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Teen-Parent Forum Held to Address Alcohol Use, Abuse

"Start Talking Before They Start Drinking," was the message shared by parents and community leaders at a panel discussion on teen alcohol use, hosted at PCHS on March 25. Panelists included Putnam County's Death Investigator Bob Cofoid, Sheriff's Deputy Josh Boedigheimer, State's Attorney James Mack, Resident Circuit Judge Scott Shore, Probation Officer Andy Ceresa, Dr. Damian Grivetti, and Superintendent of Schools Jay McCracken.

A video was shown, portraying the reality of exposure of children to alcohol at home, in movies and advertising, the peer pressure and social misdirection given teens to use and abuse alcohol, and the long-term effects impairing mental development, disabling normal growth, and substantially increasing the risk of addiction.

Panelists then spoke of their individual perspectives on the effect of teen drinking, what happens when the issue reaches their professional attention, and what parents and families can do to prevent teen alcohol abuse, legal entanglements and alcohol-related tragedies.

As County Death Investigator, Mr. Cofoid described the gruesome task of being called to the scene of an alcohol-related fatality, and the unenviable task of knocking on the door of a victim's loved ones, many of whom he likely knows within the community.

Officer Boedigheimer explained the role officers must bear in the investigation of auto accidents involving teens under the influence of alcohol, the difficult task of notifying next of kin, and the arrest consequences of underage alcohol usage regardless of whether driving was involved. It was also explained that neither the authorities nor parents should expect to be able to reason with the youth while he or she is still

under the influence.

State's Attorney Mack explained the effect of underage alcohol use on teenagers' driving privileges and, in some cases, the potential consequences of monetary liability, jail or prison for youths as well as adults who violate drinking laws, provide alcohol or allow the use of their property or hotel rooms for alcohol consumption.

Probation Officer Ceresa explained treatment options and available resources for youths, whether referred by the Courts or by families or law enforcement hoping to provide treatment without criminal consequences. He said his office is available as a referral source for families seeking help.

Judge Shore reflected on the need for family control and intervention to prevent the many alcohol-related cases he sees before the bench, which he described as the result of tragedies just waiting to happen. We need to be more diligent as a community, he said, in promoting the message of existing campaigns targeting the message of alcohol abstinence to our teens, and in encouraging full participation in existing alternatives such as Afterglow and summer youth activities.

Dr. Grivetti described the grief that strikes families as victims of teen drinking and alcohol-related auto accidents enter the emergency room, sometimes never to leave. Dr. Grivetti said no hospital television show can depict the real life uncontrollable anguish of a victim's family that never goes away, he said.

Superintendent McCracken echoed that the effects of teen alcohol use affect others, and in fact the entire school community as well. Although the schools enforce their rules, he said, they are not enough to prevent the problem. Addressing parents' concern and

the need for more alternative activities for youth, Mr. McCracken suggested contacting the schools' Parent Advisory Committee that is addressing such concerns.

Panelists and parents alike appeared to agree that the first line of offense must be within the family, to address and prevent alcohol use and abuse among young children and teens.

The Forum was held in conjunction with PC Schools' "Partners in Education" workshops held earlier in the evening. The Panel was introduced by Terry Madsen, Youth Educator for the M-P Extension Unit and a member of CPASA, Community Partners Against Substance Abuse, co-organized by CPASA Project Coordinator Dawn Conerton of the Bureau-Putnam County Health Department and chaired by CPASA member Adriane Shore of Granville. Schock Announces Federal Trade Adjustments for Steel Workers in Hennepin

•• Funds Will Provide Income Support, Retraining, and Benefits to Displaced Workers

Congressman Aaron Schock (R-IL) has announced that United Steel Workers who were laid off after Arcelor Mittal closed their steel plant in Hennepin are eligible to apply for Trade Adjustment Assistance (TAA) benefits. This determination was made after a thorough investigation by the U.S. Department of Labor (DoL). This announcement means that the affected workers will be eligible to apply for assistance such as retraining and job placement.

