Reverend Brian Caughlan – A True Man of God

Rev. Brian Caughlan has left the New Hope Parish which made up the UMCs in Hennepin, Magnolia and McNabb. He departed on June 28th. He will be moving to serve the United Methodist Church in Auburn between Springfield and St. Louis.

The Bishop in Springfield decided to move Rev. Brain to Auburn to a larger church with a membership of 200. The pastor there is retiring. Brian has enjoyed living in Hennepin and said a good part of him hates to leave, but he is also glad for the new challenge and is excited about the ministry he will be able to do there.

He fell in love with this place, making good friends, wonderful relationships with the people here but trusts the system and hope he brought to the churches will leave them where they need to be.

When the new pastor, Carol Stufflebeam, comes she will take them further. Pastor Brian said, "God feels I have done as much as I can here and it is time or someone else."

Pastor Brian is looking forward to living fulltime with his wife, Francie, in Auburn because she works in Springfield for the state and he was in Hennepin most of the time. He will also be closer to his daughter, Beckie, who is married and lives in Missouri and is expecting a ranchchild for Brian.

Brian was born in Washington DC, lived in Columbus OH, grew up and went to school in Philadelphia PA. His father went into the ministry and was a pastor for a lot of Danish Lutheran churches. Brian joined the Navy for six years and became a photographer there. He moved to the St. Louis area in 1980. After leaving the navy, he joined the Air National Guard for 16 years. He had always wanted to be a journalist and never dreamed of being a photographer. He is now glad he never became a journalist.

Brian met his wife while at work on active duty with the

Nir National Guard. Francie served 21 years in the Air National Guard as secretary to the commander. They both were part of the 1st Tactical Fighter Wing, where Brian served as a photographer. He knew Francie a long time before they started dating. She was a wonderful friend and they started going out. They married in 1989. He was working as a photographer for McDonald Douglas in St. Louis. They laid him off so he went into business for himself, working in photo labs around the campus.

I asked Brian how he decided to go into the ministry. He said, "The Holy Spirit was leading me into the ministry. I always had that little voice saying, 'God wants you to go into the ministry.' I resisted and would not do it."

He had grown up in a home of a minister and knew it was a difficult life since you had to live in a fish bowl, and he did not want to do this to his daughter. All the time he was constantly reminded that God wanted him to join the ministry. People would say to him, "You would make a good pastor. You are in the wrong field. Get out of the photography business."

The more he said 'no' he sensed God finally pushing him into it – after he lost his job. It became quite obvious that this was what God wanted him to do. Brian said, "Last Sunday the gospel text was about Allison hearing the voice of God. Sometimes God has a small voice, sometimes God comes through by hitting you with a 2X4."

At this time his father-in-law had a conversation with him about going to college full time. Brian told him, "I can't because I work full time." Then the photo lab said, "We don't need you for three months." Finally he surrendered to God. He enrolled in Jr. College that weekend.

The Associate Pastor in his home church left the ministry and they needed a part time assistant to the pastor. Then a friend called him that ran a photo shop and offered a half time job. It had become really obvious that this is what God wanted him to do. Brian told his wife that when he decided to do this he would not put them in a financial bind. He was offered a part time job in a funeral home. He became a full time student and was able to get his education, four years of college and four years in the seminary.

Rev. Caughlan earned his BA in History and Religious Studies from McKendree College, a Methodist college in Lebanon in 1999. He completed his Master of Divinity in 2003 from Eden Theological Seminary. He really had a good professor

at his first college. After he graduated he was sent to E. St. Louis. Brian said, The people there were terrific, they loved me, and I loved them. It was important for them to be faithful."

He worked there as an associate pastor doing a lot of community organization and it bore fruit. But he was not teaching or preaching, and that's why he went to school. He was ordained, and he wanted to serve. He asked for an appointment and was appointed as the associate pastor at Niedring Haus UMC in Granite City. He then became Senior Pastor at Trinity UMC

in Granite City.

In September 2003 Rev. Brad Brault of the Hennepin UMC and his daughter lost their lives in a tragic car accident. The church continued on with lay ministers and guests. The Bishop told Rev. Caughlan that the Methodist Church in Hennepin needed someone who would walk with them and lead them into the future, and appointed Brian to the church. Brian's first thought was rural area?

Since moving to Hennepin and Putnam County he has volunteered to be the Chaplain for the Hennepin Fire Dept., EMT, he is on the Senior Center

Board, Emergency Shelter and Food Board, Hennepin Business Men's Assoc., and Putnam County Library District. He also worked with the Community Partners Against Substance Abuse. Rev. Brian is so fearful for the young people of our county. He said, "Until someone somewhere says this is just insane, and we have to stop it, it will be here. Substance abuse has no respect for any family, it cuts across all families. Alcohol is a drug just as the illegal drugs are, and now the subscription drugs are a big problem. The solution is that families have to get back to church. It is not only in our community, but everywhere. The families have moved away from the foundations of the church and do not embrace the religious communities."

He has read all the books that the experts have written on how to get families back into church. Kids do not have that foundation, and there is no one answer. Rev. Brian thinks it is important for him to get out of the church and into the community. It is important for him to go into Moreno's Restaurant, or walk the streets in Magnolia. When he is in the communities he might never say, "Take Jesus Name," but he is representing him. If one just sits in the church and acts holy that's OK but one may not get anything done. The Pastor is not just a Pastor in the church, but of the community. Being with the people is part of the ministry. "I am representing God while I am there with them."

Rev. Brian loves Volkswagon cars, especially the Beetle. He learned to drive his father's 1958 Beetle and ever since has had a love affair with them. He said that now he will have time to work on the 1979 yellow Beetle he bought from my wife Jeanne! It's in the garage and he is going to get down to business and tear it apart

Each box costs \$1,000.00 and is sponsored by Rotary Clubs, service clubs, school and church groups, businesses and individuals throughout the USA and around the world.

The standard Shelter Box is sent instantly to natural and manmade disasters by delivering boxes of aid to those who are most in need (such as earthquakes, volcanoes, floods, hurricane, cyclones, tsunamis or conflicts and have helped over 100 disasters in more than 70 countries. The box weighs 110 lbs. They are sealed and banded for transit and security. Box contents vary depending on the nature of the disaster requiring their use. The relief tent is supplied for a family of up to 10 people with a tent and essential equipment to use while they are displaced or homeless.

Stop by the booth at the Marshall-Putnam Fair to see the contents of the Shelter Box and if you so desire, make a donation. Since the tent takes up too much space, it will not be set up, but pictures are available.

Brian has planted many, many seeds so it is up to you to make the seeds grow. So, Brian, from all of us - thank you."

It was then open mike time. Linda Litherland took the mike and said, "I am attending to the meal that the Hennepin Methodist Church was going to have this evening for the new pastor who would attend to meet his parishioners. I was in the basement when the door opened and a man and woman who were all dressed up entered. I asked if they were the new minister and he said, 'maybe.' They had arrived early to check out where they would be living, thinking it would take quite a while to check the town out." They lived the first two weeks with the Litherlands while the parsonage was being remodeled.

