucks in the U.S., all 2007 and newer. In November, after engine testing on those models is completed, EPA is expected to decide whether to approve E15 for vehicles 2001 to 2006. Approval of those 86 million cars and trucks would mean that E15 would be allowed in more than half of the total passenger cars and light-duty trucks on the road today.

For the Illinois ethanol industry, the decision means more consumer demand and more ethanol sales. According to a report released last year by Growth Energy, completed by the Windmill Group, in consultation with researchers from North Dakota State University, E15 approval for all vehicles could create 4,083 full-time jobs and inject \$833 million into Illinois' economy. Those positive numbers don't include the one-time boost of \$1.5 billion and 10,418 construction-related

jobs Illinois would need to expand its ethanol production capacity to meet increased demand.

"This is a great first step on the road to energy independence," said Mark Marquis, President of Marquis Energy. "Illinois ethanol producers make a quality product and it's exciting to see the EPA remove one of the barriers to ethanol use."

The existing E10 standard - which permits up to 10 percent ethanol blended into fuel - was set in the 1970s to help spur the growth of a domestic, renewable fuels industry in answer to America's first major oil crisis, engineered by OPEC. In March 2009, Growth Energy, the coalition of ethanol supporters, filed a petition with EPA to permit the raising of that regulatory cap on the ethanol blend from 10 percent to 15 percent.

Today's modern ethanol industry supports U.S. jobs by producing a renewable, domestic fuel that is at least 59 percent cleaner than conventional

gasoline. By allowing E15 as an option on the market, the U.S. could create 136,000 new jobs, decrease carbon emissions equivalent to removing 1.35 million vehicles from American roads, displace as much as 7 billion gallons of gasoline from imported oil and expand the market-demand necessary to help make cellulosic ethanol commercially viable.

Another defensive feat of the Cyclone Senior team was holding the Rebels to only 2 scores, one in each half, which was the fewest points the Rebels have scored all year, and even managed to force several punts. On the offensive side of the ball, the Cyclones managed to drive the field on multiple occasions, utilizing both the run and passing game, and succeeded in being the only team to get the ball inside the Rebel's 30 yard line all year. However, they did not manage to find the end zone due to a stingy Stark County defense.

In the end it proved to be a hard fought game from both teams as the Rebels managed a 15-0 victory. Next week the Cyclones look to blow into Princeville to take on the Princes for the second time this year and work to repeat their week one success.

Hear His Word

In the late 1980's our family moved to Yuma, Arizona. We were blessed to call this area home for four years. I came to love the desert and the simple beauty of the sand and open sky. The year before we returned to Illinois I began working for Arizona Cactus Pine Girl Scout Council. The Council's main office was in Phoenix, yet had staff all over the state. Periodically all the staff would be invited to an activity, very much like a company picnic. The soul purpose was to spend time together. The summer of 1991 we were all invited to a day of tubing on Salt River. I immediately began making excuses. "I don't know how to swim." I was told that they would provide life jackets and the tubes would be tied together. It was going to be so much fun.

I finally consented and showed up bright and early on the day that the activity was scheduled. Our group was large enough that we had two groups of individual inner tubes tied together. In spite of my fears we launched off into the river. I would love to tell you that all was calm and quiet that day, but I can not tell a lie. As we drifted along the two groups were separated by the current of the river. The current took the group I was in down a smaller fork. We knew we were in trouble when someone in the other group hollered out "Rebels!" There was nothing we could do but wait to see what was in store for us. We didn't have to wait very long. We heard the rushing of the water before we saw the turbulent water. After we had passed through this area of the river I was tense with anticipation of what was yet to come. There were two more areas of rapids, nothing that was life threatening, yet for this girl it was more than enough. As I was going through those areas of the river, I could focus on nothing but the water.

I have to say there were some magnificent sights on the trip as well. The scenery was beautiful. At one point we had front row seats so to speak as we watched some young people dive into the river from some cliffs. From our inner tubes we had a different vantage point; it gave me a different perspective.

As I reflect upon that experience, I am reminded that life is very similar. There are times when we tense up because we do not know what is around the corner. It is difficult for us to see the broader picture. God sees things from a different angle. God says to us, "Be still and know that I am God" (Psalm 46:10). No matter where the path may lead. God is with us. Does that mean that we are never anxious? No. Yet because of our faith we have a different perspective. We can trust in the One who empowers us for the journey. We can trust in the promises of God and know that we do not walk alone.

May you know the peace and joy that is found through Jesus Christ our Lord and Savior.

Farming Update for Illinois

OCTOBER CROP REPORT

As of October 1, the corn for grain yield in Illinois was expected to drop 14 bushels from the September 1 forecast to 160 bushels per acre.