"Losing a job can devastate families and entire regions," said Schock. "These TAA benefits will enable these United Steel Workers based in Hennepin to find employment as soon as possible. We must ensure these displaced workers have the financial support, training and opportunities to get a fresh start."

"I am very pleased that the Department of Labor has come to this positive conclusion after a long string of negatives in the closing of the steel plant," said Duane Calbow, Vice President of United Steel Workers Local 7367. "This is an extremely important source of assistance

for our workers."

Trade Adjustment Assistance (TAA) and Alternative Trade Adjustment Assistance (ATAA) help trade-affected workers who have lost their jobs as a result of increased imports or shifts in production out of the United States.

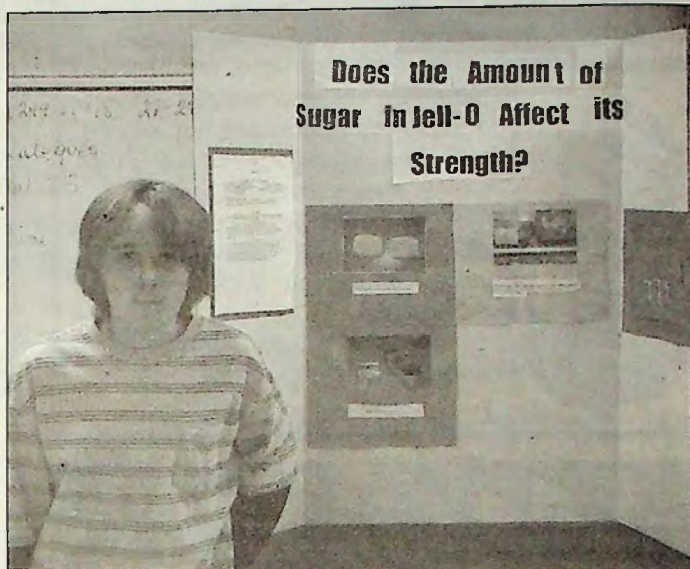

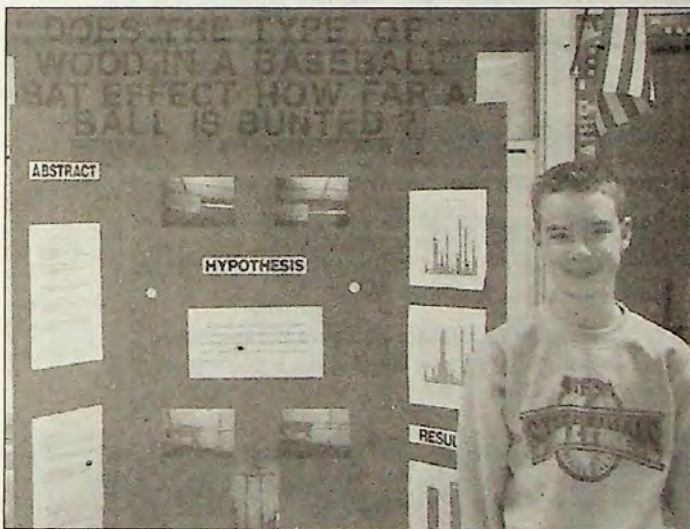

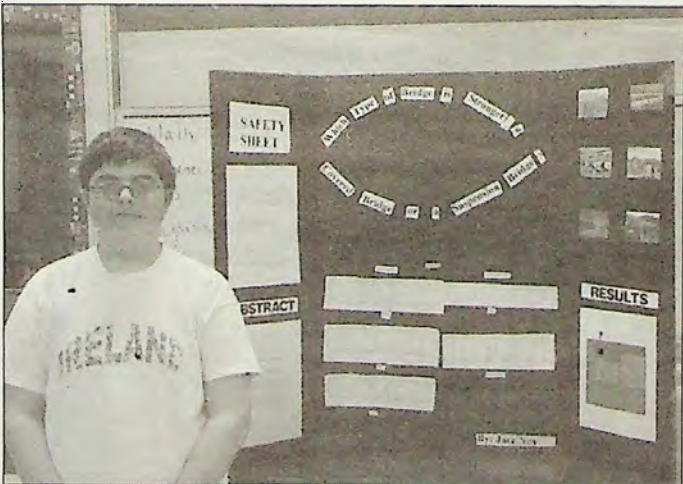

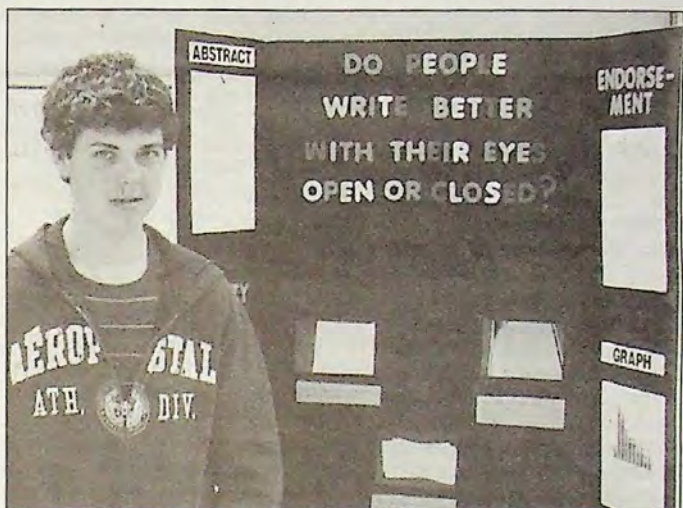

Hear His Word

To Walk in Christ

The Christian life is difficult at times and it's becoming harder to live a righteous life.

If we are to live in Christ we must get into His word daily. The Gospels record the events of Jesus' life, the letters of the New Testament sent to encourage, instruct, and rebuke, and the Old Testament which is the foundation of our faith—the more we read the more we see Christ in all of it. The Bible is the official guidebook of the Christian and it tells one how to walk as the child of God. Paul's letter to the Ephesians is a good example in this respect.

To walk in Christ is to walk in His love. Notice Ephesians 5:1, "Be imitators of God, therefore, as dearly loved children..." Have you ever noticed how a little child looks up to their mom or dad? They try to do whatever the parent does. Concerning our heavenly Father, what are we to do? Verse 2 explains; "... live a life of love, just as Christ loved us and gave himself up for us as a fragrant offering and sacrifice to God." Jesus was the only one who could have rightfully demanded that He should be first and yet He instead offered Himself. His attitude conveyed the message. "How may I help you?"