The following people remembered Rev. Brian: Elaine Gauden, Peter Lovell, Jan Ringenberg, Carol Miller, Steven Malavolti, Leo McCauley, Mary McQuilkin, Hennepin Mayor Kevin Coleman and Mary Miller, who finished by telling that Rev. Caughlan was the minister at her mother's funeral and he spoke of her mother like he had known her all his life, although he had never met her.

Rev. Brian came to the mike and as he did six year old Paige Terando did, too. Rev. Brian said, "Here is my good friend, Paige."

Paige pulled the mike down and said, "Pastor Brian's a good minister,"

Rev. Brian said, "Paige was the first baptism I had here."

Paige said, "That's cool."

Rev. Brian said, "When I was told I was going to a town of 750 people, I thought I will

never get a good signal there on my cell phone. I might as well forget the internet, there will not be any public TV. I will never forget the first time I came up Rt. 71 and saw Marko's Restaurant the first time and thought 'that's really some kind of fine restaurant.' It ended up one of my favorite restaurants! Francie and I stayed in a hotel the first night here. My first day in Hennepin was January 2, 2004. I pulled up to the church, a gentleman came walking across from the courthouse and said, 'Are you going to be our new minister?' I said yes. It was Don Camatti, the first man I met. Three years ago I went to the Magnolia and McNabb churches when the New Hope Parish was formed. They made me feel the way Hennepin had. I loved serving in all three villages. Each community has their own personalities, they are very different places, all in their own way, they are all decent, people. I really hate leaving here. I loved going to Moreno's for the chicken. There are all good restaurants in Putnam County. I loved Ray's Place and Pauline's chicken, too. I am excited about being with my wife, and excited about the ministry possibilities in Auburn. I wanted to retire here, but Francie's family are all south of here so we will retire down there. Goodbye, Peace Be With You."

When I met Rev. Brian Caughlan, the thing that struck me about him was his openness, accessibility, and his warmth. He is not only known in his churches, but also in the PC communities. He is a wonderful man of God. I like his style and how he makes people feel. He has been an inspiration to me as he has been for everyone who meets him. Peace Be With You too, Rev. Brian.

Sheriff's News Release

CAMPAIGN FRAUD ADVISORY

Sheriff Kevin L. Doyle of Putnam County is advising County residents that there is currently underway a phone campaign fraudulently using the name of the Illinois Sheriff's Association in their solicitation. The Illinois Sheriff's Association never solicits by phone but does conduct a direct mail campaign throughout the state of Illinois endorsed by the Sheriff.

Telemarketing fraud costs billions of dollars each year. Phone solicitors who want you to "act immediately" or are offering a "too good to be true" opportunity are most likely fraudulent. Remember that if you have any doubts, or are highly pressured - just hang up.

You have the right to ask for the following information:

- 1) The name, address and phone number of the organization for which they are soliciting.
- 2) The name, address and phone number of the telemarketing firm.
- 3) The percentage of every dollar paid to the telemarketing firm.
- 4) Insist on something in writing prior to making a pledge or commitment.

If you cannot get the answers to these questions do not hesitate to hang up the phone. After all, it is your money.

Although there are some legitimate organizations that use telemarketers for their fundraising efforts, the Sheriffs of Illinois, through the Illinois Sheriff's Association, are adamantly opposed to police groups and associations using telemarketers in their fundraising efforts. Again, the Illinois Sheriff's Association never solicits by phone. Should you receive a call from someone saying they represent your local sheriff or the Illinois Sheriff's Association and are asking for donations, contact the Sheriff's Office immediately at 815/925-7084 or gather as much information as you can from the caller and report it to the Illinois Sheriff's Association at 1-800-840-2776.

Woman Locked in Car Trunk

On June 27 at approximately 6:30 p.m. the Putnam county Sheriff's Office received a 911 call from a 20 year old woman who reported that she was locked in the trunk of her own vehicle. The vehicle was located at approximately 7:15 p.m. in Granville township, approximately two miles west of IL Hwy 89 on West bottom Road in Putnam County.

The investigation revealed that the incident started in LaSalle County near Mendota. LaSalle County investigators have interviewed the victim and continue to collect evidence and interviews with other potential witnesses are continuing.

At this time no arrests have been made.

The investigation being conducted by Putnam and LaSalle County Sheriff's offices continues. Further information will be released when it becomes available.

John Gapinski Recovering in Springfield from Washington Mills Plant Accident

An industrial accident at Washington Mills Hennepin Inc. (formerly Exolon-ESK) on Mon., June 21, resulted in severe burns for John Gapinski who has worked at the company for 30 years. He remains in critical condition in the burn unit at Medical Center, 701 N. First St., Springfield, IL 62781. Plant officials would not release the name of the employee.

Washington Mills produces silicon carbide, which is used in grinding wheels, sand paper, wire sawing for granite and other applications, according to Ron Campbell, the corporation's chief operating officer.

According to a press release from Washington Mills, "a combination of hot gases and material emitted from the furnace during the cooling process and covered the employee." Plant personnel provided first aid.

"No other serious injury of this nature has ever occurred at this facility since it began operations nearly 30 years ago," the release stated. The release did state there was a minor incident at the Hennepin plant on Friday, June 18.

"On behalf of the company, we want to express our deepest concern for this employee. We have expressed our concern to the family and offered our

full support to them in any means possible. Our thoughts and prayers are with his family at this time. No additional employees were injured in this accident and the operations of the facility are continuing. However, at this time the company's primary concern is for the welfare of our injured employee and his family, first and foremost," plant manager Armand Ladage noted in the release.

Campbell, who normally works from the company's office in Niagara Falls, was at the Hennepin plant this week along with an environmental health and safety manager who will spend the week examining the situation with the Occupational Safety and Health Administration.

"It's a very unfortunate incident," Campbell said. "We need to determine why it happened and make sure it doesn't happen again."

The victim's wife, Mary, stated that doctors expect it would be months before he is released. The couple lives in Spring Valley.

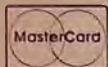

As I was driving away, with a heavy heart, I started thinking of what Hennepin means to me. The words for this poem came to my mind. The sweet memories are comforting as I start this

new adventure. I would like to leave this with you until we meet again.

