Dedication of the Magnolia High School Memorial Held at MagnoliAffaire

Magnolia American Legion Post #254 members John (Jack) Kays and Phil Hansen raised the US Flag above the new Magnolia High School Memorial which stood from 1912 until it was torn down in 2006. Peggy Smith, Magnolia Baseball President, spoke and said

three other teachers; Miss Stramberg who taught history, civics and Home Ec. In those days the girls in Home Ec really learned how to cook. They made lunch for everyone every day. Mr. Putman taught general science, and physics and Miss Conder was the music and English teacher. She also had the high school plays.

Mr. Doc Etter was the coach. The gym was little and it had a very low ceiling with a stage at one end. Kelly said, "They were practicing for the junior play so we hardly had any basketball practices. We went to Toluca to play basketball. They were always good. We were getting beat bad so we called time out. In those days you went under the basket as a team, without the coach. We were under the basket, and one of the boys said, 'Where is the coach?' We looked over to the bench, the substitutes were there, but not our coach. We then spotted him. He was sitting on the top row with his hat and scarf on. He had disowned us."

In Senior class Mr. Miller came and was the coach and science teacher. That year we finally had a real coach instead of someone who was just called a coach.

The students spent one six week semester on automobiles, studying the big three; G-M, Ford, and Chrysler. They studied the steering system, spring system, etc., just practical knowledge.

Mr. Munnis taught bookkeeping that was useful in after-school life. Kelly said, "Violet Steffens, Grant (Leon) Steffens and I went to the State Commercial Contest. We won the district, sectional and placed 7th in the State. For a little school that was pretty good, and I won the individual first in the State. Dr. Munnis was a very good administrator, and good disciplinarian. I will tell you I feel I got a very good education in the Magnolia school system. Fifty students graduated in our class and we were the largest class to ever graduate from Magnolia High School. I am the only one left of the 1937 class. I tell you what, I am always going to call Magnolia my home. I lived here until 1950 outside of a couple of years with Uncle Sam, and one year in Toluca. Magnolia will just always be my home. Thank you, everyone."

that John Davis built the new monument with monies from an anonymous donor. The plaque on the monument was mounted over the door to the Magnolia High School building. The area where the former high school stood is being turned into a park. Peggy said she and Mayor Laurie Smith planted a red star maple tree near the monument and planted maroon and gold flowers in front of the monument because the Magnolia High School colors were maroon and gold.

Peggy said there is so much history here and she remembers the students that attended here. She would like to acquire a small storage shed for a historical building on the old school site. Peggy thanked everyone who worked or donated monies for the project.

Carl "Kelly" Carlson, former Magnolia grade and high school student, spoke to Magnolia School's former students, family members and friends. He said, "There was no kindergarten, and his first grade teacher was Miss Mary Hauger. He was six years old in October of 1925 and could start school because I was six years old before the 31st of December." He and his sister drove a pony and buggy from the family farm to Cindy Sammon's barn in town, left the pony there, and walked the rest of the way to school. Cindy fed him a little hay at noon and their Dad paid \$1.00 a day for

team to Wenona in her 1927 two-door Chevy car. Coming back there was a terrible snow storm. Bill Chestnut helped Miss Hartman navigate. When they got by the stockyards in Magnolia, Bill said, "Turn here Miss Hartman." She turned and they went up the railroad track and got stuck. The boys had to lift the car back up over the railroad ties.

Mr. Baine taught 8th grade. Bob McBride just moved into Magnolia with his mother and stepfather, who had just bought the pool hall. Bob wanted to play basketball, but was a chubby kid. Mr Baine worked with him, teaching him how to dribble and so forth. Bob had the desire but his stepfather died and his mother and Bob moved to Henry where Bob became a star on the Henry basketball team and sports became his life. He wrote a sports column for the Henry newspaper, "Looping the Loop" and refereed games. One day Mr. Baine did something wrong to Phyllis Weber and she threw a book into his face. She was embarrassed and ran into the girl's restroom. After awhile Mr. Baine wondered if the girl was OK. Harold Heckt said, "I'll go check, Mr. Baine." At noon Phyllis came out and left school and never came back. She went to Swaney after that.

Recent programs presented at dinner meetings of the Granville Rotary Club held the interest and fascination of Club members, offering variety, insight and benefit to all concerned!



Rotarian Sandra Woest recently presented two programs, the first featuring Angela Dunlap of IVCC's I-Read adult literacy program in which Sandy volunteers, and the second describing her post-retirement teaching experience with foreign residents who are seeking to become US citizens. The IVCC citizenship education program prepares students of all ages for the rigorous process which includes English language proficiency, extensive testing, and personal interviews. Sandy also described the detailed paperwork and substantial financial commitment required to even be eligible to pursue the process. In a nation founded entirely by immigrants, the program gave members added appreciation for the determination and accomplishment of those now seeking citizenship.



Club President Adriane Shore took the opportunity on July 22 to launch the Club's "Final Inch" fundraising effort to support Rotary International's nearly-complete eradication of Polio worldwide. Since the Polio Eradication effort was undertaken by Rotary in 1985, Rotary and several partner organizations have immunized

more than 4 billion children, at a cost of over 800 million dollars, bringing the number of countries that were rampant endemic from more than 125 to just 4 remaining countries, Nigeria, Pakistan, Afghanistan, and India, where efforts have been increased to reach children and families of the most remote tribes and villages while continuing to reach newborns world-wide to prevent a resurgence of the crippling and often fatal virus. Adriane says the Club hopes to raise both money and community awareness of the need.

As noted by Adriane and echoed by the personal experiences of other members of the Club, Polio is not just a foreign problem. Adriane's mother was a Polio survivor who overcame her disabilities, and the Shores recently met violin virtuoso Itzhak Pearlman, also a Polio survivor who personally helps to raise money for Rotary International's Polio Eradication project. Their lives, as well as historic accounts of Polio survivors such as Franklin D. Roosevelt, inspire Rotary's conviction to reaching the "final inch" in the long road taken to eradicate Polio world-wide.

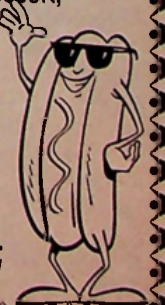

Food Pantry Needs

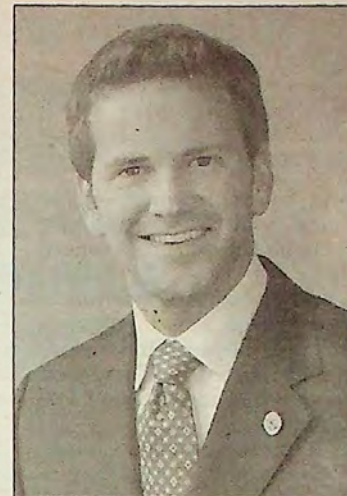

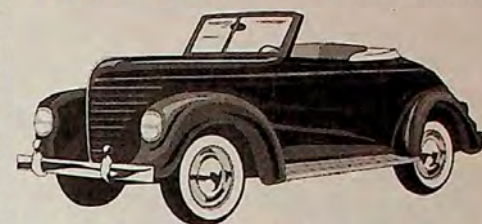
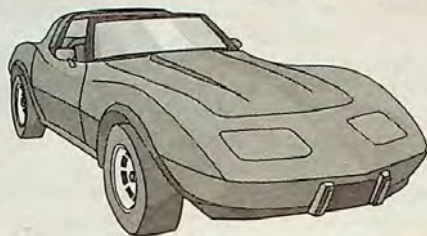

L.E.A.S.E. Preschool Screening August 12th

L.E.A.S.E. and the Putnam County School District will offer a preschool screening on Thursday, August 12 (morning hours). The screenings will be held at the Putnam County Primary School, in Granville. Putnam County children who will be 3 on or before the screening dates are eligible for

with age-eligible preschoolers, to take advantage of this screening.

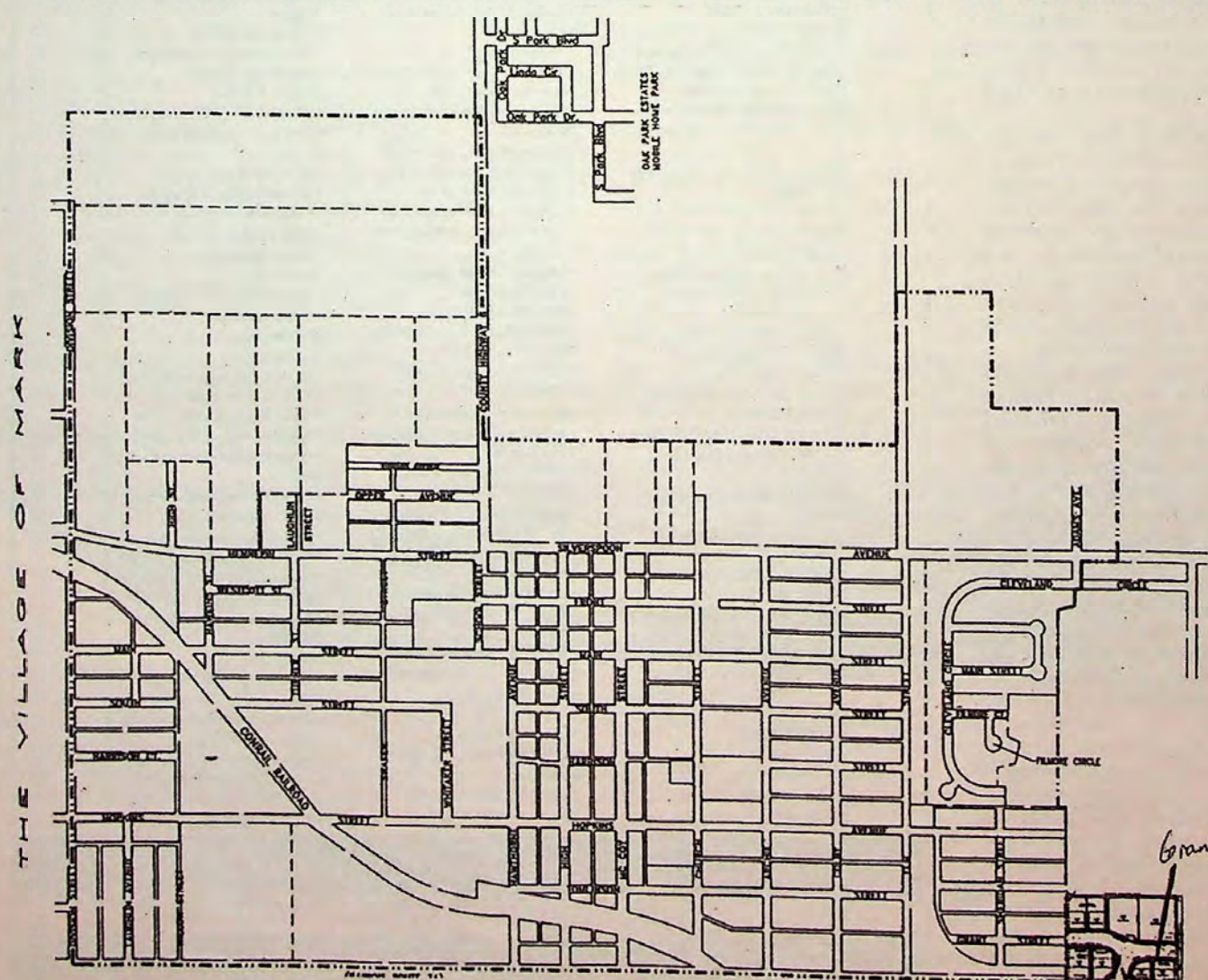
Results from the screening can be used to help determine a child's eligibility for the Early Childhood Program at the Primary School Building in Granville. At this time the Early Childhood Program is a

The 65th Anniversary of the end of World War II

The Battle of Okinawa, and the appalling casualty estimates prompted President Harry Truman's decision to drop the atomic bombs on Japan. After five weeks of battle on Iwo Jima ended, the US 10th Army invaded Okinawa on April 1, 1945. Japanese troops did not contest the initial landings, but within days, casualties mounted as American forces ran into carefully prepared underground defenses on the heavily populated stopping stone to Japan's main island.

