## Change of Leadership at McNabb Grain Company

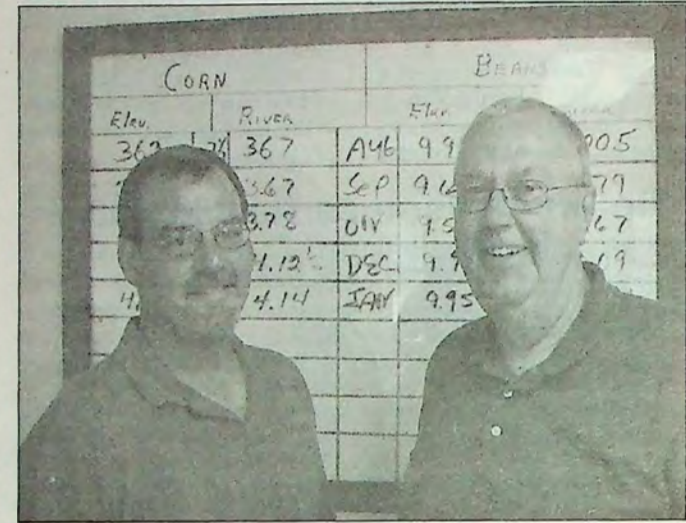
September 1st marks the end of one era and the beginning of another at McNabb Grain Company. Larry Guderjan begins his retirement on that date and

## Labor Day in Granville, September 7, 1925

*Editor's Note: An article dated September 7, 1925 was brought in the Putnam County Record office by a resident of the county and we thought excerpts from it would be appropriate for this 2010 Labor Day edition. Please forgive the few spelling errors because the article is reprinted as it was first printed.*

Labor Day of 1925 at Granville has passed into history and has the record of bringing the largest crowd that ever assembled in the county. Early in the morning the crowds began to come into town and at nine o'clock the park and streets were showing regular holiday crowds. The Chief of Police, Chris Wold, had plans well in hand and they went off like clock work all day long. Thousands of automobiles were parked in military precision and not an accident of any kind happened in the entire day. The business section had been decorated very early on Monday morning, "Welcome" banners were out at both ends of the main street and flags and bunting gave color to the situation. . . Hopkins Park was the center of the day's activities, though the crowds were split into several bunches.

The ball game between the McNabb Cardinals and the Moose from Ladd drew its following to the ball field; the trap shoot and the flying machines were the center of attraction at Sherman's field, the free acts several times during the day kept the folks milling up and down McCoy, and after dinner the athletic program at Foundry Park had its crowd, though it was very disappointing to the promoters, as nothing like the crowd expected materialized, satisfying the fans that Granville is a very poor place to pull off such sport.

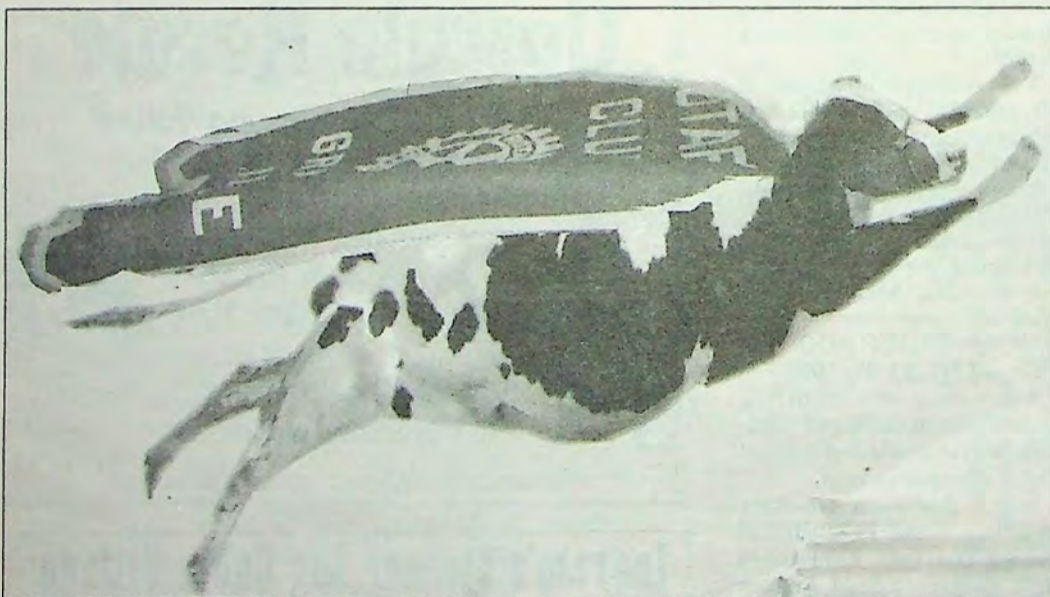
Governor Small was late in getting here, though he had informed the committee on Saturday that he would not be able to reach us before eleven o'clock. A very large crowd gathered around the band stand, the largest the writer ever saw in Hopkins Park, to greet the Chief of Illinois. The Orphans Home of Normal had permitted us to use its band for the day and the boys gave a very inspiring send off for the Governor. . . Governor Small did not speak at length but he made a very interesting talk of less than a half hour. . . as he closed his address, Judge Taylor of Hennepin presented him a splendid basket of flowers in a well-chosen short speech, as the offering of the people of Putnam County to their Governor. . . Moving pictures of the Governor and others were taken and pictures of other features of the day's events were made (to be) shown at the high school on tomorrow night as is noted elsewhere. . . it may be well to remark that this is the first time in a half century, if ever, that a live governor has spoken in Putnam county; several of them have campaigned here but never has one of them honored us as the present Governor. He left Granville shortly after dinner for Peoria (to another speaking engagement).

