Rebecca Caudill Young Readers' Book Award Program Observed at PCJHS

The Putnam County Junior High School sixth grade students and the Putnam County Elementary School fifth grade students participated in the Rebecca Caudill Young Readers' Book Award program. This Illinois award is determined by student vote. The 2010 Rebecca Caudill Young Readers' Award will be given to the author whose book receives the most participating student votes. This award encourages students to read for personal satisfaction and develops a statewide awareness of outstanding children's literature.

This program was introduced to the students through a cooperative effort among Miss Darrah's sixth grade classes, 5A-Mrs. Boudreau's, 5B-Mrs. Hall's and 5C-Mrs. Ward's language art classes, (the late) Mrs. Hundley, media aide and Mrs. Thompson, the new media aide. A special thank you goes to the Putnam County Educational Foundation for purchasing the books and providing the treats for the party. Each student received a certificate after they read a book and completed a brief book report. The book reports help the students understand the parts of a novel. Accelerated Reader tests are also required after reading each book.

After reading and reporting on three Rebecca Caudill books, each student receives a certificate stating they are eligible to vote for the Rebecca Caudill Young Readers' Book Award.

Fifty students voted on Friday, February 12. Three hundred

one books were read. Students were treated to cookies, soda, ice cream and toppings in celebration of Rebecca Caudill's February birthday. Sheriff Doyle to Award Scholarship to Applicant

The IL Sheriff's Assn has announced it will be awarding over \$53,000 in college scholarships throughout the State of IL to students wishing to pursue higher education during this academic year. The scholarships are to be applied to tuition, books and fees only. The students must be enrolled full-time at a certified institution of higher learning within the State of IL.

Sheriff Kevin Doyle of Putnam County will award one scholarship in the amount of \$500. There will be no restriction on any applicant by reason of race, age, creed, color, sex or national origin. The only limitations are as follows:

- applicants must be permanent IL residents
- scholarships must be utilized at institutions of higher learning within the State of IL
- students must be enrolled as a full-time student during the 2009-2010 school year (excluding summer session)

Applications are now available at the PC Sheriff's office or online at www.ilsheriff.org. Students must complete the application, answer the essay question and return all documentation to the sheriff's office in their permanent county of residence by March 13 (must be postmarked by this date).

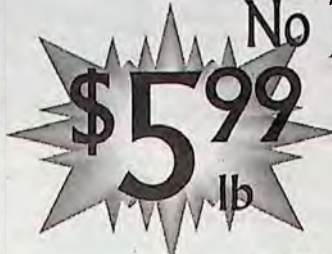

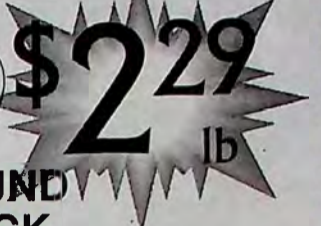

County Health Rankings Released

A new report which ranks the overall health of every county in all 50 states was released in Washington by the University of Wisconsin's Population Health Institute and the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation. Each county is ranked within the state in terms of how healthy people are, how long they live, and how important key factors such as tobacco use, obesity, access to healthcare, education, community safety, and air quality, affect their health.

In Illinois, Bureau County ranked 34 and Putnam county ranked 57 (1 being the healthiest) out of 101 counties in Illinois when comparing health outcomes. The online report, available at www.countyhealthrankings.org, includes a snapshot of each county in Illinois with a color-coded map comparing each county's overall health ranking. Each county's rank reveals its strengths and weaknesses. This is the first release of what will be an annual snapshot of county-by-county health within each state.

This report is important because it shows us that where we live, learn, work and play has a bearing on our health. The rankings highlight the need for people and organizations from all sectors of each county to work deliberately and collaboratively to improve the public's health through policy, programs and services. All of us must play a role in improving the health of our communities.

Summer Seminar Program at Naval Academy

Applications are being accepted through March 31 for the U.S. Naval Academy Summer Seminar (NASS) 2010. NASS is designed for students who will have just completed their junior year in high school this summer. The program is a fast-paced six-day experience for high-achievers who may be interested in pursuing an appointment to one of the nation's service academies and serving as a military officer after graduation. NASS is held in three sessions: June 5-10, June 12-17 and June 19-24.

Summer Seminar introduces students to the opportunities at the Naval Academy where academics, athletics, and

professional training play equally important roles in developing our nation's leaders. Students will live in the dormitory, Bancroft Hall, eat in the dining facility, Kind Hall; participate in academic and leadership workshops; and experience a variety of other activities at the academy. Students will have an opportunity to see first-hand what the academy has to offer through its exceptional academic, athletic, extracurricular activities and leadership training programs.

The academy's current students, known as midshipmen, run the Summer Seminar training with oversight by active duty Navy

and Marine Corps officers. Over 2,250 students from around the U.S. attend this rigorous program each year.

According to Naval Academy Summer Seminar officer-in-charge, Lt. John Meise, "If you are a student who wants a summer challenge with the opportunity to sample university-level academics at a first-rate engineering school, the Summer Seminar program will let you discover how the Naval Academy can help you achieve your goals, and give you a jump start on the admissions process."

By applying to the Summer Seminar, students are also applying for admission to the naval Academy class of 2015. There is no need to submit a preliminary application when it becomes available on April 1st for students desiring to apply for admission to USNA.

Approve Affordable Health Care Coverage for Unemployed Workers

Health care coverage would continue to be more affordable for laid-off workers in IL under a measure sponsored by State Rep. Frank Mautino, D-Spring Valley, and approved unanimously by the IL House of Representatives.

"Illinois like much of the entire country, is still trying to recover from the deep recession it was thrown into in 2008," Mautino said. "Many still struggle to find jobs, making it extremely difficult to find affordable health care. This legislation provides assistance for working men and women who have fallen on tough times."

House Bill 5018 makes IL eligible to receive federal dollars for the mini-COBRA program so health care coverage can be extended to workers who have been laid off. The mini-COBRA program requires employers to offer employees who lose their group coverage the opportunity to continue their employee-based health insurance. The program applies to employers of any size, including small employers with less than 20 employees, and the coverage covers both the employees and their eligible dependents. Employees who elect continuation coverage typically must pay the entire health insurance premium.

Under the mini-COBRA plan, qualifying persons are only required to pay 3.5% of group coverage continuation premium. The remaining 65% is initially paid by the former employer or by the insurer providing the coverage under the group health plan, and they are then reimbursed by the federal government.

Last year, Mautino helped to pass a law providing that employees who were laid off between September 1, 2008 and December 31, 2009 and who had group insurance coverage or group HMO coverage were eligible to receive continued at a discount rate. Last December, the federal government extended the eligibility period for the premium reduction through February 28, and the maximum period for receiving the subsidy to 15 months. Mautino's new measure ensures that coverage can continue under the extended dates and beyond if the dates are extended again.

"This bill will not only help laid off workers when they and their families need it the most, but the federal reimbursement ensures that businesses can continue to provide needed coverage without shutting off benefits," Mautino said.

House Bill 5018 passed the IL house 112-0. The measure is

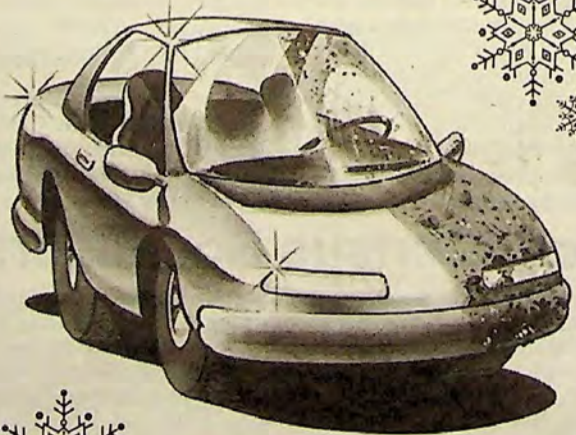

George Donaldson as squad commander was comprised of Charles Bernardi, Ivan Moore, Clarence Peterson, Robert Ruppert, Jenno Bonucchi, Albert Bean and Joe Vercellone, with Charles Kassabaum, Jr., Harold Grant, Robert Klein and James Barnard comprised the color squad. Bill Kemp served as bugler. Alfonso Mazzini, Amel Trahd, Kent Lenzen, Charles Stanton, Leland Anderson and Francis Ballerine, legionnaires, served as pallbearers.