Ten months before the invasion of Okinawa in WWII, a joint Chief of Staff planning group began working on outlining the groups of the Pacific war's final stages. Through the month long battle for Saipan, June 15 to July 1944, the concept was regularly updated. At Saipan the cost of 3,426 US deaths, plus over 13,000 wounded to kill 22,000 Japanese defenders, had a sobering effect on the Joint Strategic Survey Committee. There was a primary outline for planning the serious of campaigns to culminate on

million trained and equipped troops. Stimson asked Hoover to meet Truman, but Hoover refused to visit Truman without a specific invitation. Truman did request the former President to pay him a visit on May 28th. They discussed a wide range of international issues. Hoover impressed Truman with his knowledge and willingness to help; requested that Hoover prepare memoranda on the issues discussed and send them directly to him.

Hoover produced four memoranda: 1) The European Food Organization, 2) The Domestic Food Organization, 3) The creation of a War Economic Council, and 4) The Japanese Situation. In Memo #4, a work of less than 700 words, Hoover stated twice that American deaths from a Japanese invasion could run from 500,000 to 1 million lives. The memo arrived at the end of May as ground force casualties on Okinawa surpassed 57,000. Truman forwarded the memo, after writing, "From Herbert Hoover" across the top, to his Army Chief of Staff, to his manpower czar vision, Stimson and former Secretary of State Cordell Hull, telling each he wanted an analysis of the memo and wanted to discuss it personally with them. Hull responded that he agreed with Hoover's estimate, but suggested the terms offered to the Japanese were too lenient.

One said the Japanese are a fanatical people capable of fighting to the last man. "If we invade Japan the cost in

American lives will be unpredictable," Stimson wrote. "The terrain in Japan would be susceptible to a last ditch defense such as has been made on Iwo Jima and Okinawa and is much larger than those two areas."

Truman and his Joint chief of Service Secretary held a meeting and all agreed that the invasion of the home islands would be extremely costly, but was essential for defeating Japan. Truman asked, "if the invasion of Japan would not have the effect of more closely uniting the Japanese." Stimson agreed and hoped for some other means, which was as yet the untested atomic bomb.

It was hoped it would shock the Japanese into surrender. That other means was realized on August 6 and 9, 1945 when, with President Truman's authorization, the US dropped atomic bombs on Hiroshima and Nagasaki, ending WWII, and with it the nightmarish debate about how many Americans and Japanese would have resulted from the planned invasions of Japan's home islands 65 years ago.

Truman wrote in his diary that the decision whether to invade Japan or bomb and blockade was his hardest decision.

I took parts of this article from the book "Hell to Pay," by D. Giangreco, who did extensive research that clearly confirms that the probability of hundreds of thousands of American casualties prompted Truman's authorization of the atomic bombings.

President Harry S. Truman, who took office upon Franklin D. Roosevelt's death on April 12, 1945, received reports of the ever-mounting numbers of dead, wounded and missing at every morning's briefings. Every day he visited the White House map room with his Chief of Staff, Fleet Admiral William D. Leahy, to review the most recent cables and to pour over the maps of troop movements; including those of the Japanese Army, which was conducting a military buildup in Japan.

The battle for Okinawa came during a casualty surge, an average of 65,000 battle casualties among the young American soldiers and army airmen each month from June 1944 through May 1945. These figures did not include Marine and Navy casualties in the Pacific of America's roughly 1.25 million WWII casualties and nearly 1.0 million during the casualty surge of the war's final year.

As American forces moved closer to the Japanese home islands, and into the heart of Japan's defenses, dependent on massive firepower and bravery of the Army and Marine infantrymen. The US military planners estimated the number of Japanese troops available for their home island defense were 3.5 million.

It led them to conclude on past operations on the Pacific Islands that it would take one American killed and several wounded to exterminate seven Japanese soldiers. On that basis it would cost the US a half million American lives and many times that number wounded in the invasion of Japanese home islands.

Japan's soil.

Operation Olympic was against the southern-most island of Kjusju in late 1945, and operation Cornet against Tokyo in spring of 1946. The US Army and War Department manpower policy for 1945 was to speed up selective service inductions from 60,000 to 100,000 men per month for the war against Japan that was projected to last into 1947.

An unlikely man now entered the discussion of projected invasion losses; former President Herbert Hoover, who had been put aside by his Republican Party and the Roosevelt Administration although he was a frequent and low-keyed assistant to congressional committees.

However, this brought Hoover to the attention of Truman's Pentagon officials. On May 15th, Hoover provided Secretary of War Stimson under Truman (Stimson was formerly Hoover's Secretary of State) a memorandum outlining his views on ending the war with Japan. In this document, and another one, Hoover suggested the invasion could cost 500,000 to 1 million US lives. Stimson sent the paper to General Marshall's staff for comment.

The U.S. Army's initial planning for the twin invasions of Japan; Operations Olympic and Coronet, was based on the ideas that US forces would face approximately 3.5 million enemy soldiers. But further analysis of Japan's manpower and training revealed that the opponents two tiered system would produce at least 5

The Putnam County Panic 12 and under team may not have won a game this season, but head coach Angie Augspols considers the season a success.

It is good to see that they are hard on themselves and want to keep that status there, but I also want them to have fun and just play. Mistakes will be made, and I know I, along with other college players, make mistakes. You just have to shake it off and do better next time."

When Augspols finishes playing college softball for the University of Illinois-Springfield in the spring of 2011, she will rejoin the team as they compete in the 14 and under division. Augspols will take the reigns of the 14 and under team while Carla Passini, current coach of the 14 and unders, will coach the 16 and under travel team. Augspols mentioned about several things that her squad should work on for next summer's season. "They need to work on the small things and also have fun. If they keep playing for the fun of it, and do the job at the plate and in the field,

they will be successful one day. That is one thing I stress: work on the small things now, and the success will come."

"Aleceya Davis, McKenna Downer, and Ashlyn Haage all played right field and were very shy and timid when we started practice," said Augspols about her most improved players. "All three of them made some big catches in the outfield during games, and that even surprised me too, and that is the best feeling of the world for a coach. They are among the youngest of the team, but they are doing their job as the best they can do. They stepped up a lot," Augspols added.

"I am proud of my group of girls. I know in the public eye, it looks like we have not accomplished a lot, but there has been some games we have only lost by one or two, and in some games, we have actually led, but let it slip away. I am proud of them because through everything, the highs and lows, they kept their heads up and ready to go in practice. They are not sulking after a game, but know what they did wrong, and I am proud that they still come out here and want to improve," Augspols said.

Most cases of elder abuse go undetected so don't assume that someone has already reported the situation. Rotarian Chauntelle Biagi-Bruer hosted Jan Eschen of the Office of Illinois Secretary of State Jesse White, to bust some myths and to encourage participation in the Illinois Organ and Tissue Donor Program. As the Northern Illinois regional coordinator, Jan visits with groups whose members' own experiences often tell the story. Even among the Rotary audience, one guest and two members and one guest had been organ recipients. The speaker explained that anyone over 18 can designate the use of their body after death, by signing onto any Illinois registry including use of the back of our driver's license. She said that there are currently 4,700 patients awaiting transplants in Illinois, and 18 Illinoisans on the list die every day for lack of available organs or needed tissue. She also encouraged lifetime donations of bone marrow, a process which has been greatly refined, and blood donations every 56 days, as every blood donation helps three patients and extra donor blood is also needed to effect tissue and organ transplants. Chauntelle thanked Jan for her presentation, with a gift from the Club.

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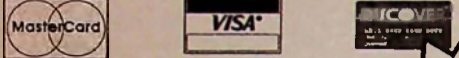

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Magnolia Schools Memorial Dedicated During MagnoliAffaire

Editor's Note: Since a memorial was dedicated to the Magnolia Schools during the MagnoliAffaire on July 31st, we are reprinting this for our readers at this time.

in the east.

The first school was held in the old brick year yard in the southwestern part of town in a log cabin, built for a dwelling house. Mr. John Richey opened the schools in the fall of 1837. He was succeeded in

rough, school furniture was provided. In 1860 the war came and fathers, husbands and sons marched away to defend the Union.

After the end of the war a new schoolhouse was built and the students moved in on January 1,

States. Scattered through other schools in town and country are the future makers of our laws as well as those who will execute those laws. There, too, are the future mothers on whose wisdom and trained intelligence rests the integrity of the home, the keystone on whose security depends the existence of the nation. We today owe to these tomorrow every possible aid in developing and training the minds and bodies which will be called upon to meet and solve the problems of the future."

Another article published by Dr. W.H. Weathers in 1929 had this information. In 1905 a four year high school was started in the same year they started have nine months of school instead of eight. The school burned again on March 14, 1912, and school was again held in the Masonic Hall and church until a new building was ready. The new school opened in March, 1913, and was dedicated on August 20, 1913, with Mr. Francis Blair, State Superintendent of Public Instruction, as guest speaker.

In 1916 the Magnolia Township H.S. officially had its beginning. The high school had formerly been organized and financed by the grade school district. The high school students started going to Swaney High School in 1946. This was a trial period to see if consolidation between Swaney and Magnolia would work. Everything went fine, and in 1949 the Magnolia High School District closed its books to become part of the Swaney system. The

grade schools also consolidated then, but Magnolia students continued going to the Magnolia Grade School.

Three of my children attended Magnolia Grade School in the early 1960's. Cy Satterfield was principal, and teachers were Charlotte Munson, Mrs. Sammons, Mildred Steffens, Ruby Petersen, Warren Stout, and Mrs. Paxon was the cook. Former Regional School Superintendent Iner Anderson started his teaching career there in 1957.

Mayor Laurie Smith attended 1st and 3rd grades at the Magnolia school and at that time second grade was held at McNabb grade school. The Junior High School was held at Swaney.