IVCC President Jerry Corcoran Featured Speaker at PCEF Meeting

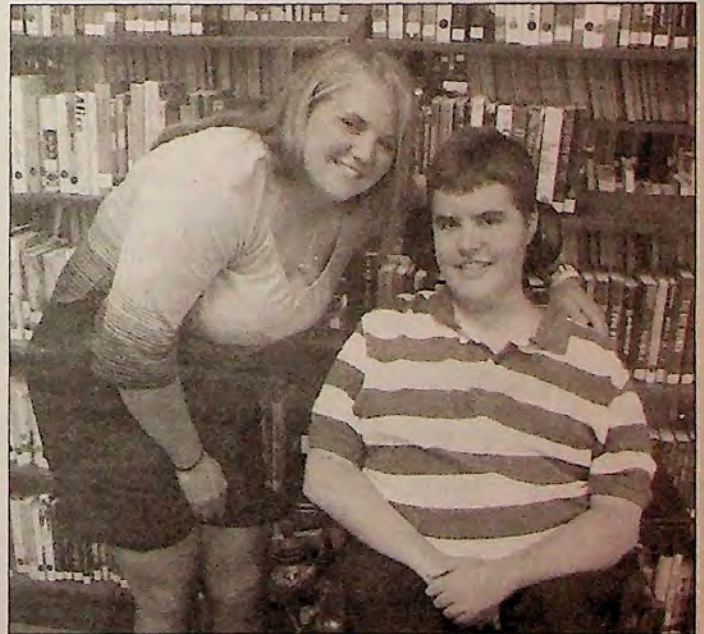
Emphasizing the value and quality of obtaining an education at IVCC, President Jerry Corcoran spoke to the attendees at the 2010 Annual Meeting of the Putnam County Educational Foundation (PCEF) held at Putnam county High School June 8. Corcoran described the history of the community college movement and IVCC while pointing out the increasingly important role community colleges play in helping students continue their educations after leaving high school. Students wishing to obtain degrees from four year institutions of higher learning find this route to be affordable because of the opportunity to save tens of thousands of dollars by first attending IVCC for two years. Other students wishing to more directly enter the work force can do so quickly by learning skills at IVCC which will make them very employable.

Reed Wilson, Chairman of the PCEF Board of Trustees, introduced President Corcoran by pointing out that under Corcoran's leadership – even though he had held the position of President for barely two years – IVCC was entering a golden era for the College. He referred to the all-time record attendance the establishment of a satellite campus in Ottawa and the plans to build the 76,000 square foot, #40 million Community Technology Center on the Oglesby campus which will break ground next summer.

In other Annual Meeting business, PCEF Vice President John Redshaw reported on the student enrichment activities of the PCEF over the years. He noted that thousands of Putnam County students had been positively impacted through PCEF grants for educational technology, fine arts programming and a wide variety of teacher mini-grants for special classroom projects. Of special note is the PCEF support each year for the Accelerated Reading Program which results in massive reading increases by PC students and strong performances on standardized reading programs.

Redshaw also pointed out the work of the PCEF would be more important than ever during the next few years as tight PC School budgets might force cutbacks – leaving the PCEF to help fill the budget gaps. Upcoming PCEF fundraising events will be the Winestock event and a trivia contest – both to be held this fall.

Finally, the Putnam County High School graduates and college students receiving scholarships from the five scholarships administered by the PCEF were recognized.

Standard FPD Has New Hovercraft for Rescue

Standard Fire Department has a new Hovercraft now in service. Personnel took delivery from Hovertechnics Inc. in Eau Claire MI on June 8th. The Hoverguard 700 needed to be lettered with the name and have a radio, safety gear, and other rescue equipment installed by the firemen before being put into service.

The Hoverguard 700 is a 2010, 14 ft., 4 man craft powered by a 100 hp engine that replace an older vehicle Standard has had in service since 1997. The previous unit was damaged during an ice-rescue training session and a decision was subsequently made to replace the 3-man, 60 hp older craft instead of repairing it. The cost of the new unit was \$27,940, with most of that cost covered by insurance, and the balance through fundraisers. Since one individual is basically committed to the duties of pilot, the extra capacity allows for two rescuers, instead of one, to assist a victim into the boat and begin care. The older craft was always cramped and usually operated very near load capacity with little reserve.

A hovercraft, unlike a boat, rides on a cushion of air, thus actually running above any surface it travels over. It can traverse water, ice, snow, mud and dry land surfaces. Over the past 13 years it has proven most useful in the sloughs, mud flats, and back-water lakes of the Illinois River, as well as flood-swollen creeks on higher ground.

Standard Fire Department's hovercraft is available to all emergency agencies, including Fire, EMS, Law Enforcement, and Conservation by contacting the Dispatch Office at the Putnam County Sheriff's Department.

Cherry Mine Disaster Exhibit at IVCC Taking Shape

.....Summer 1910, Cherry

People of Cherry are desperate for food and supplies, struggling since St. Paul Coal Company Mine #2 caught fire in November. Some still wait for bodies of their loved ones to be recovered from the still-cooling depths. Reporters covering the disaster which claimed 259 lives last fall, and sightseers traveling to witness the grisly events are few.

Domenica Compasso and her four fatherless children live beside the Marchetti family on a street where mourning continues for those lost. Five-year-old Frank Compasso no longer treks to the morgue with his family every single day. On May 21 the body of John Compasso was brought out, identified by his watch and tobacco pouch, and then reburied in Mount Olivet Cemetery, Spring Valley.

Young Ambrose Marchetti, Frank's teenage neighbor, climbed to escape the fire in the mine where he worked six days a week. Ambrose, still trying to deal with the horror he has witnessed, wonders how the family will fare without his St. Paul mining paycheck.

There is no monument in the Cherry cemetery. Graves for miners are still being dug. Anniversary remembrances of all who were lost by those who lost them are yet to come. For the people of Cherry, the 1909 Cherry Mine Disaster is now.

.....Summer 1978, Cherry

After meeting at an auction where on the docket were some nice pieces of memorabilia from the Cherry Mine Disaster, Jack Rooney, 15, of Cherry wrote a letter to invite Frank Compasso, who remembered the event, to visit and talk about the mine, the fire, and collecting. Frank drove to Cherry and sat at the kitchen table with Jack and his mother.

.....Summer 2010, Oglesby

Beginning last summer, the centennial of the Cherry Mine Disaster is being commemorated with ceremonies, parades, and exhibits in Cherry, around the Illinois Valley, in Chicago, and in Springfield at the Abraham Lincoln Presidential Library, the State Library of Illinois. In Cherry, just as hoards of

sightseers flocked to Cherry in 1909, thousands gathered again for a weekend of activities in November 2009.

Cherry native Jack Rooney grew to adulthood in the childhood home of his grandfather, Ambrose Marchetti, and Mary Marchetti Rooney, his mother. He often listened to stories of the Cherry Mine Disaster, and his grandfather's timely escape. When a teen, Rooney, in a flash of recognition, saw that the typical, everyday lives of people who were just like him, and his mother, and their neighbors ended the instant fire was kindled on a wagonload of hay for coal mine mules. Rooney is compelled to this day to document that day--November 13, 1909. Because his collection and his memory are encyclopedic, the staff at the Lincoln Library consulted with Rooney, now of Springfield, as they created *The Flames Caught Us*, an extensive exhibit to mark a century since the Cherry Mine caught fire. Rooney also was planning events for the two-day remembrance in Cherry where he would lead bus tours of the mine site.