Excitement ran high as the hour drew near for the giving away of the Ford Tudor and the Corsley radio; the sedan went to Archie Nicoli of Spring Valley, it cost him a quarter; the radio to Tony Balda of LaSalle. . . as the numbers were drawn from the box that would decide who got the automobile, and the numbers drawn approached the number to decide the matter (the eleventh one out of the box) the stillness was oppressive; one could feel it; when the 11th was announced, the crowd simply evaporated with sighs of regret.

In the final event of the day, the big tarp dance, there centered the real thrilling interest that goes with young blood. The selection of the best looking girls in the crowd provoked lots of fun for the crowd. After much jockeying, and prancing up and down before the grandstand, the judges decided that Miss Margaret Johnson of Granville was entitled to the basket of flowers as the best looking young lady in sight, but they couldn't see so much of her as they could some of them; so we now know who would represent Granville at Atlantic City in the beauty show. . .

The 1925 Labor Day was a decided success in almost every way. The Merchants Association is entitled to much credit for their everlasting perseverance in putting over the things they begin. Next week the Indoor Carnival followed by the four weeks revival - the Association is behind both undertakings.

# A Wonderful Life in Two Great Countries

Maria Zaccaria Serafini traveled the farthest of anyone to her 1960 Hopkins High School Alumni 50th Anniversary Class Reunion held in the new PC Primary School in Granville. It was the 10th Triennial Reunion of the Hopkins High School Alumni Association on

Three months ago Maria's mother died at age 96. They buried her in the town of Paivello where Franco and Maria live.

Maria is a special person. She has lots of energy, is outgoing, friendly, and talkative; a very nice and interesting lady.

August 7th. Maria was born in Italy, and her father was killed in Germany in 1944 during World War II. Her mother, Ennis Zaccaria, became a widow and took back her maiden name of Serafini. Her sister, Connie Serafini, had a place for her here in Granville. In a house across the street from

home the evening before the Hopkins reunion, along with Larry Benassi and his wife, Ginny, Fran's sister and Janice Seimers where I interviewed Maria for this story. Maria told about when Helen and her sister, Diane, and mother Irma came to visit her. Maria said she heard her neighbor's

Eddie Capitani's mother on West Main Street.

Connie could send for her because she was her sister. Maria could not come with her mother because of quotas. Maria had to wait one year before her mother could bring her to the United States.

Maria was 14 years old when she came to Granville in 1956 and started high school at Hopkins High. She had to start from scratch because she only spoke Italian. Maria's aunt changed Maria's name to Mary, but when she graduated H.S. in 1960, she changed her name back to Maria and moved to Florida in 1961.

In high school she joined FHA and was in girl's chorus. She remembered teachers Mrs. Hoover, Mr. Raider, Miss Williams and Principal Milo Watson.

She married in 1963 and had two children. They gave her three grandchildren and one great-grandchild. After her divorce, she moved back to Italy with her mother.