The Magnolia Grade School closed its doors in 1966. McNabb and Magnolia grade schools were consolidated with Swaney. Stanley Anderson bought the school building and started a weekly PC newspaper. He owned it for several years and sold it to James Cimei who used it for storage for several years. He then sold it to Jim Brittingham from LaSalle. He died and the school eventually fell back to the Village of Magnolia. They did not have the money to take care or dispose of the building.

Former Congressman Ray LaHood contacted the Environmental Protection Agency and secured money to demolish the school at no cost to the Village. The school was demolished on August 3rd and 4th in 2006.



Magnolia High School officially opened in March of 1913 and remained as the place of education until the district consolidated with Swaney High School in 1946.

This was written originally by Lucy Baker Swindler in 1906.

When William Haws, who became a Captain during the Black Hawk War, came on a prospecting tour through central and northern Illinois in 1821, he found what afterward became Putnam County, the roving grounds of the Winnebago and Potawatamie Indians. The country was beautiful and gave such abundant evidence of fertility, that he returned in 1826 and built a log cabin on his claim just north of what is now Magnolia.

Though the first settler, he and his courageous wife were not alone, for John Knox came in 1827. They were soon followed by other sturdy men and brave-hearted women, seeking homes on the cheap and productive lands of what then was the West. They possessed the land and formed a community.

The log cabin of John Knox became a resting place for travelers between Fort Dearborn, now Chicago, and Springfield. In those days neighbors were not very close, but they gathered from miles around to help when a cabin was to be built, or a clearing made in the timber for a new home.

When the homes were built and the virgin soil broken up and the settlers could raise food crops, the settlers could give attention to other things and began making preparations to educate their children, recalling the schools they attended

the fall of 1838 by Mr. Joshua Simpson. The number of pupils increased, and the little log cabin was soon too small to hold them. Mr. Thomas Patterson, a public spirited citizen, gave a tract of land west of town, part of which was to be used as a cemetery, and the remainder for a school building and grounds. A frame school house was built and opened late in the fall of 1839. Dr. Painter was the first teacher and the school was known as "The Graveyard School." The seats were made of heavy planks.

The services of the church were held in the same room on Sundays. Magnolia grew and became a manufacturing town. Judge Parrett made the first reaper and built threshing machines. Paretts machine shop stood at the northwest corner of Peoria and the cross street.

John Ong and sons turned out as many as two hundred breaking plows in one season. The first plows with iron mould boards were made in Magnolia, as well as the first reapers in Illinois.

John Dykes ran a cording mill and the Alexanders carried on a large business in grain and merchandise. In 1855 a census of the town was taken which showed 711 inhabitants. It was evident that the schoolhouse was too small. It was decided to divide the district into two parts and build two schoolhouses. These were known as the North and South schools. Maps, charts, blackboards, good, but

1866. The teachers were Mr. Rickey, Mr. Orange Parrett, and Miss Jennie Nell.

In 1870 there was still no definite course of study. It was decided that the school would be much more efficient if graded with a regular course of study, and a high school department incorporated.

The first high school graduated in 1875 under the teaching of Miss Mary Fuller. The members were Ed Hannum, Helen Fyffe, Casper Gurnea, Ella Morrille, and Ella Burt.

About 9 o'clock the evening of January 23, 1901 the schoolhouse was found on fire and burned to the ground. School was held in the Masonic Hall for the remainder of the year.

A new school building was erected on the site of the old one. The new school opened in September 1901. The building and furnishings of the new schoolhouse was a heavy tax on the people. Entertainments were held at different times to aid in securing books and supplies.

Lucy Baker Swingle ended her story with this. "The record would be incomplete without a word of praise for the many teachers who have done such excellent work in the Magnolia school. The Directors have been fortunate in securing faithful conscientious teachers who used their best endeavors to advance the interests of the school in every way. The boys and girls of today are the men and women of tomorrow. At some school desk today sits the future President of these United

The board selects and approves the Election Judges in each precinct from a certified list provided by the chair persons of the county Central Committee of the first and second leading political parties within the county. The ratio of the judges utilized within each precincts is 3:2, with three (3) judges being selected from the first leading political party and two (2) judges being selected from the second leading party. The determination of the leading political party within each precinct is based upon the average number of votes cast by that party, in that precinct, in the last three Governor elections. (The current ratios are based on the 1998, 2002, and 2006 elections.)

In recent years Putnam County has lost a number of Election Judges within the county's voting precincts. Unfortunately, some of our Election Judges have passed away while others have been lost due to relocation outside of the county job requirement, and other priorities.

Putnam County Clerk and Election Authority Dan Kuhn together with Putnam County political party chair persons Teresa Clausen and Kim Alleman, would like to appeal to the citizens of Putnam County for their help in filling the quota needed for Judges of Election. A's and Cardinals to Play Decisive Game 3 Wednesday

The Putnam County A's and Ottawa Cardinals will play decisive game three on Wednesday Night in Ottawa at Masinelli Field after splitting a doubleheader in round one of the Men's League Playoffs Sunday Night as Massino Field in Hennepin.

Putnam County won game one 8-7, but would lose game two 5-2 to force the clinching game. The winner would play in the World Series on Sunday. "You're never happy when you let the team come back from eight runs down and your forced to use your ace to close it out," player manager Neil Mecagni said. "Give a lot of credit to Ottawa's pitchers. We also played sloppy as well on defense and didn't hit well. You can't score two runs and win a game. We got a win, and will have to get it on Wednesday," Mecagni added.

In game 1, PC got on the board early in the first inning. After Shane Peterson, Ben Fogle, and David Seibert reached base safely, Cody Jessen was hit by a pitch, which allowed a run to score. Putnam County Tentative Multiplier Announced

Putnam County has been issued a tentative property assessment equalization factor of 1.0429, according to a press release Friday from the office of Brian Hamer, director of the Illinois Department of Revenue.

The property assessment equalization factor, often called the "multiplier," is the method used to achieve uniform property assessments among counties, as required by law. This equalization is particularly important because some of the state's 6,600 local taxing districts overlap into two or more counties (e.g. school districts, junior college districts, fire protection districts). If there were no equalization among counties, substantial inequities among taxpayers with comparable properties would result.

State law requires property in Illinois to be assessed at one-third of its market value. Farm property is assessed differently, with farm homesites and dwellings subject to regular assessing and equalization procedures, but with farmland and farm buildings assessed according to standard based on productivity.

The equalization factor is determined annually for each county by comparing the sales price of individual properties sold over the past three years to the assessed value placed on those properties by the county supervisor of assessments/county assessor.

If this three-year average level of assessment is one-third of market value, the equalization factor will be one (1). If the average level of assessment is greater than one-third of market value, the equalization factor will be less than one (1). And if the average level of assessment is less than one-third of market value, the equalization factor will be greater than one (1).

Assessments in Putnam County are at 31.96 percent of market value, based on sales of properties in 2007, 2008, and 2009.

The equalization factor being assigned is for 2010 taxes, payable in 2011. Last year's equalization factor for the county was 1.0000.

The tentative factor is subject to change (1) if the county Board of Review takes actions which significantly affect the county assessments or (2) if local officials or others can present data showing that the Department of Revenue's estimates of the average level of assessments in the county should be adjusted. A public hearing on the tentative multiplier will be held between 20 and 30 days after the tentative factor is published in a newspaper of general circulation within the county.

The assessed value of an individual property determines what portion of the tax burden a specific taxpayer will assume. That individual's portion of tax responsibility is not changed by the multiplier.

Anticipation High as Ohio Valley Gold and Silver Refinery Opens for Business Next Week in Peru!

Been following the gold and silver market lately? Well if you have a jewelry box or lock box full of gold or a coffee can full of old coins you should be according to Ohio Valley Refinery spokesperson John Miller. "The gold and silver markets have not been this strong for over 30 years" said Miller. Typically when the U.S. dollar is weak and the economy is flat gold and silver markets soar. "That's good news if you are setting on a few gold necklaces or an old class ring" says Miller.

Next week, starting Tuesday at 9am and every day next week through Saturday, the Ohio Valley Refinery will be setting up a satellite refinery right here in Peru at the La Quinta Inn. During their 5 day stay, anyone can bring gold, silver or platinum items and turn them in for immediate payment, explains John Miller. "Just about everybody has some amount of gold or silver just lying around collecting dust and next week anybody can sell theirs direct to our refinery. Typically, selling direct to a refinery is reserved for larger wholesale customers like jewelry stores, pawn shops, and laboratories," says Miller. "We are changing how business is done," he explains. "We want to do business with everybody so we took our business to the streets. Our teams visits various cities around the country hosting 5 day events allowing the general public to take advantage of our services. The turnout has been overwhelming," says Miller. "Usually each day is busier than the previous day. It seems once people come to us and sell something, they are so amazed by what an old ring or gold coin is worth that they go home and start digging around for more and telling relatives, friends and neighbors. It's like a feeding frenzy by the third day. People line up with everything

from gold jewelry to sterling silver flatware sets to old coins. I think during this bad economy everybody can use extra money but most people say they are taking advantage of selling direct to our refinery because of the higher prices we pay."

During this special event anyone is welcome to bring all types of gold, silver and platinum to the refinery and turn it in for instant payment. The types of items they will accept include all gold jewelry; gold coins; gold ounces; dental gold; old coins dated 1964 and before including: Silver Dollars, halves, quarters and dimes; anything marked "sterling" including: flat ware sets, tea pots, silver bars, silver ounces and all industrial precious metals.

What should you expect if you go to the event to sell your gold and/or silver? Just gather up all gold silver and platinum in any form. If you are not sure if its gold or silver bring it in and they will test it for free. When you arrive at the event you will be asked to fill out a simple registration card and

will be issued a number. Seating will be available. When your number is called you will be escorted to a table where your items will be examined, tested and sorted. This only takes a few minutes using their expertise and specialized equipment. Items will be counted and/or weighed. The value of the items will be determined based on up to the minute market prices. Live feeds will be available at the event displaying current market prices of all precious metals. If you choose to sell your items, they will be bagged and tagged and you will be escorted to the cashier to collect your payment. Waiting time to sell your items may range from just a few minutes to 1 hour so bring something to read.

If you are the owner of a jewelry store, pawn shop, dentist office or a dealer you are encouraged to call ahead to make an appointment with the smelt master to discuss their special dealer programs. They can be reached during refinery hours at (815) 224-9000.

Ohio Valley Refinery will open for business Tuesday from 9am-6pm. The event continues every day through next Saturday. No appointment is needed.

Silver and Gold Coin Prices Up During Poor Economy.

Got Coin? It might be just the time to cash in. Next week, starting Tuesday and continuing through Saturday, the International Collectors Association in conjunction with the Ohio Valley Gold & Silver Refinery will be purchasing all types of silver and gold coins direct from the public. Collectors will be on hand to identify and sort your coins. Then the quality or grade will be determined. According to collectors I talked with, the better the grade the more they are worth. With the current silver and gold markets, high prices are being paid for older coins too. Any coins minted in 1964 and before in the U.S. are 90% silver except nickels and pennies.