Production would be 1.98 billion bushels, 3 percent less than last year's crop. As of October 3, 74 percent of the crop was harvested which compares to 5 percent last year at this time and a five-year average of 31 percent. This year's harvest progress is just 1 point behind the record level of 75 percent in 1991 and advanced throughout the month of September right at that pace.

The October 1 forecast yield for soybeans was expected to be 52 bushels per acre, up 1 bushel from the September 1 estimate. Production was expected to total 470.6 million bushels, 9 percent above last year. Acres planted and harvested were revised down to 9.1 and 9.05 million, 200,000 less than the previous estimates. As of October 3, 50 percent of the crop had been harvested compared to 5 percent last year and the five year average of 28 percent.

The final yield for the 2010 winter wheat crop was 56 bushels per acre, the same as last year's yield. Acreage seeded in the fall of 2009 was 330 thousand acres, down 520 thousand acres from 2009, making this the lowest planted acreage on record. Farmers harvested 295 thousand acres for grain this year, another record low, down 64 percent from last year.

This resulted in a total production of 16.5 million bushels, 64 percent less than the 2009 production. This large decline in acreage was caused by the second wettest October on record, which delayed corn, soybean, and sorghum harvest and prevented many producers from seeding wheat. The previous record lows occurred in 2005 when there were 630 thousand acres seeded and 600 thousand acres harvested for grain.

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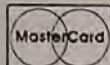

The Putnam County Schools Wellness Fund is maintained at the Granville National Bank and is a non-profit fund. The After-school Activities Program is the focus of the fund, but we also pay for prevention and student leadership programs in the district as well. The After-school Activities Program is free to all 6th thru 12th grade students and is held every Monday and Wednesday evening after school until 5 at the Swaney Junior High building. The program provides homework help, recreation and craft activities as well as a snack and a bus ride home. The entire program is free for students. It is that time after the school day ends, but before parents are home, that students can make poor recreational decisions. Donations to the fund provide personal growth and leadership opportunities to the students of Putnam County.

PC Final Multiplier Released

Putnam County has been issued a final property assessment equalization factor of 1.0000, according to Brian Hamer, Director of the IL Department of Revenue. The property assessment equalization factor, often called the "multiplier," is the method used to achieve uniform property assessments among counties, as required by law. This factor is particularly important because some of the state's 6,600 local taxing districts overlap into two or more counties (e.g., school districts, junior college districts, fire protection districts). If there were no equalization among counties, substantial inequities among taxpayers with comparable properties would result.

Under a law passed in 1975, property in IL should be assessed at one-third (1/3) of its market value. Farmland is not subject to the state equalization factor. As-

sessments in Putnam County are at 33.18% of market value, based on sales of properties in 2007, 2008, and 2009. The equalization factor currently being assigned is for 2010 taxes, payable in 2011. Last year's equalization factor for the county was 1.0000. The final assessment equalization factor was issued after a public hearing on the tentative factor. The tentative factor issued in August 2010 was 1.0429.

The equalization factor is determined annually for each county by comparing the price of individual properties sold over the past three years to the assessed value placed on those properties by the county supervisor of assessments/county assessor. If this three year average level of assessment is one-third of the market value, the equalization factor will be one(1). If the average level of assessment is greater than one-third of market value,

the equalization factor will be less than one (1). And if the average level of assessment is less than one-third of market value, the equalization factor will be greater than one (1). A change in the equalization factor does not mean total property tax bills will increase or decrease. Tax bills are determined by local taxing bodies when they request money each year to provide services to local citizens. If the amount requested by local taxing districts is not great than the amount received in the previous year, then total property taxes will not increase even if assessments increase. The assessed value of an individual property determines what portion of the tax burden a specific taxpayer will assume. That individual's portion of tax responsibility is not changed by the multiplier.

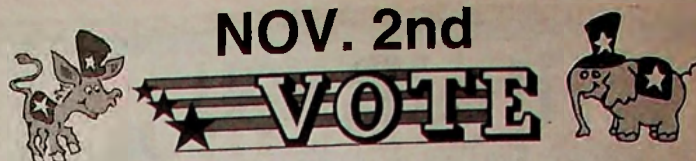
Wooden posts are also needed to support the panels (52 @ 6 ft. 4x4 @ \$5.98 each).

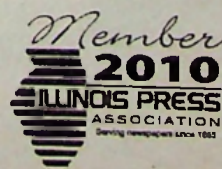

Granville Cemetery Walk – Final Chapters

Larry Kessler portrayed Samuel Kessler, telling that, "In Germany in the 1850's there was a revolution, a recession going on, and a lot of people there thought that there was a future in America. People were all interested in coming over here. I was born in 1848, the 4th son and 8th child of the family of eleven, (but three of them had died in infancy) to Stephen and Anna Bertrudus Scott in Wora Germany."