The deceased was born July 24, 1894 in Spring Valley to the late John and Margaret (Smiles) Redshaw. The family moved to Granville in 1912. During his youth he worked in the local mine. He was appointed postmaster of the Granville Post Office in 1919, and served in that capacity until 1932, Granville's last Republican postmaster. Developing his bartering ideas as a fulltime business while postmaster, he was well established in his enterprise when he was relieved of his appointment as postmaster. He was soon acclaimed a

construction business. Then eight years after Jack died, on September 28, 1953, the Ossola's held an auction of the contents as well as the building on October 5, 1963. My wife, Jeanne, remembers going to the auction. She was interested and always wondered what was in the big long building as she walked by it in the alley past Trahd's Tavern on her way to visit her friend, Peg Kassabaum, whose house was directly on the east end of it.

Jerry Masini remembered walking by the warehouse and looking into a window and seeing a merry-go-round horse when he was a kid. Jeanne remembers a large crowd attended the auction.

The Granville businessmen built the building to entice a business to Granville. That is when the rain coat factory came and employed local people. After the rain coat factory closed, Jack Redshaw bought the building for a roller skating rink.

Bill Tonarelli remembers Mary renting the roller skate shoes and clip on rollers for

customers to use. Ed Capatani said he and his sister roller skated there. Eddie said that the men that took Jack for a ride and beat him up before letting him out by Hennepin, had come into the roller rink and took him out through the main door that is still used. After the skating rink closed, Jack started keeping his trades and collections in the large building.

At the auction the airplane with no wings was sold. The airplane that I had seen late morning hooked to a car across the street from Jack's business so many years before. This quotation inscribed in large letters on a plaque on the front of Jack's business spelled out the philosophy of this famous man known the world over for his trading powers;

"There is hardly anything in the world that someone cannot make a little worse and sell a little cheaper, and the people who consider price only are this man's lawful prey." - Ruskin

Kereta Verdict: Guilty!

For the second time in six months, the fate of Richard Kereta has gone into the hands of a Putnam County jury. Kereta's previous trial on these charges in October of last year was declared a mistrial after a juror asked a question during deliberations and a bailiff answered, which is a violation of criminal procedures.

This time, however, Kereta, 45, was found guilty of multiple charges including: Driving under the influence of alcohol, enhanced offense (Class 3 Felony), driving under the influence of alcohol, enhanced offense (Class 4 Felony), driving while driver's license is revoked, enhanced offense (Class 4 Felony, two counts), aggravated driving under the influence of alcohol causing great bodily harm (Class 4 Felony), aggravated driving under the influence of alcohol causing permanent disability (Class 4 Felony), aggravated driving under the influence of alcohol causing disfigurement (Class 4 Felony), aggravated reckless driving causing great bodily harm (Class 4 Felony), aggravated reckless driving causing permanent disability (Class 4 Felony), and aggravated reckless driving causing disfigurement (Class 4 Felony). The charges stemmed from a November 30, 2007 incident which resulted in severe injuries for then-19 year old Nicole Engelbrecht.

According to testimony from witnesses and experts, Kereta, formerly of Putnam and now a resident of Princeton, struck Engelbrecht with her own truck after an argument over his usage of marijuana in the vehicle. Also testifying, through the use of a keyboard and computer screen, was Engelbrecht herself. Due to the severity of her injuries, Engelbrecht is still unable to speak, but she asserted by writing that it was Kereta who struck her.

Kereta has alternately declared that he was not driving the vehicle or was not even present at the time of the accident; however, a reconstructionist placed Kereta in the driver's seat of Engelbrecht's Toyota Forerunner as the only viable suspect. Adding to the evidence is the observation by former Henry police officer Matthew Carrescia that Kereta tried to place the keys to the truck on Engelbrecht's body at least twice. Other witnesses have testified to Kereta's consumption of alcohol which, according to two different toxicologists who appeared in court, contributed to a BAC of at least 0.073, and likely closer to the 0.1 mark. The state legal limit for BAC is 0.08.

Although legally eligible for probation on all counts, Kereta faces the possibility of one to three years in prison on the Class 4 felony counts, except for the aggravated DUI counts, to which a sentencing range of one to twelve years is applicable. The sentencing range on the Class 3 felony is two to five years.

Avoid Census Scammers

"I believe it is vital to ensure that the American public understands the importance of participating in the U.S. Census while not becoming victimized by con-artists."

Browning offers tips to help people recognize fraudulent activity or unofficial data collections to keep predators at bay while ensuring your valid participation in the important census process. Tips include:

• **Don't Get Social** - The U.S. Census does not request your social security number so do not divulge this information to anyone claiming to be a U.S. Census representative.

• **Avoid Phishing Trips** - The U.S. Census is not conducting any surveying via the Internet so any emails or other electronic communications received are fraudulent "phishing trips" that should be immediately reported as spam and deleted. "Phishing" is the unlawful practice of attempting to acquire private information such as usernames, passwords, social security numbers, bank account and credit card details by masquerading as a trustworthy person or organization in an email or via instant messaging. Often the "phishers" direct you to enter this private information at a fake web site that looks almost uniform to the legitimate one.

Excerpts From A New Book by Greg Stanmar

Harold Washington

A footnote in the history of Harold Washington and Illinois politics, if anybody remembers or cares, is that he is the only 20th Century Chicago mayor to spend time behind bars, albeit very briefly.

Washington began his political career classically enough for Chicago. He took over as a precinct committeeman in the city's south side when his father died in 1954. He also picked up a law degree to add to his record as a sergeant that efficiently built airfields in World War II. He spent 15 years in the state legislature before becoming a U.S. Congressman in 1960.

In 1970, during his congressional tenure, his law license was suspended for a year for accepting retainers and not doing the work. That year grew to five years after additional shenanigans were leveled against him. Included was failure to file for income taxes for 19 years. Government investigators could only

get him for four of those years because of the statute of limitations.

His two years in prison was knocked down to probation and 36 days in Cook County Jail, about the same as a predecessor, Mayor Levi Boone, who was jailed 110 years earlier for helping Confederate prisoners of war jailed in Chicago.

With Washington's jail time behind him and ready to resume his political career, his work for the underprivileged was recognized by the voters, who unexpectedly ousted incumbent Jane Byrne in the primary, assuring his victory in this heavily-Democratic city. Chicago's first woman mayor was replaced with its first black mayor.

Even though Chicago is made up of 51½ percent women and 42 percent black, it has never again voted in a woman or black.

The one dream that Washington did not fulfill was spending 20 years in office and then dropping dead at his desk like his famous predecessor, Dick Daley. Washington dropped dead at his office in 1987, but only four years after he was elected.

This eventually opened the way for Dick Daley the younger to take over his father's office, something Chicagoans have been happy with ever since. They much prefer their mayor to preside over a den of thieves than to be one.

DISABILITY

Question: How does Social Security decide if I am disabled?

Answer:

For an adult to be considered disabled, Social Security must determine that you are unable to do the work you did before and unable to adjust to any other work which exists in significant numbers in the national economy. Also, your disability must last or be expected to last for at least one year or to result in death. Social Security pays only for total disability. No benefits are payable for partial disability or short-term disability (less than a year). For more information, we recommend you read Disability Benefits (SSA Publication No. 05-10029), available online at www.socialsecurity.gov/pubs/10029.html.

Question:

What is the earliest age that I can receive Social Security disability benefits?

Answer:

There is no minimum age as long as you meet the strict Social Security definition of disability. To qualify for disability benefits, you must have worked long enough under Social Security to earn the required number of work credits and some of the work must be recent. You can earn up to a maximum of four work credits each year. The amount of earnings required for a credit increases each year as general wage levels go up and is currently \$1,120. The number of work credits you need for disability benefits depends on your age when you become disabled. For example, if you are under age 24, you may qualify with as little as six credits of coverage. But people disabled at age 31 or older generally need between 20 and 40 credits, and some of the work must have been recent. For example, you may need to have worked five out of the past 10 years. The Fire of Our Lives

John the Baptist said, "I baptize you with water for repentance. But after me will come one who is more powerful than I, whose sandals I am not fit to carry. He will baptize you with the Holy Spirit and with fire" Matthew 3:11, (NIV).

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Adult Volunteers Needed for 4-H Shooting Sports Program

Adults who are looking to get involved in one of the fastest growing sports/activities in the country may want to consider the University of Illinois 4-H Shooting Sports program, says Dan Dawson, 4-H youth development educator and coordinator of the program.

The program provides a supportive, adult-supervised environment in which young people, ages 8 to 18, can learn the shooting disciplines of archery, air and .22 caliber rifle, and shotgun. Youth also learn about wildlife management and conservation ethics. Some counties even offer competitive shooting events.

Nationally, the 4-H Shooting Sports program has been in existence since 1975, involving more than 300,000 youth and 46,000 adult volunteer instructors. The Illinois program started in the fall of 2009 with two adult volunteer training workshops held in Monticello and Sparta. To date, 80 adults have been trained and are now able to start the program in 23 Illinois counties.

The next training workshop for adult volunteers is set for April 9-11 at the 4-H Memorial Camp in Monticello. Disciplines of archery, rifle (air and .22), shotgun and coordinator will be offered.

