# Veteran's Day in Washington DC – A Great Memory

Honor after honor was bestowed on the local area WWII Veterans of the Greatest Generation on their one day trip to Washington DC to visit their WWII Memorial. Honors started right here in Granville at Casey's General Store at 2:30 a.m. of May 26th. Manager Eleanor Greathouse, Honor Flight volunteers Jodi Slingsby and Heather Liebhart were there to welcome and serve donuts and coffee to the Veterans. The Granville Legion Commander presented a boutonniere to Jodi and Heather for setting up the trip. The local VFW Commander, Vietnam Veteran Gary Bruno presented WWII Veteran Jeno Bonucchi with a 65 year attendance pin. At 3 a.m. the Peoria Charter bus pulled out of Casey's with a great send off from family, friends, supporters and an honor guard salute from the VFW's Honor Guard group. Jeno Bonucchi's son-in-law, Ken Unes, drove the bus and his daughter, Carol, who was Jeno's guardian and the Honor Flight nurse were on board as the bus headed east on Rt. 71, with several Granville-Hennepin fire trucks, a PC Sheriff's car, Granville Police and two State Troopers leading the way. Everyone stopped in front of Senator Gary Dahl's home on Rt. 89 to pick him up, the Army Veteran, and guardian for WWII Veteran Jim Whitaker. Stops were made in Spring Valley and Princeton to pick up other WWII Veterans. In Spring Valley local police and fire trucks returned home, but the State Police escorted the bus all the way to the Quad Cities Airport. At the airport the Veterans were met by Veteran groups, well-wishers, waving flags, and those thanking them for their service to their country. The Salvation Army served donuts and coffee at the airport. The large Sun Flight #8600 departed at 7 a.m. for the two hour flight to Dulles Airport in

Washington DC.

I overheard the WWII Veterans taking and telling about what service they were in, where they served, and exchanging stories. The plane was full of chatter and laughter by the heroes. After a smooth landing, Honor Flight Director Bob Morrison spoke telling everyone to watch out the windows of the plane because the Veterans and the plane were going to have a water can salute. This is an Air Force salute to a pilot and his plane on his last flight.

Everyone loaded onto a bus and ate a box lunch on the drive to the WWII Memorial. Everyone was impressed with the beautiful memorial.

U.S. Transportation Director Ray LaHood greeted the Veterans before giving a brief speech. Pictures were taken of the group at the monument. As the group was leaving, Senator Charles Grossley from Iowa boarded the bus and thanked the Veterans for their service.

Next we toured the Air Force Memorial, Iwo Jima Memorial, Women's Memorial, Arlington National Cemetery, the Tomb of the Unknown Soldier and the Changing of the Guard. The Guard clicked their heels together honoring the WWII Honor Flight Veterans. They only do that when Veterans are there. After that we went to the Korean and VietNam Memorials, Lincoln Monument and headed back to Dulles Airport for the flight home. At the airport again the Honor Flight Veterans were met by Veterans and others honoring them as they went through the airport.

On the flight home the Veterans had a mail call. This was a surprise to all. Volunteer Heather Liebhart set this up by contacting the Veterans families. Every Vet received mail from their wife, children, grandchildren and friends thanking them for their service. The flight landed in Moline at 10:15 p.m. and the group was

met by 500 or more flag waving passionate patriotic people of all ages and occupations, along with family members.

Bagpipe music flowed throughout the airport as the Vets walked through the big crowd of well-wishers. The bus returned back to Granville at 1:15 a.m. escorted again by the State Police.

I asked for comments of the trip. Legion Commander Ed Guiliani said, "It was magnificent, a number one memory. It was like the Pope was blessing us. It struck me all the way through."

Veteran Joe Panier said, "All the volunteers made it the success it was. There are no words to express my thanks. They are all special people."

Harry Faletti said, "The reception was really something. It was a long day, a lot of fun. If I ever had a chance to go again, I would go."

U.S. Navy man Bill Tonarelli said, "It was just outstanding the way the local people, the VFW, firemen with their trucks, police, families and people from the community showed their support for the Veterans."

Jeno Bonucchi said, "It was a wonderful trip, It went off just like they planned. It was really good. We were gone 22 hours and I slept like a log when I got home."

Jim Whitaker's wife, Kathryn said, "I enjoyed the opportunity to write Jim a love letter which I had not done for a long time."

Jodi and Heather thank the volunteers, guardians, Keith Baldwin and Senator Gary Dahl for his \$2,000 contribution to the Honor Flight Committee, and to all the patriotic people at the airports and especially here at home.

Casey's provided free coffee and donuts. As shown in the photo above, Gary Bruno presented Jeno Bonucchi a pin from VFW Post 8324 for 65 years as a member of the Post. Jeno wore the hat he received from the Post for 50 years as a member.

The bus left Casey's at 3:00 a.m. for the Quad Cities Airport in Moline. The bus was escorted to the Bureau County line by trucks from the Granville Fire Department, as well as local, county and Illinois State Police cars. Harry Faletti said the bus was escorted all the way to the airport by Illinois State Police.

The World War II Veterans saw the WWII monument, Iwo Jima monument, and many others. They also attended the Changing of the Guard ceremony. A special presentation was given to honor the WWII Veterans.

The bus arrived back at Granville at 1:15 a.m. but the late arrival didn't faze the Veterans in the least. They still gathered at the Corner Store for coffee at 8:00 a.m. the next morning just like they always do. They shared memories of the events that took place on the trip with others at the Corner Store. Ed Guiliani said that everywhere they stopped, they were given donuts or coffee or sandwiches. At one stop they were given ice cream.

Joe Panier said the Veterans even had a "mail call." Receiving mail from home while in the service was a very big deal. It was reported that the trip went very well and was well planned. This trip will remain a great memory for these Veterans. Thank you to everyone who helped with the effort of putting this Honor Flight together. One can't imagine the work that went into arranging the details of the flight. A very special Thank You to Jodi Slingsby and Heather Liebhart for all the work they did to put this flight together.

# History From the Files of the PC Record

10 YEARS AGO  
MAY 31, 2000

Granville faced a major destruction project with the fire on May 24th of the west side of the 300 block where eight businesses or vacant buildings were destroyed. Those businesses were Granville Foods, Valerie's Touch of Glamour Beauty Shop, Helmig Law Offices, Granville Village Hall, Gran Pet Team and Puppy Parlor. Vacant building also destroyed were the former Harris Feeds and PC Record office. The Record office went down due to having a back hoe tear into it to make a fire break in an attempt to stop the blaze from spreading any further. Major damage was also sustained by SMH's Community Health Center, T&A Auto Supply and the Granville National Bank. Twenty-two fire departments helped with the fight along with three ambulance services and the PC Sheriff's Dept., Granville and Hennepin Police Depts. as well as the IL State Police.

David Shore of Granville was selected by Granville American Legion Post 180 to attend Premier Boys State at EIU in Charleston June 10-16.