"My sister, Anna Elizabeth, was the first in my family to come over here in 1856, after the death of my father. My father died of typhoid. Anna Elizabeth had responded to an advertisement by the Hegler family in Peru to be a housemaid and a servant to work in their home. My oldest brother, Fredrick, followed in 1857. Unfortunately he died after a short time here and is buried in the old Granville Cemetery. My sister, Elizabeth and my brother George followed in 1858. My sister Elizabeth later married Franz Haggler. Brother George came over in 1858. George stayed here until 1890, married and moved to Iowa."

"I was able to join them when I came over in 1860 with my sisters, Marie and Katherine. Marie married John Gehm and Katherine married Henry Waldschmidt. I was 12 years old when I got to Illinois, and I went to live with the Joel Hopkins family. I worked as a servant and hired man for the family. Later on I got my education with the Hopkins family and then settled east of here in Eden Township area. My sisters had married people out there. Margaret and Bertha Schafer had left Woodhouse in Germany to be with their uncle, Daniel Frederick, in Eden Township. Upon seeing Margaret I thought maybe I should start a family."

"We married in 1868 and took up residence on a farm in Eden Township on the county line. The house is still there today. It is being renovated by someone at this time. Berthan married Reinard Pletsch. Margaret and I named our second daughter after her. She and Reinard had a son, Leonard. She later died in child birth."

"Margaret and I were fortunate to help with the County Line Church and the community. Margaret and I had 10 children. Our two oldest daughters married two Alleman brothers, Leonard and Amos. Our third daughter married a Schmelling. Our daughters, Margaret and Caroline, never married. Caroline's twin brother, Conrad, never married either and they are all buried here in the Granville Cemetery. Our son,

Henry, married Elsie Rull. Their daughter, Caroline and Henry had all girls, Ilene Goodwin and Doris Miller. Fredrick married Elizabeth; Reinard's son, Walter, married Lydia Zimerman, and Louis married Helen Baker."

"My brother George went to Iowa and had several male heirs so the name lives on. In 1912 I developed a problem and had surgery in Chicago and as a result of that I passed away at the age of 64."

PART VI

Brad Popurella portrayed Gustave Naumann and began: "Good afternoon and welcome. My name is Gustave Naumann and this is my final resting place and that of my wife, Phoebe Leota Henning. I was born here in Putnam County in 1875, the 4th child of Tobias and Elizabeth Dippel Naumann. They had five children in total. My sister, Lena, married Richard Fiedler; my brother, John, married Lean Pletsch; Henry married Carolyn Gehm; and my sister, Susanna, married Reinhardt Stehl."

"Perhaps you recall Brad Popurella portraying and telling the story that Samuel Kessler's of Gustave and Phoebe Naumann. sisters also married into these families.

My brother married Samuel's niece and my sister married his nephew. There aren't too many families that aren't related several times over. (At the grave) this is a picture of my parents, Tobias and Elizabeth. Tobias was born in 1838 in Wohra, Germany. This is the same village where the Kesslers, Dippels, Stehl, Gehms, Waldschmidts – well, many of the County Line area Germans came from there. Tobias was confirmed at the age of 14 into the Lutheran Church in Wohra. In 1863, at age 24, he and his brother, Johannes, left their home and sailed out of Bremen to New York with a final destination of here – Putnam County, Illinois. Their sister had come to America earlier and she and her husband were already in the area."

"My parents were married in 1865, Tobias was 26 and Elizabeth, 19. My mother was the daughter of Johannes and Barbara Breitenstein Dippel and was born in Hatzbach, Germany. This was a small village just south of Wohra. She was only 16 when she arrived with her parents, her brother, Eustus age 19, and brother, August, age 14. With the exception of four years in Iroquois County, Illinois, my parents spent their lives farming in Putnam County. In 1882 they bought 160 acres from Joel and Sara Hopkins for \$60 per acre. I believe you already know the Hopkins name from having talked to Mrs. Hopkins earlier. At any rate, my grandson, Gary and his wife, Jeanne, still live there today, 128 years later."

"My family has always been Lutherans. In the early 1860's

the German Lutherans had been meeting at the Cedar Point schoolhouse, but in 1868, along with 47 other families, my parents were among the founders of the County Line Lutheran Church. I know the formal name is the Immanuel Lutheran Church, but we all refer to it as the County Line. That was also the church where I was baptized and confirmed."

"Growing into adulthood, I felt it was my duty to be active in community affairs. I served on the board of directors for the Fairview school as my father had before me. This was the school that I attended and was only about a mile from our home. I also served on the board of the Farmers State Bank and the Standard Elevator."