To walk in Christ is to walk in His light. If we are to follow Christ and align our steps with His, we should be sharing His light. This is the revelation that as we turn to Jesus, we can receive forgiveness of sin and freedom to know and understand the truth. Even more, we should be asking God how we can share this with others. We can only share the light He has given us. Paul makes this clear: "For you were once darkness, but now you are light in the Lord. Live as children of light (for the fruit of the light consists in all goodness, righteousness and truth)" (Ephesians 5:8-9). The more we share, the brighter our light becomes.

To walk in Christ is to walk in His wisdom. How many times have we heard it said we should submit to Christ? We should of course and yet Paul takes this even further. He says we should "Submit to one another out of reverence for Christ." God places special people in our lives that we can learn from, look up to and trust. We should submit while trusting Christ to watch over us, and continue to walk in His wisdom. He also places people in our lives we can help. We should ask one another how we can help—to serve each other just as Jesus did when He washed the disciple's feet. Jesus offered Himself to the world—to each of us. This week, and beyond, let us offer ourselves. In other words, "How may I help you?"

- When climbing trees, children must first check to make sure there are no power lines hidden among the limbs. Choose a tree that is away from power lines.
- Look up when painting or making repairs to your house to avoid contact with overhead wires.
- Avoid planting trees in locations that will cause problems with power lines once the trees are full grown. Detailed information is available at MySafeTrees.com.
- Before digging in your yard or planting trees, call the service that marks the location of underground utilities in your area. This will help you make that sure you do not strike underground power lines or gas pipes. In Missouri, this service is called the Missouri One Call System, and it can be reached by calling 1-800-DIG-RITE (1-800-344-7483), or simply 811. In Illinois, the service is Joint Utility Location Information for Excavators (JULIE), which can also be reached by dialing 811.