The coins worth is determined by the rarity and the grade. Old silver dollars are worth a great premium right now. Even well worn and heavy circulated ones are bringing good premiums. Franklin and Kennedy halves, Washington quarters and Mercury and Roosevelt dimes are all worth many times their face value. While older types like Seated Liberty, Standing Liberties, and Barber coins are worth even more.

Gold coins are really worth a lot right now according to Brian Fades of the International Collectors Association. This country didn't start minting coins until 1792 says Fades. Before that people would trade goods using gold dust and nuggets. Some shop keepers would take more gold than needed to pay for items. purchased. There was no uniform system of making change.

The government opened the first mints and began distributing the coins in 1792. By the beginning of the 19th century, coins and paper currency were wide spread and our monetary system was here to stay. In 1933 Roosevelt required all banking institutions to turn in all gold coins.

Once all banks turned in this gold, the president raised the gold standard from \$20.00 per ounce to \$33.00 per ounce. This was his way of stimulating the economy during the great depression. However, gold coins were never redistributed after the recall. Not all gold coins were turned in. Many folks during that time didn't completely trust the government and chose to keep their gold.

These gold coins are sought after by collectors today and bring many times the face value. Any gold coins with the mint marks of CC, D or O will bring nice premiums. Collectors at the event will be glad to show you where to look. Other types of coins will also be purchase including: foreign coins, Indian head cents, two cent pieces, half dimes, three cent pieces and buffalo nickels to name a few.

Collectors warn people against trying to clean their coins as significant damage can be done and the coins value lessened.

USDA NEWS UPDATE

USDA FSA Reminds Producers of Nearing Deadline for FSA County Committees

United States Department of Agriculture Farm Service Agency (FSA) State Executive Director Scherrie V. Giamanco wishes to remind farmers, ranchers and other agricultural producers that they have until August 2, to nominate eligible candidates to serve on local FSA county committees.

"The last day to file nomination forms is just a few days away," Giamanco said. "Please get involved this year and nominate the candidate of your choice or nominate yourself to serve on your local county committee. I especially encourage the nomination of beginning farmers and ranchers, as well as minorities and women. This is your opportunity to have input in how federal programs are delivered in your county."

FSA county committees help local farmers through their decisions on commodity price support loans, conservation programs and disaster programs, and by working closely with county executive directors.

To be eligible to hold office as a county committee member, individuals must participate or cooperate in a program administered by FSA, be eligible to vote in a county committee election and live in the local administrative area where they are running. A complete list of eligibility requirements, more information and nomination forms are available at <http://www.fsa.usda.gov/elections>.

All nominees must sign the nomination form FSA-669A. All nomination forms for the 2010 election must be post-marked or received in the local USDA Service Center by close of business on August 2.

After that, ballots will be mailed to eligible voters by November 5 and are due back to the local USDA Service Centers on Dec. 6. The newly elected county committee members will take office January 1.

In 1983 while on a business trip in Milan, Italy, Howard Schulz came across some neighborhood espresso bars where all the customers seemed to know and enjoy each others' company. Each bar had a slightly different atmosphere. Some were upscale and expensive while others were small and homey. Invariably, however, each place offered an atmosphere of friendliness, belonging, and family.

This was the inspiration for the start of his own small chain of "coffee bar" restaurants across the Pacific Northwest known as Il Giornale. In his new businesses he determined to focus on accomplishing three things:

2. To offer customers the highest quality service and product the company could provide (in this case coffee by the cup or the pound); and
3. To educate customers about the product being offered.

In 1987 Mr. Schulz and his partners purchased a little known Seattle-based whole bean coffee retail business named Starbucks, and a new coffee empire was born.

Companies, hospitals, social groups and even churches can learn something from Howard Schultz and his Starbucks enterprise. If every organization made those three goals their own—believing in them and living them what a difference it would make.

For example, for a church it would be

1. To provide a friendly atmosphere where visitors and members alike will feel welcome, wanted, and comfortable;
2. To offer everyone to the highest quality service [worship & fellowship] and product [grace of God] the church can provide; and
3. To educate attendees about the product being offered.

Better yet, wouldn't it be great if we could say that we, as individuals, had incorporated these three goals into our lives? Ask yourself the three questions:

1. Do I exude a friendly atmosphere that makes everyone feel welcome, wanted, and comfortable?
2. Do I offer everyone I meet the highest quality service (my time) and product (my attention)?
3. Do I educate people about who I am and what my values are?

Howard Schulz made Starbucks a success by offering people the highest quality in a friendly way. He gave people great value for their investment. We could do better if we did likewise.

SURE Deadline

•• Sept. 30 Deadline for SURE Program Applications

United States Department of Agriculture Farm Service Agency (FSA) State Executive Director Scherrie V. Giamanco announced that the deadline to submit USDA Farm Service Agency 2008 Supplemental Revenue Assistance Payments (SURE) program applications is close of business on September 30. Applications not filed by September 30 will not receive a payment.

SURE provides crop disaster assistance payments to eligible producers on farms that have incurred crop production or crop quality losses. The program takes into consideration crop losses on all crops grown by a producer nationwide. SURE provides assistance in an amount equal to 60 percent of the difference between the SURE farm guarantee and total farm revenue. The farm guarantee is based on the amount of crop insurance guarantees, Non-insured Crop Disaster Assistance Program (NAP) guarantees, and waived in crop guarantees on the farm. Total farm revenue takes into account the estimate crop value on the farm as well as insurance indemnities and certain farm program payments.

To be eligible for SURE, producers must have suffered at least a 10 percent production loss, adjusted for quality on a crop of economic significance. In addition, producers must meet the risk management purchase requirement by either obtaining a policy or plan of insurance, under the Federal Crop Insurance Act or NAP coverage, for all economically significant crops. For 2008 crops, producers had the opportunity to obtain a waiver of the risk management purchase requirement through a buy-in provision. Producers considered socially disadvantaged, a beginning farmer or rancher, or a limited resource farmer may be eligible for SURE without a policy or plan of insurance or NAP coverage.

•• Conservation Reserve Program General Sign-up

A Conservation Reserve Program (CRP) general sign-up will continue through August 27th. Farmers and ranchers interested in offering land under the competitive general sign-up are encouraged to contact their local FSA office.

Eligible land includes cropland that is planted or considered planted in at least 4 of 6 crop years from 2002 through 2007. CRP acreage with a contract expiring on September 30th may also be offered for re-enrollment under the general CRP sign-up. FSA will evaluate and rank eligible CROP offers utilizing the Environmental Benefits Index (EBI) to determine environmental benefits gained from enrolling the applicable land in CRP. EBI consists of five environmental factors; including wildlife habitat, water quality, reduced soil erosion, air quality, enduring benefits and a cost factor. At the conclusion of the general sign-up, the Secretary will determine the EBI cutoff and analyze the EBI of all submitted offers. Land that has met previous general sign-up EBI thresholds is not guaranteed a contract under this general sign-up.

Producers with environmentally desirable land devoted to certain conservation practices may also want to consider enrolling land under the ongoing CRP continuous sign-up. Basic eligibility requirements still apply; however, offers are not subject to competitive bidding.

or other persons at a hearing, that party must immediately contact the Clerk of the Board, who will attempt to make arrangements for a more suitable venue. If no one has informed the Clerk that a large group is expected and more persons come to a hearing than can be safely permitted in the room, the Board may restrict the number of people in the room to those who can be safely admitted.

4. Public comment may be accepted at the Board's discretion.

H. Clerk of the Board of Review. The administrative functions of the Board are discharged by the Putnam County Chief County Assessment Officer, who shall act as the Clerk of the Board.

II. Appeal Hearings

The purpose of an appeal hearing is to evaluate a property assessment based upon evidence presented by all concerned parties: typically, appellant and assessor and, where applicable, intervener.

A. Standing. Only a taxpayer or owner of property (or agent/attorney thereof) dissatisfied with a property's assessment or a taxing body that has a tax revenue interest in the decision of the Board on an assessment made by any local assessment officer may file an appeal with the Board. Appeals must be filed on the forms provided by the Board of Review and available in the Supervisor of Assessment's office. All applicable items on the form must be completed. Any non-owner (such as an agent or attorney) filing an appeal on behalf of an owner must have authorization by the owner of record.

B. Date of Filing. All appeals must be filed with the Board of Review on or before 30 days after the date of publication of the current year assessments (35 ILCS 200/16-55).

Appeals are deemed filed on the date

1. officially postmarked by the U. S. Postal Service or by a private mail/delivery service, or
2. hand delivered to the Board of Review office and stamped received.

Filing deadlines may fall on a postal holiday or a Board of Review holiday. In these cases, appeals must be post marked or hand delivered before the final deadline. The Board of Review office is closed on Saturdays and Sundays and the following holidays:

New Year's Day
Lincoln's Birthday
President's Day
Good Friday
Memorial Day
Independence Day
Labor Day
Columbus Day
Thanksgiving Day and the following Friday
Christmas Day.

The Board accepts only official postmarks (not metered-mail dates) and hand deliveries on or before deadlines. It does not accept appeal forms nor case-related materials by fax or email. Late filings are not scheduled for hearings.

C. Appeal Forms and Information. The Board requests that all parties to an appeal utilize the prescribed forms and comparison grids of the Putnam County Board of Review. These forms are available in the Chief County Assessment Office. Neither the Board nor its Clerk will send appeal forms or information by any method other than first class mail.

1. Incomplete Forms. Incomplete appeal forms may not be set for hearing.
2. Contiguous Parcels. When filing an appeal, all contiguous parcels included in that property must be filed on, even if a reduction is sought on only one parcel. For purposes of this rule, contiguous parcels include all parcels that are physically contiguous, have a unity of use and are owned by the same owner(s) of record, including beneficial ownership.
3. Reductions of \$100,000 or more. Pursuant to 35 ILCS 200/16-55, if an appellant is requesting a reduction in assessed valuation of \$100,000 or more, the Board must notify each respective taxing district. It is therefore required that appellants supply their requested assessment total in the appropriate space on the appeal form. If this information is not provided, the Board will assume the requested assessment is \$100,000 or more and thus notify all potentially impacted taxing districts.

E. Submission of Evidence. The Board requires that the original appeal form and evidence, plus three (3) copies of the form and evidence, be submitted at the time of application, except for a documented appraisal report, which must be received in the Board office (irrespective of postmark) no more than ten (10) calendar days after the filing deadline. The Board forwards a copy of each appeal and accompanying evidence to the appropriate township assessor. Any appellant or agent/attorney filing additional evidence with the Board of Review after the initial case submission must forward the additional evidence to the Supervisor of Assessment's Office. Evidence submitted at the hearing by any party (appellant, assessor or intervener) may be accepted by the Board; however, it may be given less weight than evidence submitted in accordance with Board rules.