Nine years after John Compasso was killed in the mine his four children lost their mother in 1918 to the Great Influenza Epidemic. Frank went to live on his uncle's farm outside Mark—the same uncle who had traveled to Cherry to identify John Compasso's remains. His grown granddaughter, Peggy Lami, lived in a new house next door to Frank who, by then, owned the farm. From early childhood, Lami was fascinated to listen to her grandfather's stories of Cherry and the mine. November 15, 2009 she traveled to Cherry from her Glen Ellyn home for the centennial ceremonies.

Rooney and Lami were introduced in Cherry November 15, 2009. He recommended *The Flames Caught Us* exhibit at the Lincoln Library and she vowed to see it. They agreed to walk through the display together. He also mentioned a tape that he had made of a conversation with Frank Compasso, her grandfather. Digging through a box of Cherry clippings, photos, and letters, Lami uncovered the

letter from Jack to Frank. Rooney mailed her a copy of the tape, and standing before the exhibit in Springfield, Lami returned his letter, written 31 years earlier.

In Springfield, *The Flames Caught Us* occupied more than 300 linear feet of images, text, and diagrams on 3 levels in the atrium at the library. It ran November through March 2010. Rooney, Lami, and many others, upon seeing it, expressed regret that the temporary installation would be missed by too many with ties to the Cherry Mine Disaster. Saddened that the months of meticulous research presented in riveting graphic style would be lost, the two Illinois Valley natives decided to try to save the exhibit and take it back toward Cherry.

Rooney contacted library officials to request that the exhibit be saved when it came down, first for viewing near Cherry, and then made available for other venues. In March the Lincoln Library announced the release of *The Flames Caught Us* to "the people from Cherry." Coordinated by Rooney, the panels came down and were removed to storage in Springfield. Lami then arranged for transfer to Illinois Valley Community College where the exhibit will be unveiled July 12 at 5 p.m. to run through October. Jack Rooney and Peggy Lami first met in November of 2009, but they have been connected for at least 100 years.

The Flames Caught Us: Cherry Mine 1909 is sponsored by the IVCC Foundation. The exhibit may be viewed by the public from 8 a.m. until 9 p.m. Mondays through Thursdays at IVCC until August 13 when the campus resumes Friday hours. Admission is free. Viewing begins at the main entrance.

Fay Improves Despite Rocky Start of Junior Year at SIU

No one really knew the name Carlton Fay expect for those in the Illinois Valley when he signed with SIU in 2007. However, during the late stages of his sophomore year, Fay caught the Missouri Valley by notice, and continued that as part of his junior campaign as a Saluki.



Despite not playing in the team's first two games

due to being suspended. Fay was a key part of Coach Chris Lowery's Saluki program. His two-game suspension however, refocused Carlton onto basketball. "Missing two games, I had to take a step back and really think about how much I enjoy playing the game and how much I wanted to be out there with the team, even if they were exhibition games. It made me sit and think I love to play this game, so the suspension was good and bad," Fay explained.

SIU's expectations for the season were high, however, the result fell short, as the Salukis for the third consecutive year did not reach the NCAA Tournament finishing at 15-15. Fay led Saluki scoring six times during the season, including a 38-point effort against Western Michigan on Feb. 20. Fay also led the Salukis six times in scoring

in the 08-09 season, which saw SIU end 13-18. "Obviously it wasn't what we expected, but it was alright," Fay explained. "It was a growing and learning year. We know what we need to do to be successful and hopefully we will take that this year and show it with harder work."

As "Big Country" works his way through the Saluki program, his responsibilities and roles changed as well. "I had a bigger role (this year) than the last two years, and that is to do more on the offensive end. Some nights I played well, and other nights I didn't so as a senior, I have to night in and night out be consistent. I have to get my points and get my rebounds, and doing everything to help the team win," Fay said.

During the 2009-10 season, Fay played in 30 games, starting 25 of them. Averaging 27 minutes, Fay was 49 percent from the field (7th in Missouri Valley Conference), including an impressive 38 percent from three-point range (10th in Missouri Valley Conference), and 85 percent from the free-throw line. Fay ranked fourth on the team in rebounding (102 season and 3.4 rpg), and averaged 12 points per game, which placed him 14 in the entire Missouri Valley Conference, and which was higher than his 10.4 ppg last season. All of Fay's stats for the 09-10 season improved except for rebounding from the 08-09 season.

As his Saluki basketball career winds down, Fay still

eyes a shot at the NCAA Tournament. "To be a part of something special like that would be awesome. We have talked about that since I got to SIU," Fay explained. When asked about the expectations for the team, Fay responded by saying "The expectation for next year is to win ball games. We also talk about making goals, and I haven't made any personal goals yet. I will probably work on that before the season begins," Fay explained. Fay also continued by saying, "that the chips will fall where they fall and I have to come in everyday and work hard."

Also, thoughts of what his life and basketball career are on the mind of the Hennepin native as he nears completion at SIU. "There has been talk about going overseas, but we'll see. I am trying to keep all my options open. I cannot commit to anything right now, and just worried about getting my schoolwork done and having a successful basketball season. After that and after the season is over, then I will worry about what I will do afterwards. I am not trying to rush anything," Fay explained.

Fay was also quick to mention the community support he has received. "The community is awesome. I can come back and talk to people and I love being around this area. I have family here and it feels like home. I have been very fortunate through high school and up to college is the great community support. They love sports and love being around and watching sports, so I have been lucky," Fay said.

Illinois Valley Memory Walk

The money that stays locally funds educational programs, caregiver trainings, direct counseling and support to families suffering from this disease.

The Boo Milby Memory Run is the single largest team fundraiser benefitting the Illinois Valley Memory Walk. The race is in honor of "Boo" Milby who lost his battle with Alzheimer's disease in 2007. Joanne Milby, race director and widow of Boo Milby and her granddaughter Hailee Clancy planned the race with the help of the Starved Rock Runner's Club. "We just wanted to give back. The Alzheimer's Association was so helpful to our family when my husband was sick," said Milby. "We could not have planned this without the help of the Starved Rock Runner's Club. They helped us every step of the way to make this race happen." In 2008 a children's running clinic was started by the Runner's club. The 5K Memory Run was their first official race to run. This summer the Runner's Club has also started a woman's running clinic, and added another children's clinic. Both groups will participate in the Boo Milby Memory Run this Saturday as their first race.

Nearly 22,000 people in central Illinois are affected by Alzheimer's Disease and age related dementia. Nearly 70% of those people are cared for at home with family members as caregivers. There are typically three family members taking care of each Alzheimer's patient. "The affect of this disease on a family is devastating," said Peg Gonet, who lost her husband to Alzheimer's Disease and is now a Walk Director as well as a volunteer support group facilitator for the Alzheimer's Association.

USDA Announces Funding Assistance for Microentrepreneurs in Rural Communities

Agriculture Secretary Tom Vilsack announced the availability of funds to support rural microentrepreneurs and microenterprises. Non-profit organizations, institutions of higher learning and federally recognized Indian Tribes are eligible for loans and grants to support the development and ongoing success of rural microentrepreneurs. Funding is available through USDA Rural Development's new Rural Microentrepreneur Assistance Program (RMAP) that was authorized by the 2008 Farm Bill.