"Farming for me was quite different than the farmer of today. We raised corn and wheat. We kept chickens, ducks and geese. We used goose down for our pillows



and wheat straw for our beds. In the spring several farmers would gather to butcher beef and pork. The meat was preserved in lard or smoked. In the fall, farmers would help each other with the harvest. Threshing was always a big day with 25 to 30 workers bringing in the crop while the women prepared the meals. Every woman tried to outdo the meal previously served by her neighbor and setting a higher standard for whoever was to follow at the next farms. Living as a typical farmer in the area, our home had no central heat but a coal burner in the living room."

"Phoebe and I had two chil-

dren, Hester and Chauncy. Hester married Marvin Smith and gave us a grandson, Lloyd Leonard Smith. Hester later married Frank Williams and moved to California. Her son, Lloyd, still lives in California. Chauncy married Elsie Johnson and gave us five more grandchildren: Virginia (Mrs. Richard Gansemmer), Gary, who married Jeanne Spear; Nancy (Mrs. Donald Brandstatter); Alice (Mrs. John Gibson); and Robert who married Jackie Zalce. Chauncy had learned his lesson well to give back by being involved in the community. He served on the board for the McNabb Telephone company and the McNabb Grain Elevator. He also served on the board for the Farmer's State Bank. Both Hester and Chauncy have now also passed with Hester resting in San Diego and Chauncy right here in this cemetery."

I would like to add to this article about my friend, Gus Naumann. I knew Gus when I was a young boy growing up on a farm west of Gus's farm in the 1940's. Besides being our neighbor, we were related and he was my Dad, Walter Samuel Kessler Alleman's, friend. Gus was on the one room Fairview School board that I attended with Gus's grandchildren, Gary and Virginia. Gus owned a 1937 Chevy grain truck. He hauled grain at harvest time for my dad to the McNabb Elevator. I remember when school let out in the afternoons, I would run across the road and jump in Gus's truck with him. 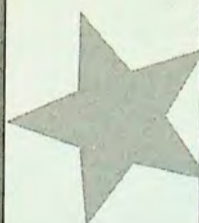

PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO THE 1970 ILLINOIS CONSTITUTION

Explanation of Amendment

The proposed amendment, which takes effect upon approval by the voters, adds a new section to the Suffrage and Elections Article of the Illinois Constitution. The new section would provide the State's electors with an option to petition for a special election to recall a Governor and for the special election of a successor Governor. At the general election to be held on November 2, 2010, you will be called upon to decide whether the proposed amendment should become part of the Illinois Constitution.

If you believe the Illinois Constitution should be amended to provide for a special election to recall a Governor and for a special election to elect a successor Governor, you should vote "YES" on the question. If you believe the Illinois Constitution should not be amended to provide for a special election to recall a Governor and for a special election to elect a successor Governor, you should vote "NO" on the question. Three-fifths of those voting on the question or a majority of those voting in the election must vote "YES" in order for the amendment to become effective.

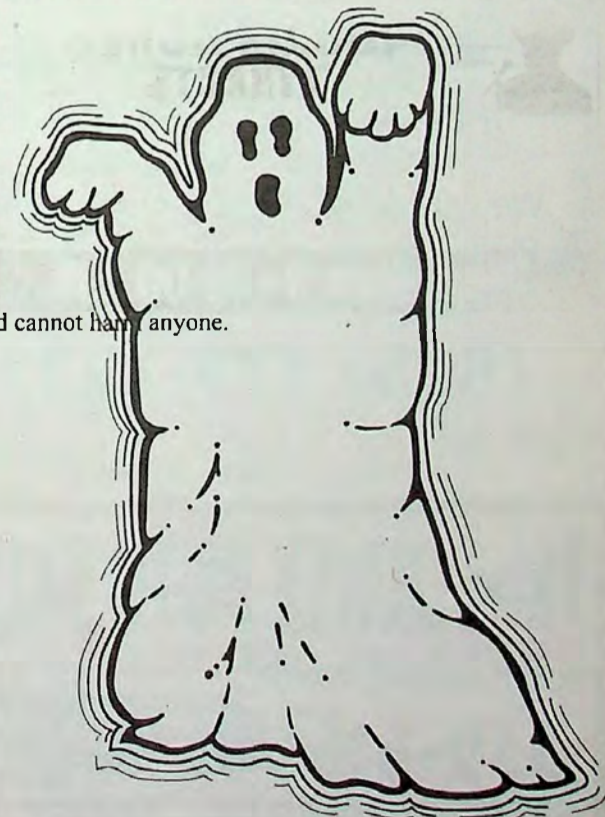

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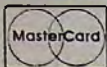

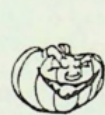