F. Hearing Notification. An appellant will be notified by U.S. Mail of the hearing date, time and place of the hearing. If an appellant fails to appear for the hearing, or fails to telephone the Board on the scheduled date and time, the case will be decided on the evidence submitted with the appeal form along with any evidence submitted or presented by other parties to the appeal. If an appellant has requested a hearing by letter, no notice will be sent and the case will be decided upon the evidence submitted by the appellant with the appeal form plus any evidence submitted by other parties to the case: typically the township assessor and/or the Supervisor of Assessments where applicable, an intervener.

G. Scheduled Hearings. Scheduled hearings are not rescheduled due to time constraints of the property tax cycle.

H. Location of Hearings. Hearings of the Board are held at the Putnam County Courthouse, 120 N. Fourth Street, Hennepin, IL 61327. Meetings may be held at other locations in the County at the discretion of the Board.

I. Hearing Format. Appeal hearings are conducted in the following manner: The appellant or his/her representative may present testimony regarding the assessment and are required to answer any questions from the Board. The Township Assessor or the Supervisor of Assessments is expected to be present to give evidence and testimony concerning the property and its assessment. Each party may then present closing or rebuttal remarks. This concludes the evidentiary portion of the hearing. Board Members then deliberate between or among themselves, considering the evidence, testimony and rebuttal, and generally announce their decision at the close of the hearing.

J. Hearing Length. Because of the volume of appeals before the Board, most hearings are scheduled at fifteen-minute intervals. All presentations by an appellant and an assessor, along with questions and the deliberation of the Board, must be completed within this time frame.

K. Decisions After all hearings are completed for a township, official findings for each case are mailed to all appellants or their representatives. No written decisions are released prior to this time.

L. Evidence Submitted by the Township Assessor and/or Supervisor of Assessment's Office. All evidence to support a township as-

essor's and/or the Supervisor of Assessment's opinion of assessed value, including complete Property Record Cards for subject properties and any comparables, must be submitted to the Board no less than five (5) calendar days prior to a hearing. For each appeal, a total of three (3) copies of the evidence must be submitted to the Board. The Board also strongly encourages township assessors to forward township evidence to appellants five (5) days prior to their respective scheduled hearing dates.

M. Evidence Submitted by Interveners. A taxing body wishing to intervene in a matter before the Board must file a Request to Intervene with the Board of Review at least five (5) days in advance of the scheduled hearing. This form is available in the Supervisor of Assessment's office. Any evidence being presented by a taxing district needs to be supplied to the Assessor, appellant and Board of Review prior to the hearing.

III. Bases for Assessment Appeals

A. Appeals Based upon Incorrect Assessor Data.

1. Definition. Incorrect data includes, but is not limited to, size of the site, size of the improvements, physical features and location attributes.

2. Evidence. Appeals based on the application of incorrect subject-property data by a township assessor must include a copy of the property record card for the subject, a statement highlighting the incorrect data and evidence of the correct data, such as a plat of survey, photograph or construction documents.

3. Assessor Access to Property. Appellants are urged to schedule a property inspection with their Assessor's office for appeals related to the description, physical characteristics and/or condition of the subject property.

B. Appeals Based on the Recent Sale of a Subject Property.

The Board considers the sale of a subject property, which occurred within twelve months of the assessment date, as possible evidence of market value. The Board requires the following information in such an appeal:

1. Documents that disclose the purchase price of the property and the date of purchase including the Settlement Statement, or RESPA, and the State of Illinois PTAX form.
2. Testimony and/or documentation revealing the identity of seller(s) and buyer(s) and any relationship between or among them (other than seller and buyer) including, but not limited to, those existing by blood, marriage, corporate parent-subsidiary companies or by virtue of ownership of non-publicly held stock, and whether or not the transaction was arms length.
3. An itemized Bill of Sale, signed by seller(s) and buyer(s), and supporting documentation of the fair cash value of any personal property included in the sale of the subject property.

C. Appeals Based on Fair Cash Value.

1. Definition. Fair cash value is defined as "the amount for which a property can be sold in the due course of business and trade, not under duress, between a willing buyer and a willing seller." (35 ILCS 200/1-50) Fair cash value is often used interchangeably with market value.

2. Burden of Proof. When fair cash value is the basis of an appeal, the value of the subject property must be proved by a preponderance of the evidence.

3. Appraisal Evidence. The best evidence of fair cash value (in lieu of a recent usable sale price of a subject property itself) is a professional appraisal done for ad valorem purposes, valuing a subject property as of the lien date, January 1st of the current assessment year. Appraisals obtained for the purpose of an appeal this assessment year must state the subject's value as of January 1, 2010.

a. To be considered, an appraisal must be:

- i. Prepared in conformance to the Uniform Standards of Professional Appraisal Practice as currently adopted by the Appraisal Standards Board.
- ii. Signed by the appraiser(s).
- iii. Presented in entirety, including all exhibits, with no missing pages.

b. Appraisal testimony offered to prove the valuation asserted by any party shall not be accepted at the hearing unless a documented appraisal report has been timely submitted.

c. Except for homestead property, appraisal testimony offered to prove the valuation asserted may be given only by a preparer of the appraisal whose signature appears thereon. An appraisal which does not accompany an initial Appeal Form is acceptable to the Board, if it is received by the Board (irrespective of post mark) within ten (10) calendar days of the filing deadline and if it is distributed by the appellant in the following manner: one (1) original and two (2) copies to the Board of Review and one (1) copy to the appropriate assessor's office. Appraisals which are not filed in a timely manner nor appropriately distributed to the Board of Review and appropriate assessor may not be considered by the Board.

4. Recent Usable Sales of Comparable Properties. In lieu of a professional appraisal, recent usable sales of comparable properties may be submitted as evidence for a fair cash value appeal. A usable sale is an arms length transaction of a property between or among unrelated parties, who are not under any duress to buy or sell the property which has been offered on the open market and advertised for sale.

If recent usable sales of comparable properties are submitted as evidence for a fair cash value appeal, it is preferable to select the best three (3) comparables which have closed as close to the lien date, January 1, 2010, as possible. Comparables should be located near the subject and/or in the same neighborhood. They should be similar in style (e.g., ranch, 2-story, split-level, etc.), construction (e.g., brick, frame, with or without a basement, etc.), age, size (e.g., square footage of lot and building), quality and condition to the subject. If comparables are not located in the subject's neighborhood, additional explanation may be needed to confirm their similarity.

Characteristics of the subject and three (3) comparables must be displayed on the Residential Comparison Grid, and submitted with the original appeal, together with pictures of the subject and comparables. These forms are available in the Supervisor of Assessment's office. An appellant or agent/attorney is reminded to view comparable properties to confirm their similarity to the subject.

Comparable properties offered in testimony but not submitted with the original appeal may not be considered by the Board, unless provided to all parties prior to a hearing.

5. Other Evidence. Other evidence of fair cash value may consist of, but is not limited to, the following:

- a. Listing contract and Multiple Listing Service history of a subject property for 2009 and 2010.
- b. A complete (final) sworn contractor's affidavit of costs, if the improvement is new construction, together with a Settlement Statement (or RESPA).

6. Income Producing Property. When an assessment appeal for an income-producing property is based on fair cash value, the income and expense data of the property must be submitted as evidence.

- a. Where the entire property is covered under a single lease, the entire lease must be submitted as evidence.
- b. Where multiple leases are in place, the Board will consider lease summaries, audited financial statements, rent rolls with totals and representative samples of leases submitted by the tax-

payer and any such documents requested by the Board.

i. If the property is fully residential with six or fewer units, the appellant must provide to the Board at the time of filing the operating statements, audits and all other pertinent information.

ii. If the property has seven or more units or has a non-residential use, the appellant must submit, at the time of filing, income and expense statements for 2007, 2008 and 2009.

c. Vacancy. If an appeal for reduced assessment is based upon vacancy, the appellant must provide an affidavit of occupancy.

D. Appeals Based on Equity.

1. Definition. Real property assessments shall be valued uniformly as the General Assembly provides by law (Art.9, Sec 2, Illinois Constitution of 1970). An inequitable assessment is one that values one property at a higher level of assessment (relative to fair cash value) than assessments of comparable properties. (Note: Courts in Illinois have found that mathematical exactitude is not an absolute requirement in estimating property assessments.)

2. Burden of Proof. When unequal treatment in the assessment process is the basis of an appeal, inequity must be proved by clear and convincing evidence.

3. Evidence Considered. Comparable properties usually are submitted as evidence for equity appeals, arguing that the assessed value per square foot of a subject is higher than that of comparables.

It is preferable to select the best three (3) comparables. Comparables should be located near the subject and/or in the same neighborhood. They should be similar in style (e.g., ranch, 2-story, split-level, etc.), construction (e.g., brick, frame, with or without a basement, etc.), age, size (e.g., square footage of above ground living area), quality and condition to the subject. If comparables are not located in the subject's neighborhood, additional explanation may be needed to confirm their similarity.

Characteristics of the subject and three (3) comparables must be displayed on the Residential Comparison Grid and submitted with the original appeal, together with pictures of the subject and comparables.

An appellant or agent/attorney is reminded to view potential comparables to confirm their similarity to the subject.

Comparable properties, offered in testimony but not submitted with the original appeal, may not be considered by the Board, unless provided to all parties prior to a hearing.

4. Income-producing Properties. When an assessment appeal for an income-producing property is based on equity, the income and expense data of the property must be submitted as evidence, including all leases and/or rent rolls for the three (3) years previous to the lien date.

E. Appeals Based upon Matters of Law.

1. Definition. Matters of law include such factors as carrying forward prior year residential appeal results, preferential assessment and farmland valuation.

2. Evidence. Appeals alleging an incorrect application of law must include a brief, citing the law in question, as well as copies of any legal opinions and/or judicial rulings regarding the law in question.

3. Prior Board of Review Decisions. Owner occupied residential property assessment appeals based upon prior year Board of Review decisions should contain the Notice of Finding from the Board of Review from the general assessment year or from the subsequent year where applicable. Aside from substantial cause, prior year decisions on owner-occupied residential properties should be carried forward until the next general assessment year, subject to the Chief County Assessment Officer's equalization. Cases based solely on this reason will be set for review only after a review by the Board or its staff.

4. Additional Copy Required. In addition to the customary one (1) original and three (3) copies of the appeal form and accompanying documentary evidence, an additional one (1) copy must be provided to the Board. The Board will forward the additional copy to the Board's legal counsel.

IV. Omitted Property

A. Authority. The Board has the authority to place an assessment on omitted property (35 ILCS 200/9-160, et seq.).

B. Notice. If the Board initiates proceedings designed to place omitted property on the tax rolls, the Board gives at least ten (10) working days written notice to the concerned parties, advising them of the Board's proposed action.