US Farm Reports

Corn growers intend to plant 88.8 million acres of corn for all purposes in 2010, up three percent from both last year and 2008. Expected acreage is up in many states due to reduced winter wheat acreage and expectations of improved net returns. Acreage increases of 300,000 or more are expected in Illinois, Kansas, Missouri, and Ohio. The largest decreases are expected in Iowa, down 200,000 acres, and Texas, down 150,000 acres.

Soybean producers intend to plant 78.1 million acres in 2010, up one percent from last year. If realized, the United States planted area will be the largest on record. Acreage increases of 100,000 or more are expected in Illinois, Iowa, Kansas, Nebraska, North Dakota, and South Dakota. The largest decreases are expected in Georgia and North Carolina, both 150,000 acres less than 2009. If intentions are realized, the planted acreage in Kansas, North Dakota, and Pennsylvania will be the largest on record.

ELAP provides emergency assistance to eligible producers of livestock, honeybees and farm-raised fish that have losses due to disease, adverse weather or other conditions, including losses due to blizzards and wildfires. ELAP assistance is for losses not covered under other Supplemental Agricultural Disaster Assistance programs established by the 2008 Farm Bill such as LFP, LIP, and SURE.

Good News in a Good Friday World

We live in a Good Friday world with all the bad news that surrounds us in the world; therefore, we tend to dwell on those feelings of bad news.

We live in a Good Friday world with the news of the economic downturn, banks failing, job loses due to company downsizing and commercial failings.

We live in a Good Friday world with the news of illness, terminal diseases, and depression.

We live in a Good Friday world when we begin to wonder what kind of world are we leaving to our children.

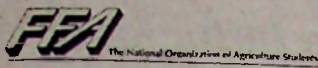

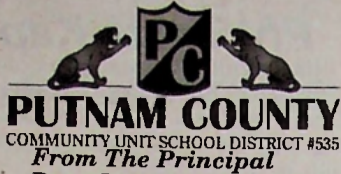


•• PC FFA Annual Alumni Banquet

Dear Parents and Guardians,

Keeping kids safe is a big job for parents and guardians. For most it means safety from bad strangers and others preying on our children.

Bike safety is another area that parents need to talk about with their children. Bike safety includes wearing helmets and riding safely.

Why is bicycle safety so important?

Bike riding is a lot of fun, but accidents happen. Every year, about 176,000 kids go to the emergency department because of bike accident injuries. Some of these injuries are so serious that children die, usually from head injuries.

Wearing a good bicycle safety helmet protects a rider's head. A head injury means a brain injury. Wearing a helmet doesn't mean riders can be reckless, but it provides some protection in case of an accident.

Bike helmets are so important that the U.S. government has created safety standards for them. A good bike helmet should have a sticker that says it meets standards set by the Consumer Product Safety Commission (CPSC). The bike helmet should fit properly. It shouldn't be too small or too big. Children should never wear a hat under a bike helmet. If you're unsure if your child's helmet fits well, ask someone at a bike store.

Make sure your children wear their helmets the right way for full protection. A helmet should be worn level and cover the forehead. The straps should always be fastened. If the straps are flying, it's likely to fall off, especially when needed the most. Make sure the straps are adjusted so they're snug enough that the helmet can't pull or twist around.

A fun thing to do is to per-

sonalize a bike helmet with favorite stickers. Reflective stickers are a great choice because they look cool and make children more visible to people driving cars.

Riding a bike that is the right size also help keeps children safe. Here's how to size a bike:

1. Have the child stand straddling the top bar of the bike so that both feet are flat on the ground.
2. There should be 1 to 3 inches (2.5 to 7.6 centimeters) of space between the child and the top bar.
3. Make sure the seat, handlebars, and wheels fit tightly.
4. Check and oil the chain regularly.
5. Check the brakes to be sure they work well and aren't sticking.
6. Check the tires to make sure they have enough air and the right tire pressure.

Wearing bright clothes and putting reflectors on the bike also can help a child stay safe. It helps other people on the road see the bike rider.

