PC Student Earns 3rd Place at Annual Tar Wars Statewide Poster Contest

"Don't Have a Bad Air Day," is the theme on the poster created by Putnam County Elementary fifth grader Keila Petersen. Her creativity and positive message earned third place in the Family Health Foundation of Illinois Tar Wars Poster Contest, held Friday, April 16th at the Illinois State Capitol in Springfield. For her outstanding work, Keila received a plaque and prizes from the statewide contest.

Emily Happ from Bureau-Putnam County Health Department delivered the prizes personally during the Putnam County Tar Wars Awards ceremony on Thursday April 22nd, at the Putnam

County High School. This is Happ's first year teaching the Tar Wars program in Bureau and Putnam counties, taking over the program which has been in place since 2000.

Students at schools across the state learned the truth about tobacco's harmful effects in a one-hour Tar Wars classroom presentation from volunteer family physicians, teachers, medical students, nurses and health educators. Tar Wars teaches tobacco prevention in fourth and fifth grades by focusing on the short-term effects of tobacco use and teaches children how to identify and understand the reasons people begin smoking and why

some people seem to continue to use tobacco products.

Tar Wars, a program of the American Academy of Family Physicians, is at work in schools around the country, as well as Canada and overseas. The program is free for schools and for volunteers to teach in their local schools. For more information, including the complete program curriculum, visit www.tarwars.org.

The Illinois Academy of Family Physicians launched a statewide Illinois Tar Wars effort in the fall of 1998. In the current school year, Tar Wars is taught to over 270 elementary schools across the state.

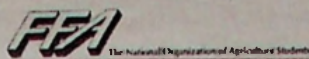
The Special Olympics held their annual Spring Games at Mendota High School on May 6.

Hear His Word

As I was preparing one of my weekday homilies I came across the reading from the Book of the Acts of the Apostles where it listed that the disciples were first known as Christian in the community of Antioch. I decided to meditate on the meaning of Christian; what does being a Christian mean?

Immediately coming to my mind was the fact that a Christian was a follower of Jesus, the Christ; the anointed One. I knew that I had to go deeper in my meditation. I next came to the idea that a Christian is a person who believes in Jesus. I realized that I was getting closer to the reality but still it was an incomplete answer. Our belief in Jesus as the Son of God comes through our faith that we are given through our common Baptism, which is God's free gift to us. But I could still envision a person believing in Jesus while holding back on a complete commitment to Him. And so in my meditation I knew that I had to delve deeper into the meaning of being a Christian.

Faith was Jesus' response to us; what was lacking was our response to Jesus. In a moment of enlightenment I knew that the answer to my question was love. Our response to God's gift of faith is to love; a love that can only come about through the gift of faith that was first given to us.

In this past Sunday's Gospel Jesus gave us a new command, to love each other as Jesus has loved us. All too often our love is based on our feelings and remains self-centered, but Jesus' love was not based on feelings but his love centered on the cross. It was on the cross that Jesus preached His greatest sermon on the topic of love. He not only took upon Himself our sins but He even forgave those who put Him on the cross.

True and authentic love must be self-giving and forgiving, which will always involve a cross. It is easy to love those who think and act like us and are nice to us; it is quite a different matter to love those who give us every reason not to love them. The first type of love still has one thing in common, namely "me;" the second type of love means rising higher than the "me" in order to see Jesus in each and every person.

The early Disciples truly lived up to the name of Christian. I want to use the example of St. Stephen who was one of the first to be martyred for being a Christian. Stephen's love did not shrink from professing his faith in Jesus even though he knew that his life was in mortal danger. And Stephen was able to forgive those who actually stoned him and also those who were complicit in the act as was St. Paul. There are those who believe that Stephen's forgiveness led to Paul's conversion.

It all comes down to love. The three theological virtues that are given to us at baptism are Faith, Hope and Love, but the greatest of these is love. St. Paul tells us that love never fails. And the reason that love never fails is that God is love; He alone is the source of all authentic love.

Isaiah 54:10

"Though the mountains be shaken and the hills be removed, yet my unfailing love for you will not be shaken nor my covenant of peace be removed," says the LORD, who has compassion on you.

USDA FSA Reminds Producers to File Annual Report of Acreage to Meet Farm Program Requirements

Scherrie V. Giamanco, State Executive Director of USDA's Farm Service Agency (FSA) in Illinois wishes to remind producers to submit their annual report of acreage to their local FSA county office to meet FSA program eligibility requirements.

"Producers must file their reports accurately and timely for all crops and land uses, including prevented and failed acreage, to ensure they receive the maximum FSA program benefits possible," said Giamanco.

Accurate acreage reports are necessary to determine and maintain eligibility for various programs, such as the Direct and Counter-Cyclical Program, Noninsured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP), Conservation Reserve Program (CRP), and newer programs authorized in the 2008 Farm Bill. Those programs include the Supplemental Revenue Assistance Payments Program (SURE), Average Crop Revenue Election Program (ACRE), Live-stock Forage Disaster Program (LFP), Tree Assistance Program (TAP), and Emergency Assistance for Livestock, Honeybees, and Farm Raised Fish Program (ELAP).