PC Historical Society was honored with donations from recently uncovered historical items by the Cofoid family and in particular Robert L. Cofoid, senior member. 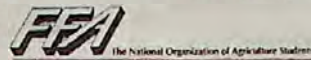

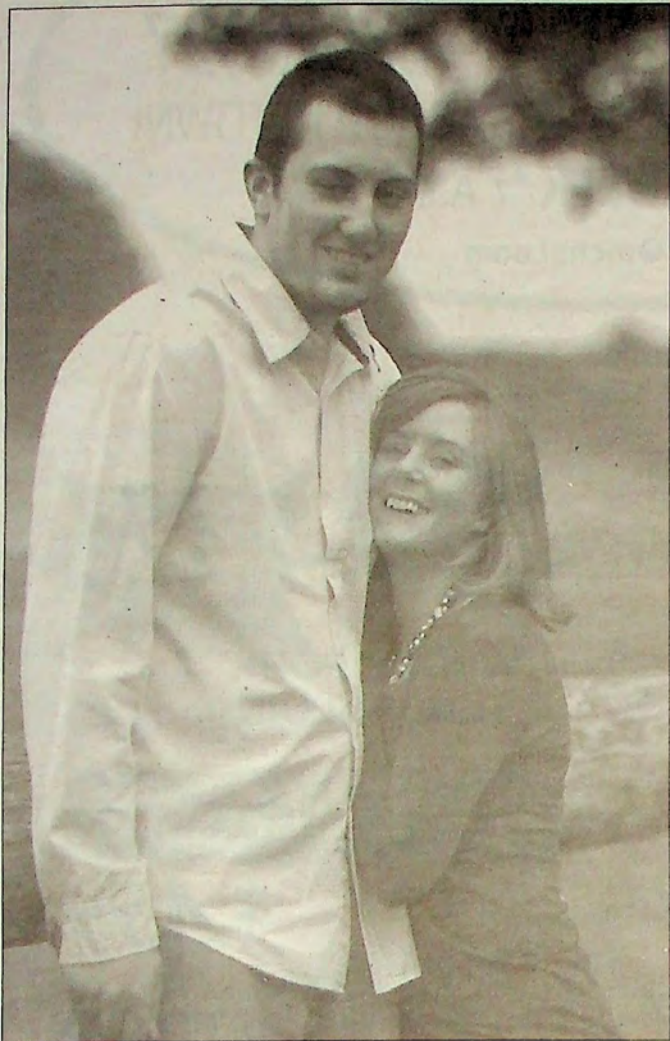

## Report From Schock

Congressman Aaron Schock, a member of the Transportation and Infrastructure Committee, joined his Illinois Republican colleagues in writing to Committee Chairman James Oberstar to request he reconsider his support for changing the way highway funding is distributed.

As a donor state, Illinois is already putting more money in to the Federal Highway Trust Fund than we receive in return from the federal government. This week the House is expected to begin debate on H.R. 4213, the American Jobs and Closing Tax Loopholes Act, which changes the highway funding formula. The enactment of this legislation will require Illinois to forfeit \$118,940,724 in highway funds that has already been apportioned to the State as of mid-April, costing thousands of jobs, and damaging our ability to continue to be a central transportation hub for the entire country.

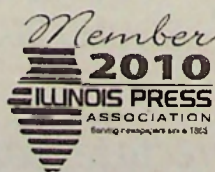

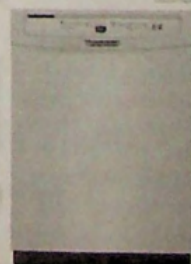

## Putnam County 2010 Census Update

The Village of Granville Officials thought the residents might be interested to know the answers to the following questions. Here is a response from the Director on his Blog:

*Why am I being contacted by the Census Bureau...?*

*The Census Bureau is getting quite a few calls from people asking this question. You might like to see the response from the director, himself.*

### The Director's Blog

Why am I Being Contacted by the Census Bureau - I Returned my Form!

Some questions are coming in from folks who completed and mailed back their census forms, but are being visited by census workers in person, or receiving a phone call from the US Census Bureau. It might be a good time to go over the different reasons this might be happening. (All of the reasons are variants of attempts to make sure we've counted people once and only once and in the right place, their April 1, 2010, usual residence.) We use two ways of contacting people -- face to face visits and telephone calls.

Here are some reasons why you might get a knock on the door:

1. We received your mailed-in form too late to scratch your unit off the list of addresses to visit. (Since some forms get lost in transit, we train our enumerators to ask the census questions at every door they're assigned; please be patient with this request).

2. There was missing or conflicting information on the form we received. (We want to make sure the information we collect from your household is complete and correct.)

3. We can't match the address you provided on a "Be Counted" form or over the phone to our master address list. (We send the enumerator to you to make sure all information in properly attached to the right housing unit).

If we are uncertain about any of the answers your household provided on the census, we may call to get a better understanding of the situation and ensure we get an accurate count.

Here are a few reasons why you may receive a telephone call from the US Census Bureau:

1. If the number given for how many people were living at the address on April 1 does not match the number of people for whom information was provided.

2. If the form indicates that additional people were staying at the address on April 1 but were not included in the household's count.

3. If we suspect we have received duplicate information about a housing unit or individual, we will follow-up to make sure people are not counted twice.

You can confirm that the individual calling is really from the Census Bureau by running through this checklist. (<http://2010.census.gov/2010census/how-preparing-for-a-census-call.php>)

I'd like to thank all of

the households who have responded to the census takers who have already visited them in person or received a call from the Census Bureau. If you haven't yet received a call or visit - but do so in the next few weeks - please be kind to our census enumerators and answer their questions. This assures your household is part of the 2010 Census.

Preparing for a Census Call  
What to do when you receive a call from a Census Taker  
Census Bureau numbers are:

- English: 866-851-2010
- Spanish: 866-859-2010
- Russian: 866-848-2010
- Korean: 866-874-2010
- Vietnamese: 866-863-2010
- Chinese: 866-881-2010
- TDD: 866-784-2010

Through mid-August, the Census Bureau will call households who have responded to the 2010 Census if we need to clarify any answers about the number of people living at the address. These calls are simply to clarify answers that have been given and to make sure we count everyone once, only once and in the right place. Not every household will receive a call. The Census Bureau estimates that we may need to call about 8 million households over the four-month period. If you get a call:

• The caller will identify themselves as working for the U.S. Census Bureau and that the purpose of their call is to help the Census Bureau take the most accurate census and to ensure we have counted everyone at the right address.

• The caller ID will likely show "U.S. Census Bureau." If this text is not supported (such as on a cell phone), then the inbound toll-free number should show up. The exact number depends on the language skill for which the call is made. If a household would like to confirm they have been contacted by the Census Bureau, they could call one of the possible numbers above and use the eight-digit case identification number they were provided to complete the interview. The interview will take approximately 10 minutes.

• 2010 Census takers will not ask you for your social security number, bank account number or credit card number.

• 2010 Census takers never solicit for donations and will never contact you by e-mail.

• 2010 Census takers will not ask about your citizenship status.

• The information collected over the phone, as well as provided on the census form or to a census worker in-person, is kept confidential by law, Title 13, U.S. Code - which is the same law that protects all information provided to census employees.

• If the interviewer calls and nobody answers the phone, he or she will leave a message requesting the household to return the call. In addition, a specific case identification number will be provided so the household can call back and complete the interview.

## Area Farm Update

The Illinois winter wheat crop is expected to yield 60 bushels per acre based on conditions as of May 1, four bushels above last year's yield. If this yield is realized, total production would be 19.5 million bushels, 58 percent less than a year ago. Farmers seeded only 350 thousand acres to winter wheat as the result of a very wet fall and expect to harvest 325 thousand acres for grain. This compares to 850 thousand acres seeded and 820 thousand acres harvested in 2009. Winter wheat headed has reached 43 percent as of May 9, well ahead of 19 percent last year, and near the five-year average of 40 percent. The condition of the crop is 2 percent excellent, 31 percent good, 38 percent fair, 25 percent poor, and 4 percent very poor.