She had lived in the U.S. for 41 years. Upon her move back to Italy she married Franco Serafini who told her he was in love with her when she was 13 and he was 17 before she left for America. Franco was a truck driver and had never married. Franco had her fa-

dogs barking and barking next door. She opened the door to yell at them to shut up in English, looked and said, "My God, that's Irma," and Irma said in English, "That's me."

Maria does all of the U.S. holidays; Halloween, Thanksgiving, Christmas and Easter. At Christmas time she puts a tree in front of her house with lights and everything for her children. At Easter she puts eggs in a basket. Franco was not into it at first, but now he likes it. Maria said that people say to her, "Oh, you're the one that has lights on your tree."

Maria likes roses and flowers and has 25 roses. She said roses are better in Italy, and has not seen any good ones here. Florida is too hot for roses. She lives in the northern part of Italy where comelico and parmesan cheese come from; also Prosciutto, it is not ham and is not cooked. In Balonia they have the Formula One race that goes by her house. She sees lots of Ferraris.

The last time she visited here was 1991 and she was so excited about attending the reunion she could hardly stand it. She couldn't wait to see the Hopkins displays. She also visited the cemetery. She also visited Marge Marcacci. Marge's two granddaughters have each visited Maria five years

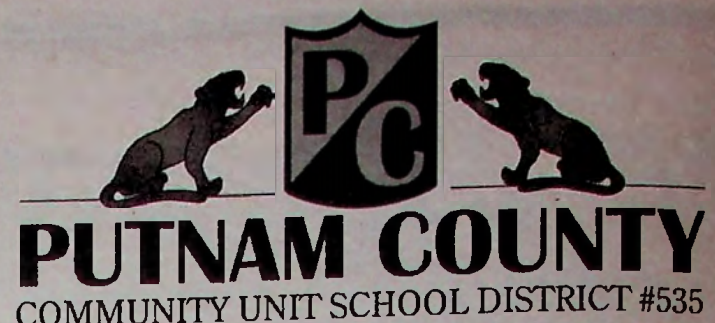

Dear Parents and Guardians,  
Welcome Back! Getting back into the swing of the school year can be stressful for everyone, including everyone at home. Below are some suggestions you can use to help make the transition back to school from summer break easier:

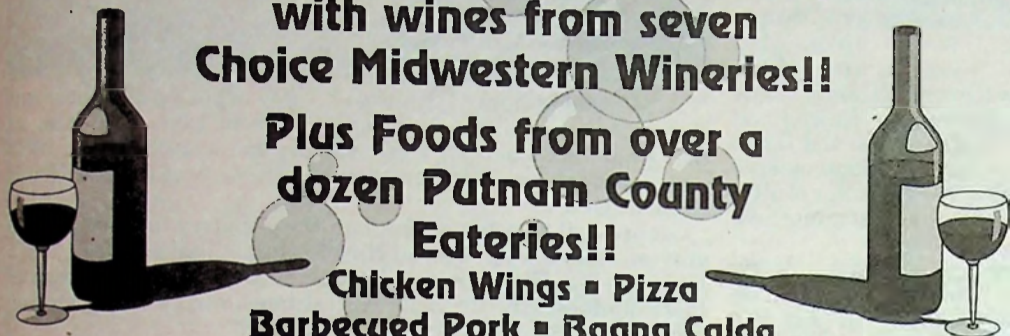

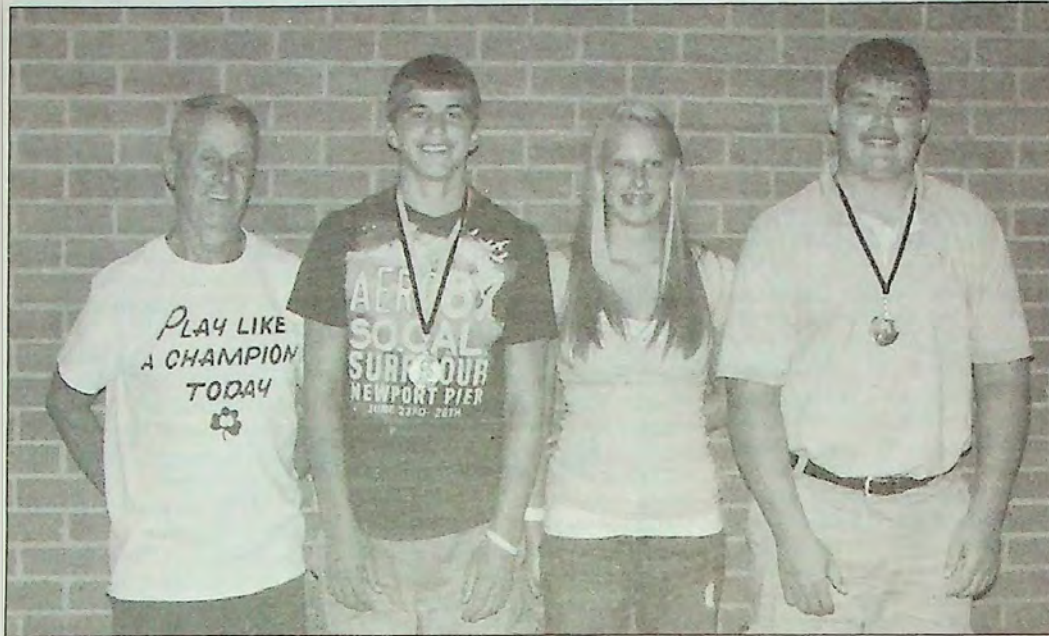

PC County Clerk, Gudmund (Sonny) Jessen reported that he had received the Postcensus Local Review count for the 1990 Census from the U.S. Dept. of Commerce. The initial count reflected that Putnam County had a decline of population of 6%, dropping from 6,085 (1980 Census Count) to 5,716.

Ray and Marge Barnes of Standard announced the birth of their grandson, Steven Thomas, son of Mary Kay (Barnes) and Tom Nestler of Spring Valley on August 21 in IVCH, Peru.

The Leepertown School Board met in regular session with all members present except M. Jaskowiak who arrived late.

Thermometers soared and high humidity prevailed on August 26, the day of the Putnam County Historical Society's ice cream social. Throughout the afternoon many gathered on the lawn of Pulsifer House partaking of ice cream, pie/cake and cool beverages and enjoyed the music of the Four Encore Quartet, "2 by 2" vocal ensemble, PC Community Band and vocalist/guitarist Connie Halbleib. Julia Edgerley, Society President, awarded 41 Pioneer Certificates to descendants of PC settlers.

The PC Trendsetters held their election of officers on July 10th.

Dealer tables were still available for the PC Booster Club's baseball card show featuring Chicago Cubs starting shortstop, Shawon Dunston. Dunston was coming off his best years as a major league player and was going to be available for photographs and autographs.

Jim Carboni and Chris Weddell, cousins, were honored at a farewell dinner on August 18. Jim, son of Linda and Jim Carboni of Granville was off to Western State University in Macomb and Chris was to attend Arizona Technical University in Phoenix.

Sharon Bluemer, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Ronald Bluemer of Granville, accepted a new position with Midway Airlines in Chicago. She had completed her computer training at the Midwest Travel Institute in Davenport IA and was hired by Midway Airlines in November. She would be helping develop new reservation programs, and train reservation operators in new airline procedures.

The Granville American Legion Auxiliary began their 1990-91 year on Sept. 11 in the American Legion Home. Elenor Bruch was hostess and Mary Gordon provided the gift. Margaret Bonucchi was program chairman and introduced the Girls' State Delegate.

HPD offered adult swim lessons in October and the class was taught by Water Safety Instructor Linda DeMattia.

Mr. Bruno Pomatto pre-

sented a program to the Rotary Club describing the history and current usage of the Hennepin Canal which was built around the turn of the century to connect the Illinois and Michigan Canal, the Illinois River and the Mississippi River. Unfortunately, because of changing commercial water transportation, economic considerations, the Canal was never a commercial success and was closed to commercial traffic in 1951. Today, the State of Illinois owns the Canal and has developed it into a valuable outdoor recreational facility known as the Hennepin Canal Parkway.

## Letter to the Editor

Dear Editor,

As the trial of former Governor Rod Blagojevich enters a new chapter, I am struck by the claim that a retrial would be a waste of taxpayer dollars and the government's resources.

As a former U.S. Attorney for the Northern District of Illinois and as the current Inspector General for the Illinois Secretary of State, I know firsthand the importance of ferreting out corruption, unethical behavior and wrongdoing. The role of the U.S. Attorney is to charge and prosecute federal crimes and to uphold justice. Very simply, we can't put a price tag on justice.