"The coordinator manages the county 4-H Shooting Sports program with assis-

tance from local U of I Extension personnel," explains Dawson. "Counties must have a trained coordinator and at least one shooting discipline instructor. But, it is beneficial for counties to have multiple shooting discipline instructors."

Once local 4-H shooting sports clubs are organized, they will need meeting places such as sportsmen's clubs, community ranges and privately-owned facilities where they can meet, learn and practice their disciplines. The shooting sports clubs may also need financial help to buy equipment and expendables as more boys and girls get involved.

Marshall-Putnam 4-H is in need of volunteers who are willing to participate in the training and work with youth throughout our area. There are many current 4-Hers who are anxious to get started, but are patiently waiting for adults to step forward and volunteer.

Dawson says that the focus of all 4-H programs is the development of youth as individuals and as responsible and productive citizens. The Illinois 4-H Shooting Sports program stands out as an example.

Youth learn marksmanship, the safe and responsible use

of firearms, the principles of archery and much more. The activities of the program and the support of caring adult leaders give young people a chance to develop skills in decision making, self responsibility, teamwork and leadership.

Premise Alert Program or PAP

In 2009, the Illinois Legislature developed and enacted what they commonly refer to as the Premise Alert Program (PAP). This program provides that emergency response agencies (law enforcement, fire and ambulance) who have dedicated telecommunications (dispatch) responsibilities and a computer aided dispatch (CAD) software program that is capable of archiving information of interest to emergency responders, retain certain matters of importance for qualifying individuals. The PAP program is specifically intended to provide aid and support to those individuals with Special Needs. In the event of a call for help, support or emergencies, the information can then be provided to our emergency / first responders.

The information provided by an authorized person will be kept confidential and used only to provide emergency / first responders with the knowledge necessary to help and support with situations or emergencies involving a Special Needs person. No individual may be entered into the Sheriff's PAP database unless the special need has been verified by the individual, a family member, caregiver, or a medical provider who is familiar with the individual. This verification will be made through the completion of an application document that will be signed by the certifying person and submitted to the Sheriff.

Applications to participate in the Premise Alert Program (PAP) are currently available at the Bureau County Jail, 22 Park Avenue West in Princeton. There is no cost for this service.

Tips To Improve Your Golf Game

* Improve Your Club Selection: Updating your golf clubs can help. Consider investing in custom wedges to save strokes, hybrids for hitting more greens, and a putter with a length and head weight that's right for you. But lugging a set on your vacation isn't all that appealing. Leave them at home if they aren't imperative to your game. Many resorts provide top-of-the-line equipment. Just don't forget to buy golf balls.

* Play Challenging Courses: Top resort golf courses typically offer scenic landscapes, lagoons or ocean views, which add beauty to the eye and depth to your game.

* Learn the Rules: It might seem elementary, but familiarizing yourself with the USGA rule book, especially specific situations and procedures, may save you some strokes. Ask if local rules allow for "drop areas" on holes with water hazards, which could save you time and golf balls. 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Schock Helps IL Manufacturers to Improve and Compete Globally

Congressman Aaron Schock (IL-18) announced his recent cosponsorship of legislation that would enable Illinois manufacturers to continue to receive cost-effective services from the Illinois Manufacturing Extension Center (IMEC). This follows a letter Congressman Schock authored with a bipartisan coalition of Illinois Representatives to Governor Quinn, urging the state to include funding for the Illinois Manufacturing Extension Center.

The bill, H.R. 4393, would reduce an MEP center's matching funds requirement from 66 percent to 50 percent, and give the Secretary of Commerce the authority to reduce the match further if circumstances necessitate such action.

"One of 59 affiliate centers of the U.S. Department of Commerce's Manufacturing Extension Partnership (MEP), IMEC leverages federal funds to reach out to manufacturers throughout the state, assess their needs, and provide them with best practice solutions to improve productivity and create jobs. Each federal dollar requires two additional dollars of cost-share match from states and industry. As states like Illinois have decreased or eliminated funding for their MEP centers, the cost share burden has shifted to smaller manufacturers, many of whom have been unable to make necessary investments in continuous improvement because of the economic downturn.

Last Spring, Congressman Schock organized a bi-partisan coalition of Illinois representatives in sending a letter to Governor Quinn, urging the state to include funding for the Illinois Manufacturing Extension Center.

"We continue to convey our support for IMEC and the Manufacturing Extension Partnership and want to make sure that the Governor is aware of the opportunity to leverage up to \$4.5 million in federal funds to help manufacturers make the improvements they need to compete globally," said Schock. "In these uncertain economic times, manufacturers need help to weather the current downturn and position to grow in the future. With the state's fiscal challenges, it makes sense to invest in a program that delivers a return of jobs and tax revenue."

The Manufacturing Extension Partnership was credited with creating or retaining 57,000 manufacturing jobs in 2007 and increasing or retaining \$10.5 billion in sales for participants. In Illinois, IMEC generates more than \$100 million in annual impacts on manufacturing cost savings, sales, and investments. These benefits, in turn result in more than \$250,000,000 in state and local economic impacts, including four dollars in new state and local tax revenues per dollar of state contribution. In the last two years alone, the companies IMEC served reported creating retaining nearly 2,200 jobs at a time when many other companies were reducing employment.

in downtown Tonica, which is now a woodworking shop, it was a beehive of activity. Nine members of Woodcrafters Unlimited of Princeton were making braille blocks for the blind.

Since 1999 the twenty-five members of the group have shipped over 1,800 sets of blocks to the Hadley School for the Blind in Winnetka. The wood blocks, which are approximately two inches wide by three inches long, have six holes partially drilled in them. Into different locations of the holes wooden pegs are inserted to form the twenty-six letters of the alphabet. The wooden block has a groove cut into the top to distinguish the top from the bottom. The twenty-six blocks are then placed in a handmade wooden box for storage.

The nine men at work were set up in an assembly process.

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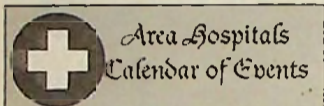

Southwest Flight Attendant, Jodi Slingsby and WWII Army Veteran, Joe Panier made some commercials for the upcoming Honor Flight and Southwest Airlines.

Jodi said the opportunity to do the commercial came from her SW Airline Supervisor for volunteerism, Glen Fox, who nominated her. He knew of her work for the WWII Honor Flight, and her involvement

groups and others to do the commercials. Jodi feels one reason they beat the rest of them is they wanted a real emotional person, which she is. When asked about the WWII Veterans she would tear up sometimes to the questions.

When they were notified they were going, they only had a weekend to get ready. Joe did not have his uniform anymore. Jean called eight

WWII Eisenhower jacket and uniform, they cried the first time they saw him. Joe said that he and Jodi had to walk off of a Southwest airplane and walk the length of a fire truck 20 times with people standing there. One time there was a black lady standing there with her two children. Joe bent down and shook the little girl's and boy's hands. Right away a camera man noticed that and asked them to walk off the plane again and shake their hands, this time the cameraman was there to film it.

There were bright lights, cameras, a full movie scene. The film crew was from New York and there were several corporate companies there making the commercials. They were told to just be natural. They were wired for sound. One of the girls on the Southwest staff tied Joe's tie in the military style. One commercial had the sun rising in it.

They were in Dallas for three days. The Southwest commercials were shown several times during Super Bowl Sunday and at other times as well. Jeanne and I saw them, and got excited seeing our local people on TV. Joe's granddaughter was watching TV with friends and saw Joe in the commercial and yelled, "That's my grandpa Joe."

Joe served in WWII from 1943 to 1946 in the Army in France and Germany. He left in October 1943 and that December his daughter, Janice, was born. Joe never saw her until she was 15 months old.

Joe and his family had a lot of suspense and fun waiting for the commercial to be shown. Joe and Jean were out west with their family when they saw it. Jodi said that May 26th will be the first opportunity to fly the WWII, Korean and Vietnam Honor Flight Veterans to

with the M-P County Fair Queen Pageant. They became friends and last summer Glen came to the county fair and was a judge for the Queen Pageant.

Military was Jodi's category, the others were children charitable work, the Ronald McDonald House and Natural Disasters. Jodi thought of WWII Army Veteran Joe Panier and asked him, "What do you think about going with me to Dallas TX and make a movie with me?" Joe said his first thought was that this can't happen. Joe's wife Jean said, "Why don't you go?"

Through another phone interview with both Jodi and Joe, they beat out big military

different people trying to find a WWII Army uniform, finally finding Marion Kuhne's and it fit Joe. It was kept in mothballs and they did not have much time so Jean used Breeze and hung it outside. It was OK, but Joe said it had a mothball, Breeze smell!