Acreage reports are considered timely filed when completed by the applicable final crop reporting deadline, which may vary from state to state. Prevented acreage must be reported within 15 calendar days after the established final planting date for the crop. Failed acreage must be reported before the disposition of the crop. Producers should contact their local county FSA office if they are uncertain about acreage reporting deadlines.

Late-filed provisions may be available to producers who are unable to meet the reporting deadline as required. Reports filed after the established deadline must meet certain requirements to be accepted and may be charged late fees.

Producers should visit their county FSA office to complete acreage reporting. For questions on this or any FSA program, including specific crop reporting deadlines and planting dates, producers should contact their county FSA office. More information on FSA programs is at: www.fsa.usda.gov.

USDA Seeks Applications for Grants to Improve the Quality of Rural Housing

Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack has announced that USDA is accepting applications for grants to help low- and very-low-income rural residents repair their homes.

Housing Preservation Grants are provided to intermediaries such as town or county governments, public agencies, federally recognized Indian Tribes, and non-profit and faith-based organizations. The grants are then distributed to qualified homeowners or owners of multi-family rental properties or cooperative dwellings who rent to low- and very-low-income residents. The grants can be used to weatherize and repair existing structures, install or improve plumbing or provide access to people with disabilities.

For example, in 2008, the Kendall County Public Health Department, headquartered in Yorkville, received a \$53,000 Housing Preservation Grant, matched with funds from a state weatherization grant, to help rural families in the Department's two-county service area make their homes more energy efficient. With the funds, the agency was able provide a \$3,925 grant to help David and Maria Blas in Plano, insulate their attic, caulk the frames of all their windows, replace the roof, and clean their hot water heater, making it operationally more efficient.

USDA may award up to \$10.1 million in competitive grants through the Notice of Funds Availability (NOFA) published in the April 27 Federal Register. The grants to be awarded are part of USDA Rural Development's annual budget and are not funded through the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act of 2009.

energy (DOE) is overseeing the DCEO program that is part of the American Recovery and Reinvestment Act (ARRA).

Approved activities will enhance the objectives set forth by DOE and DCEO and include a strong emphasis on job creation, job retention and economic recovery. Eligible units of local government may apply for EECBG grant funds for projects to improve or enhance their publicly owned property, or for projects that include entities located within their boundaries, such as school districts, park districts, police departments, and fire protection districts. The unit of local government may also use EECBG funds to administer programs (i.e. energy audits, or rebates) that would benefit businesses, residences and not-for-profits located within their boundaries. EECBG grant funds cannot exceed 75% of the total project cost.

What specific activities are eligible for use of funds?

- Residential and Commercial Building Energy Audits.
- Energy Efficiency Retrofits in Buildings and Facilities. Communities may use funds to administer programs or pay for their own building projects.

Only the following projects are allowable under this activity:

- installation of insulation
- installation of efficient lighting
- heating, venting, and air conditioning (HVAC) and high-efficiency shower/faucet upgrades;
- weather sealing;
- the purchase and installation of ENERGY STAR appliances;
- installation of solar powered or conventional garbage compactors with improved efficiency,
- and replacement of windows and doors.
- Development and implementation of transportation programs to conserve energy.
- Applicants may use funds to encourage purchase of hybrid, electric, or alternative-fueled vehicles for local government or school fleet vehicles. The rebate or grant shall not exceed \$5,000 for each vehicle purchased.
- Applicants may also use EECBG funds to pay for part of the cost of plug-in charging stations for electric plug-in vehicles. Any such charging station should include solar or other renewable energy supply. It is important to note that the EECBG funds can only provide for 50% of the total project cost for the plug-in charging stations.
- Building code revisions and inspections to promote building energy efficiency and or training of enforcement officials or the local building industry.
- Material conservation programs including source reduc-

tion, recycling and recycled content procurement programs that lead to documented energy savings.

- Energy efficient traffic signals and street lighting.
- Government building renewable electricity - Onsite renewable energy projects that generate electricity from solar, wind, fuel cells, or biomass are eligible.

The maximum grant award for an individual project is \$100,000. The minimum grant amount is \$5,000.

Completed applications are due to NCICG by June 11. Although NCICG typically provides grant writing and administration assistance to local governments, in this instance the agency will not be filling that role. The application is not overly complicated. Local governments may call NCICG with questions or resource/assistance ideas (815-875-3396).

Containers Offer a Growing Solution for Vegetable Gardeners

The number of people who tried vegetable gardening for the first time increased dramatically last summer and is expected to increase again this summer, said a University of Illinois Extension horticulture educator.

"Unfortunately, many people don't have room for a garden or they rent and can't change the landscape and some people only have an apartment balcony to work with," explained Jeff Rugg. "Fortunately, there is a solution -- they can plant a garden in containers.

"Container gardens are easy and productive. Instead of filling all your large flower pots with geraniums and other annuals, plant a few with a different kind of ornamental. The vegetables most people like are the ones that grow the easiest in pots."