V. Non-Homestead Exemptions

A. Applications. Applications for Non-Homestead exemptions must be filed on forms of the Illinois Department of Revenue: PTAX-300, PTAX-300-FS (for federal and state agencies) and PTAX-300-R (for religious entities). These forms, along with the general and specific instructions for their completion, are available at the Supervisor of Assessment's office. If an exemption for multiple parcels is being sought, separate applications may be required. See the Illinois Department of Revenue general instructions to determine the required number of separate applications. The petition and supporting documentation must be submitted in duplicate. According to the Illinois Department of Revenue, failure to answer all questions and provide all evidence will result in the return of the petition and delay a final decision.

B. Documents. The following documents must be attached to the application forms:

1. Proof of ownership (deed, contract for deed, title insurance policy, copy of the condemnation order and proof of payment, etc.)
2. Picture of the property
3. Notarized affidavit of use
4. Copies of any contracts or leases on the property
5. Parsonage form, where applicable.

C. Notification of Units of Government. If the request for an exemption would reduce the assessment by \$100,000 or more, the applicant or agent for the applicant must notify the units of government in their jurisdiction. A copy of the letters showing the notification of each Unit of Government must be submitted with the application at time of filing.

D. The Board of Review makes a recommendation to the Illinois Department of Revenue as to whether or not a non-homestead exemption is allowed. The Illinois Department of Revenue reviews the evidence and renders the final decision.

VIII. Adoption

Adoption. These rules are adopted for the 2010 session of the Putnam County Board of Review as of June 21, 2010.

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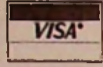

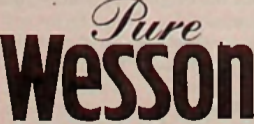

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ROE Issues School Bus Safety Memo to Drivers

The school supplies have been purchased, students are registered and now it is time for all of our school aged children to return to the classroom. Since school buses must meet more Federal Motor Vehicle Safety standards than any other type of motor vehicle, they are the safest motor vehicles on the road. The Regional Office of Education would like to remind everyone of their responsibilities to know and adhere to the school bus laws of Illinois. A few safety tips to remember when you meet or follow a school bus as required by Illinois law are:

- It is unlawful for a driver to pass a school bus that has stopped to load or unload children when the signal arm is extended and the lights are flashing.
- On one-way roadways, all traffic must stop for buses picking up children.
- When a highway has at least four lanes of traffic and at least two of these lanes are traveling in a direction opposite from the bus, only motorists traveling in the same direction as the school



bus must stop.

* The speed limit in school zone when students are present is **20 MPH**.

In addition, drivers must be aware of children crossing streets and waiting at designated school bus stops. In some cases, crossing guards also regulate traffic patterns and speed.

Illinois law provides that an individual who fails or refuses to comply with a lawful order of a crossing guard may be fined. Motorists convicted of passing a stopped school bus will have their driver's license suspended for three months with a fine.

Illinois also makes using your cell phone in school zones unlawful. Please slow down and be aware that a child may suddenly appear in the road. By using safe driving habits, you can help ensure a safe school year for the youth in our region.

Effective immediately, the health department in Hennepin will be open the following hours:

- Wednesday Closed
- Thursday 8 a.m. - 4:00 p.m.
- Friday 8 a.m. - 4:00 p.m.

In addition, the board has voted to discontinue the Family Case Management Program, due to lack of payment from the State. While this has been a very difficult decision, the board feels that it is the most fiscally responsible action for them to take given the current circumstances. While the hours that the health department operates will be different, core programs and services will continue to be provided for the citizens of Putnam County. These include food, well, septic, tanning inspections and Communicable Disease Control. In addition, the health department will continue offering Immunizations, WIC, Teen Parent Services, Disaster Response, Tar Wars and West Nile Virus Education as well as our Community Partners Against Substance Abuse (CPASA) Coalition. 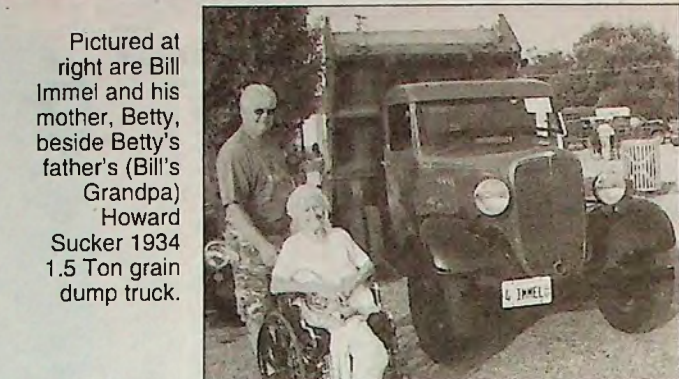

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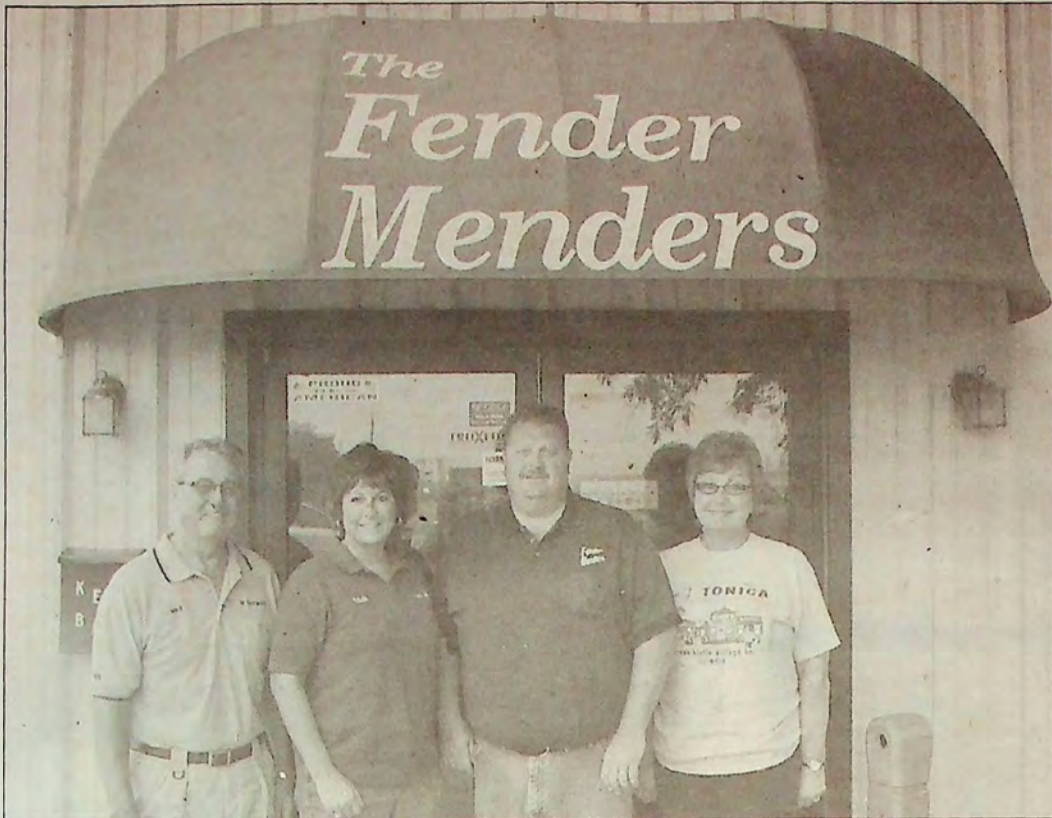

Twenty-five years ago on August 1, 1985, Mike and Linda Supan took a major business step and opened The Fender Menders in rural Peru. Mike Supan, Sr. had worked and then managed the body shop at Bill Walsh in Ottawa for eighteen years. He decided it was time to strike out on his own.

"There were many sleepless nights in the beginning of the business. One great help in the beginning after being open only three weeks, Mother Nature helped our business. A terrific hail storm struck Mendota and it gave us three months of repair work," Mike, Sr. stated, laughing.

"In the start of the body shop there was only one building. The repair shop and the office were in the same location. The paint fumes at times would overwhelm me and I would have to go outside and breathe some fresh air. We have come a long way since those first years. The business has ex-

panded three times since the beginning and now the office is in a separate location," Linda explained.

The business has changed radically over twenty-five years. They now sell sheds, truck accessories and truck toppers.

After many years of hard work making quality repairs to damaged vehicles, the senior Supans have passed the reins to their son and daughter. Mike Jr., vice president of the corporation, has worked at the shop since its inception. Mi-

chelle has been working in the office for eight years. She is the secretary-treasurer of the corporation. Linda still holds the office of president.

Remembering Hopkins – 10th Triennial Reunion

Hey! If you're a Hopkins Township High School alumnus and missed the August 7, 10th Triennial Reunion at the new Putnam County Primary School which sits on the site of Hopkins' track field, you missed a truly enjoyable event.

Approaching the building at the main entrance and exiting from the nest door to the East evoked many memories. To the left hand side as one enters is beautiful landscaping whose focal point is the flag pole with the big old boulder with the plaque commemorating the Granville Convention of 1851 at the base, as it was at H.T.H.S., and a new black iron bench. All are gifts of the Hopkins Alumni. Similar landscaping to the right hand side is the gift of the Hopkins Family. (Arch is the grandson of A. W. Hopkins the president of the first board of education of Hopkins High School. Both Arch and his wife Judy have held the same position of president of the board of the Putnam County Community Unit District.)

Journeying through the rooms and corridors to the gym, one depicts other memorabilia from Hopkins – paintings, stained glass windows, bas-reliefs, and statuary. Superintendent Dr. Jay McCracken has shown great appreciation for the heritage of Hopkins and encouraged the displays, the use of the gym for the reunion, and has labeled the entrance hallway to the gym, "Hopkins Hallway." It is here that a number of paintings hang and the statue of Blackhawk resides.

Formally the Hopkins Alumni Museum Association became the Hopkins Alumni Association since all efforts failed to re-establish the Museum. All alumni are welcome at meetings the second Monday of most months in the Conference room (or Media Center) of the Primary School. The regulars are a small group. Robert Peterson, '61, is President, Joe Panier, '41, is Vice-president, Loretta Zimmerman Schrowang, '54, is Secretary, and Linda Webster Bean, '57, is Treasurer. Co-curators are Ardene Bonucchi Peterson, '61, and Helen Marie Hawthorne Engelbrecht, '43. The Execu-

tive Board members are Don Troglio, '51, Dorothy Konneck Donaldson, '40, Margaret "Peg" Franceway Gonet, '53, Karen Zellmer Ossola, '65, Margaret Tulini Bonucchi, '36, and recent helpers Charlene Zellmer Sandberg, '51, and Kathryn Serrine Whitely, '63.

Relocating many of the artifacts from Hopkins has been/is a big job. The Bald Eagle in its case is in the lobby of the Granville National Bank, the scale model of the school is in the lobby at Mennie's Machine Shop at Mark, all the military items are at the Granville American Legion hall, the case of trophies is at the Clover Club in Mark, the stuffed birds, and animals, the saddle and the poster of the Buell Institute are at the Putnam County Historical Society Ag Museum at Hennepin. The boulder with the Buell Institute plaque rests at the backdoor of the PCCSD High School. The statues of Washington, Lincoln, and T. Roosevelt are in the High School media center. Bas-reliefs, and stained glass windows are in both the Primary School and the High School. The plaques of the "Nation's Defenders" and "Early Settlers" have been installed on the front of the Granville Village hall. Much credit and thanks go to Joe Panier and Don Troglio for labor and innovations in the placement of many items; and to the ladies who rejuvenated the pictures which were hung.