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Three PC Winners in IVCC Edible Car Contest

The debris on the side of the track looked like the remains of a food fight, but it was the result of a friendly competition that was the highlight of the Fifth Annual Edible Car Contest at Illinois Valley Community College.

Many of the cars IVCC students built of food items disintegrated on the race track during the contest held recently in celebration of National Engineers Week. The fastest vehicle, a not very sleek looking cucumber with rice cake wheels, managed to stay intact until it crossed the finish line, traveling the three-foot inclined track in .47 seconds, just .02 of a second

than gentle push.

Speed, however, was only one category in which the vehicles competed. Prizes were awarded for best overall entry and for design, creativity, detail, nutritional value, most colorful, most durable and a few special categories. In keeping with the edible theme, prizes included trophies filled with chocolate and NASCAR cocoa.

The 60 students who competed in the contest said they found the challenges of creating an edible car that worked to be the highlight of participating. One student said his favorite was "the trial and error, and rebuilding." Another

requires students to use math and science in a creative framework," said Dorene Perez, Program Director of Computer Aided Design/Computer Aided Engineering and one of the organizers of the competition.

Judging by the excitement of the participants and the animated reactions of the students who crowded the college cafeteria for the speed trials and prize ceremony, the contest accomplished the fun part.

Students also demonstrated an understanding of the scientific principles behind their designs, with many of them acknowledging that axles were their top design challenge. One student admitted that "nothing worked the way I thought."

The Best Overall car, a bread stick body with spaghetti axels named Car Ramrod, designed by Bryan Cole, Natalie Nelson and Jennilea Gentry also took a third in Speed.

The fastest car Plan B designed by Luke Maltas, Janet Hunt, Doug Donaway and Douglas Goulding also captured second place in Detail.

This year, for the first time, two teams of Hall High School students who are taking IVCC dual credit classes participated in the contest and went home with prizes. Cars From Calculus, built by Macee Lentz, Christina Richardson and Claire Faletti won First in Nutrition and First in the IVCC/High School special category. Da Wolf Pack, designed by Ben Dagraedt, Gabriella Dhesse and Michele Victor, received a special prize for Most Durable after surviving four runs down the speed track. Their slim and trim pasta creation hugged the track so closely that it failed to trip the electronic timers despite repeated tries.

Despite the technical problems Da Wolf Pack had, the timing for the speed competition was decidedly high tech. Under the guidance of Jim Gibson, Program Director of Electronics, electronics students designed, programmed and built a programmable logic controller (PLC) to time the

speed on the track. The control was connected to a computer running Rockwell Automated software. The timing setup utilized a reflective photo eye at the start and finish.

Debris dropped or smeared on the track as the cars rolled, or slid, and some cars smashed into the electronic timing mechanism, requiring regular cleanup and causing some delays in speed runs.

Student teams were required to include at least one female since encouraging more women to consider careers in engineering technology is one goal of the contest.

"Women hold less than 20 percent of the engineering jobs," Perez said. "There's a big push nationally to increase the number of women in science, technology, engineering and math."

Since half of the students who participated were women, the contest apparently succeeded in appealing to women.

The contest was sponsored by the Division of Career and Technical Programs and Masking Industry Meaningful In College (MIMIC) project and was supported by a National Science Foundation grant.

Leadership Team students from electronics and engineering technology programs assisted with activities and Student Government Association provided pizza.

Judges were Michelle Story, computer laboratory instructor; Crystal Loughran, administrative assistant; and Koshu Jagasia, English professor.

Organizers of the contest were Perez, Gibson, life science professor Sue Caley Opsal and communications professor Rose Marie Lynch.

Soul and Thoughts

One of my favorite books in the New testament is Philippians, and I believe that Philippians has a lot to say to us during this season of Lent. "Finally, brethren, whatever is true, whatever is honorable, whatever is just, whatever is pure, whatever is lovely, whatever is gracious, if there is any excellence, if there is anything worthy of praise, think about these things" (Philippians 4:8).

Two facts about the advice Paul gave the people at Philippi are just as important today as they were then. One is that a person has the capacity to direct his or her thoughts. The second is that this has a dramatic influence on one's life.

There is an old story of two children who went into a garden. One said, "Every rosebush is covered with thorns." The other said, "Every thornbush is covered with roses." The life-style we follow depends on what we emphasize. Most of us fall somewhere between the two extremes. Some of us see more roses than thorns; some see more thorns than roses. Which we see most has a very powerful influence on our happiness, our effectiveness and even our health.

When Paul urged the people at Philippi to direct their thoughts to those things that are true, honorable, just, pure, lovely and gracious, he was giving them very sound, practical psychological counsel. He was well aware of the realities of their situation. He knew they were facing discouraging situations, opposition and even persecution. After all, he was in prison as he wrote.

What he was doing was emphasizing a force that has been recognized for centuries, both before and since. An ancient philosopher said, "The soul is dyed the color of its thoughts." Since the positive approach is so powerful, some things should be said about it:

1. Positive, creative, affirmative thinking has a powerful influence on our outlook, our happiness and on the people with whom we live. One who thinks optimistically, affirmatively, is a great blessing to those with whom he/she lives, works, or plays.

2. Thought patterns are largely habitual. They are a part of our life-style, what some people call the scripts by which we live. Life-styles change slowly, usually in small steps. Hence, one who desires to change should begin with small and specific steps. He/she should say, "I will change *this* attitude, toward *this* situation." He/she should not be discouraged by set-backs; probably these are inevitable. When they happen, he/she tries again.

3. A person should recognize that only he/she can change themselves. Change is possible, and that is all important, but no one else can do it for us. Neither can we blame others for negative, pessimistic thoughts. Only we can think negatively. Only we can think affirmatively.

4. Such a desire needs to be reinforced by definite action. One must make the statement, "I will," or "I choose now to think affirmatively." Write it out. Say it aloud. Maybe write out daily the things for which you are grateful.

5. Basically, this is an act of faith, faith that God, the Father of our Lord Jesus, is on the side of the things that are true, just, pure, and lovely. When it seems there is little else to affirm, we can affirm our own dignity as children of God and our trust in God's love and care. During Lent, why not, instead of giving up something, take on a more positive thought and attitude toward ourselves, family, and others.

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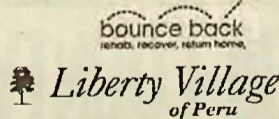

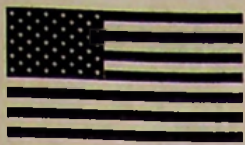

The Conservation Farm Family of the Year award is a prestigious honor at the local, state and national level. A long standing tradition for Soil and Water Conservation Districts, the Conservation Farm Family

exemplifies the best of the best in terms of stewards of our land and natural resources. The Marshall-Putnam SWCD is proud to be able to honor such a family as the Jessen's.

The Jessens live in rural Hennepin on the family farm. Craig is a 3rd generation farmer. Craig and Amy have four boys. The Jessens grow corn, beans, wheat and alfalfa. They have a cow-calf operation. Some of the conservation practices they have implemented on their farm are buffer strips, terraces, grassed waterways, wildlife food plots, and their most recent project and prob-

ably their largest by far, is the implementation of a Grazing Land Management Operation through NRCS Federal Cost Share program, and (EQIP) Environmental Quality Incentive Program. This is a Rotational Grazing Pasture Management system. Craig and Amy enjoy the family oriented lifestyle that farming offers.

The Marshall-Putnam Soil and Water Conservation District proudly honors the Jessen Family Farm and congratulates them on becoming the 2010 Conservation Farm Family of the Year.

Granville UCC Church Mission Trip

Granville United Church of Christ along with Zion United Church of Christ, Peru, took a team of 17 adults to Biloxi, MS to help rebuild the gulf area after Hurricane Katrina.

On August 9, 2005, Hurricane Katrina hit the gulf area of the United States. A 28-foot storm surge came ashore wiping out 90% of the buildings along the Biloxi-Gulfport coastline. In South Mississippi, approximately 65,000 homes were destroyed and an additional 65,000 were extensively damaged, displacing 50,000 residents. Harrison County, the county in which Biloxi is located, lost 30% of its businesses and 70% of the fishing industry. Five years later and Biloxi is still rebuilding.

The mission team worked

on two homes while in Biloxi under the leadership of Back Bay Mission. Back Bay Mission was founded in 1922 as an outreach of the First Evangelical Church of Biloxi (later the United Church of Christ). Members of this early church responded with compassion and service to the needs of the poor 'fisher folk' living in deplorable conditions along the Back Bay in Biloxi. Since then the Back Bay Mission has grown its services and ministries, always keeping the impoverished and marginalized at the center of its concern. Today it provides an array of social services including legal aide, health care services to the homeless, family counseling and domestic violence counseling. It is a leader in the area in

establishing affordable housing for people in poverty. Back Bay's mission statement comes from the Book of Micah "And what does the Lord require of you? To do justice, to love kindness, and to walk humbly with your God" Micah 6:8.