Hay stocks in Illinois on May 1st were at 310,000 tons, up three percent from a year ago.

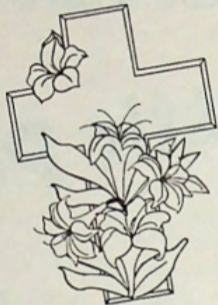

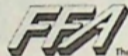

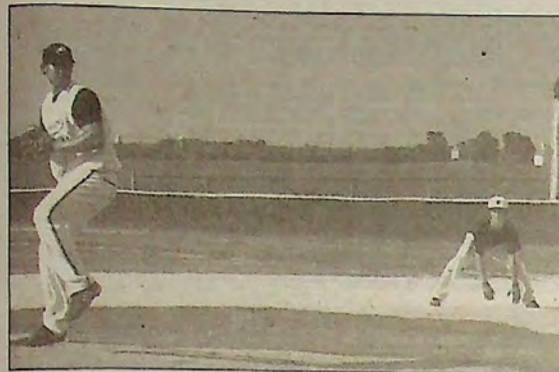


# PC Baseball Season Ends in Regional Championship

Ottawa Marquette's ace pitcher Joey Ceja showed everyone, including three professional baseball scouts, why many in the Illinois Valley have called him "the real deal" on Monday, May 24. Ceja threw a complete game, striking out 12 Panthers in an 8-1 Regional Championship clinching victory.

"Joe Ceja is a great pitcher. He mixes up his speeds well and we were aggressive. He hit him, and when we got behind, he went to the off speed pitch. I tip my hat to him. He did a good job," said

PC head coach Dave Garcia.

"This is a great feeling. We couldn't get it done freshmen year, and everyone is playing great and had confidence, and we got it done today," Ceja said, who added that his curveball was really working along with his fastball.

"He is as good as advertised," said Marquette coach Todd Hopkins before getting drenched with a refreshing water bath. "He is Farve for us. He was awesome," Hopkins added.

In a game that was played in 90-degree heat, Putnam County did everything they could to get to Ceja. However, when opportunity knocked, Ceja and the stifling Crusader defense denied PC any runs except for the third inning. "They are all good hitters from one to nine, especially (Tonozzi) and (Khoauja) can hit homeruns, and I had to spot my pitches and for the most part I did it. The defense was amazing and helped me out," Ceja added.

The Panthers scored when Cody Bornemann would put down a suicide-squeeze bunt, which plated Alonzo Khoauja. "They have hitters up and down their lineup," said Garcia. "Josh Tonozzi pitched a great game. He threw hard. We couldn't get the outs and make the big pitches when we need to," he added.

Tonozzi took the loss, giving up six earned runs off 11 hits. He struck out five and walked two. "Give them credit. They got hits and hit the ball off of Joe," Hopkins added.

"Hop's crazy. He hasn't got any sleep in the last week, and I am glad we could do it for him," Ceja said about winning a regional title for his coach on his former home field.

"You're right. This is sweet as hell. Everyone predicted us to win this thing, and we did. Now we can relax and play. I told them there isn't going to be any more pressure than there was today. I don't think they felt the pressure like I did. I didn't sleep for three days and that is not an exaggeration," Hopkins said.

Mason Synder, who went 2-3 with two homeruns, led Marquette offensively. "He was hitting .460 coming into today's game and he hit two balls hard," Hopkins said. Leading PC offensively was Bornemann who was 2-3 with an RBI.

"PC is a good program. I played here, and it is always nice to come back. Give them credit. They are a young team and I didn't think they went away at all. The score was 8-1, but they are pretty good. They are going to be (darn) good in a couple years, and real good next year," Hopkins said.

Garcia said he had high expectations for next year's team, and had one thing to say to the returning players. "Just keep improving. We are returning 19 victories on the hill and returning a lot of good hitters. They have big shoes to fill," he said.

The loss ended four senior's careers. Gerald Pyszka, Jeff Wujek, Alan Augspols, and Khoauja. Garcia was quick to praise each senior during his postgame interview. While most of their Panther teammates had cleared out of the third base dugout for the last time, Garcia spoke to each of the seniors. "These seniors had their best years this season, and that is what you want out of them. I want to thank Alonzo, Alan, Jeff, and Gerald for four years. They have been great assets to the program," Garcia said.

Source of Drinking Water
The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive material, and can pick up substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.
Contaminants that may be present in source water include: - Microbial contaminants, such as viruses and bacteria, which may come from sewage treatment plants, septic systems, agricultural livestock operations, and wildlife. - Inorganic contaminants, such as salts and metals, which can be naturally-occurring or result from urban storm water runoff, industrial or domestic wastewater discharges, oil and gas production, mining, or farming. - Pesticides and herbicides, which may come from a variety of sources such as agriculture, urban storm water runoff, and residential uses. - Organic chemical contaminants, including synthetic and volatile organic chemicals, which are by-products of industrial processes and petroleum production, and can also come from gas stations, urban storm water runoff, and septic systems. - Radioactive contaminants, which can be naturally-occurring or be the result of oil and gas production and mining activities.

Drinking water, including bottled water, may reasonably be expected to contain at least small amounts of some contaminants. The presence of contaminants does not necessarily indicate that water poses a health risk. More information about contaminants and potential health effects can be obtained by calling the EPA's Safe Drinking Water Hotline at (800) 426-6791.

In order to ensure that tap water is safe to drink, EPA prescribes regulations which limit the amount of certain contaminants in water provided by public water systems. EPA regulations establish limits for contaminants in bottled water which must provide the same protection for public health.

Some people may be more vulnerable to contaminants in drinking water than the general population.

Immuno-compromised persons such as persons with cancer undergoing chemotherapy, persons who have undergone organ transplants, people with HIV/AIDS or other immune system disorders, some elderly and infants can be particularly at risk from drinking water. These people should seek advice about drinking water from their health care providers. EPA/CDC guidelines on appropriate means to lessen the risk of infection by Cryptosporidium and other microbial contaminants are available from the Safe Drinking Water Hotline (800-426-6791).

If present, elevated levels of lead can cause serious health problems, especially for pregnant women and young children. Lead in drinking water is primarily from materials and components associated with service lines and home plumbing. We cannot control the variety of materials used in plumbing components. When your water has been sitting for several hours, you can minimize the potential for lead exposure by flushing your tap for 30 seconds to 2 minutes before using water for drinking or cooking. If you are concerned about lead in your water, you may wish to have your water tested. We want our valued customers to be informed about their water quality. If you would like to learn more, please feel welcome to attend any of our regularly scheduled meetings. The source water assessment for our supply has been completed by the Illinois EPA. If you would like a copy of this information, please stop by City Hall or call our water operator at 815-224-1650. To view a summary version of the completed Source Water Assessments, including: Importance of Source Water; Susceptibility to Contamination Determination; and documentation/recommendation of Source Water Protection Efforts, you may access the Illinois EPA website at <http://www.epa.state.il.us/cgi-bin/wp/wrap-fact-sheets.pl>.