Parents/Guardians should make sure that nothing will get caught in the bike chain, such as loose pant legs, backpack straps, or shoelaces. Children should wear the right shoes - sneakers - when biking. Sandals, shoes with heels, and cleats won't help grip the pedals. And children should never go riding barefoot!

Children should avoid wearing headphones because the music can distract them from the noises around them, such as a car blowing its horn.

Please assist me in helping to keep the children riding bicycles safe. Talk with your children about bicycle safety.

New Transportation Opportunity for Putnam and Bureau Counties

Many of us don't give much thought to jumping into our car and heading off to wherever we need to go. However, when you live in a rural area like Putnam County, and don't own your own vehicle, or are unable to drive, it can really be a challenge to get to places. Those with wheels may take getting around for granted, and may not consider how difficult travel is for folks who don't have a car. Not having transportation can limit employment opportunities, prevent a person from getting to important medical appointments, and inhibit the ability to get needed groceries and other supplies. It can even result in social isolation. Some people would just like a chance to "be green" and have the option to economize and help benefit the planet. So now, with your cooperation, we have the opportunity to make public transportation a reality.

Spearheaded by the PC Senior Center, Putnam County is now participating along with Bureau County in a volunteer Transportation Partnership Group (TPG). Volunteers throughout the two counties have been actively seeking input and asking residents to complete a Transportation Survey. A huge thank you is extended to all the people that have already filled out the transportation surveys! "Volunteers have gathered over 180 completed surveys and just looking at them, the residents in the county would utilize the service if it was available," stated Pat Croissant, Execu-

tive Director of the Putnam County Achievement Services in Standard. The surveys help us better assess the type of transportation needed, where people want to go, and what they can afford to pay for a ride. The completed surveys are required as one of the steps needed to secure funds that have been set aside for public transportation in rural areas. These monies will not increase taxes in any way in the county. The federally funded 5311 Grant was created to make public transportation available in rural areas of the state and represents ongoing funding.

Public transportation is just that—for the public. Pat Croissant, on behalf of the Senior Center, became involved because of the Center's current reliance on a declining volunteer pool of drivers who currently take seniors to their appointments and to the Center. The Bureau/Putnam County TPG group envisions mini buses and vans that can not only fill a great need of the PC Senior Center, but also address public need to transport people to work, to IVCC, to doctor appointments, shopping or any other appointments. Vehicles will be equipped with wheelchair lifts and can accommodate people with special needs. Rural transit service in our area might even include evening trips if that is what the public need indicates. There will be a fee for general public transportation, but the amount is yet to be determined based on the survey data.

With this endeavor, Putnam County will be able to link with other public transportation providers to provide better and quicker, unduplicated service for riders. "Right now those providers are crossing each other on the road, where as with the new service all the rides will be scheduled from one area. They will be able to share resources to accomplish a common goal, get people to the places they need to be," stated Croissant.

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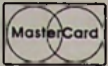

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Adam and Ida Deck Scholarships Awarded

The Hennepin Village Board of Trustees on Wednesday, April 21 awarded the first place 2010 Adam and Ida Deck College Scholarship to Chase Redshaw, son of Lyle and Penny Jo Redshaw. These scholarships are provided by the Village Board of high school seniors who are residents of Hennepin Township.

Farmer's State Bank Holdup Foiled – 1952

The Putnam County Record of July 3, 1952 had on its front page the headline "McNabb Bank Holdup Foiled. President Hoyle attempts to oust gunman. Stranger makes escape following unsuccessful visit Monday." "Oh no you don't," is what Benj. C. Hoyle, President of the Farmers State Bank of McNabb said when he looked across the desk in his private office in to the open end of a gun held by a stranger who had just informed him he was there for cash. It was 3 o'clock and time to end the banking day when the stranger appeared at the tellers window with the request of making a loan. Behind the counter were Mr. Hoyle, Cashier Leon Clausen, assistant cashier John A. McKirgan and bookkeeper Dorothy Wilson.

In the rear of the building Fred Johnsen, village decorator was at work. After the visitor informed Mr. Hoyle he lived on a Wagner farm in Marshall County, he was invited to the President's office to the rear and it was there the conference was of short duration.