The mission team is composed of members of the two churches, community members from many other denominations and friends and family. The team members were Rev. Gary Stillwell, Susan Stillwell, Rev. 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

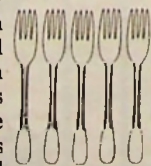

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PC Democrats Hold County Convention



Happy Saint Patrick's Day! This is a holiday that is celebrated in our country as a time of parades and green beer. Every one knows the first few words to "When Irish Eyes are Smiling" but they can't sing the verses. So what is St. Patrick's Day really all about?

In Ireland this is celebrated as the day St. Patrick died. He became the Patron Saint of Ireland after bringing Christianity to the island. He lived in the fifth century and traveled around evangelizing and converting the Celtic people, who were pagan worshippers.

One striking thing that he did, in my opinion, is that he used the Shamrock, now a symbol of Ireland, as a way to explain the Holy Trinity. Three distinct petals are on the Shamrock, yet they make up one Shamrock. What a simple and beautiful way to show the relationship between God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit.

Jesus was a master of using common things to illustrate important messages. That's what the parables are all about. He often spoke of things common to the life of the people he was with. The stories, in simple language, made the lessons come alive. People at that time were not well educated and using simple illustrations meant that the common man could understand the lessons, they didn't need to be "learned men" to comprehend the message.

When we think about the Trinity, however, it is still difficult. There have been many thousands of scholars over the years who have tried to explain it. I have heard many simple illustrations as well. The egg: a shell, a yolk, a white, but one egg. How about a pie? A top crust, a bottom crust and filling: one pie.

While these illustrations might make some sense to us, it is a reality that the concept of the Trinity is difficult to understand, and in fact, may be too difficult for the human mind to truly grasp. A single God with three distinct manifestations. This is where faith comes in. Our faith allows us to put our trust in something we do not fully understand.

God told the people through Isaiah the prophet: "For my thoughts are not your thoughts, neither are your ways my ways," declares the Lord. "As the heavens are higher than the earth, so are my ways higher than your ways and my thoughts than your thoughts." (Isaiah 55:8-9)

With faith, we can be content in knowing that God is greater than any man and that we cannot fully understand until that day when we join Christ in heaven. Paul told us: "Now we see but a poor reflection as in a mirror; then we shall see face to face. Now I know in part; then I shall know fully, even as I am fully known." (1 Corinthians 13:12)

I am thankful that we have a God that is greater than humans. I am thankful that His ways are not the ways of man. I am thankful that His power and mercy can overcome anything here on this earth. I give praise to the Father, the Son and the Holy Spirit, all three in one. One God, three parts.

Excerpts From A New Book by Greg Stanmar

Jim Wright

Proving there is no end to the schemes politicians can dream up to fatten their wallets, former U.S. Speaker of the House Jim Wright will go down in history for his literary scam and not for the excellent career that made him third in line for the presidency.

Wright got off to a good start as a Texas Democrat who put in his time during World War II looking through a bombardier's sight onto South Pacific islands, which earned him the Distinguished Flying Cross. After he took off his officer's garb for civilian attire he used his University of Texas (Austin) education to become involved in trade shows and marketing. He also quickly got himself elected a state representative out of Weatherford for one term.

At the age of 30 he became mayor of Weatherford, holding the post for four years until his 1954 election to congress from Texas' 12th District, which also included Fort Worth. There he did his government work for 14 terms, working himself up to majority leader and then the top house post, speaker, in 1987.

His timing and luck seems to have run out at that point. A guy named Newt Gingrich, a Republican who would later himself become speaker, was making a lot of noise about some of the opposition party's dirty bed sheets that everyone else had been content to leave in the bedroom. Wright's dirty laundry was the sale of a book he had self-published, "Reflections of a Public Man." People weren't beating down the book stores' doors to buy a copy.

When his plan for his literary skills to ensure a healthy financial retirement did not work out as planned he went to Plan B, tying his book sales to his speaker fees, with the aid of the Teamster's Union, slinking past the maximum allowed for those fees. He also got his wife on the payroll of supporters, further helping the family budget.

Newt took a dim view of all that and the house ethics committee made Wright one of its targets. Wright stepped down as speaker in 1989 and resigned from Congress soon after.

After he left Congress, Wright had to make do with a teacher's paycheck at Texas Christian University.

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The Beautiful Big War Bird

by Darrell Alleman

This story is about a World War II bomber airplane, the man and pilot who have preserved it for history, a U.S.S. carrier ship with planes like this one, and a World War II Navy Machinist who helped load the bombs on the war bird, watched them take off of the carrier and land back on it, and even saw some go into the ocean.

Vietnam veteran Jerry Massini of Mark told me about the beautiful World War II TBM-3-Avenger sitting in a hanger at the Peru Airport. Jerry was helping

paint off of the interior of the bomb bay to ready it for repainting. Another volunteer, Tom Hartman of Peru was a pilot who served aboard the U.S.S. Independence during the Vietnam War. He enjoys working on the Avenger and especially likes the big round radial engine.

All of the volunteers that work on the plane feel that Deckert's mission to keep the Avenger flying so veterans and their families can see it and enjoy it is a wonderful thing.

This winter, Deckert and the volunteers have been repairing the plane, adding an

the plane.

Brad said the opportunity came at a good price. The plane was in flying condition, having its current inspection. He had always wanted a warplane, and these planes were under valued. Brad said this plane just has a presence about it, and when he saw the movie with 30 Avengers sitting on a carrier, he loved the plane.

Brad told an interesting story about how he learned to fly the war bird. He said first off, the F.A.A. has a type rating; anything over 12,500 pounds you have to get a type rating from the F.A.A., a specific license for that plane, and they require an approved training course. But when you read their regulations, there are no approved training courses. Brad did what the pilots in World War II did; he trained in a C-6 plane. It was the closest plane that would fly like the Avenger, although the C-6 weighed only 6,000 pounds with 1200 horsepower, a big step between planes. Brad finished his training and was signed up to fly it with a letter authorizing him to practice in the plane for his actual test flight.

Brad waited for the perfect weather so he had no excuse not to fly. The plane had been brought to the Bloomington Airport. He got into it and spent time checking the list and "getting his head into it." As he taxied out on the runway, he noticed there was very poor visibility. He had kind of expected that from this large plane, but he could not see down the runway at all. This was worse than he had expected. When he was cleared for takeoff, he eased into the throttle. This plane had so much power that in just a few seconds he was flying, way sooner than he expected. He was in the air but still could not see anything. Then he remembered the guy he hired to fly it from Fargo ND to Bloomington was sitting on his parachute and he was sitting on the plane's seat in the down position. At that point he wasn't willing to bury his head down there and try to find out how to adjust the seat higher. He decided to fly to Peoria to its two-mile-long runway instead of to Peru. When he reached Peoria, he lined up and dove down to the runway. He said he greased his first landing and eased out onto the landing strip. Everything has come out beautifully since then.

The key to this operation is the great volunteers Brad has. He remembers telling his wife over breakfast that the plane was just overwhelming, he didn't think he could keep doing this. She encouraged him

a volunteer there test the original radio antenna to see if it would work with a new modern radio. Jerry had purchased a 522VHF radio when he was in high school from a war surplus store, the same radio used in the TBM-3-Avenger, and everything else that flew during World War II. I remembered doing a story on William Tonarelli of Granville who was on the carrier U.S.S. Wasp in the South Pacific. Bill had told me about the TBM-3-Avenger bomber that was on the Wasp, as well as the F4F Wildcat, the F4U Corsair and the F6F Hellcat. I asked Bill to go with Jerry and I to see the plane and interview the owner and pilot Brad Deckert whom Jerry had already met.

We went on a Saturday as the volunteer workers and the owner meet at the Peru hanger every Saturday to work on the plane. Upon arriving, there were three volunteers working on the dark blue war bird. They greeted us warmly. Bill walked up to the plane and started telling us about the plane. He remembered that Larry Bartoloni of Cedar Point was a Navy pilot on the air group on the Wasp when Bill was on it. After the war, Larry owned the Tonica Lumberyard. Carleton Fay, a Navy man from McNabb, also served on the Wasp with Bill.

Greg Bohn, a volunteer from Peru, was taking old

original ball turret and completing the original cockpit.