Following the trail of green balloons Saturday evening, guests were led to the gym where more big balloons designated the seating location for each class. The balloons were anchored by glass paper weights which have a picture of the school imbedded in them. Also centering each class area was a framed picture of the class in a green frame and a listing on the back of deceased members.

Posted on several areas of the walls and one table were pictures and memorabilia. One area was portrayed as Bill's (Tonarelli, '45) Snack Bar and another as Marcacci's Soda Fountain. Awaiting each guest was a name tag, a listing of all attendees and a printed program in green and white.

The super good dinner served by the Country Caterers of Lostant was arranged for by Jovanna "Sis" Ramey Mear, '55. The soft drink bar was

under her supervision as well and manned by some of her family.

Peter Fassino, '48, served as Master of Ceremonies and following his statement to welcome everyone, Nancy Naumann Brandstatter, '58, gave a short note of remembrance followed by a moment of silence in honor of the many deceased alumni. She then extended a dinner prayer.

Following the dinner, M.C. Fassino introduced the officers of the Association. Joseph Panier led the assemblage in the Pledge to the Flag.

President Peterson conducted a brief business meeting to give an update of the activities of the Association and to introduce special guest Dr. McCracken. He also commended Panier and Troglio for their many achievements. He told how Cattani's of Ladd had moved the big boulder; and how the plaques now on the Village hall had been "cleaned up." Both actions were gratis. Linda Bean received kudos for the many things she had planned and prepared for the reunion.

Karen Ossola presented a donation for the scholarship fund from her Class of '65 in memory of Ellen Engelhaupt King.

Linda Bean gave information regarding the scholarship program noting that all donations are placed in that fund. To date, three scholarships have been awarded – the first to Erin Keenan who goes to school in IA, Kelsey Ryan who is a student at Monmouth College, and Jessica Baker who will be attending IVCC.

Ron Zellmer, '66, presented Web-site information telling what is on the Web-site, what can be added and what he would like to add.

Linda Bean and Charlene Sandberg, '51, conducted the raffle drawing. Lucky winners were: \$100.00 – Gary Borri, '59; \$50.00 – Joyce Passini James, '63; and \$25.00 – Mary Jane Skutt Pratt, '57 who was not present.

Ilene Schrowang Shaw, '58, preparatory to calling the Roll of Classes gave nostalgic reminiscence of Hopkins Township High School. Each Class was asked to stand, if able, and many have reached a point where standing is not easy or is even impossible.

The rest of the evening was spent visiting. Dr. McCracken assembled a group for any who wished to tour the Primary school. Those departing were asked to exit by the door to the left upon leaving the gym and thus see other items in the "Hopkins Hall." For those

wishing to continue partying, there was a special "old time" band at the Clover Club in Mark.

Attendance is dwindling. Where in 1984 there were 444 and everyone was nearly sitting in his neighbor's lap, this year of 2010 there were 260 reservations not only from Illinois, but from Italy and the following 17 states of Alabama, Arizona, California, Colorado, Florida, Georgia, Iowa, Indiana, Kentucky, Michigan, Minnesota, New Jersey, North Carolina, Nevada, Ohio, Texas, and Wisconsin. Since many locals shun the event and the number of those known to have passed away since 2007 is 84, it is not surprising the group is smaller.

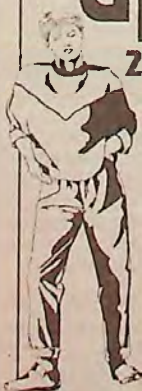

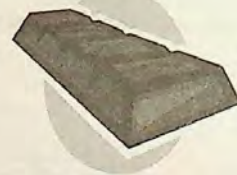

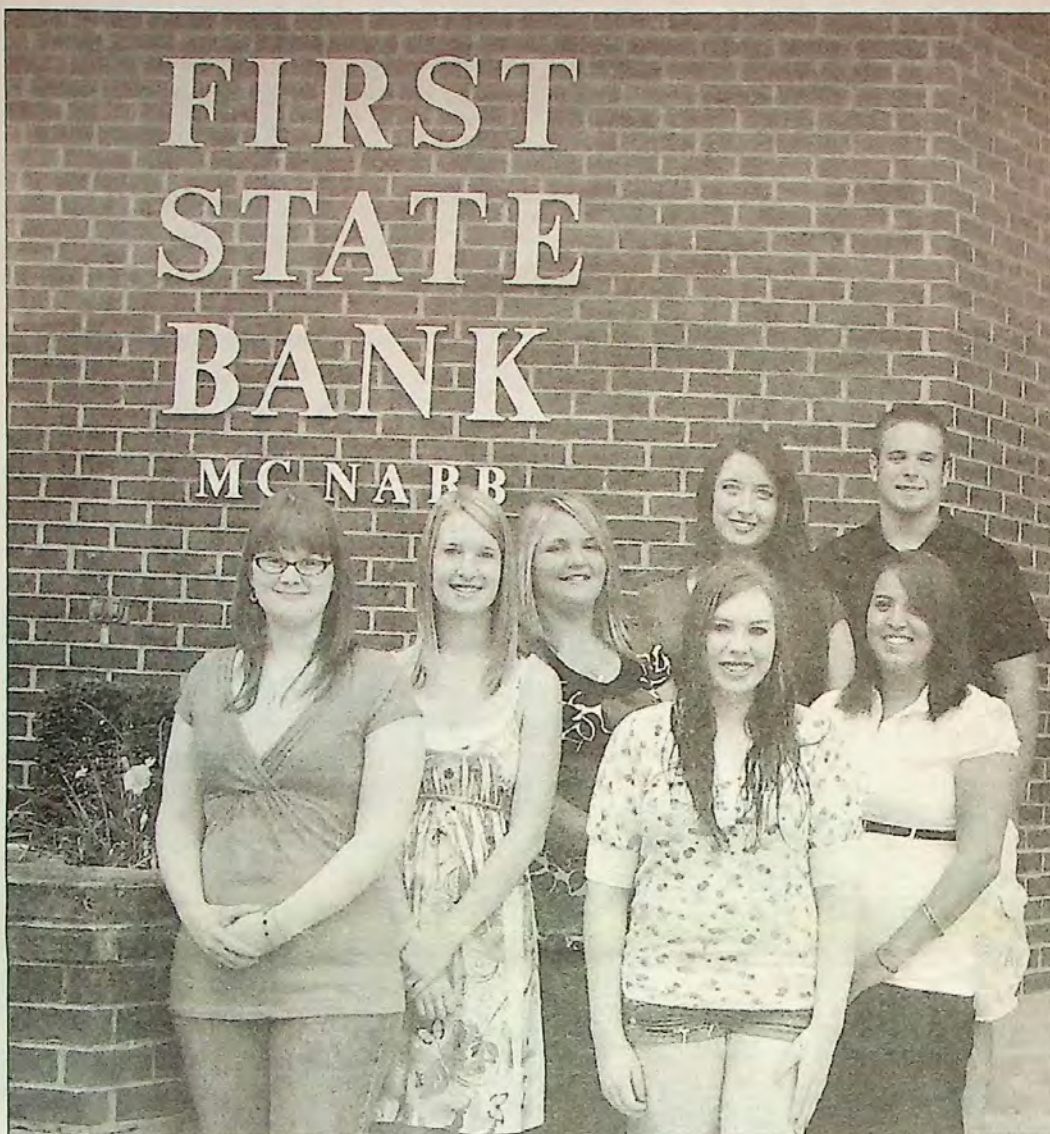
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Nelson Scholarships Awarded

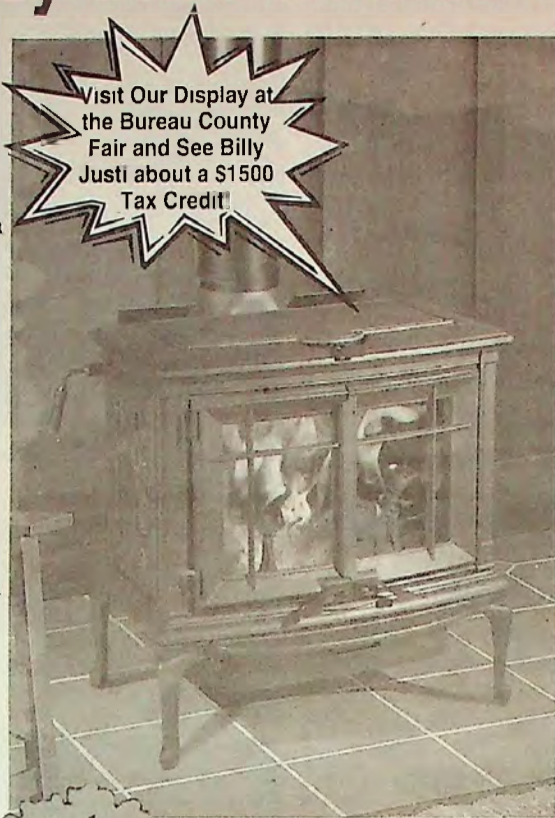

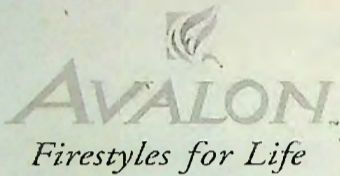

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Linda's Loving Legacy - A Story of the Epley Family

In September of 1991 Linda Epley Coleman of McNabb was fighting breast cancer. She sent a letter to all of her family. This is what she wrote, "Well here it is! What you all have been waiting for, a family newsletter! If there is enough interest, and I can find time, I am going to try it. I hope you are all as interested as I am. The purpose of this newsletter is to keep each other informed of important - and maybe not so important - things going on in each family. My own news is that I have finished chemotherapy, Hooray!!!! I go back to Madison on Wed., Sept. 18th to meet with my radiologist to decide about the 30 radiation treatments I have to have yet. They are every day, five days a week. I hope to have them in Spring Valley and have them either very early, or late in the day, so I can still work a full day. Somehow, I have gotten through this, I know how, with God and my family. Help, I need a "catchy" name for the news letter!"

Linda went on listing birthdays of family members for September and October plus family sport events, upcoming events, she wanted a family picture for Thanksgiving, a spot for want ads, other news. She finished the newsletter with this summary: "So this is all I have so far. If you have input for the next one call me, or write me at my McNabb address. Or if you think this is a dumb idea, let me know. This is an appeal to the grandchildren, too, for information."

Her second newsletter in October of 1991 listed several names that were suggested for the newsletter: Epley Events, Epley Essays, Epley Echoes, Epley Edits, The Epleylog, Goings-On, Epleylogue. The family picked Epleylogue when they voted at the family Thanksgiving get-together (Joyce's brother, Norman, who lives in Canada, picked the name for the newsletter).