Based on information obtained in a Well Site Survey published in 1992 by the Illinois EPA, several potential sources are located within 1,000 feet of the wells. The Illinois EPA has determined that the Granville Community Water Supply's source water is not susceptible to contamination. This determination is based on a number of criteria including: monitoring conducted at the wells; monitoring conducted at the entry point to the distribution system; and available hydrogeologic data on the wells. Furthermore, in anticipation of the U.S. EPA's proposed Ground Water Rule, the Illinois EPA has determined that the Granville Community Water Supply is not vulnerable to viral contamination. This determination is based upon the evaluation of the following criteria during the Vulnerability Waiver Process: the community's wells are properly constructed with sound integrity and proper siting conditions; a hydraulic barrier exists which should prevent pathogen movement; all potential routes and sanitary defects have been mitigated such that the source water is adequately protected; monitoring data did not indicate a history of disease outbreak; and the sanitary survey of the water supply did not indicate a viral contamination threat. Because the community's wells are constructed in a confined aquifer, which should prevent the movement of pathogens into the wells, well hydraulics were not considered to be a significant factor in the susceptibility determination. Hence, well hydraulics were not evaluated for this system ground water supply.

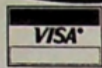
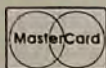

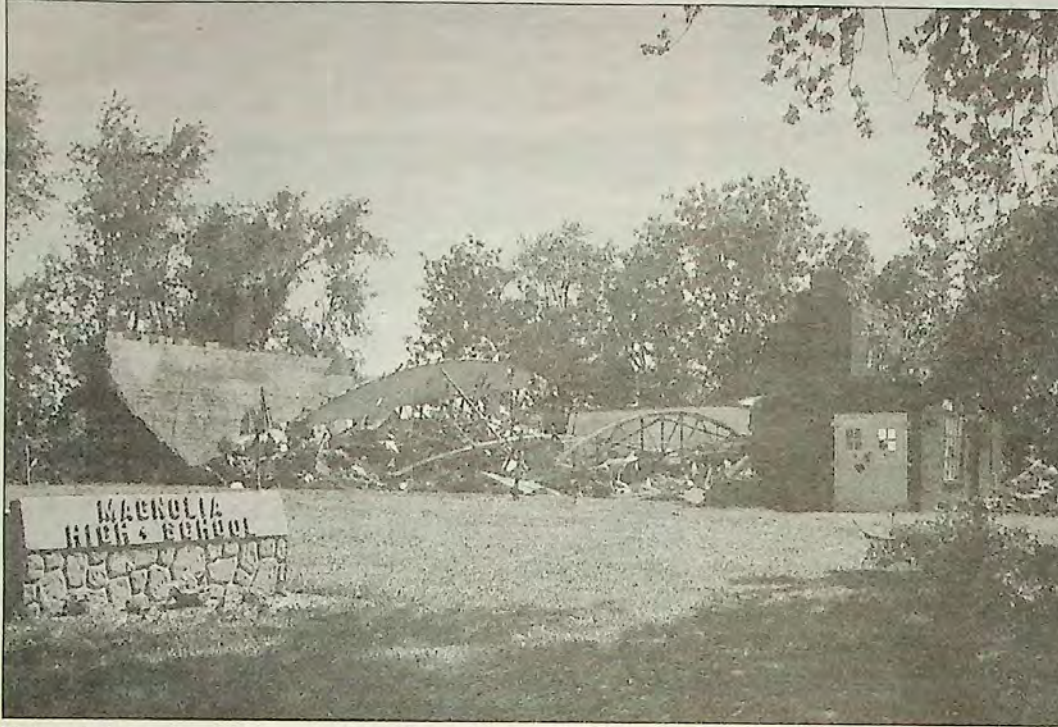

# Tornados Wreak Havoc in Magnolia

All the ingredients were present, and unfortunately Putnam County was not spared the wrath of Mother Nature on Saturday, June 5 as a strong EF2 tornado struck Magnolia.

It was the first tornado in Putnam County since an F2 tornado struck Granville on April 20, 2004. It was the first time also that a tornado had struck the southern part of PC since an F3 tornado devastated McNabb on July 17, 1972.

The tornado sirens started to blare across Putnam County at 7:30 p.m. when a tornado warning was issued. Despite rotation all across the county, no tornado was spotted until law enforcement and trained weather spotters spotted a twister near Magnolia around 8:20 p.m.. According to the National Weather Service, the tornado stayed on the ground until 8:33 p.m., when it dissipated. No injuries or fatalities were reported in Magnolia.

Victor Gensini, formerly of Granville, was a member of the storm survey team that toured Magnolia on Sunday to assess the damage. Gensini explains on how the storms formed and caused the damage. "There were large amounts of moisture (fuel for thunderstorms) created an unstable atmosphere after the thunderstorms from (Friday) departed Saturday morning. More interesting was a seasonably strong jet stream providing very favorable wind shear needed to produce tornadoes."

The storms continued to gain strength as the sun went down. "Daytime heating was still critical in producing the instability (in these storms). However, storms still need a source of lift to get them started. This source of lift was not present until dusk hence the continuance of storms well into the nighttime hours," Gensini said.

Once the tornado left Magnolia, the town went into virtual lockdown, with no one allowed in or out of town. When daylight rolled around on Sunday, law enforcement authorities still requested that people stay away from Magnolia to make sure the rescue efforts were not hampered. Power lines, cell phone towers and trees were down, and complete houses were either destroyed or severely damaged. Many trees were snapped in half or pulled up by the roots as well.

"Ranking tornado damage is not easy. Essentially, something has to get damaged in order to assign an EF status. If a tornado is spotted in an open field doing no damage, it is very hard to assign an EF status. Things like damage to a cell phone tower near Magnolia, houses, power lines, and trees all serve as good indicators as to the highest achieved wind speed of the tornado," Gensini explained. The ranking of the storm was a high rated EF2 tornado with estimated winds at 135 mph. The width of the storm was a half-mile wide and the storm was on the ground for 9.5 miles, and looked like a wedge tornado, according to

the storm survey team's report, found on the National Weather Service's Quad Cities website.

The storm would later affect the Streator area, causing massive damage and up to 17 reports of minor injuries, but no fatalities were reported. Storm survey teams indicated that Streator was struck by an EF2 tornado, which brings wind speeds from 111 to 135 mph. Reports also indicated that a tornado was spotted in Lostant causing a semi to be blown off Interstate 39. The town of Dwight was also affected by the tornado, which also caused EF2 damage.

"While climatology serves as a first guess as to the highest probability of tornadoes on a given day during the year, the fact that PC has not been hit since 2004 is completely random. Putnam is a relatively small county in terms of area, so chances of a touchdown in PC are obviously more rare. Climatologically speaking, the probability of a tornado occurring in PC is the first week of June," Gensini said when asked why a tornado in Putnam County is rare.

There were 164 total severe weather reports across the United States on Saturday, 48 being from tornadoes. Twenty-eight of those tornadoes hit Illinois between Knox and Kankakee counties. The same area that was affected by the tornadoes were all in a moderate risk for severe weather, which means significant severe weather often more than likely.