Brad arrived and was introduced to us. Bill showed Brad his three books he brought with him about the Wasp and some pictures showing the Avenger taking off and landing. Brad is a very friendly man who started the Deckert Electric Company in Eureka in 1991. He said when he is not busy in his office, he enjoys his favorite hobby: flying. Brad started flying in 1999, and has accumulated approximately 3,000 hours in various aircraft. He holds a private pilot certificate, an instrument rating, a commercial rating in the TBM, a rotorcraft rating. He also has endorsements for high performance for complex and tail wheel airplanes. Besides the Avenger, Brad has partial ownership of an A-36 Bonanza, and an Estron 280C helicopter.

I asked Brad why he was interested in the Avenger and how he acquired it. He said three years ago, a good friend of his was killed at an Oshkosh WI air show. He had met this friend from Fargo, North Dakota when he and his wife purchased a cabin by a lake in Wisconsin next to his cabin. 130 YEARS AGO MARCH 1880 IN IL

(Taken from the IL State Historical society, Old State Capital, Springfield.)

Illinoisans were somewhat handicapped in their observations of the two big days of March 1880 - St. Patrick's Day and Easter.

Ireland was suffering from one of its famine periods and, as the Chicago Evening Journal expressed it, "the (Irish) societies have very sensibly decided to do away with the street parade and to devote the money which would otherwise be devoted to fuss, feathers

and music to the relief of their starving fellow countrymen in Ireland." Peoria and Rock Island also cancelled their parades. (There was a parade in St. Louis, but half of the cities' societies decided not to participate.)

Although the parades were cancelled, high mass was celebrated at the Catholic churches and there were numerous lectures, banquets and balls. The St. Patrick's Society banquet at Chicago's Grand Pacific Hotel included the drinking of 12 toasts, and Gov. Shelby M. Cullom presided at the "grand entertainment" of the Hibernia Rifles at the Exposition Building. Proceeds from these and other celebrations in Chicago as well as those in Rock Island and Peoria went to the Irish relief fund.

Overflow crowds attended the state's churches on Easter Sunday, although Springfield's Illinois State Journal complained of the 'unfavorable' weather. There were services practically all day in most churches - several in the morning, the children's Sunday School programs in the afternoon, and an evening service. The Chicago Journal noted that at Grace Episcopal Church "the services were long and impressive, lasting from 10:45 till nearly 2 p.m." Typically, "the flora decorations were lavish and beautiful."

A chicken dinner was served and then committees were introduced and Mitch Wilson provided the members with a briefing of each of the reports for the plots. A big thank you to everyone who came. Bureau/Putnam County Health Dept. Help With Battle Against Tobacco

The Bureau/Putnam County Health Department took the battle against tobacco use into the 4th and 5th grade classrooms at Putnam County Elementary School.

Tar Wars is a tobacco-free education program for fourth and fifth graders that focus on the short-term effects of tobacco use, the financial implications of tobacco use, and the reasons people begin or continue to use tobacco products. An unbelievable 6,000 young people start smoking each day in the United States. To decrease that statistic, students are asked to create posters advertising the positive effects of being tobacco free after participating in the educational classroom session.

During the classroom presentation, the students participate in various activities. The first activity is to increase the students knowledge of the effects of using tobacco products, such as yellow teeth, bad breath, smelly clothes, difficulty running and breathing, holes in clothes, messy ashes and cigarette butts, coughing and premature wrinkles that is caused by smoking. The students then do a breathing exercise using straws to demonstrate how smoking decreases their lung volume. Next, the students discuss the cost of smoking. The program illustrates the cost of tobacco use over the course of one day, month, year, and lifetime. Another activity the students participate in helps the students identify and understand the reasons people begin smoking and why some people seem to continue to use tobacco products.

The final activity is the poster contest that reinforces the Tar Wars lesson and emphasizes the positive effects of being tobacco-free through original poster designs. The students put their talents to work to create a poster advertising the positive effects of being tobacco free.

Keila Petersen, a fifth grader at Putnam County Elementary School won 1st place in the Tar Wars Poster/Billboard Contest. Keila's poster will be made into a billboard that will be displayed in locations in the Putnam County area. Her winning design will also printed on t-shirts that are given to the top 20 contest winners. Keila has qualified to have her poster entered into the state-wide poster contest. The local winners will be honored at an awards ceremony in April.

The top 20 winners are: 1st place, Keila Petersen, a 5th grader, 2nd place winner, Jon Sabotta, a 5th grader, 3rd place winner, Anna Mattern, a 4th grader. The 4th graders from

Putnam County Elementary School in the top 20 are Paige Veronda, Olivia Lawley, Cameron Colby, Brea Schorn, Liam Lockridge, Dominic Green, Bailey Davenport, Zoe Stombaugh, and Devin Jones. The 5th graders in the top 20 are Isabella Wroblewski, Samantha Smith, Mackenzie Elmer, Jacob Dudek, McKenna Downey, Abby Ossola, Cassandra Copeland, and William Faletti.

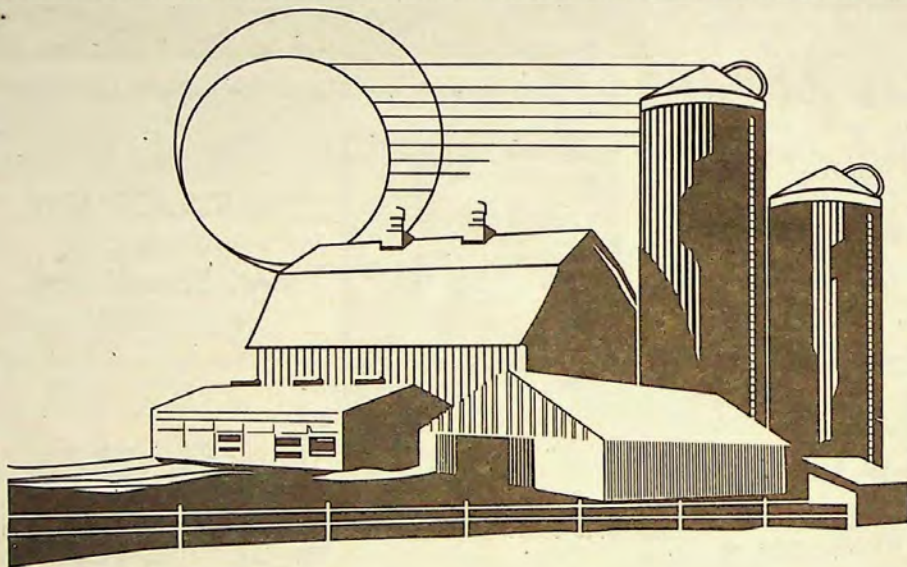
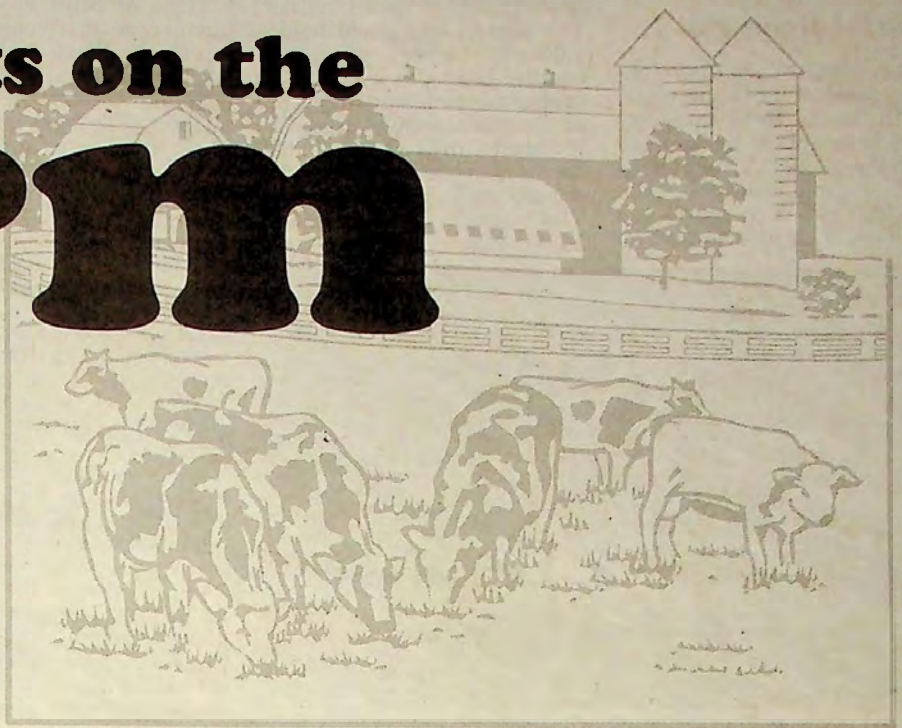

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

to stay with it. Then the volunteers stepped up to the plate. "With them," Brad said, "we have been able to do so much with the plane to bring it back to its original condition, even making most of the parts and we have been able to find all

the original fittings for it. It's incredible the people who are giving us parts and our mechanic we have from St. Louis has a TBM also."