"The Obama Administration and USDA understand that helping small, start-up businesses is fundamental in building a sustainable rural community," Vilsack said. "This new program will help provide access to capital, business-based training and technical assistance to the smallest of the small businesses. We need to embrace new strategies to help create a thriving rural economy."

"Support for small rural businesses is one of the most important investments Rural Development can make," said the agency's State Director Colleen Callahan. "When local businesses thrive, rural communities can offer the jobs and services that ensure stability and economic vitality."

Eligible organizations can apply to USDA Rural Development for loans ranging between \$50,000 and \$500,000 at two percent interest for up to 20 years. They will re-lend the funds in rural areas to sole proprietors and small businesses with no more than 10 full-time equivalent employees. These microborrowers can apply to the organizations for microloans no larger than \$50,000 at a fixed interest rate for up to 10 years. The loans can be used for working capital; purchases of furnishings, supplies, inventory or equipment; debt refinancing; business acquisitions; and already improved real estate on which to locate a business.

The organizations eligible for the RMAP funds can also apply for grants to provide technical assistance and training to microentrepreneurs and prospective microborrowers.

Putnam County Area Farming Update

•• SURE requires 2010 hay quality tests

Due to the wet spring, there is a lot of 2010 hay in Illinois that has suffered quality loss. The Farm Service Agency (FSA) reminds producers enrolled in the Supplemental Revenue Assistance Program (SURE) to have the quality tests completed for each cutting.

FSA requires farmers and ranchers enrolled in SURE to maintain written verifiable evidence indicating both the quality loss and the amount of the affected production. The quality loss evidence must be specific for the affected quantity.

Producers must certify production at their county FSA office for quality loss determinations and must maintain all production evidence for spot check purposes. Additional information about hay quality loss is available at local county FSA offices or on line at www.fsa.usda.gov.

Cooling Assistance Available Soon

Tri-County Opportunities Council (TCOC) is operating the Low Income Home Energy Assistance Cooling Program under the direction of the Illinois Department of Commerce and Economic Opportunity. The cooling program provides a one-time payment to the electric vendor on behalf of the household. The program is designed to assist those households that are at risk during the sweltering heat. According to the State of Illinois those households are households that have a member 60 years of age or older, disabled, a child under the age of three, households that have a medical need for cooling, and persons with terminal illness. To receive assistance a household must prove it meets the income guidelines, have proof the energy bills are in the applicant's name and provide copies of all household members' social security cards and medical cards. 

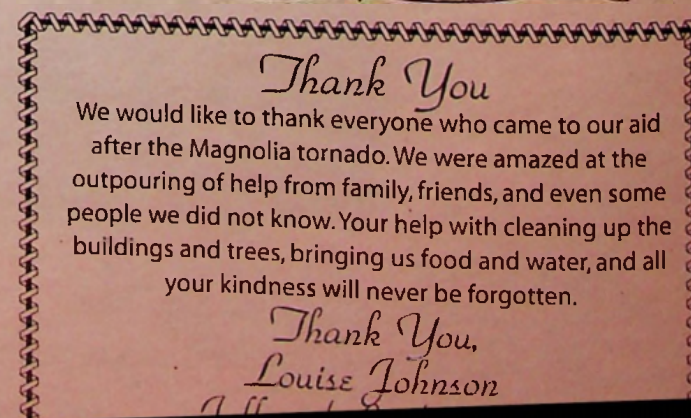
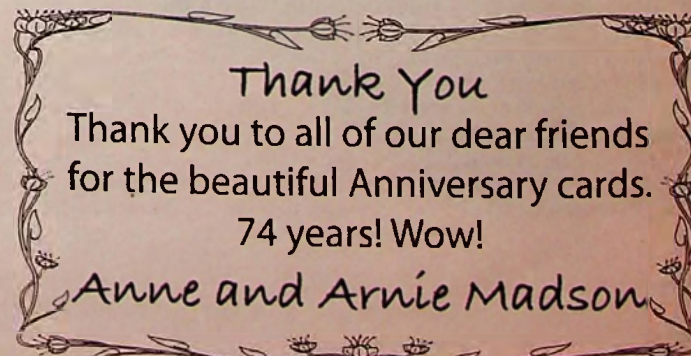

Fay Takes His Game International

While baseball was on the minds of many in Putnam County as the Panthers were fighting in the IHSA postseason, Carlton Fay's mind was on basketball.



Fay, who is preparing for his final year as a Southern Illinois Saluki, recently took a trip to China to play

basketball. Playing for the Reach USA Sports Basketball team for the second consecutive year, Fay played in nine games in the most populated country in the world from May 14 to May 31.

"They treated us like rock stars over there," said Fay. "It was not all about basketball, but just to experience the culture and seeing how they do things. I picked up a little bit of the language and it is something I probably will never be able to do again. When a opportunity like that jumps out at you, even though I went last year, I had to jump on it. It is something you can't miss, and I am so lucky to be able to do that and basketball has let me do stuff like that. I am very fortunate," Fay explained.

According to sportsreach.org, Reach USA is a sports evangelism program directed by Robby Speer out of Campbellsville, Kentucky. The organization's website states directly that "the program operates under two basic principles: One is that sports provide a platform or avenue to share the Gospel that might not exist otherwise. The second comes directly from Romans 12:6 - "We each

have different gifts according to the grace given us... let him use them in proportion to his faith." Sports is certainly not the traditional idea one might picture when thinking of sharing the Gospel, but we each have different gifts, and we are called to use them."

Fay was part of the "blue team," which was the second group of players to go over to China. Led by University of Nevada's head coach Dennis Gates, the Reach USA team went 8-1 in nine games that saw seven against a Chinese professional team and two against Russian professional opponents. The first game against the Russians, the eighth of the tournament, saw Fay score 21 points, his highest point total of the trip.

The trip saw Fay average 7.8 points per game, 4.4 rebounds per game, while averaging 53.2 percent from the field, including 50.0 percent from three-point range, and 58.8 percent from the free-throw line.

The trip was not just about playing basketball. It also allowed Fay, along with his teammates to see several tourist attractions as well. "We saw the Great Wall and traveled around attempting to find a lot of KFC's since that was the only American food. Other than that, the team and I just soaked it all in and watched the people. They are very generous people," Fay explained.

The team that Fay was part of was comprised of talent from NCAA teams across the United States.