Ignoring the gun that was pointed at him, he stepped into the hall (which to the right led into the vault room, and to the left the far end) from the door of the bank robbery. Calling for a gun from his assistants, President Hoyle stopped at the end of the hall outside his office door as the would-be robber ordered everyone not to move. Mr. Hoyle was 68 years old and not of huge stature, but of the old school where the boss believes he is running the institution. No matter what he thought, he grabbed the gun and visitor and proceeded to throw him out the front door 20 feet to the curb. After advancing a few feet, the gun discharged and the man fled under his own power to his car in front of the bank and sped east to Route 89 and turned south, making his getaway.

In the shuffle, Mr. Hoyle either caught a finger in the gun or the discharged bullet opened the end of it. At any rate he lost some blood which sprinkled his shirt and trousers.

Sheriff James A. Hynds and State Patrolmen George Michels and John Pratt were on the scene within a few minutes and covered the countryside for the Oldsmobile in which the escape was made. Following a report, a suspect was being held at Harrisburg in the southern part of the state, John McKirgan went to that city to check identification.

Mr. and Mrs. Hoyle left Tuesday for Salt Lake City UT where they are enjoying a vacation.

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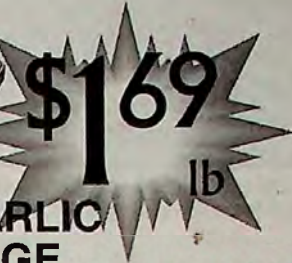
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Corner Garden Now Open in Tonica

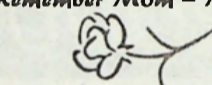

Kereta Sentenced to 10 Years

Richard Kereta, 46, of Princeton was sentenced April 22nd in Putnam County Circuit Court. Kereta had been found guilty of multiple counts of driving under the influence, driving while driver's license was revoked, aggravated driving under the influence and aggravated reckless driving following a jury trial which concluded on February 26. Due to legal requirements, Kereta was sentenced on a single count of driving while license was revoked, a single count of aggravated driving under the influence of alcohol, and a single count of aggravated reckless driving. Kereta was sentenced to a maximum sentence of 3 years on the driving while revoked offense, and 10 years on the aggravated driving under the influence of alcohol offense. The sentences were ordered to be served consecutively by the Court. Additionally, Kereta was sentenced to 3 years in prison on the aggravated reckless driving offense, permanent disability offense, all three are class 4 felonies. The prison sentences are to be served in the IL Department of Corrections. The sentences were ordered to be served concurrently Kereta is eligible for day-for-day credit. Kereta will also serve 1 year of mandatory supervised release, following his incarceration. Kereta was further sentenced to pay court costs, a \$200 DNA analysis fee and additional mandatory DUI fines and fees totaling \$1255.00, as well as restitution in the amount of \$883.50 for emergency response.

The victim, Nicole Englebrecht, who still cannot speak, had a friend read her Victim Impact Statement to the Court. In her statement, she described her injuries as a "life sentence" and requested the Court to sentence Kereta to the maximum allowed.

State's Attorney, James A. Mack, stated that he was very pleased with the sentence imposed by the Court. State's Attorney Mack stated:

"I greatly appreciate the sacrifice made by so many people, who took time out of their busy schedules to participate as jurors or witnesses in this matter, and to the law enforcement personnel who went above and beyond the call of duty in seeking justice. I also wish to thank Nicole Englebrecht for her determination and courage throughout the Court process. I further hope that the sentence imposed will give Nicole some measure of redress as she copes with the debilitating injuries caused by Kereta's actions."