"Two years ago, we took the war bird to a couple of shows, and last year we took it out to shows for a couple of months. It is so much fun talking to the World War II veterans, that's what it's all about," Brad noted. That's what he likes the best about owning the TBM plane. He loves to see the South Pacific World War II veterans that were involved with the plane react when they see it up close. "When these veterans walk over to the plane and put their hand on it, they have tears in their eyes from the memories. This makes it all worthwhile."

There are only 15 to 20 TBM-3-Avengers still flying, and only five of these have actually seen battle. This one has its history well-documented by its military records. It sits this winter with its wings folded back, just as it sat on the U.S.S. Vella Gulf carrier in World War II.

The Avenger was built in 1945 by General Motors for Grumman. TBM stands for Torpedo Bomber and General Motors. It was named the

Avenger to avenge the Japanese attack on pearl harbor. The plane's bay could hold a 2,000 lb. torpedo or several smaller bombs. It was built to drop torpedoes, but they were so inaccurate they used 500 lb. bombs instead. At 18,000 lbs., it was the heaviest single engine plane in World War II. The Walright Cyclone C-14BB 14 cylinder double row air-

the fuselage.

One of Bill's books has a picture of 30 Avengers lined up on the Wasp deck with all of their wings folded back, just like the one in the Peru Airport. The book also states that the Wasp and her air group shot down 230 Japanese planes, damaged 50 other planes in the air, sank 114 Japanese ships, and damaged 305 more ships. On Feb. 16th, 1945, Wasp planes were the first to fly over the Japanese capitol. The last atomic bombs were dropped in Hiroshima on August 7th and a second one in Nagasaki on the 9th, 1945, while Wasp planes were hitting Honshu airfields. The last kamikaze plane dived on the Wasp on August 19th, 1945. At 1612 hours (4:12 p.m.), a Wasp pilot spotted the kamikaze plane diving on the Wasp from 7 thousand feet. The Wasp pilot hit one wing of the enemy plane, then pulled away giving the Wasp gunners a chance to hit him, dropping him into the sea less than one hundred feet from the Wasp's starboard Bow. The carrier U.S.S. Wasp, TBM-3-Avenger, and Navy man Tonarelli all sat in Tokyo Harbor, Japan, next to the U.S.S. Missouri while General MacArthur signed the peace treaty with the Japanese to end World War II.

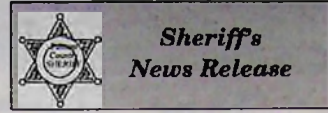

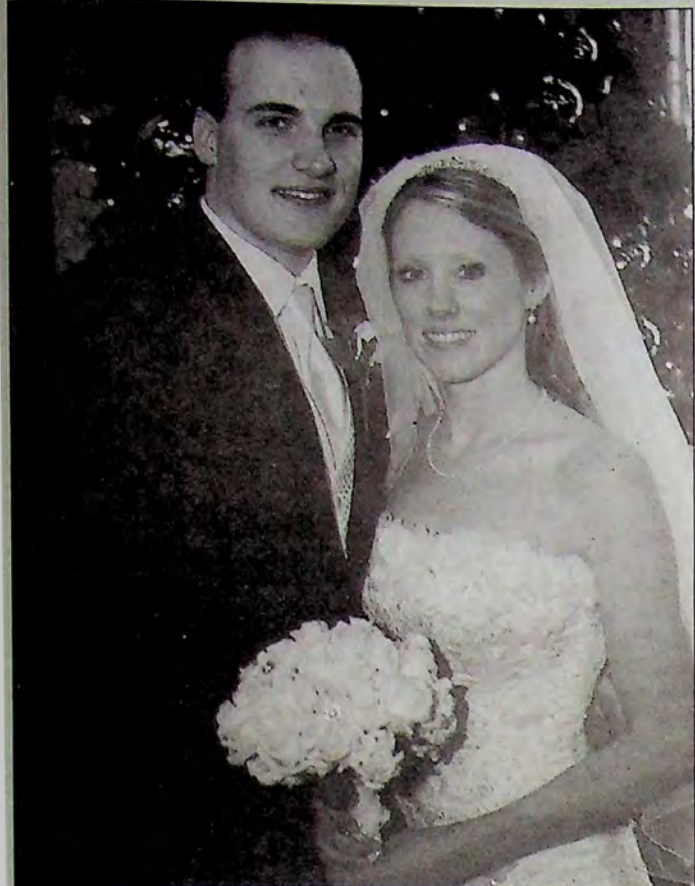

"So we are always of good courage: we know that while we are at home in the body we are away from the Lord, for we walk by faith, not by sight. We are of good courage, and we would rather be away from the body and at home with the Lord" (2 Cor 5:6-8).

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Hear His Word

"Therefore go and make disciples of all nations, baptizing them in the name of the Father and of the Son and of the Holy Spirit, and teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you. And surely I am with you always, to the very end of the age." Matthew 28:16-20

The command that Jesus gave his followers to "go and make disciples" is heard over and over again in every denomination. In my denomination it is even a part of our book of overall church polity, The Book of Discipline reminding every United Methodist that our primary mission, after loving God, is "to make disciples of Jesus Christ." (par. 121, pg 87, BOD 2008)

Actually, I have to admit, that that particular way of condensing this Scriptural passage, that is, "to make disciples of Jesus Christ," really bothers me, but maybe it's just because of my particular language bent. You see as a native Spanish speaker I have some difficulties with possessives and their prepositional phrase counterparts.

Let me explain: Spanish doesn't have that "apostrophe s" thingy that is not only so convenient in English, is also very reflective of the U.S. American culture. It's like taking a short cut around the bend and zipping through the back roads instead of going the looong way around to get your destination.

For example, in English you might say "Mary's boy" or "God's son." In Spanish we can't DO that. We have to go the long way around the mountain... (or cornfield for us Illinoisans). In Spanish we HAVE to say the "son of God" which doesn't sound too bad, or "boy of Mary" which sounds just a little weird.

What I'm getting at, is that when native English speakers start to employ Spanish language phraseology like "disciples of Jesus Christ" I just naturally start to get a little suspicious.

Do they intend to turn Jesus Christ into a disciple? I mean think about it: a "pie of cherry" is really a pie made out of cherries, isn't it? So wouldn't a "disciple of Jesus Christ" by extension be a disciple made out of Jesus

Christ? Or is the objective actually meant to be to turn people into "Jesus Christ's disciples" rather than the other way around?

By now you probably figure I've dived into the deep end of the semantics pond, but please bear with me a little longer.

The actual wording of Jesus' command (at least in the New International Version) is "to go and make disciples of all nations" rather than "to go and make disciples of Jesus Christ." And we're supposed to be baptizing these newly made disciples and, it says right here, "teaching them to obey everything I have commanded you."

So, here's my point: How are we supposed to teach people to obey the things that Jesus commanded us if we can't even get to a mutual understanding about a silly little prepositional phrase?

I mean I UNDERSTAND my problem with that prepositional phrase. But it's very likely that if you aren't a native speaker of Spanish or if you haven't had at least 3 or 4 years of Spanish classes my discomfort with that phrase just won't make much of a dent on you.

Oh, someone can say to me... it's really no big deal! Get over it! And being the nice kind soul that I am, I will. But it's still going to bug me. And every time I read it or hear it I'm going to smile and snicker inside myself as I envision little mini-Jesus' running around being disciples of himself—like little handmade cherry tarts that in some cartoon fashion sprouted feet, hands, and a head and are leaving tiny crumbs behind everywhere they go.

Obviously nobody in the United Methodist Church asked me my opinion when they came up with the idea of using that phrase in the way they did. Actually, I have no idea who they talked to about employing it, but I suspect that they didn't ask the advice of very many bilingual native Spanish speakers. Or maybe they did and I'm the only one with whom it resonates so hilariously. Who knows? Could be.

But my second point is this. If you

want to know what someone from a different language or culture thinks, you're going to have to get into that language or culture and talk to them. It's kind of like Chevrolet trying to market the Nova in Mexico. What they didn't realize is that the word "Nova" which invokes an amazing celestial phenomenon in English basically means "it doesn't go" in Spanish. I can assure you that that's one car that didn't sell well in Mexico until they gave it a new name!

Better yet, do as Paul from the Bible did. He said that to the Jews he became a Jew; to the Greeks he was a Greek, and to the slaves he was as a slave. In a word what he was showing us is that we need to live the life! Immerse yourself! Experience the culture and learn the language as one who lives it! Only then will you be able to see things from a native's point of view and, oh, my! What a difference that makes!

Then, after having learned the language, the culture, the values and the taboos will you be in a place to be able to say... and be taken seriously when you do... "Wait a minute. How about if you look at it this way?"

And so I stop a moment and think: Wait a minute...