Box 19276, Springfield, Illinois, 62794-9276 (herein Agency) that a draft National Pollutant Discharge Elimination System (NPDES) Permit Number IL0001554 has been issued under 40 CFR 124.6(d) for Dynegy Midwest Generation, Inc., 13498 E. 800th Street, Hennepin, Illinois, 61327 for discharge into the Illinois River from the Hennepin Power Station, Hennepin, Illinois, Putnam County. The applicant operates the Hennepin Power Station, which is a coal-fired steam electric generating facility. The facility discharges process wastewater and storm water to the Illinois River. Discharges are monitored and limited. Application is made for continuation of the existing discharges and several modifications: Internal Outfalls A03 and B03 and Outfalls 006, 008, 009, and 010 were removed. Outfall 007 was renamed as Internal Outfall D01. Several new wastestreams were added to Outfall 003, mercury sorbent residuals, bag house diatomaceous earth solids, deep well cleaning wastewaters, and stormwater runoff, landfill leachate, truck wash water, and pug mill mixer wash water. One wastestream has been added to outfall 005, coal-pile runoff pond mechanical and wet dredge spoils. Several special conditions are also being modified or eliminated based upon changes in operation or project completion.

If written comments and/or requests indicate a significant degree of public interest in the draft permit, the permitting authority may, at its discretion, hold a public hearing. Public notice will be given 30 days before any public hearing.

With the Hopkins Alumni in the throes of preparation for the Tenth Triennial Reunion scheduled for August 7, it is impossible not to reminisce of the days at Hopkins.

The first Class graduated seven members in 1918 and the last before being a part of the Putnam County Community Unit District graduated 30 members in 1966. In between, a few were larger in number, but none were huge. The HTHS Alumni spread to every corner of the U.S.A.

Each class had its outstanding members and mid-way in the life of Hopkins was the Class of '43. For the fiftieth year after graduation, the classmates of the Class of '43 were asked to write an autobiography of their past fifty years to comprise a history album to be shared with the Class. The following autobiography which is being shared with you is that of Lilly Ann Thomas. She was from a well known family in this area. Her father, Lawrence Thomas, was the principal at the Mark Grade School. She was one to blaze her own trails through life.

"Lilly Ann Thomas Stephenson (Mrs, Woody W. - deceased)

"Fifty years??? It can't be! Walking into Hopkins High School, the first day of my Freshman year, was like walking into a strange world. How huge it was, how beautiful it was, how many new faces were walking the halls and appeared as lost as I was. It didn't take long for me to learn where to go and what to do, so I settled in for my big leap into learning what to do and what not to do. I liked the what not to do best.

Finally got out of the Freshman year.

"Sophomore year was very interesting. We got to take the Freshmen to Starved Rock for our picnic to them. It was there that several of us decided to smoke a Lucky Strike. We even posed for a picture, cigarettes in hand, and lo and behold this picture was given to Mr. Pyatt, and we know what happened to "the smokers" in that picture.

We all passed and then we were Juniors.

"I am sure that no one snatched on the parties that decorated the Statues in the Study Hall. It was this time in my life that I had a suit that had bells for buttons. I would run up and down the stairs and my little bells would ring out. Then one fateful day I was told that I could wear the suit, but I would have to walk very carefully so that I would not disturb the class, or else the bells would have to be replaced with buttons. I am glad that I went to school during the time that girls dressed in dresses and didn't look like the kids of today in their cut off blue jean shorts.

"The Senior year came along and it was great. Finish that year, graduate and you're out of there and on your own. The talk was of War in a foreign country called Europe, and then suddenly it hit all of us. We saw many of our "old" classmates leave for the Service. I even wrote to Washington and asked them to let me enlist. I wish that I had kept the letter that the War Department wrote back to me, as they didn't have the facilities to take women into the Service.

"Graduation was completed, and Carolyn Rennick and I moved to LaSalle and got a small room and went to work as a Waitress at the Vendome Hotel. We had put in our application for a job in Moline, paying us \$18.50 a week and that was big bucks. I had met a Sailor and we were married and I moved to St. Louis. It was during the time that I lived in St. Louis that I went to the Police Department and attempted to join the Police Force. Once again I was told that they had no provisions for hiring women as Police Officers. During the time I lived in St. Louis I got pregnant and also word came that my husband was going to be sent overseas. When he got his orders I moved back to Mark. In September of 1945 the War was over for me and word came that my husband had enough "points" to be discharged, so I packed up and caught a train to Houston, TX. In November of 1945 I had a beautiful baby girl that I named Kay Alice Dixon.

We built a home and finally I felt like I had permanent roots. Kay was in Kindergarten, so with time on my hands, I went to City Hall to see about making application to join the Police Force. There again I was told they did not have provisions for women on the Force, but they did have an opening for a Clerk in the Police Records. I took a typing test, talked to the Captain over Records and was hired at \$120.00 a month.

"While working in Records the Assistant Chief of Police talked to my Captain and asked for a Clerk to work in his office, for about 6 weeks as his secretary was out sick and the Clerk had to know shorthand. I was

interviewed and the next day I was sitting in the reception room of the Assistant Chief of Police. There was no raise in pay, but work was a lot better. It was just about time for Grace, the Secretary, to return to work and the Assistant Chief asked me if I was still interested in becoming a Policewoman. This was even better than having bells on a suit, so I jumped at the chance. They were giving an Advancement test for Police Matron, as we had moved into a new Station and they now needed three women to work in the Jail. Five women took the test and believe it or not I came in #1! (The test didn't involve math, or I would have failed it.) I was taken, sworn in and worked in the Jail for 2 weeks, when the Captain in Juvenile Division came to me and asked if I would consider working in that Division. I was overwhelmed with joy, so I moved up to the 4th floor where I worked with another Officer for 2 weeks and then was assigned to a Police Car, given a radio number and handed some cases and told to go to work. My salary then jumped to \$180.00 a month and I was working 6 days a week. I was finally doing what I had always wanted to do, and if the City of Houston had only known, I would have worked for nothing.

"In 1960, I took the promotion exam for the rank of Detective, and over 200 Officers took the Exam. By this time I had been promoted to Policewoman and had received several raises. When my name came up for promotion, the only opening was in Homicide. That was the Division that I wanted to work

in. I was sworn in and reported to Captain Waycott, known to be tough and expected 100% from his men.

There were 27 Homicide Detectives and I made the 28th. He explained that because I was a female made no difference and that he expected the same type of work from me, and that no difference would be made in the investigations that I was sent on. I was nick named, 'The high heeled flat foot.' I worked shift work and never was assigned a permanent partner. I worked where needed, long hours and was on 24 hour call if a rape was reported as they expected me to question the females in sex cases. Homicide was known as an elite division, and it was.

"By this time I had been divorced for 9 years and Kay was out of college and married. She was living in Ft. Worth and was also a Policewoman with that Department.

I was very proud of her. In 1968, I married the Captain in Robbery, Woody Stephenson. Several months after we married he was promoted to Assistant Chief. Houston was growing by leaps and bounds and our work was getting more demanding, and I was getting older. Homicide Detectives had increased to 52. I was still the loner but worked with other Detectives.