Leepertown School Selected to Receive Media Equipment

The John F. Kennedy Center for the Performing Arts, in conjunction with Daimler Financial Services, selected nine schools across the country for On Location: Spotlight On Your Community. Now in its second year, the program is designed to allow students the opportunity to produce a documentary telling the story of an arts organization or artist in their community, which will be shared worldwide on the Internet. Roll was called McMullen, Coleman, Borio, Leckonby, Norris and Pettit answering roll. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited. Minutes of the last meeting were read. Motion by Norris, second by Pettit to accept minutes as read. All Trustees voting aye with Leckonby passing. Motion carried. Bills were presented and reviewed. Motion by Pettit second by McMullen to pay bill out of their respective funds. All Trustees voting aye. Ragan Electric bill was presented in the amount of \$89.00. Motion by Coleman, second by Leckonby to pay from the Vehicle Replacement Fund. All Trustees voting aye. Motion by Borio, second by Pettit to purchase a tiller in the amount of \$1,499.99. All Trustees voting aye. Cost of this will be 75% from the Water Depreciation Fund, 25% from the General Fund with that breakdown 15% from Streets and 10% from Parks. The Treasurer's Report was read. Area Farm Update

Agricultural Summary Week April 19:

Planting and fieldwork activities across Illinois increased this past week due to warmer weather. Some producers reported they have completed planting while others found it too dry to plant. Temperatures averaged 60.7 degrees, 7.8 degrees above normal across the state. Statewide precipitation averaged 0.05 inches, 0.92 inch below normal, with 6.4 days suitable for fieldwork. Corn jumped to 34 percent planted compared to 1 percent a year ago and 12 percent for the 5-year average. Soybeans are 1 percent planted and oats are 89 percent planted. Topsoil moisture was rated 1 percent very short, 13 percent short, 79 percent adequate and 7 percent surplus.

Examine Alfalfa Stands for Weevils

In the haste to plant corn, producers with stands of alfalfa should not neglect scouting efforts for alfalfa weevils.

Mike Gray, U of I Extension entomologist, said southern Illinois producers should begin scouting now as leaf feeding by first and second-instar larvae is under way in many fields across southern Illinois. Central Illinois producers should begin scouting within the next week to 10 days.

"Scouting is important to determine whether or not economic infestations are present and to determine if rescue treatments or an early harvest are warranted," Gray said.

Alfalfa should be sampled by making a U-shaped pattern within a field, taking care to avoid field edges, Gray said. Randomly collect 30 stems and place them in a bucket. Following the collection of all stems, dislodge the larvae from the stems within the bucket and determine the number of weevil larvae per stem.

"If 25 to 50 percent of leaf tips have been skeletonized and you find three or more larvae per stem, a management decision is required," he said.

Early harvest of the first hay crop is a sound management option. If this cultural management approach is selected, monitor the regrowth carefully for any signs of feeding activity.

An insecticide rescue treatment may be required following an early harvest if both larvae and adults are causing injury to more than 50 percent of the crowns and regrowth is not occurring for 3 to 6 days.

Seminar on Awareness and Prevention of Youth Suicide

A free evening seminar for adults will be presented by Streamwood Behavioral Healthcare System on Thursday, May 4th from 6 p.m. until 8 p.m. at the Putnam County High School auditorium.

The presentation will be the second offering that day of the district's attempts at increasing the awareness and prevention of youth suicide through the assistance of the Jason Foundation.

During the day, an educator from Streamwood will conduct a program with the high school students on coping skills.

The evening program is designed to give adults tools and resources needed to recognize possible problems with their children and know how to respond. Also, The Jason Foundation provides a Parent Resource Program (PRP) that can be accessed from their website (www.jasonfoundation.com). A PRP icon is located on the homepage and will take parents to a link that will inform parents if they have a concern about their child or others. Signs of concern, elevated risk factors, resources and other information are included for parents to educate themselves about youth suicide and know how to help their child.

During the school district institute day on August 16th, staff development training for educators and other district employees will also take place.

Students are encouraged to get a responsible adult involved if they have a concern. Since there is no way of knowing who that student might choose, everyone should be aware of the problem of youth suicide and know what to do if a student comes to them.

Participants in The Jason Foundation seminars will learn about the scope and magnitude of the problem, recognize signs of concern, and learn some elevated risk factors. In addition, a discussion of resources will be included.

Is God Your Idol?

American Idol is a popular show on TV. They are looking for the next famous person. Someone who will become an idol to millions of fans. (I'm really not sure anyone should want that title.)

What does the word IDOL mean?