Many varieties of tomatoes will grow in a patio container. Look for ones that say 'eterminate' on the label as they maintain a shorter size. A tomato cage can be placed in a large pot or around a smaller one to help hold the tomato upright.

"Try red, purple or yellow bell peppers or one of the white or purple eggplants," he recommended. "Just as easy are hot peppers, onions, lettuce, bush beans or bush cucumber.

"Vines such as some of the cucumbers, peas, squash or melons might need a support, can be used in a hanging basket, or they can just be left to sprawl on the patio." "The larger the pot the better, but many of the dwarf or compact vegetables can grow in an 18-inch-tall pot," he said.

To keep the pots light, look for a potting soil that is soil-less. It will be a lightweight blend of peat moss, perlite, vermiculite, tree bark, compost and other ingredients. It might also have

fertilizer and moisture-holding granules. Soil-less mixes are almost sterile and have few weed seeds, insects or disease spores. Replace one-third to one-half the mix with new soil each year to keep it fresh.

"Plant seeds according to the package instructions. When filling the pot with soil, leave the top inch or two of pot exposed so that the pot can be watered and not overflow. Never add gravel in the bottom of the pot. Just cover the drain hole with a small piece of paper or cloth." A large pot might still be too heavy. Fill the bottom third with empty milk jugs, packing peanuts or other filler. Cover the filler with a cloth and then add the soil. There should still be at least six inches of soil for the roots.

Another easy way to grow vegetables in a very small space is to grow them in a product trademarked as EarthBox. Filling the reservoir allows the plants to self water until you fill it again, making watering much easier. Water is not wasted as it is in regular garden plots. These boxes can be moved into the sunny spots of the yard and a trellis can be installed so tall plants and vines can grow. It uses a sterile soil mix for no weeds and the fertilizer is installed at the beginning of the season, using either regular fertilizer or the new organic version.

"One box can handle two larger plants like tomatoes or four smaller plants like bush beans," he said.

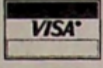

And thus began the mock trial in which Putnam County High School Seniors played the roles of the parties, witnesses, counsel, court personnel and jury, as part of this year's celebration of Law Day at the Putnam County Courthouse on April 23.

The mock trial was part of the annual Program hosted by the Putnam County Bar Association to honor the importance of law and the Constitution in our lives. Students had the opportunity to meet all County Office-holders and their staff, to tour the Courthouse and jail, to register to vote (and 16 did!), while also learning about the history of the Courthouse -- the oldest still in use in Illinois.

The story line of this year's mock trial was written by Putnam County Resident Circuit Judge Scott Shore with the help of the Law Day Committee, including Putnam County Bar President Roger Bolin, State's Attorney James Mack, and Hennepin attorney Christina Judd-Mennie.

The saga began when Plaintiff Jayde Dater (Haley Naumann), a Putnam County senior, broke up with her would-be prom date, G.Q. Stronghold (Edwardo Hernandez) and sought the help of an on-line prom dating service, E-Prom.com, to line her up with a "perfectly matched" replacement date for the Prom and Afterglow.

Her surprise turned to disappointment, and her disappointment turned to anger, when she found out on Prom night that her "perfect match" was none other than the boyfriend she had just dumped! Declaring that she would NOT attend prom with GQ, Jayde was soon further surprised to learn that the owner and chief

matchmaker of E-Prom.com were fellow PCHS students Rudy Mismacher (Alonzo Khouaja) and Carey Cupidiak (Rhiannon Elliott), and the stage was set for a law suit in which Jayde accused E-Prom's operators of intentionally setting her up for a date that was bound to fail. The jury consisted of Foreperson Gerad Pyszka, Conner Herkelman, Dylan Wulzen, Chris Naumann, Alan Augspols, Michael Illingworth, Ericka Smith, Kelly King, Holly Siegel, Krissy Taylor, Brittany Griffin and Becky Nielsen. Other court personnel, learning the ropes from Circuit Clerk Cathy Oliveri, included her replacement, Emily Smith, as well as Court Reporter Stevie Croisant, and Bailiff Robert Ramirez who did his best to maintain "order in the court" for Judge Mitch Loiselle.

High School seniors may apply for the Hennepin Vocational/Trade Grant if they are planning to attend a vocational, trade school, community college, four-year college, or university leading to career employment from a school or institution that is on the "Federal Student Aid Code List." (Examples: Cosmetology, Nursing, Horticulture, Early Childhood, Truck Driving, Agricultural Areas, etc.)

The fund has two remaining grants; one consists of \$1,000 and the other of \$800. The grants are intended to help defray tuition, room and board, fees, and other necessities of a vocational/grade program. Guidelines and applications for this grant are available at the Putnam County High School Guidance Office or the Regional Office of Education.

Applications are due to the ROE in Washburn by August 1st.

"Midnight Mystery" Budget

Underscores Need for Reform

State Sen. Gary Dahl (R-Granville) says a midnight "mystery budget" approved by the Illinois Senate by Democratic leaders underscores the need for reform in the state budget process.

The measure, House Bill 859, was approved by the chamber at 1 a.m. on May 7 along partisan lines, despite the fact no lawmakers - even the bill's sponsors - had a chance to review it.