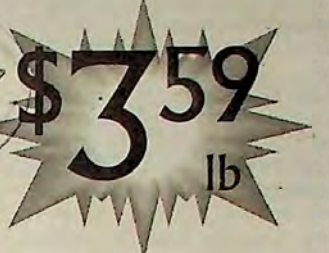
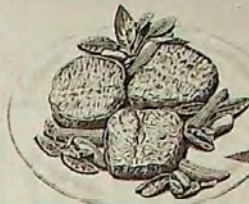

*Well did you get your tax bill this year? Did anything stand out?*

First I would like to thank the #535 School Board members for their fiscal approach to our taxes. Obviously, they budgeted accordingly and only levied what they needed and NOT what they could get from us. Thank you all, employees, administration, and board for your hard work. This entity alone is why your tax bill went down.

Bad news: It would have gone down further if the county paperwork had been done properly. How can that be? Has someone messed up again? Will we ever hear an admission of the mistake or will our county board chairman help cover this one up? Will it cost thousands of county tax dollars again? Can this be an example of why the county government tax rate went up, when nearly ALL other rates went down?

It appears that the ethanol plant was not properly "billed" for their taxes. While the plant gets free taxes from most governmental bodies, they were not to get free taxes from the Granville-Hennepin Fire District. Our fine fire district commissioners worked very hard to budget and plan for the ethanol plant to be taxed and to lower your tax rate, but that did not happen. I WANT TO BE CLEAR. THIS IS NOT THE FAULT OF THE FIRE DISTRICT.

On your tax bill, look at the huge increase (mistake) on the G&H Fire district line. Since the plant was not originally charged for their share, you had to pay more. For most taxpayers, that is \$50-100 more than it should have been.

Will you get it back with interest? Not likely, the county only charges interest. If you pry and prod, you will be told

that the county is going to bill the ethanol plant, collect an extra \$100,000 this year and refund you next year. Remember, the treasurer only collects what the county clerk's office calculates.

If you ask why it happened, you may hear an accusation of fault pointed at North Central Council of Governments (NCICG). In past years, IVCC was blamed for similar mistakes. These organizations exist to strengthen our community and they do that very well. Shame on PC government for allowing the blame to be placed on these fine organizations, when the error is clearly the fault of one office.

My point is that you have an example of fiscally sound

planning and it only took a careless and preventable error to change the perception of the fire district. Everyone makes mistakes, but one must first admit the mistake so it does not happen again. The tax levy has been ill prepared before, by the same person, year after year. This cannot continue.

It is time for the person to step forward and accept full responsibility. It is equally important for the county board chairman to stop defending the person and insure that measures are taken to prevent these costly mistakes. Please consider attending the June 14th Putnam County Board meeting to ask "HOW or WHY?"

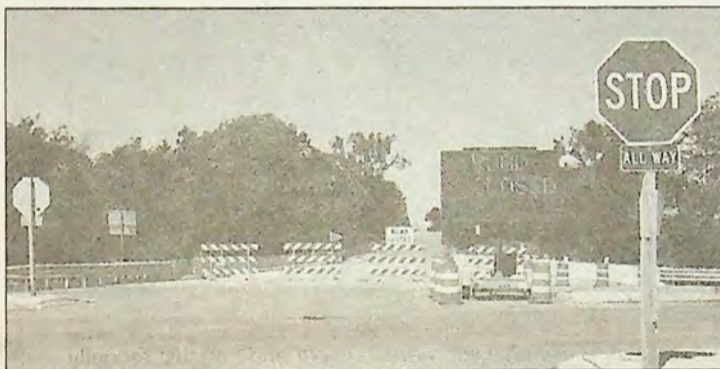
# Clean Up Will Continue for Sometime

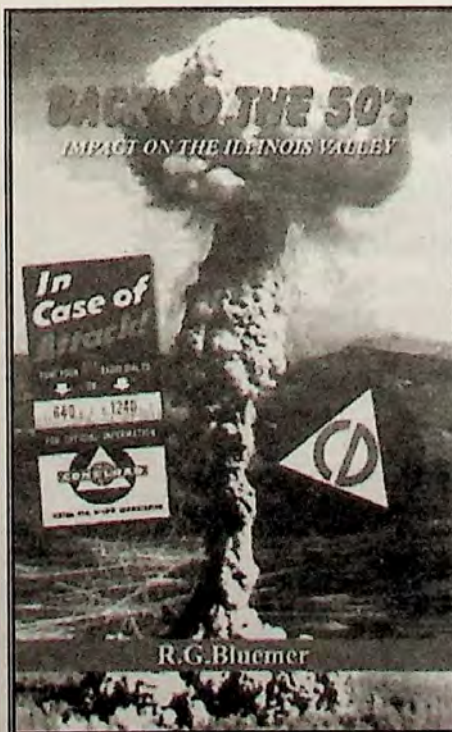

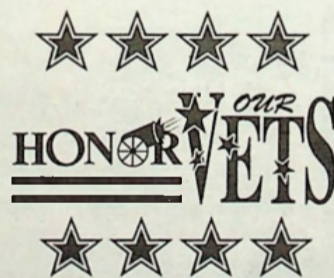

## Farming

Isolated showers, some heavy at times, caused variable amounts of precipitation across the state last week. Some producers were able to get into their fields for corn and soybean replanting due to earlier ponding. Most of Illinois experienced sunshine and heat last week with above normal temperatures and below normal precipitation. Temperatures averaged 75.4 degrees, 9.6 degrees above normal across the state. Statewide precipitation averaged 0.64 inches, 0.40 inches below normal, with 4.2 days suitable for fieldwork. Corn emergence is at 94 percent, well ahead of the five-year average of 82%. Soybeans are 73% planted compared to the five-year average of 71%. Soybean emergence is at 49% compared to the five-year average of 45%. Winter wheat is 94% headed, 62% filled, and 21% of the crop is turning yellow. Topsoil moisture was rated 3% short, 68% adequate and 29% surplus. Corn condition is 1% very poor, 5% poor, 18% fair, 59% good, and 17% excellent.

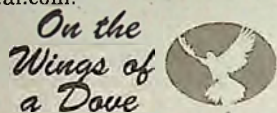

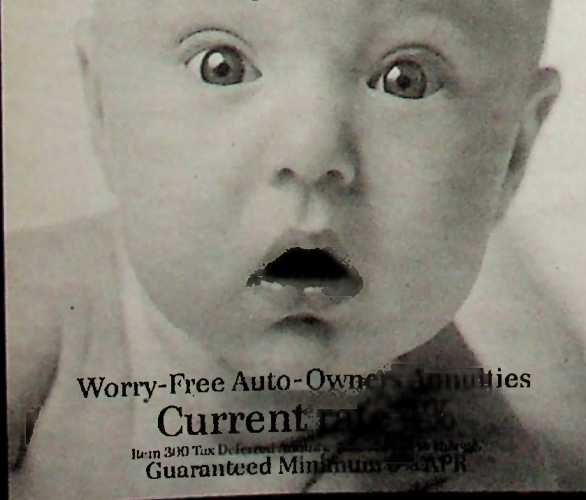

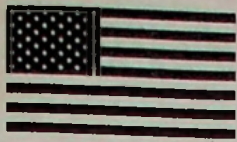

It has been reported to the State's Attorney's Office that there is a new scam being perpetrated in our County. The scam artists are sending out large checks in hand-addressed envelopes. They also enclose a letter stating that you have won a promotion and are entitled to an even larger sum of money. The particular scam reported to the State's Attorney's Office had a letter from Manulife Financial of Niagara Falls. The check was drawn on Wells Fargo Bank of Alaska. The check appears very authentic; however, if you have not entered a particular drawing you did not win. Do not cash the check. Do not forward any funds to collect the remainder of your promised winnings.