The dictionary defines idol as an image of a god constructed of wood, stone etc. and worshipped as if it were the god it represents. I would also define an idol is anything that gets your time and passion that keeps you from having a relationship with the REAL God.

Which begs the question: is God your idol? Many people would say yes, they idolize God. But in reality, there is never an instance in the Bible where God refers to himself as an idol of any kind.

What does God say about idols? You shall not make for yourself an idol in the form of anything in heaven above or on the earth beneath or in the waters below. Exodus 20:4

So how do we make God an idol? By creating an image of God that is different from the God of the Bible. By holding to false beliefs about who God is and what he represents. Man was made in God's image - Not God in man's image. How powerful would a god be that we created ourselves?

God is the God of the Bible. The scriptures are given to us so that we can know God and know his character. We cannot pick and choose which attributes of God we will embrace. God is not Santa Claus - or someone who just grants us wishes like a Genie in a lamp.

For some people God is just an idol. Something to adhere to when it is convenient, or when we think it will benefit us. Sometimes our devotion to God is just a way of being selfish. We think if we follow him then God will be good to us.

God does hear our prayers. God does bless His people. But sometimes the road we are expected to travel is a rough one. Beyond our selfish desires are larger issues, such as righteousness, justice, peace, and love for our neighbor, which are essential to God's purpose for our world. If we try to make God the god of our image, he becomes nothing more than an idol - as worthless as the idols that Paul talked about in Acts. (Acts 17)

Paul acknowledged that the people were very religious, and when he saw that they had an altar to an unknown god, he knew it was his chance to share the true God with them. He taught them of the one and only living God.

The first commandments says: I am the Lord your God, who brought you out of Egypt, out of the land of slavery. You shall have no other gods before me. (Exodus 20:2-3) We cannot have any other gods, not even a god who is a perversion of the God we think we believe in.

If our god is not the God of scripture we do not have the true God. We need to study the Scriptures to learn who God is - who he really is. We need to know that God has an ultimate plan - and our ideas of what we think he should be are unimportant. God is NOT an idol - HE IS LORD!

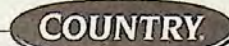

ORDINANCE AMENDING
CHAPTER 3 - ALCOHOLIC
BEVERAGES

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED BY THE PRESIDENT AND BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE VILLAGE OF GRANVILLE, PUTNAM COUNTY, ILLINOIS, A MUNICIPAL CORPORATION, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION I: CHAPTER 3 - ALCOHOLIC BEVERAGES,
SECTION 3-5 CONSUMPTION ON PREMISES, be and the same is amended to add all the following provision to Section 3-5:
SECTION 3-5. CONSUMPTION ON PREMISES

It shall be lawful for persons having a license to permit consumption of alcoholic beverages on the licensed premises outside of the building on the premises so long as all alcoholic liquor is sold within the building on the premises and carried only by the purchasers outside the building. No license holder or employee thereof shall sell or serve alcoholic liquor outside the building on the premises. It shall be lawful for alcoholic beverages to be consumed outside of the building only so long as the area where consumed is on the licensed premises and is not on public property of the Village of Granville or any other Municipal Corporation. Furthermore, the outside premises shall be enclosed by ten (10) foot high fence that is at ground level and is so constructed of material that does not allow persons outside the enclosed area to view inside the enclosed area. The fence shall be so constructed that no person in the enclosed area is able to pass alcoholic liquor or any other of personal property through openings in the fence to persons outside the fence. The liquor license holder is prohibited from hav-

ing music, television or any other device outside the building that emanates sound or pictures. The provisions of this Section are an exception to the provisions of Section 3-11 requiring a view from the street. A gate shall be provided in the fence that can only be opened from the inside.

SECTION II:
Any person, firm or corporation violating any term or provision of this Ordinance shall be fined not less Seventy-five (\$75.00) dollars nor more than Five Hundred (\$500.00) dollars for each offense.

SECTION III:
All Ordinances and parts of Ordinances in conflict herewith are hereby repealed.

SECTION IV:
This Ordinance shall be in full force and effect from and after its passage and approval and publication in the manner provided by law.