"This is yet another example of why Illinois state government is broken," Dahl said. "We were asked to vote on a measure that nobody had read and during the debate, the bill's sponsors couldn't even say how much spending was in the measure. It was a very dark hour for the taxpayers of our state."

Dahl noted that earlier this year, Illinois Senate Democrats and Republicans joined together to pass Senate Bill 3622, a measure shedding sunshine into the legislative process by requiring a four day review period before a final budget could be approved. The measure is currently stalled in the Illinois House of Representatives.

"It's unfortunate the Senate Democratic leadership totally disregarded the same sunshine reforms they embraced on two months ago," Dahl said. "We need a review period to give everybody - the public, the media and lawmakers - a chance to thoroughly review what precisely is in the budget and ensure the taxpayers' money is spent wisely."

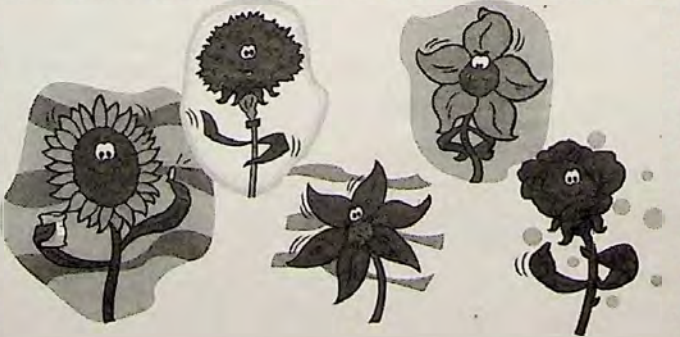

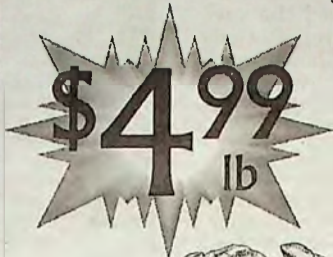

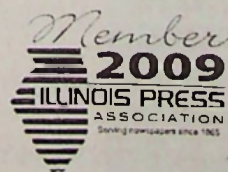

The Illinois Fair Map Amendment

Following the 2010 Census, the State of Illinois is required by law to redraw its legislative and congressional voting districts. On December 3, 2009 the IFMA coalition laid the groundwork for a non-partisan, common sense plan for the new map. The Illinois Farm Bureau 2010 Policy Resolutions included this resolution, "We will support a restructuring of the Illinois legislative redistricting process that will be conducted by an unbiased third party (and) will not be based on political affiliation and prior election results."

The coalition backing the IFMA has set out to get 500,000 petition signatures in order for the measure to be put before voters in November. Illinois Farm Bureau decided

to partner with the Illinois Chamber of Commerce and the Illinois League of Women Voters to back IFMA. Under the system now, Republican and Democrats draw legislative district maps behind closed doors picking voters down to city blocks for their party's benefit, deadlocking over their proposals and heading to a winner-take-all lottery. This method guarantees enough safe seats for the winning party to have power in the legislature for a decade.

The IFMA would return some power to the people giving voters a chance to pick the voter rather than letting the winning party pick them. They would set up a system in which districts are created by an independent commission, no lawmakers, or lobbyists. But wouldn't you

know, three months after the IFMA plan was announced, the Democratic party introduced their "Citizen First Amendment," which would leave the map-drawing power in the hands of the legislature. Then the Republicans came up with their redistricting amendment that proposed to take the map-drawing power away from the legislature and put it in the hands of a nine-member commission - eight picked by four legislative leaders and a ninth member chosen by the panel.

I support the Farm Bureau Fair Map Amendment and passed out petitions for citizens to sign. The Farm Bureau encourages their members and all Illinois voters to support the Fair Map Amendment.

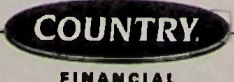

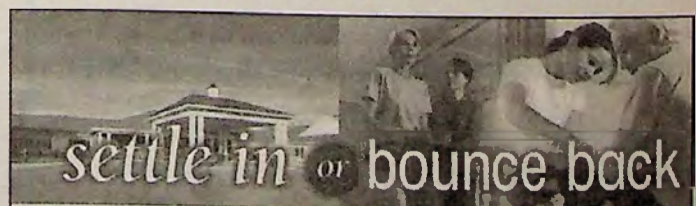

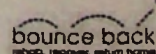

Red Cross Swim Lessons

Hennepin Park District will have three sessions of swim lessons. Each session will be two weeks long. Red Cross has six levels of swimming ability. Hear His Word

Spring has truly arrived. I hope that we won't see another snow storm until next winter. Snow is never totally out of the question for the area that we call home. Snow likes to take us by surprise. It likes to give us a raspberry whenever it possibly can. I like to forget about snow until I am undeniably confronted with it. Spring is here and we see the power of God to create and recreate is before our eyes. Green growing new life is bountifully present for us to enjoy. The flowers that have sprung up everywhere are a real treat. They are delightful.