Scams such as this try to obtain money in several ways. If you deposit the check, you may be providing the scam artists with your bank account information. If you forward a check to these individuals, they will not only have a check for the amount forwarded, but also your account information. Additionally, in some instances, if you call the number listed on the letters, it may operate as a 900 number and place a substantial charge to your phone bill. If you receive a letter that you believe to be a scam, you should report the same to the United States Postal Service. You can do so on-line at <https://postalinspectors.uspis.gov>.

In these difficult economic times, it is tempting to try to obtain the fraudulent winnings. However, not only will you not receive any money, you may possibly lose your own money or have your identity stolen. Please take appropriate precautions for yourself and any friends and family, who may be more vulnerable to such types of fraud.

## IEEMA, FEMA, SBA to Begin Tornado Damage Assessments

IL Emergency Management Agency, Federal Emergency Management Agency, U.S. Small Business Administration and local officials from Peoria, Putnam, LaSalle, Livingston and Kankakee counties will begin making tornado damage assessments on the affected communities. The tornadoes caused damage in these five counties on June 5th.

The assessments are set to start on Monday June 14 and continue until all are complete.

The assessment teams met on the 14th to determine where each team would begin. The media were invited to observe an assessment team as they viewed the damaged homes and businesses.

The tornadoes that struck on June 5th left a path of destruction through Peoria, Putnam, LaSalle, Livingston and Kankakee counties. Governor Pat Quinn named all

five counties as state disaster areas and the state continues to provide assistance with clean up efforts in these affected communities. The damage assessments will provide

detailed information about the extent of the damage to help state officials determine what, if any, form of federal assistance might be available to affected residents.

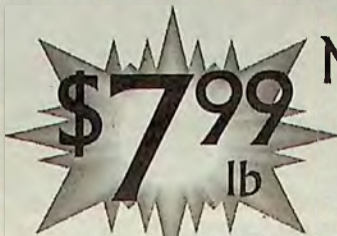

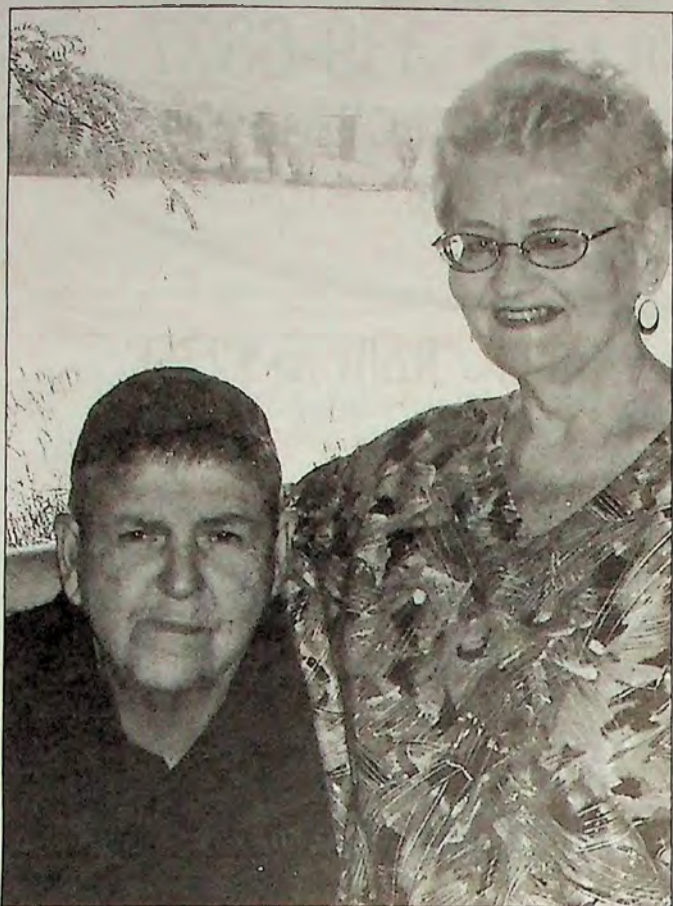

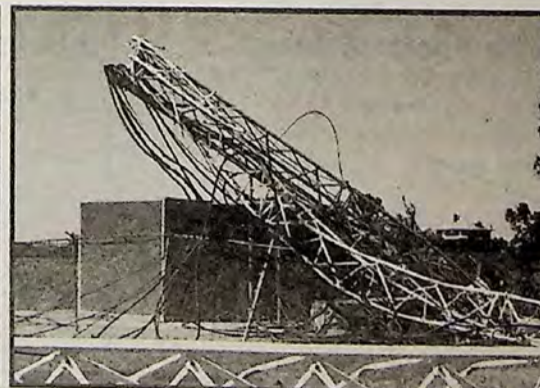

**Hear His Word**

**Prayer of St. Augustine**

In the recent past, this community has celebrated the veterans from this County having the opportunity to visit and see the World War II Memorial in Washington D.C., the celebration of Memorial Day in our County, and the tornado damages in Magnolia. If that was not enough, we continue to be reminded daily of the oil spill and natural disaster in the Gulf, and the continued economic downturn and loss of jobs in our county, society and nation.

Therefore, I believe in these days of tension, pressure, stress and strain one of our deepest needs is to discover the meaning of prayer.

In prayer we link ourselves with all the centuries and with all generations. Doctrines and theories change, forms of church government and policy serve their day and pass away, styles of architecture and patterns of worship differ with the centuries, but the experience of prayer remains essentially the same.

Here we have much to learn from the saints. They probed to the depths the meaning of the spiritual life. No one can tell another how to pray. No one can really express another's prayer for them. One can study, ponder, meditate on the prayers of some of the great souls. This reveals to us the faith by which they lived, the content of the prayers that enriched their lives, and in turn can serve as a stimulus and guide as we would develop resources for our day, such as they had for theirs.

For example, read this prayer of St. Augustine written over fifteen centuries ago:

*O Thou Good Omnipotent, Who so carest for every one of us, as if Thou carest for him alone; and so for all, as if all were but one! Blessed is the man who loveth Thee, and his friends in Thee, and his enemy for Thee. For he only loses none dear to him to whom all are dear in Him who cannot be lost. And who is that but our God, the God that made heaven and earth, and filleth them, even by filling them and creating them. And Thy law is truth, and truth is Thyself. I behold how some things pass away that others may replace them, but Thou dost never depart, O God, my Father supremely good, Beauty of all things beautiful. To Thee will I entrust whatsoever I have received from Thee, so shall I lose nothing. Thou madest me for Thyself, and my heart is restless until it repose in thee. Amen.*

- Augustine

Augustine was a person whose massive intellect has made a tremendous impact on the history of Christendom. Augustine produced huge volumes of works which have commanded the attention of scholars for centuries. His *Confessions* is recognized everywhere as one of the classics of devotional and autobiographical literature.

However, the one thing for which he is best known and will be the longest remembered is the one sentence found in this prayer, as it is usually quoted, "Thou hast made us for Thyself and our hearts are restless until they find their rest in Thee."

This is one of those statements of spiritual genius that is made once in a generation. It is one of those sentences that lives through the centuries because of its great insight and spiritual truth.