While it's always important to be mindful of spending, the fact is the costs incurred by the U.S. Attorney's office for any case are fixed—covering mostly the salaries of employees who investigate and prosecute cases.

What's most important, however, is that justice is served. And, in this case, justice requires a retrial.

Some have argued that since Rod Blagojevich is now a convicted felon on a single count of lying to federal agents, the U.S. Attorney's office should walk away from the case. I believe this would send the wrong message to the people of Illinois and to all elected officials.

The charges against Blagojevich are serious and repugnant. It is the responsibility of our state's leaders to serve the people, not their own self-interests.

The jury voted 11-1 in favor of conviction on a majority of the counts and on at least one of the scheme counts, the attempted sale of the U.S. Senate seat.

This is not the first time that a jury has been hung by one juror. Our judicial system takes this into account and allows for retrials.

We need to let the judicial

system work. Conviction on the scheme counts would send a message to the public and other politicians that if government officials shake people down for contributions, even if unsuccessful, they will go to jail.

In my view, prosecutors will have to address two commonly held misconceptions during the retrial. One is that many people believe money must actually change hands, or the deal must be completed, to be guilty of a conspiracy. This is not the law.

The other misconception is that Blagojevich's approach to raising money is believed by many to be politics as usual in Illinois. This view is also wrong. Most elected officials were offended by the actions of our former governor. They found his words and deeds despicable.

I look forward to watching the retrial and am confident that, in the end, justice will be served.

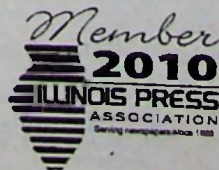

# Annual PC Ag Museum Open House Welcomes Beautiful Weekend Weather

Antique tractors, machinery, and antique trucks were on display at the Ag Museum's open house in Hennepin. Karen Bailey and Jeanne Alleman gave tours in the upstairs rooms in the Ag building, while Barbara Kessler and Verna Reed gave tours at the Pulifer House across the street. A great pork chop dinner was served with ice cream for dessert by Lonna Nauman and Teresa Clausen.

The pork chops were cooked by John Clausen, Luke Holly and Syd Glover. Syd Whitaker was on the ground floor answering any questions, while Gene and Joan Kunkel sold tickets.

Steve Malivolti made Kettle popcorn and sold it to the guests.

The main speaker of the afternoon was Charles Doty of Princeton, a World War II Army Veteran, who was on three D-Days in France, Sicily and Italy. He saw service in Africa, Belgium, Holland and Germany. After returning from the war in 1946 he started the Malden Repair Shop.

After one year he moved to Dover where he sold Minneapolis Moline machinery and also New Idea machinery until he retired in 1980. He brought a large board with flint rock glued to it. He explained how he acquired it. He received a telephone call from an antique dealer who had bought it at an Amish auction in Waverly IA. He did not know what he had. Charlie explained to him what he had and went to see it and ended up buying it. He had seen one before in England, and also knew about it from reading a book on it. It is one of the oldest pieces of farm equipment in reported history. It was discovered in Iraq in 3000 B.C. and it is also mentioned in the Bible. Charlie said it was the first actual way of separating the grain from the chaff other than using a flail. They used what they called a threshing floor, usually 40 feet in diameter. They packed it down until it was a hard surface then scattered the grain on the floor and open drag the board with the flint rocks imbedded into it over the grain.

After all the kernels were out of the grain they would take a wooden fork and throw the straw off. They would pick up the grain and willow it by throwing it into the air

and the wind would blow all of the chaff from the kernels. The kernels would drop to the ground and would be gathered up. This really was the start of the threshing machine and the combine of today. Charlie got the information from a book called the Grain Harvester published in 1978 by two people and by the American Society of Agriculture Engineers. Later in 1788 a Scotsman, Andrew Michels, patented the first cylinder type threshing machine.

The machine would be turned by hand. It had spikes in it and a concave would break up the straw and take all the grain out of the heads. Afterward they would separate the straw from the grain, willow it by throwing the grain straight up in the air and let the wind take the chaff out. The grain fell to the floor. The Chinese in 1313 introduced the first fan. It was a hand cranked fan that made wind. That was introduced to Europe in the early 1600's. This was the start of our fanning mill of today. Later they invented sieves to clean the grain.