In May we will be hosting Confirmation for two members of Emmaus Lutheran Church and one from Immanuel Lutheran Church. This event will be held at Emmaus in McNabb. Confirmation is so much more than just a rite of passage. Confirmation is all about reaffirming one's baptismal vows. Usually when one is baptized one can't speak for one's self. Usually we baptize infants or very small children. Parents and sponsors do all the talking. Parents and sponsors promise that the child that they have brought forward to the font will be raised in the church and taught the necessary basics for Christian life and worship. At Confirmation young people stand up and answer for themselves. It isn't the end of their instruction. It is the beginning of a new, more adult role in the life of the Christian community that surrounds us. It is awesome to think of young people standing up in front of a church full of people and telling them what they believe about God.

Confirmation IS NOT graduation. We graduate from the Church only when we go to be with the saints in heaven. Far from being graduation, Confirmation should be the beginning of a more active role in the life of the Church. These young people are not the future of the Church they are the right now of the Church. When they are confirmed they will be recognized as adult members of their respective churches. We need to make room for their voices and opinions. If we want them to be involved we need to respect and include them. They definitely have ideas that they want to share. Too often we ignore them. Too often we expect them to melt back into their roles as children. If we don't listen to and include them now I'm afraid that they will simply wander away. There are a boat load of things out there ready and anxious to claim their allegiance. We need to a firm hold on and listen to our young people.

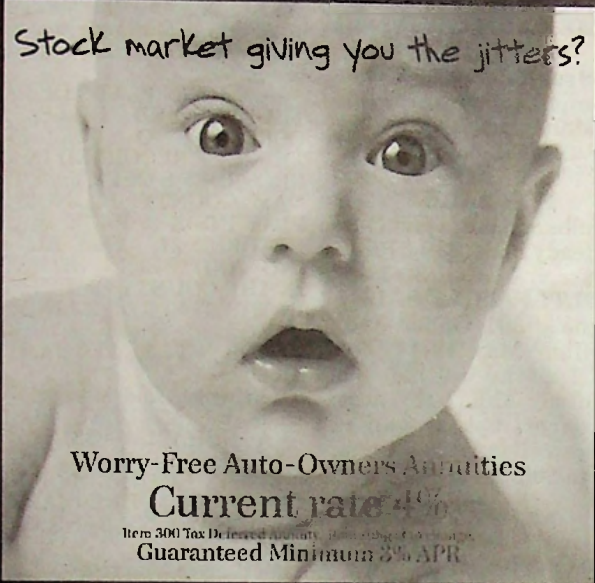

Agriculture Secretary Vilsack Announces Support For Small, Socially Disadvantaged Agricultural Producers and Cooperatives to Become More Profitable and Efficient

Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack today announced that USDA is accepting grant applications to assist small, socially disadvantaged agricultural producers and cooperatives in rural areas.

"Helping small agricultural producers better market their products creates economic opportunity and these grants will help small business owners add profit and efficiency to their operations so they can grow and create jobs," Vilsack said.

Approximately \$3.5 million in grants are available with funding is being awarded through USDA Rural Development's Small, Socially Disadvantaged Producer Grant Program, which was authorized by Congress in the Food, Conservation, and Energy Act of 2008. It is part of the Department's ongoing effort to expand outreach to rural residents to ensure that all communities have equal access to USDA programs and services. Cooperatives or associations of cooperatives are eligible to apply where at least 75 percent of the governing board or membership has annual gross agricultural product sales of \$250,000 or less in the last three years. Grants can be used for product improvements, business plan development or economic development activities.

Illinois Green Pastures Fiber Cooperative, headquartered in Kane County, Ill., used an \$180,000 grant to help their members learn how to add value to their fiber production, improve their marketing and promote their products. As a result, the cooperative, which includes fiber producers throughout the state, now sell their products in state, national and international markets.

In 2009 Piedmont Farmers Marketing Cooperative, Inc. in Greenwood, S.C., used a \$43,600 Small, Socially Disadvantaged Producer Grant to complete several seminars and workshops on animal husbandry, vaccination requirements, and techniques on breeding and proper raising of offspring. The 31-member co-op developed a marketing study on a certification mark, collective brands, consumer assurance and alternative livestock planning. The grant also will allow co-op members to visit a livestock operation that uses livestock waste for renewable energy, reducing the operation's energy costs.

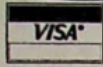

Spacecraft Systems Engineer, Barbara Bendkowski, is Formerly of Granville – A Woman With a Mission

 Former Granvillian Barbara Agnieszka Bendkowski, daughter of Bob and Basia Bendkowski of Granville, visited the Coffee Club at the Corner Store to speak to the fellows about her exciting career in the spacecraft program. She is a 2001 Embry-Riddle graduate with a degree in engineering physics and has a passion for space exploration.

She was a Spacecraft Systems Test Engineer at Lockheed Martin Space Systems Company based at the company's Waterton Campus in Littleton CO. It is not surprising that Barbara has a passion for engineering and yearning for exploration. Her father Bob is an engineer and her mother Basia was born in Poland and was a professional pelunker.