Like Pascal's statement, "The heart has reasons that reason does not know," it condenses into a few words whole volumes of meaning.

Perhaps the reason for the oft quoted statement at the end of the prayer goes back to the faith expressed in the first sentence of the prayer. "O Thou Good Omnipotent, Who so carest for every one of us, as if Thou carest for him alone; and so for all, as if all were but one!" Here is the essence of Christian theology; here is the basis of the Christian faith.

God, omnipotent in power, is a God who cares for everyone. Everyone! Such a basic trust is our source of courage, hope, and peace. (This article is dedicated to the citizens in Magnolia, and the people in the Magnolia area that had damages from the tornado.)

Johnie E. Baxter, 89 of Mark died June 11, 2010 in IVCH, Peru.

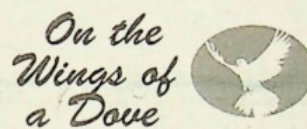
Visitation was held in Helmer-Shields Funeral Home, Granville, on June 13 with services and burial in Eaton Cemetery in Missouri on June 16.

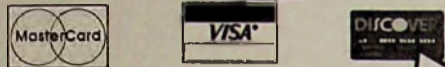

## Preserving History in Granville

Two beautiful bronze tablets were installed on the front of the Granville Village Hall that the class of 1929 gave to their high school when they graduated. One is in Memoriam of the early settlers of Putnam County. The first part of the inscription on the tablet says, "They blazed the trail into the big bend of the Illinois River. Carved from the wilderness their simple homesteads and laid the foundation of community life upon which the later generations builded."

The second tablet is in Memoriam of the Nation's Defenders from Putnam County: soldiers, sailors, and Marines of all wars.

Joe Panier, past president of the Hopkins High School Alumni, contacted Mayor Doug Gimbal and asked if the two tablets could be displayed somewhere at the Village Hall.

Mayor Gimbal and the Village Board gave permission, and it was decided to mount them on each side of the entrance to the Village Hall. The bronze tablets had been in storage since the 2004 tornado swept through Granville destroying the building holding Hopkins High School history. The tablets needed cleaned and restored. Norman Liles, owner of PC Painting, volunteered to restore them without charge. Many of you readers will recognize some of the names listed here.

Dean M. Iman was Principal of Hopkins High in 1929, 23 students were in the graduating class consisting of Dorothy Olson, President; Mary Kaletka, Vice-President; Anna Moreta, Secretary and these students; Albert Anderson, Jean Capitani, Howard Dunavan, Rose Gordon, Lorraine Johnson, Mary Barnato, Margaret Dally, Elizabeth Ernat, Ellen Hanson,

Louise Leoni, Ruth Levenborg, Elvera Nelson, Hilda Olson, Alyce Sharp, Henry Siekierka, Jennie Miglion, John Nielsen, Margaret Pletsch, Joe Shevokas and Ethel Thorsen.

Hopkins High School's first class was in 1918 and the last class was in 1966 when Putnam County School District 535 was formed.

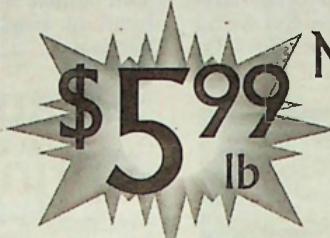

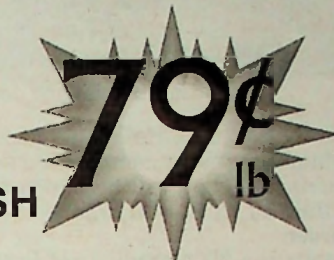

## Signup for Transition Incentives for Retiring and Beginning Producers

Signup has begun for the Transition Incentives to Help Retiring and Beginning Producers Program (TIP) according to Scherrie Giamanco, USDA Illinois Farm Service Agency State Executive Director.

TIP is a new program under the Conservation Title of the 2008 Farm Bill to encourage retired or retiring owners or operators to transition their land to beginning or socially disadvantaged farmers or ranchers.

To be eligible, TIP requires that the retired or retiring producer have land enrolled in the Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) that is in the last year of the contract; agrees to allow the beginning or socially disadvantaged farmer or rancher to make conservation and land improvements; agrees to sell, have a contract to sell, or agrees to long-term lease (a minimum of 5 years) the land under CRP contract to a beginning or socially disadvantaged farmer or rancher by Oct. 1 of the year the CRP contract expires.

Since TIP was just announced, an exception exists for CRP contracts that expired September 30, 2008 and September 30, 2009 and they may be eligible to be enrolled now with an effective date of October 1.

 The sources of drinking water (both tap water and bottled water) include rivers, lakes, streams, ponds, reservoirs, springs, and groundwater wells. As water travels over the surface of the land or through the ground, it dissolves naturally-occurring minerals and, in some cases, radioactive materials, and can pickup substances resulting from the presence of animals or from human activity.

To determine Hennepin's susceptibility to groundwater contamination, the Illinois Rural Water Association conducted a well site survey in October, 2002. Based on the information obtained in this document, there are 13 potential sources of groundwater contamination that could pose a hazard to groundwater utilized by Hennepin's community water supply. These include 1 chemical handling facility, 1 manufacturing process, 1 boat yard, 1 sales store, 2 onsite sludge disposals, 2 injection wells, 2 water treatment plants, and 3 above ground fuel storage tanks. In addition, information provided by the Leaking Underground Storage Tank and Remedial Project Management Sections of the Illinois EPA indicated sites with on-going remediation that might be of concern. According to the Hennepin PWD facility, LTV Steel Co. and the associated injection well and water treatment plant have been sold to the International Steel Group. However, the sludge disposal associated with this site is no longer active. Based upon this information, the Illinois EPA has determined that the Hennepin Community Water Supply's source water is susceptible to contamination. As such, the Illinois EPA has provided 5-year recharge area calculations for the wells. The land use within the recharge areas of the wells was analyzed as part of this susceptibility determination. This land use includes residential, commercial and agricultural properties.

To view a summary version of the completed Source Water Assessments, including: Importance of Source Water; Susceptibility to Contamination Determination; and documentation/recommendation of Source Water Protection Efforts, you may access the Illinois EPA website at <http://www.epa.state.il.us/cgi-bin/wp/swap-fact-sheets.pl>.

To determine Hennepin's susceptibility to groundwater contamination, the Illinois Rural Water Association conducted a well site survey in October, 2002. Based on the information obtained in this document, there are 13 potential sources of groundwater contamination that could pose a hazard to groundwater utilized by Hennepin's community water supply. These include 1 chemical handling facility, 1 manufacturing process, 1 boat yard, 1 sales store, 2 onsite sludge disposals, 2 injection wells, 2 water treatment plants, and 3 above ground fuel storage tanks. In addition, information provided by the Leaking Underground Storage Tank and Remedial Project Management Sections of the Illinois EPA indicated sites with on-going remediation that might be of concern. According to the Hennepin PWD facility, LTV Steel Co. and the associated injection well and water treatment plant have been sold to the International Steel Group. However, the sludge disposal associated with this site is no longer active. Based upon this information, the Illinois EPA has determined that the Hennepin Community Water Supply's source water is susceptible to contamination. As such, the Illinois EPA has provided 5-year recharge area calculations for the wells. The land use within the recharge areas of the wells was analyzed as part of this susceptibility determination. This land use includes residential, commercial and agricultural properties.