Looking back at that phrase, "making disciples of Jesus Christ" and thinking on my vision of "little mini-Jesus' running around like little handmade tarts ... leaving tiny crumbs behind everywhere they go." Hmmm...

Isn't that what we Christians are supposed to be? Don't our words of institution over the sacraments ask God to "make us for the world the body of Christ redeemed by his blood"?

Aren't we supposed to be the fragile vessels that carry the Spirit of Christ within us leaving little bits of God's love behind us?

Well, now that I think about it... maybe that phrase about making disciples of Jesus Christ isn't so bad after all.

PC Awarded EFSP Funds

Putnam County has been awarded federal funds under the Emergency Food and Shelter National board Program. PC was chosen to receive \$6,231 to supplement emergency food and shelter programs in the county.

The selection was made by a National Board that is chaired by FEMA and consists of representatives from American Red Cross, Catholic Charities, National council of the church of Christ, the Salvation Army, United Jewish Communities and United Way Worldwide. A Local Board has been charged with distribution and oversight of the funds, which are designated to expand the capacity of food, and shelter programs in high need areas around the country.

The Local Board is comprised of representatives from American Red Cross-Illinois Valley Chapter, Catholic Charities, United Methodist Church of Hennepin, the Salvation Army, PCAS, PC Food Pantry, PC State's Attorney, Tri-County Opportunities council, IL Valley PADS and United Way of IL Valley. The Local Board is responsible for recommending agencies to receive these funds and any additional funds that may become available under this phase of the program.

Under the terms of the grant from the National Board, local agencies chosen to receive the funds must: 1) be private voluntary non-profits or units of government, 2) operate under formal accounting systems & policies, 3) practice non-discrimination, 4) have demonstrated the capacity to deliver emergency food and/or shelter programs and 5) if they are a private voluntary organization, they must have a voluntary board. Qualifying agencies are urged to apply.

Tri-County Opportunities Council has managed and distributed PC EFSP funds in the past. Funds have primarily been utilized for rent, mortgage, and or utility assistance.

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USDA NEWS UPDATE

•• USDA to Propose Expanding Poultry Loan Guidance to Include Pork Operations

Scherrie V. Giamanco, State Executive Director of USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) in Illinois, has announced that USDA will expand guidance currently in place for loans to contract poultry operations (meant to protect them from questionable business practices) to also include contract pork operations. USDA currently provides guidance to county offices on the analysis and evaluation of applications for direct and guaranteed loans for contract poultry operations, and how those loans are serviced, to avoid making loans that may exacerbate integrator business practices that have left some producers suddenly without contracts and unable to pay back their FSA loans.

"Contracted poultry and pork operations face increased risk in these challenging economic times, and this additional guidance for pork, putting it in agreement with the poultry guidance, will aid the loan officers in our county offices as they continue to make informed decisions on loans for contracted pork operations, providing opportunities for producers while at the same time protecting the interests of the taxpayers who fund the loans USDA makes," stated Giamanco.

Recent increases in energy and feed costs coupled with reductions in demand have affected profit margins and returns in the industry. In response to these conditions, some companies who contract with producers to supply poultry and pork have closed processing plants, reduced placements, and declined to renew contracts.

In some instances, it may have proven less expensive to cancel old contracts and begin new contracts with new producers, supported by FSA loans. The producers were sometimes left with debt for their contract operation facilities, but no contract to provide income and repay their USDA direct or guaranteed loan.

In addition to the contracting guidance expansion to pork production, USDA's Farm Service Agency will issue an Advanced Notice of Proposed Rulemaking to solicit input from the pork and poultry community regarding the prevalence of type of contracting situation. FSA will be soliciting proposals for the best way for USDA to address these contract situations in the long term.

Additionally, USDA's Grain Inspection, Packers and Stockyard Administration (GIPSA) will investigate allegations from producers that companies are targeting producers for contract termination. GIPSA will examine such allegations to determine whether such practices violate Section 202 of the Packers and Stockyards Act, which prohibits packers, swine contractors and live poultry dealers from engaging in unfair, deceptive and discriminatory practices.

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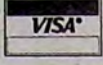

WHAT IS WIC?

WIC stands for Women, Infants and Children. It is a supplemental food program that provides nutrition information and free foods to help mothers, babies and children get the nutrients they need for proper growth and development.

WIC is available to infants and children up to age 5, pregnant women, postpartum women (up to 6 months after giving birth), or breastfeeding women (up to 12 months after giving birth). WIC income guidelines must be met, or the family must have a current AllKids or Medicaid card from DHS. You can have a job and still be eligible.

WIC provides free healthy foods such as milk, eggs, cheese, juice, cereal, peanut butter, whole wheat bread, fruits and vegetables, baby food, and iron-fortified infant formula. WIC appointments are usually scheduled every three months after the initial visit.

For more information or to find out if you or a family member is eligible for WIC, please call the Putnam County Health Department at 815/925-7326.

Services Provided for PC Residents

This message is going out to all of the great Putnam County residents. My name is Andrew Jackson, and I am the Director of PC EMS ambulance that is located in the McNabb Fire Station. The message that I am trying to get out



to everyone is, if you call on this ambulance service to take you or a loved one to any of the hospitals in our area, remember that if for some reason you or the loved one that has to be transferred to another hospital, for what is called a higher level of care not available at the hospital they are in, PC EMS is able to do that type of transfer, and you have the right to choose the ambulance service that you want to take you to the most appropriate hospital.

This means that if you are at St. Margaret's, IVCH, or Perry memorial hospitals and need to be transferred, let the staff know that you would like PC EMS called to do that service since you are a resident of Putnam County.

Hear His Word

I appeal to you therefore, brothers and sisters, by the mercies of God, to present your bodies as a living sacrifice, holy and acceptable to God, which is your spiritual worship. Do not be conformed to this world, but be transformed by the renewing of your minds, so that you may discern what is the will of God—what is good and acceptable and perfect. Romans 12:1-2

I have shared with more than a few of you that Leonard Sweet is writing a book on the 100 things that make us Christian, and is asking his readers and Twitter followers for help. He asked us to come up with those things - those words - that define us. I offered "weird." That's right, "weird." I defended the word by writing that Christians - those who follow the teachings, life, and heart of the Crucified and Risen Christ - should be pretty far out of the norm of our culture, or, weird. We should stand out. Stick out. Like a sore thumb stick out! In Dr. Sweet's work, among other words offered were "inclusive," "loving," "proactive," "scandalous," and "holy." That last one gets used a lot, and not in a nice way. We Christians ought to be holy.

The word that sticks out in my mind as I read the text up there is 'holy.' It could be that because we are now in Holy Week. Holy. Holy means "set apart." (That's kind of like weird, no?) We are apart and set aside for God. We are consecrated - another word for holy. So here we are in a week set apart to travel with Jesus to the Cross, culminating in the defining moment for Christianity: The Resurrection.

This brings me to asking, what is holy to us? What in our lives is set apart for God? What about our time? How much of our time could be considered holy? How much of our lives is considered holy? Do we set aside time to really be in the presence of God in prayer and meditation? Do we even teach our children to pray? Does a prayer or even a passing thought go out to God in a day's time other than exclaiming God's name thoughtlessly as an expression of surprise? What is more important to us on a Sunday morning, worshiping a few more moments at the altar of St. Mattress, or in worship of the One who makes your life possible? I don't write these things to bust chops, but because I want us all to live the lives God intends for us! What an amazing life God has for us if we would just spend some time with God!

A last word on Lent: We give up things during Lent, usually, with great relief, to take them back-up again quickly when we hear "HE is Risen!" I wonder if we take things up during Lent too. I wonder if we take up things like prayer, meditation on the holy texts, service, worship, fasting... you get the idea. If we do, do we lay them down as quickly as we pick up those things we laid down? Just a thought. Have a blessed Easter!

PS - Here is Eugene Peterson's take on the Romans text I started out with. I like it most of all:

"So here's what I want you to do, God helping you: Take your everyday, ordinary life—your sleeping, eating, going-to-work, and walking-around life—and place it before God as an offering. Embracing what God does for you is the best thing you can do for him. Don't become so well-adjusted to your culture that you fit into it without even thinking. Instead, fix your attention on God. You'll be changed from the inside out. Readily recognize what he wants from you, and quickly respond to it. Unlike the culture around you, always dragging you down to its level of immaturity, God brings the best out of you, develops well-formed maturity in you."

The angel said to the women, "Do not be afraid, for I know that you are looking for Jesus, who was crucified. He is not here; he has risen, just as he said. Come and see the place where he lay. Then go quickly and tell his disciples: 'He has risen from the dead and is going ahead of you into Galilee. There you will see him.' Now I have told you." Matthew 28:5-7

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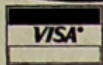