Barbara said her father inspired her when she was rowing up. As a mechanical engineer he made a significant effort to share aspects of his job with Barbara. He had a great passion for the work he did and in being in an environment like that, Barbara found the inspiration for making her decision to pursue a career in the space industry. Her father never once said, "Do you think you can do that?" Instead he always said, "What can I do to help you achieve your goal?"

Barbara grew up in Michigan and Tennessee. Then the family traveled to Florida several times to watch rockets launch from Cape Canaveral. Barbara attended her first three years of high school at Knoxville Catholic High School in Knoxville TN. When her parents moved to Granville she attended St. Bede Academy for her senior year, although she had enough credits to graduate. Most of her senior year was used to take courses from IVCC professors at St. Bede. After graduating she moved to Florida so she could attend Embry-Riddle and pursue her dream of becoming an astronautical engineer.

Barbara said, "There was no place better to go to school for someone interested in space travel. There were times when our class would step out of class to watch a launch. It was a great experience and an ideal environment." She attended classes at the Kennedy Space Center, including one taught by Astronaut Sam Durrance. She walked around on the space site and even inside the vehicles as they were being assembled and saw several space launches at the VIP station. She remembered one morning she missed her bus and was sitting on the curb when Astronaut Sally Ryde stopped and gave her a ride to the Kennedy Center.

After graduating Barbara accepted a position in the Naval weapons program at Lockheed Martin. Two years later she transferred to Lockheed Martin Space Systems. In a news release, William Adams, telecommunications operation engineer for Lockheed Martin, said, "Barbara is an excellent systems engineer, able to pull together a number of different inputs and drives toward a solution that works for everyone."

Bendkowski has provided expertise that has helped propel her to the top of her field. She has worked on an array of high profile projects, including the Mars Reconnaissance orbiter, the Stardust Sample Return project, and the Stardust Next mission. She has split her time overseeing operational tasks, working as a system controller sending signals to the various space vehicles and service as a test engineer in the lab. Barbara said, "The work we are doing today will lead us to great things in the future, even if it is a hundred years from now, we're setting the stage for human exploration of our solar system. It's absolutely exciting to be part of the space program and be involved with sending these tiny space vehicles

millions and millions of miles to far away places."

Her days are busy handling different duties for several projects. She did send commands to the Mars Reconnaissance orbiter from a control console at the Littleton facility. Later she would be in the test lab reviewing technical data for the Stardust spacecraft. The Mars Reconnaissance orbiter, which carries the most powerful camera ever flown on a planetary exploration, requires constant updated command sets to photograph Martian terrain. The spacecraft which arrived on the Red Planet in March 2006 also carried scientific instruments designed to find subsurface water, identify surface minerals, and study how dust and water are transported in the Martian atmosphere. Although NASA has created existing templates for building command commands, Bendkowski ensures that they are developed in a format that is compatible with the spacecraft.

Barbara's role in the Stardust Next Mission is as one of the Spacecraft Test Lab (STL) operators. She participates in the testing of command products in a simulated spacecraft environment on the ground before the command is radiated to the spacecraft. She also has a secondary role as a Real Time Operator. This means that once a command product is approved to be sent to the spacecraft, she is one of the people certified to actually radiate "send" the command to the spacecraft.

Barbara said 90% of all medical instruments we have today were invented by the space program, which is a side benefit of the program. The CAT scans, MRI imaging system, are a couple of the benefits that were developed by the Apollo Program of the space program. This has helped society as a whole. She is upset with President Obama for proposing to cut the financing of the space program. She said,

"We will lose the initiative and the drive to develop technology for the shuttle program such as velcro that we all use." She is concerned that the United States has 200,000 engineers, and only seven space engineers, while China has 2 million engineers. Barbara said, "The Space Program is a show of power and shows we are the leading country in the world, that we are the leaders in technology and are serious about it." Now Barbara lives in Stockholm VA and has her own office in Washington DC, a 40 minute drive. She has to understand the whole space system, and make sure all the dots connect and everything falls into place. She is responsible for the power system to have enough power for any situation and make sure that every single part on the shuttle is strong and powerful enough to do its job. Barbara is a woman on a mission; she hopes to continue working with spacecraft for many years, including manned missions. "We are exploring in many places where we can't send a human. There is nothing I would rather do than work with these spacecraft to discover new things about our universe," she said. Barbara also is proud to be a part of the work that is being done to further human knowledge and understanding of the universe. She is very happy to have her dream job. She says, "success is reaching goals you have set for yourself. I have always been interested in space, and it is really interesting work."

Barbara will marry Jacob Hilton, Petty Officer First Class in the U.S. Navy on October 23, 2010. They met while working in Colorado, Jacob's home state.

It is a wonderfully interesting world in which we live because Barbara's father Bob belongs to the Coffee Club of Knowledge at the Corner Store in Granville, as does Phil Euler. One morning they were visitinh with each other and learned that Bob's future son-in-law, Jacob, and Phil's son, Chief Petty Officer Matt Euler, are both serving on the USS Nassua.