The Ground Hog thresher was the first thresher cylinder that had spikes and a concave, the grain would go by the concave and that would thresh the seed but it still had to be separated. Later a long trough was put on it with holes in it that shook the grain through the holes to the bottom and the straw would shake out the end. That was quite an improvement.

Harold Steele in Dover has a Ground Hog thresher with the shaker. The thresher and cleaner were both incorporated together making one machine operation in 1877 by Harlan Puetz. After it went through the cylinder, a conveyor carried the straw up with holes in the bottom, that the grain fell through and the straw went up and out. The first vibrator was patented in 1877 in Melrose, England.

John Nichols and Shepherd Co. introduced the first vibrator in this country. This started the modern combine as we know it now. It still is basically the same principles in the rotary combine of today. It just rubs the grain off and still uses the same grain pan as the shaker did to separate the chaff from the grain.

It was a pleasure for all to meet and listen to this WWII Honor Flight Veteran from the greatest generation.

## Illinois EPA Seeking Public Input on Illinois River Study

•• Meetings to be held in Princeton and Peoria to address water quality study

The United States EPA and Illinois EPA have begun a Total Maximum Daily Load (TMDL) study for the Illinois River, and the public can learn more about this study at upcoming meetings.

The Illinois EPA Bureau of Water will host a public meeting about the Illinois River TMDL Study on Thursday September 2 at 6:00 p.m. at Princeton City Hall. A second meeting will be held the same day at 2:00 p.m. in Peoria at the Lakeview Branch of the Peoria Public Library. The section of the river being studied extends from LaSalle to Pekin.

The Illinois River TMDL Study will determine the maximum amount of certain pollutants the Illinois River can receive and still meet water quality standards to support use of the river for recreation. Right now, the river is classified as impaired by the Illinois EPA because it does not meet the water quality standards for supporting primary contact recreation.

The purpose of these meetings is to provide an opportunity for the public to receive information and comment on the TMDL Study. Stakeholders and participants will be asked for input and ideas to be applied to the TMDL report, and IEPA staff will be present to answer questions.

Tri-County Regional Planning Commission (TCRPC) staff also will be present. TCRPC is conducting public outreach to ensure that area stakeholders are informed of the study and its progress. All who have an interest in the health of the Illinois River are encouraged to attend the meeting.

### The Banana Leaf

Over the summer, we have had the Gulf Coast Oil Spill, and the fifth anniversary of Hurricane Katrina, I thought of this story that comes from the Congo in Africa.

Straight and brilliantly green in the tropical African sunshine stands the young banana leaf, just unfurled from the womb of the tree, freshly immaculate and complete. Still folded protectingly around it are sheltering older leaves, but these are no longer whole like the young leaf: each is torn and shaggy with age in the dry season's winds.

And now with wanton, tossing motions the whole tree grows urgent in the first dark storm of the rainy season. Watching the forces of nature work the unbroken leaf, you hear the cry: "O, don't let it be torn by the wind! It is so perfectly whole and beautiful!"

But hard, flying pellets of rain begin to stab the green agitation of leaves. Frantic fists of wind grab the leaf and freak it about in rage. A rip to the spine on one side. A crashing split opposite. Then lower down, another, and whipping the other side another. The pain of living thrashes and tears.

Instantly a revelation! The exultant realization that this is a moment of miracle: the juvenile leaf maturing into exquisite symmetry: a lacy, fringed adaptation of itself to the violence shredding it. Out of agony, beauty.

I lift up my eyes to the hills

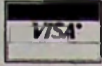

## 4-H'ers are Having Fun Learning About Science at Methodist Hospital

"Is that a REAL brain?" "Is this the way doctors get ready for surgery?" "How do X-Rays work?" These were just a few of the many questions asked by 4-H members who participated in the sixth annual 4-H Science Sleepover was recently held at Methodist Hospital in Peoria. Fifty 4-H members and friends explored a surgery room, X-ray lab, histology lab and nursing student training area. The girls got to put on surgical gear including scrubs, gowns, gloves, masks, hats and glasses. They also got to experience what it was like to adjust an X-ray machine, listen to someone's heartbeat and take their pulse. They learned about the latest robotic technology in the surgery room and also learned about the many science-based careers in the hospital. Throughout the evening, they also practiced proper hand-washing, tried healthy portion sizes, and studied the effects of aging on your body. "The great thing about this event is they get to learn about many careers in the hospital they may never have thought of and see places in the hospital they would otherwise never see," says Judy Schmidt, University of Illinois Youth Development Educator. "They also get to experience the hospital



in a fun way which will help them be more comfortable in that setting later in life."