"The thirteenth edition was

printed in October of 1992. This was to be Linda's last letter, because she passed away on October 23, 1992. She wrote this: "The news from Duane, Jennifer (Linda's daughter) and I this month seems to center pretty much around caring for me, as I go from one problem to another. I return to Madison tomorrow, Oct. 5th to figure out where we go from here. Duane and I made a four day trip to Toronto to see evangelist Benny Hinn. I found the services long and exhausting. We really enjoyed the trip though and thank Uncle Norman and Aunt June for their hospitality. I hope next month finds me feeling up to returning to my newsletter duties. I'll settle for just feeling better and being back on my feet."

The Epleylogue's newsletter's 14th edition in November of 1992 after Linda died added the byline title to the newsletter, "Linda's Loving Legacy." It was more of an appropriate tribute. Uncle Norman wrote in that edition that "Epleylogue has lost its creator, its driving force, its editor in chief and the person who did so much to bring our diversified family together, we have lost Linda. Her priorities were always for those she loved even though her own concerns must have been enormous. To all of you I say, although you have lost a very special loved one, your loss is heavens gain. She started, our Epleylogue. It is her legacy to us. Your devoted Uncle."

When Linda died, Carol and Jim kept the newsletter going. The last 10 years Jackie, who lives in Washington DC does the bulk of it. Now the news is sent to her electronically. When the Epleylogue started only one-half of the grandchildren were born, and now they add to the newsletter. Linda wanted the family to stay in touch, and to continue the newsletter forever, which they have done for the last 19 years.

The newsletter was started monthly, then every other month in 1994 and quarterly in 2000 because it was getting too big as the family was getting bigger, too.

In August, September of 1997 the 50th edition was published. This was the fifth anniversary of Linda's passing. In this edition, Linda's daughter Jennifer wrote that her friend had written a song about her and her mother called "Pink Ribbons." The words tell of the love between mother and daughter and saying goodbye. Joyce wrote "I do hope this 50th edition is all that Carol hoped it would be as a tribute to Linda on the 5th anniversary of her death." Uncle Norman wrote, "Thanks to everyone who contributed the news and information that we are all so anxious to read, and most of all, thanks to dear Linda who started this 'loving legacy.' What a wonderfully family link she created."

In the 68th edition, December of 2000 and January 2001 there was sad news. Jackie wrote that Robin died December 2, 2000. Unfortunately, it took a devastating illness (once again) to realize how precious family is. Robin was always concerned about how everyone else felt. Robin put up a good fight, but it wasn't meant to be. In this edition Robin's mother, Joyce, wrote, "watching Robin fight his illness only to lose the battle was difficult for us all. Because this illness seems to target our family, I hope the rest of the children will keep on top of their health, have regular check-ups, and tests if necessary. Do it for Mom's sake, if not for your own."

In the 92nd edition of Epleylogue there were tributes to the Epley's father, Bob, who had passed away on March 25, 2007. The front page had a color picture of Bob and an emotional poem under it called, "When Tomorrow Starts Without Me."

Cindy's husband Tom wrote

Bob's eulogy. He received his education at the Swaney schools. He farmed until World War II when he joined the army to fight for freedom. He arrived in Great Saling England where he was stationed near Braintree. There he helped build the first U.S. airbase in England, Andrew Air Base. He landed on Utah Beach at Normandy, at H plus 3 hours. He worked to construct an emergency landing strip. At one point he was working within 200 yards of an active enemy artillery replacement. The strip was finished by sundown speeding up operations in northern France, during a critical phase of combat. For this his unit received the Presidential Distinguished Citation. While in England, one Sunday he and other American soldiers walked into a "milk bar" in Braintree where Joyce Reed and a friend who had been out walking were having a cup of tea. The soldiers kept looking at the girls, and the girls kept looking back. Joyce and her friend decided to leave, and a couple of the soldiers followed. One happened to be Bob. The girls were going to Joyce's aunt's house. The soldiers walked along with them. When they reached her aunt's house they stood out in front talking. Joyce's aunt came out and invited them in for tea. The soldiers refused, saying they had to get back to their base. Bob asked Joyce out for a date, and she accepted. They were married on January 11, 1944 while the U.S. and England were preparing for D-Day.

Joyce moved to southern England where Bob was then based. Bob and Joyce's first child, Carol, was born in December, 1944. When Bob was gone after D-Day, Joyce stayed there and watched the gliders take off for two days. After the war, Bob went home first. All the G.I.'s wives stayed in housing at Hampton, until a ship was available for them to go home. Bob was home for several months before Joyce and Carol left for the U.S.A. They just missed the Queen Mary. Their ship left England on February 1, 1946. Carol was thirteen months old and Joyce was 23 years old. They landed at Manhattan NY, boarded a train to Chicago, then to Galva, where Bob was living. They eventually moved to Magnolia where they raised their family.

In the Epleylogue's 100th edition, printed last August, Editor Jackie printed Linda's opening paragraph from the first edition, where Linda asked her family if there would be enough interest in a newsletter. Jackie wrote, "As we now complete our 100th edition, it appears there was enough interest. What a great idea Linda had." Mom Joyce wrote, "It is almost unbelievable that we have reached the 100th edition of Linda's Loving Legacy. She would be proud to know the first little page she wrote back in 1991 turned out to be 'The little newsletter that could.'" Carol wrote that "Linda accomplished her goal and then some. She started the newsletter after her first round of treatments and had to do 30 more radiation treatments." Liz wrote, "One memory of the early days that

comes to mind is whenever I was missing the deadline for news, Linda would give me a call and take my news over the phone." Stephen wrote, "I think we all can thank our love for Linda which keeps our newsletter going strong even after 100 editions."

The family has just printed their 103rd edition."

Since Joyce was born in Braintree, Essex County, England 40 miles east of London, one of nine children, she still has a sister (Brenda) living in Braintree. Brother Norman is in Toronto, Canada. As you can see, the Epleylogue reaches many parts of the world and many parts of the US now that the family has grown and some have moved outside of Illinois. "It is our way of staying connected with FAMILY." But each year, the family comes together for the annual Race for The Cure in May. This year the Epley family entered the Susan G. Komen Foundation's 25th running of the Peoria Race for the Cure at the Peoria Metro Center for the 17th time. Their thoughts of Linda on this day hold a special meaning to all of them...hoping and praying for a cure for breast cancer. After the race the family gathers at Carol and Tate Schmitt's home in Henry for a Mother's Day luncheon.

This writer knows the Epley family very well as Carol and Linda both babysat our children. The twins, Kevin and Stephen were on the Magnolia Little league team that I coached, and our families grew up together in the Magnolia community. Joyce cooked for the school district at the Magnolia School, and the PC Jr. High School for 22 years. She became head cook at the Jr. H.S. when the Magnolia school closed. She has been an active member of the PC Senior Citizen Center in Standard for at least 25 years. She started attending on weekends and vacation days while she still worked for the school. Joyce was just honored as a top volunteer of the year, at the achievement center luncheon. She received a "Volunteer Rock" pin and a bookmark for her service to the center.

Joyce attends the Magnolia Methodist Church. She is from a world family. In addition to her sister and brother in different lands, her husband, son, son-in-law and grandson have all fought for freedom for all people. This loving mother of this strong family is a very special person as well as her family. Their newsletter and their loving legacy for Linda say it all!

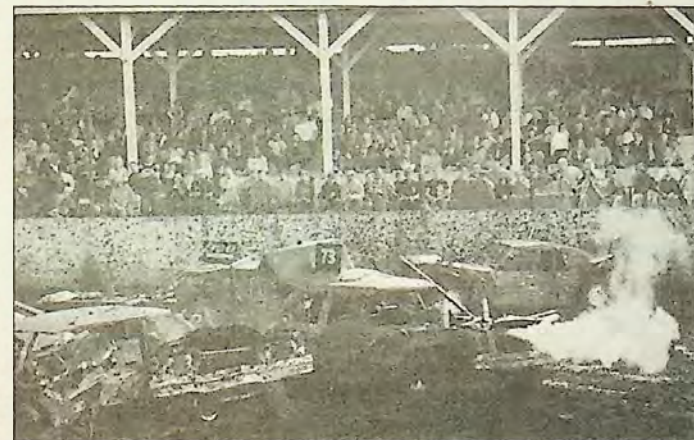

Statement by Sen. Gary Dahl on the Blagojevich Verdict

Take Time and Breathe

In recent travels to Australia, Danielle Wall has experienced a different way to experience God. Wall is now trying to bring that experience to Putnam County and the Illinois Valley in Breathe.

"I was in Australia doing NET from 2003-2006 and was with a group that had nights kind of like Breathe all the time called Fuel. That was just back in September last year, and it was shortly after that that I started feeling like I should start breathe so that we can all grow in our faith," Wall said.

Breathe is held in the sanctuary of Sacred Heart Church in Granville on the last Thursday of each month starting at 7 PM and ending around 8:30 PM. Since starting in May, two nights of Breathe have been held, with as many as 20 people attending. "The first night was on God's love and the last one was about love and reconciliation. There are songs, meditations, and prayers that go on during the night as well," Wall explained. "That is how it was in Australia. They had about 150 young people at these, and even though it wasn't going to be that many at first, just to help people get a better understanding of our faith and be free to worship God in your own way," Wall added.

Even though Breathe is held in a Catholic church, it is open to all faiths and denominations. "We will do more talks on God's love and praise and worship, along with gifts of the Holy Spirit and the journey being a disciple of Christ. We will try to keep it Catholic, but this will also help them get a richer understanding of another faith as well," Wall explained.

In order to come to Breathe, Wall explains that a person should have a desire to learn more about the faith. "If you want to go deeper in your faith, this is an opportunity to do that and be with people that feel the same way. It almost gives you a sense of community. Breathe can help you learn about Jesus more too. This is not just Sacred Heart based. This is Illinois Valley area base too. I also want to show people as well that it doesn't have to be the Priest doing something. Us lay people need to do things and stand up on the front lines. If we are excited about our faith, we need to express it," Wall said.

Each night of Breathe will feature different speakers as well. "I had a friend from Australia that came to our first night of Breathe and Father Pat DeMeullemeester spoke in July. Father Pat will be a regular speaker and also be available for reconciliation as well. I am praying about other speakers. I have been talking to people from the TEC and Cursillo programs as well. A Sister from St. Louis has said they are willing to speak and I am planning on talking to the Sisters down in Henry too. I think that having religious speakers give Breathe more credibility," Wall added.

Breathe will be held on Thursday, August 26, and the discussion for the night will be about the rosary. "Some Catholics may not have a good understanding about their faith and I feel it is a misunderstood prayer as well, so it give more people a better understanding. If your roots and your foundations are strong, then you can build. This also gives noncatholics a chance to come in and see why (Catholics) say what they say," Wall explained.