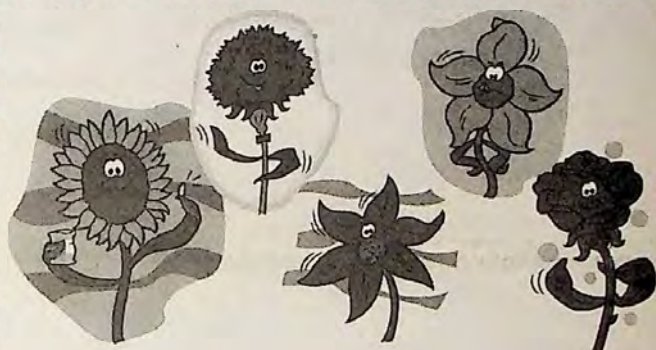

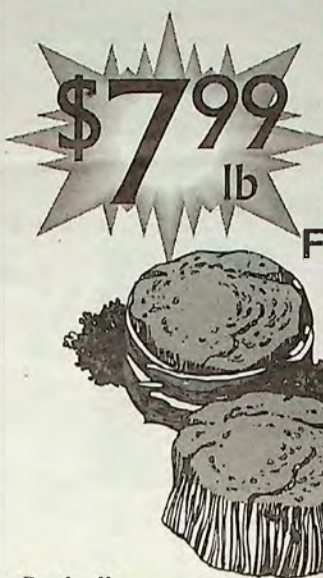

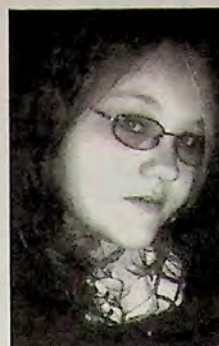

•• USDA Announces Tree Assistance Program Sign-Up

Orchardists and nursery tree growers can begin applying for benefits under the Tree Assistance Program announced by the USDA Farm Service Agency State Executive Director Scherrie Giamanco. Signup began Monday, May 10 at local Illinois Farm Service Agency (FSA) offices.

"This program helps our orchardists and nursery tree growers replant and get back on their feet after natural disasters," said Giamanco.

The Tree Assistance Program (TAP) provides help to orchardists and nursery tree growers who produce trees, bushes and vines for commercial purposes, to replant or rehabilitate trees, bushes and vines damaged or destroyed by natural disasters. The 2008 Farm Bill expanded eligibility to include Christmas tree and nursery tree growers that were ineligible under prior legislation. Trees grown for pulp or timber or not grown for commercial purposes are not eligible.

To be eligible for TAP, producers must have suffered more than a 15 percent death loss due to the natural disaster after adjustment for normal mortality. TAP is a cost-reimbursement program, with payments covering up to 70 percent of replant costs and 50 percent of pruning, removal and other salvaging costs for replacing or salvaging damaged trees.

Producers can receive assistance for up to 500 acres of trees, bushes or vines. Producers must also have purchased a policy or plan of insurance under the Federal Crop Insurance Act or Non-insured Crop Disaster Assistance Program, or for 2008, obtained a waiver of the risk management purchase requirement through the buy-in provision. Eligible losses must have occurred on or after Jan. 1, 2008, and before Oct. 1, 2011. July 6, 2010 is the final date to submit an application and supporting documentation for losses occurring from January 1, 2010 through May 7, 2010; or calendar year 2008 and 2009. For losses occurring from May 8, 2010 through September 30, 2011 the application and supporting documentation must be submitted within 90 calendar days of the disaster event or date when the losses of trees, bushes or vines are apparent.

Hear His Word

MAY CROP REPORT

The Illinois winter wheat crop is expected to yield 60 bushels per acre based on conditions as of May 1, four bushels above last year's yield.

If this yield is realized, total production would be 19.5 million bushels, 58 percent less than a year ago. Farmers seeded only 350 thousand acres to winter wheat as the result of a very wet fall and expect to harvest 325 thousand acres for grain. This compares to 850 thousand acres seeded and 820 thousand acres harvested in 2009. Winter wheat headed has reached 43 percent as of May 9, well ahead of 19 percent last year, and near the five-year average of 40 percent. The condition of the crop was 2 percent excellent, 31 percent good, 38 percent fair, 25 percent poor, and 4 percent very poor.

10-year Anniversary of Fire in Granville was Monday, May 24th

On May 24, 2000 in late afternoon the whole of the west side 300 block of McCoy Street was in flames.

It was evidently caused by a trash fire in the back of the grocery store which rapidly spread due to heavy wind gusts.



Pictured here is the inside of the grocery store the next day. Note the grocery cart in the lower right hand corner. The temperature on the Granville National Bank during the fire displayed a balmy 73 degrees.

May 24 marks the 10-year anniversary of the unforgettable Granville fire that swept the west side of the business district. Eight buildings were damaged, some beyond repair.

I was a downtown business owner with my office on the west side of the street at the time so I remember this fire like it was yesterday. We drove over from Tonica after receiving a phone call telling us what was going on. A fire that big is something you don't forget in a day or two.