"In 1971, Woody and I had our home constructed on Lake Buchanan, and then I took my retirement in July of 1972; and Woody was off on sick leave, but officially retired in January of 1973. Woody enjoyed the life of retirement being able to play golf and fish. He was a gourmet cook and loved the kitchen. I needed something more to do than to play bridge and run to different things with the 'girls.' The Justice of the Peace slot was open in the precinct where we lived, so I ran as a write in, and that was in 1978.

Took office December of 1978 and have been on the job ever since. During the 4 times that I have run for office I have never had an opponent. This was a

whole new ball game from the job I had in Houston, but now I am able to help the Officers that need it, and sitting on this side of the bench is so much different. I will serve out my 4th term (16 years) in 1992, but with good health and if I feel needed I will run again.

"The most devastating thing that has happened to me was on January 19, '93, when Woody passed away. I am so thankful that my mother, now 97 years young, is living with me. On July 4, 1992, I performed the wedding ceremony for my grand-daughter. On May 4, 1993, I was made a great-grandma. As this leaves my office I have not seen my great-granddaughter yet, but I will on the last week of May.

"I am sorry that I will not be able to attend our 50th get-together. I will miss a very important part of the friends and remembrances that I had at Hopkins High School.

Those were four very important years of my life, and it is hard to believe that it all ended 50 years ago. I wish everyone the very best, always. - Better known as 'Lanny'."

In response to an invitation to the 2006 get together of the Class of '43, word was received that Lanny had died September 28, 2005, only a few weeks after having received a diagnosis of cancer.

Putnam County Area Farming Update

JULY CROP REPORT

The Illinois wheat yield for the 2010 crop is estimated to average 54 bushels per acre based on the July 1 surveys, down 5 bushels per acre from the June forecast. Total production would be 17.6 million bushels, 62 percent below the 2009 production. Acreage expected to be harvested for grain is 325 thousand, 60 percent less harvested acres than in 2009. As of July 4, 85 percent of the wheat acres were harvested, compared to 60 percent last year and the five-year average of 74 percent.

Production of oats in Illinois for 2010 is estimated at 1.7 million bushels, 5 percent above 2009. Acreage to be harvested for grain, at 25 thousand, is unchanged from last year. The yield is estimated at 68 bushels per acre, 3 bushels above last year's yield. As of July 4, 11 percent of the crop was harvested compared to 2 percent for last year and 7 percent for the five-year average.

The Illinois peach crop for 2010 is estimated at 9,600 tons, up 17 percent from last year.

The Illinois Field Office of NASS today released the USDA June 1 Hogs and Pigs Report. State and national highlights of the report include:

ILLINOIS

The number of hogs and pigs on Illinois farms on June 1, was 4.40 million head, 1 percent more than a year earlier and 1 percent more than the March 1, 2010 inventory. Breeding hogs, at 490 thousand head, were up 2 percent from a year ago, and up 2 percent from last quarter. Market hogs, at 3.91 million head, were up 1 percent from June 2009 and up 1 percent from March 2010.

The Illinois March-May pig crop, at 2.52 million, was up 6 percent from a year ago. There were 265 thousand sows that farrowed, up 6 percent from the farrowings for the same time last year. Pigs per litter, at 9.50, was up from the average number of pigs saved per litter last quarter of 9.40.

Illinois hog producers intend to farrow 540 thousand sows between June 1 and November 30, 2010. This would be 40 thousand farrowings more than during this period a year ago. Producers expect to farrow 270 thousand sows during the June-August quarter, up 10 percent from a year earlier. The first intentions estimate for farrowings during the September-November quarter is 270 thousand sows, up 6 percent from the number farrowed during that period in 2009.

UNITED STATES

U.S. inventory of all hogs and pigs on June 1 was 64.4 million head. This was down 4 percent from June 1, 2009 but up 1 percent from March 1. Breeding inventory, at 5.79 million head, was down 3 percent from last year but up slightly from the previous quarter. Market hog inventory, at 58.6 million head, was down 4 percent from last year but up 1 percent from last quarter.

The March-May 2010 pig crop, at 28.2 million head, was down 3 percent from 2009 and down 2 percent from 2008. Sows farrowing during this period totaled 2.87 million head, down 5 percent from 2009 and down 6 percent from 2008. The sows farrowed during this quarter represented 50 percent of the breeding herd. The average pigs saved per litter was a record high 9.81 for the March-May 2010 period, compared to 9.61 last year. Pigs saved per litter by size of operation ranged from 7.70 for operations with 1-99 hogs and pigs to 9.90 for operations with more than 5,000 hogs and pigs.

Roll was called McMullen, Coleman, Norris, and Pettit answering roll. Borio and Leckonby were absent. The Pledge of Allegiance was recited. Minutes of the last meeting were read. Motion by Pettit, second by McMullen to accept minutes as read. All Trustees voting aye. Bills were presented and reviewed. Motion by Norris second by Pettit to pay bill out of their respective funds. All Trustees voting aye.

Karen and Jim Brown of 408 E. Main Street addressed the board about water concerns at their property after heavy rain falls. Water problems at the street, overflowing over the curb and onto their property after these rains. President Gimbal stated he would have the street department have the drain televised to see if it is obstructed, and if it is broken will have it repaired.

Mr. Larry Good of Chamlin Engineering told the board that IEPA has been reviewing the two projects for the Waste Water Treatment Facility. They will be sending a letter with comments on these reviews. Hopefully resulting in approval for this year and for financing of the projects. He also had information on IDOT Transportation Enhancement Program. This would be for pedestrian walks, bicycle trails and projects for beautification. The board had questions for him about oil and chip for some of the village streets.

Mr. Charles Helmig, read Ordinance #575 Pertaining to Police department for hiring of part time officers. Motion to accept Ordinance #575 made by Coleman, second by McMullen. All Trustees voting aye.

Joel Hopkins CPA, presented the board the 2009-2010 Audit stating that it was a clean audit. The financial budget to actual was in good standing with the records in very good order for the audit. Motion to accept this audit by Pettit, second by McMullen. All Trustees voting aye.

Committees were called. President Gimbal reported that the sewer has been repaired at Hill and Hennepin Streets, the 8" clay pipe was bad and had been replaced. Discussion was held and Chief Moore will have photos for the next meeting about the fence ordinance for pools. Correspondence was read from MP Fair Queen committee, and Red Cross Walk at Baker Lake. Karen Richardson has completed her FIOA and OMA with Certificate. Door to Door Census takers are still doing work and a letter was received requesting access to buildings to help obtain complete information. Motion by Pettit, second by Norris for the President to sign this letter to the Census Bureau. All Trustees voting aye. David McMullen, chairman of the parks spoke to the board about the 175th Village celebration for next year. It will be held the first full weekend in August. If you have questions please call village hall and leave a message for him.

Motion by Pettit, second by Coleman to adjourn. All Trustees voting aye.

Hear His Word

"Weltenshauung"

It is a great word, isn't it? It means *worldview*. It suggests that everyone of us has one. We all look at the world through a certain lens. Every one of us sees the world from their own peculiar perspective. We all come from some place. Where do you come from? What are you about? What makes you tick? What kind of world do you live in? What is the key that opens your understanding of existence? What is your understanding of existence? What is your *weltenschauung*? Is it Pain? Hope? Despair? Grief and loss? Faith in God?