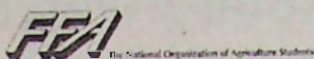

#### Hear His Word

Services were June 21 in the Hurst Funeral Home, LaSalle. Burial was in Magnolia Cemetery.

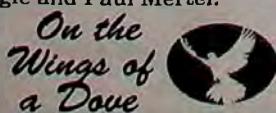

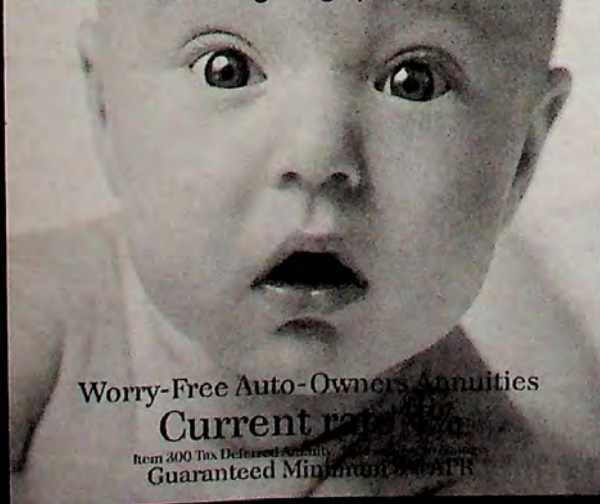

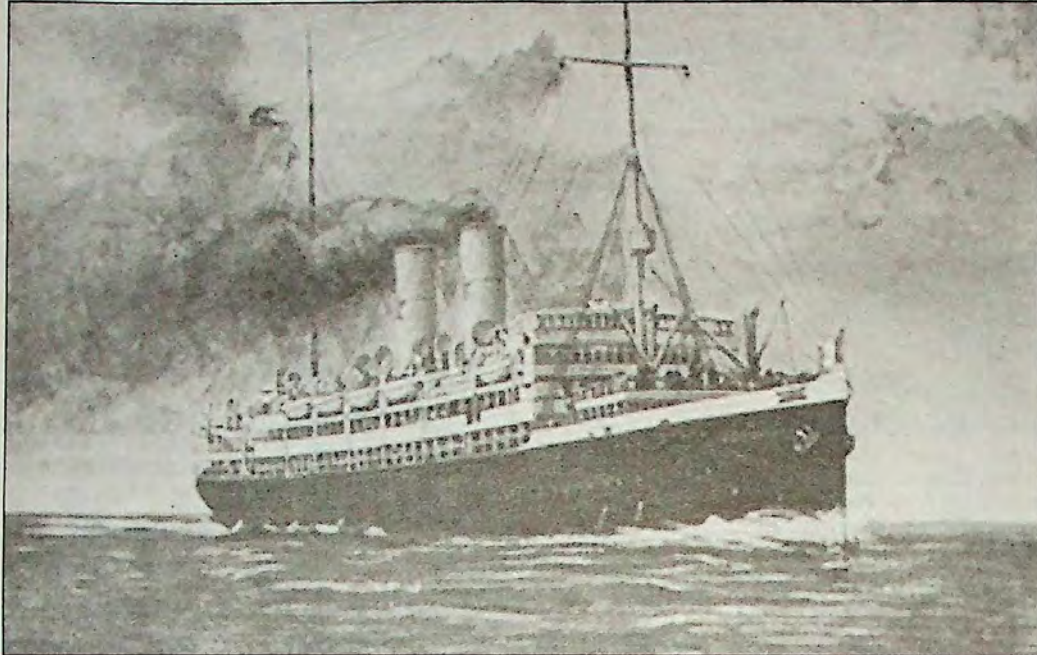

# Ettore and Ersilla Capitani Come to America

Ettore Capitani, at 31 years old, left his home in Gazzio Mou in Northern Italy in November of 1912 and arrived at Ellis Island, NY on November 12, 1912. He sailed on the Duca di Genova from the port of Genoa, Italy. The ship was built for Italiana Line and flew the Italian flag. In 1907 it grossed

War I.

Before leaving Italy Capitani worked in Germany as did a lot of Italians during that time. He returned to Italy and married Ersilla Malavolti and had two children. He then came back to Granville and was a brick layer mason. He worked at the Mark mine taking care of the fire furnaces relaying the

feet long and 55 feet wide, had steam triple expansion engines. It had a speed of 16 knots with 2,500 passengers; 100 first class and 2,400 third class.

Eddie's mother's ship was also torpedoed and sunk by a German submarine in the Aegean sea on August 16, 1916. Their daughter Giano was five years old, and their son Bruno was three years old, both born in Italy before coming on the ship with their mother. Enis was born in the U.S., the same as Eddie who was born here in 1923.

Eddie remembers his mother milking goats, and he would not drink it, but local kids with colic would and it helped them.

There was a bachelor who hung around bars in town, he had ulcers from drinking, and about every other day he would come and get goat milk from Eddie's mother.

Eddie's dad, Ettore, started Cap's Service Station, where he repaired cars, did body and fender work, and sold new and used cars. He was a dealer for Dodge and Plymouth. He opened the station in 1934 on McCoy Street in the same building that now is the Corner Store. In 1942 Ettore retired and rented the station out to Miles Schermerhorn.

Bruno went into the Army at this time. He had been working or his dad. Eddie also helped at the station pumping gas. He remembers they sold three different grades of gas: regular, high test, and ethel high octane. Eddie left for the Army in 1943, serving in Africa during World War II where it was extremely hot.

After the war in 1952 Ersilla and her daughter, Giano, went to the Vatican in Rome where

they got to meet the Pope. Ersilla's sister worked for the Pope.

When the two Capitani brothers, Bruno and Eddie returned from the War, they opened up Capitani Brothers Hardware Store on McCoy Street on the west side. I remember Eddie being at our house north of Granville in the 1950's.

I also remember watching Bobby Thomson hit the winning home run - "The Home Run Heard 'Round the World" off of Dodger pitcher Ralph Blanco in Capitani's Hardware Store on October 3, 1951 winning the National League pennant for

the Ny Giants. Eddie, Bruno and several other locals also watched the event.

The Capitani Brothers always welcomed people to come in and watch the TVs they sold. They provided chairs to sit on around the then black and white TVs.

I would like to thank Eddie for the use of his pictures, and the story of his parents coming to American, on two different ships, and having both ships blown up by the German Navy during World War I. Eddie's son, Norman Capitani, found the information on the ships that his grandparents used to come to America, on the internet.

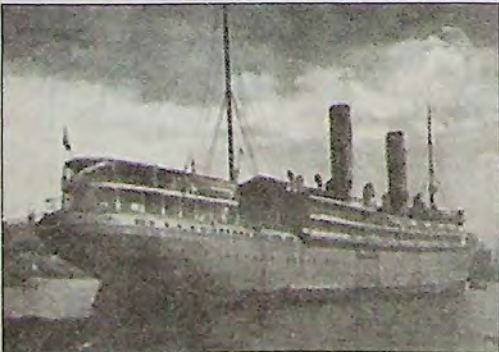

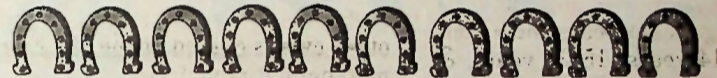


## Harness Racing Begins Wednesday