I was grateful that the fire department let me go into my building (now occupied by Monique's Boutique). My mission was to rescue my computer files for the newspaper so we wouldn't be out of business if the building was eaten up by the hungry flames that were being fed even more by the wind conditions that evening. After my mission was accomplished I wandered aimlessly around taking photos since there was little else anyone except the trained firefighters could do.

In the light of the next day the devastation seemed overwhelming. The only good report was that no one lost their lives in the tragedy.

Bob Borri, was village president at the time of the fire "I think the fire brought the community together. It was really amazing how much support we got from the other communities," Borri said. The biggest loss to the community was the grocery store where the fire originated. Other businesses either rebuilt or moved to new locations or closed. Eventually a new grocery store was built on the highway and it has been a great blessing to the community.

The new village hall, Helmig Law offices and Granville Drug replaced the space left open by the fire. The St. Margaret's Clinic moved across the street where the McMahon building burnt in 1995 and had left this area open for development. Building codes were updated with language about fire walls in new construction. The downtown area is safer and far more modern looking. Village officials and business owners can be proud of all the hard work that was done to restore the downtown area into something everyone in Granville can be proud of.

This is about as bittersweet as it gets. While I am excited about serving in a new location with new challenges, and thrilled about being able to live with my wife (who has been living and working in the Springfield area for over two years), I am going to miss this wonderful place and her wonderful people!

I leave with you this prayer:

It is a simple one... I pray that you will love one another. I also pray that you will love God. You can't truly love one without loving the other. If you love God, really love God, you can't help but love one another! If you love one another, you will see that we are all created in God's image! It really is that simple! When you love someone, you care about what happens to them. You only wish to do good for them and do no harm to them. When someone does another harm, it hurts you and it becomes your problem too. When you love someone, you will refrain from gossiping about them. You find that mean comments about them from others offend you and you will never want to participate in the meanness. And when you love, you love the stranger too. You draw the circle wide that welcomes them, feeds them, nurtures them and makes them feel their worth. It won't matter what village they live in, they will be your neighbor and their well-being will matter to you. It is in doing these things that you demonstrate your love for God.

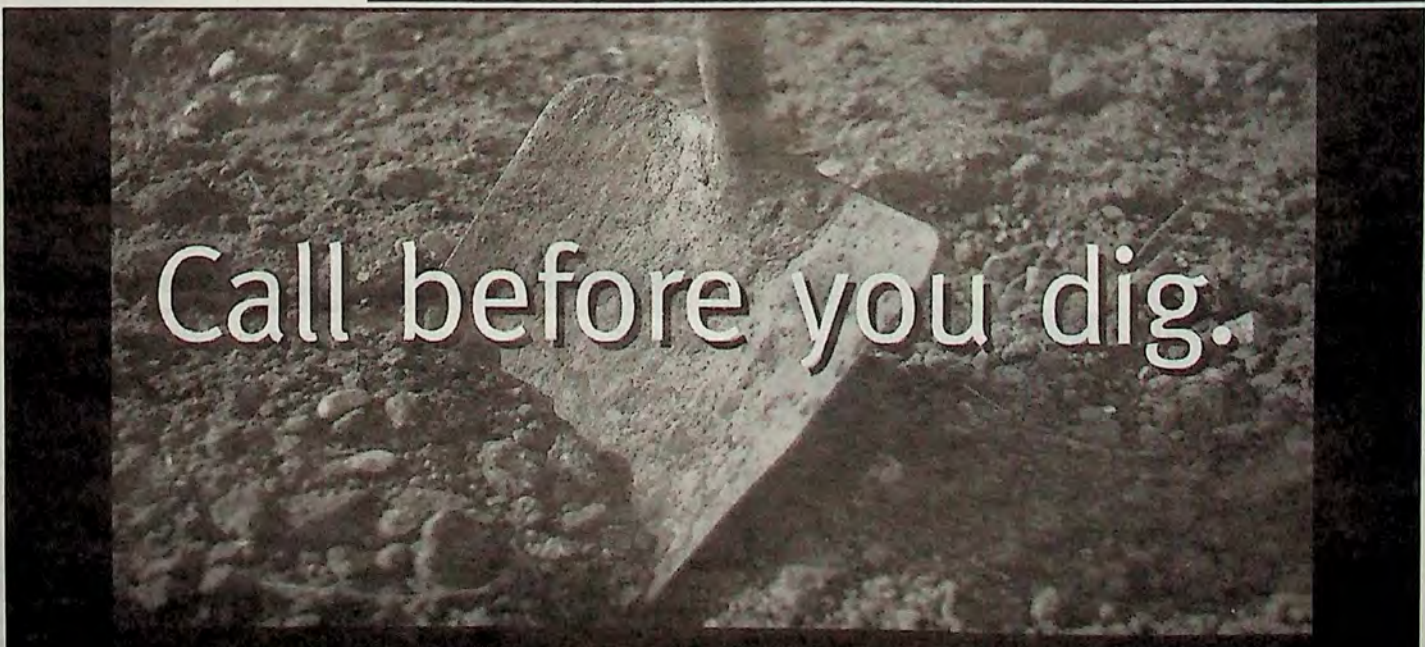

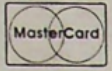