On the one hand, humans are powerful, creative, brilliant creatures, the top of the food chain. In other words, when God made a peach, he merely made a peach. But when God made a human, God made a real peach, the crown of God's creation.

On the other hand, humans have also shown themselves to be incredibly inept, marginally monstrous, and morally midgetized. The world is a messy place. We have all played a role in putting this world at risk of spiraling to its demise. You read the news: war, oil spill, violence, and gun killings. etc.

For those of us who believe in religion and the church, our *weltenshauung* is the spiritual. We can't fix this groaning old world, and we can't fix our stumbling old selves without outside intervention. Coming to believe in a Power greater than what we can bring to the table is essential for restoration to a semblance of health. We need God to right what is wrong both inside of us and outside of us in this broken world.

How does one incorporate "God" into their lives? How do we make this program our own spirit-based *weltenschauung*? Gaelic speaking Irish poet, priest and philosopher, John O'Donahue, suggests three ways if we hope to develop a health spirituality (in *Eternal Echoes*).

First, solitude. Solitude is simply a matter of finding your own space. It is an undeveloped wilderness area in you. This is the self of whom Jesus may have said, "Whatever is childlike in you," whatever is fresh, unbiased and clear. It is the wilderness in you that has not been touched by the cynic, the doubter, or the skeptic. Solitude provides the space necessary to recover the wilderness are in you. Again, as Jesus said to His friends on more than one occasion: "Let's take a break for awhile."

Second, stillness. Stillness is just being still. Sit still for 15 or 20 minutes each day. Our body and soul loves the simple relief of stillness. Be still.

Third, silence. Silence depends upon solitude and stillness. Silence opens the door to the heart and soul. Silence suggests listening, listening to the voice and presence of God in your life.

Solitude, stillness, and silence bring a rhythm to your life. Gradually you come home to self, home to others, home to God. Spirituality is the art of homecoming. This is a creditable *weltenschauung*.

The LORD is my rock, my fortress and my deliverer; my God is my rock, in whom I take refuge. He is my shield and the horn of my salvation, my stronghold. Psalm 18:2

A's Sweep Series Against Oglesby

Starting the week, both the Putnam County A's and Oglesby Mariners were the top two teams in the Illinois Valley Men's League. After a two-game series sweep of Oglesby, PC put dis-tance between themselves and Oglesby for the regular season championship.

Ben Fogle dominated the A's game at Massino Field on Wednesday both with his pitch-ing arm and his bat in a 3-1 PC victory. Fogle would throw a 117-pitch complete game, giv-ing up only an unearned run off of nine hits and striking out 11 while going 2-3 with a big 3-RBI double in the third inning. "That was a huge hit was pretty much the game right there. When your starter can help you with the offense and win the game, that is nice," A's coach Neil Mecagni said. "Ben threw a good game Saturday (at Seneca) and threw well again today. I did not think he had his best stuff, but he threw strikes and made good pitches. My hats off to him, he threw a good game," Mecagni added about Fogle's pitching performance.

PC added two insurance runs in the sixth inning as Dave Yeager, who went 2-3 in the game, would line a double to the right field fence, scoring Joe Brizgis and Mecagni. David Seibert also went 2-3 in the game, while Eric Straughn went 0-1 with two walks.

Less than four days later, the A's and Mariners met again at Dickinson Field in Oglesby, which PC won 5-3. PC jumped on the board quickly in the first inning. After a walk to Shane Peterson, Seibert would single into right field on a hit and run, scoring Peterson. A Jake Passini double to right field would plate PC's second run of the inning. However, Oglesby answered with two runs of their own in the bottom half of the first inning to tie the game at two.

PC would regain the lead in the third as Seibert, who reached on an error, would score an unearned run as he scored on a Passini double. However, as quick as PC regained the lead, the game would be tied courtesy of a Mariner homerun in the fourth inning.

The game would remain tied at three until the eighth inning. After a leadoff bunt single by John Sweezy and a sacrifice bunt by Alan Augspols, an error by Oglesby's third baseman with Brad Passini at bat would allow Sweezy to score making the score 4-3. "Give a lot of credit to Brad. He had a great at-bat and it goes down as an error in the book, but that had to be a 10-pitch at bat and he was fouling off everything. He finally got a good pitch and put it in play," Mecagni said. PC tacked on an insurance run, as a single by Seibert would plate Passini.

Mecagni took the pitching win, despite not having his best stuff. He threw seven innings giving up three runs off of five hits. "My arm felt good today, but I needed to lock down mentally and get more focused. I just need to work on some mechanics and get tougher as the season winds down," Mecagni said of his pitching effort.

Jake Passini would lead PC's offensive attack going 3-4, while Seibert would go 2-4. Fogle and Sweezy also had hits in the game. PC plays two more games as they gear up for the postseason. The A's will play a makeup game at Massino Field on Thursday July 29 at 7 PM, while playing Spring Valley on Sunday, August 1 at 6 PM at Massino Field in Hennepin.

WHEREAS, the Act requires that the Village of Mark, Illinois, (hereinafter "Village") investigate and ascertain the prevailing rate of wages as defined in the Act for laborers, mechanics and other workers in the locality of said Village employed in performing construction of public works for the Village.

NOW, THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED BY THE VILLAGE BOARD OF THE VILLAGE OF MARK, PUTNAM COUNTY, ILLINOIS, AS FOLLOWS:

SECTION 1: To the extent and as required by the Act, the general prevailing rate of wages in this locality for laborers, mechanics and other workers engaged in construction of public works coming under the jurisdiction of the Village is hereby ascertained to be the same as the prevailing rate of wages for construction work in Putnam County area as determined by the Department of Labor of the State of Illinois as of June of the current year, a copy of that determination being attached hereto and incorporated herein by reference. As required by said Act, any and all revisions of the prevailing rate of wages as determined by the Department of Labor of the State of Illinois shall supersede the Department's June determination and apply to any and all public works construction undertaken by the Village. The

definition of any terms appearing in this Ordinance which are also used in aforesaid Act shall be the same as in the Act.

SECTION 2: Nothing herein contained shall be construed to apply said general prevailing rate of wages as herein ascertained to any work or employment except public works construction of the Village to the extent required by the Act.

SECTION 3: The Village Clerk of the Village shall publicly post or keep available for inspection by any interested part in the main office of the Village of Mark this determination or any revisions of such prevailing rate of wage. A copy of this determination or of the current revised determination of prevailing rate of wages then in effect shall be attached to all contract specifications.

SECTION 4: The Village Clerk of the Village shall mail a copy of this determination to any employer, and to any association of employers and to any person or association of employees who have filed their names and addresses, requesting copies of any determination stating the particular rates and the particular class of workers whose wages will be affected by such rates.

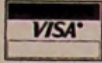