Nursing students escorted youth throughout the hospital and talked to them about the classes they take, the types of careers they will have and what they like most about the field of nursing. After spending the night in the hospital, the girls tested their knowledge of medical careers in the morning. They had learned several more careers than they knew before the event. When summing up the event in a word or two, they described the day as "AWESOME, educational, and amazing!" Many responded that after participating in the 4-H Science Sleepover, they would take more science classes in school, think about nursing as a career, and participate in other science sleepover events. Schmidt says she hopes this experience is just the start of exploration for youth into the field of science and medical careers.

The young ladies from the Marshall-Putnam area who participated in the event were Anna Mattern, Payton Knisley, Hannah Carrier, Callie Dye, Kaitlyn Swartz and Morgan Phillips. M-P 4-H Ambassador Christine Mattern was a high school assistant for the event and Anita Wilkinson, M-P 4-H Coordinator was a chaperone.

# Farming Update for Illinois

The 2010 Illinois corn crop is expected to yield 174 bushels per acre, down 6 bushels from the August forecast. The yield is down as a result of the continuation of the exceptionally hot weather throughout much of August. Temperatures averaged around 3 degrees above normal over most of the state. Precipitation was 10 to 20 percent above normal across the western half of the state but 20 to 30 percent below normal over much of the eastern half. Production of corn for grain would be 2.16 billion bushels, 5 percent more than was produced in 2009. As of August 29, 87 percent of the crop was denting with 34 percent mature and 2 percent harvested. Corn condition was rated 15 percent excellent, 47 percent good, 25 percent fair, 9 percent poor, and 4 percent very poor.

Soybean production in 2010 is expected to reach 471.8 million bushels, 10 percent above last year's production. Yield is forecast at 51 bushels per acre, 5 bushels above last year. If realized, this yield would eclipse the previous record yield of 50 bushels per acre set in 2004. Condition of the soybean crop, as of August 29,

## Governor Restores Additional Funding for Probation

Illinois Supreme Court Chief Justice Thomas R. Fitzgerald has announced that Gov. Pat Quinn has restored \$20 million to the Supreme Court's current budget to help fund probation services throughout the state.

The governor responded to an appeal by the Chief Justice for the second year in a row to add funds for probationary services to remain a viable component of public safety.

For Fiscal Year 2011, the legislature appropriated \$36.4 million to the Supreme Court for grants and awards, including probation services. That is the same amount it appropriated last year, and less than half of what had been appropriated for probation services in 2002. Last year, the governor restored \$16 million after an appeal by Chief Justice Fitzgerald and conversations between the governor's office and the Administrative Office of the Illinois Courts, headed by Director Cynthia Y. Cobbs.

In a letter to the governor last month asking to increase funds under the governor's statutory budget authority, the Chief Justice noted that even with the additional funds last year 90 probation officer jobs throughout the state were eliminated because of a short-fall of funding.

"I am compelled to once again write, with an even more heightened sense of urgency and concern for probation's continued viability and capacity to promote public safety," the Chief Justice said in a letter to the governor dated July 7. "Absent an additional allocation of funds in Fiscal Year 2011, there will be a compounded and an accelerated deterioration in probation services. This predictable sequence will begin with a loss of probation officer jobs and the attendant increase in caseload size, reductions in both frequency and quality of offender supervision, and heightened threats to public safety."

Two days after the Chief Justice's correspondence, the Governor directed Comptroller Daniel Hynes to delegate an additional \$20 million for use by the Supreme Court to fund probation reimbursements.

"This is the second year in a row that the Governor has graciously responded to the Supreme Court's requests that

fiscal resources for probation services be increased beyond what the legislature has initially appropriated," said Chief Justice Fitzgerald. "I, the Court and the hundreds of persons who make probation services work in this state are very grateful."

"As I have said in my comments earlier this year before the Appropriation Committees of both houses of the legislature, probation services are a vital component of public safety. The Supreme Court has a firm belief in the value of probation services and an unwavering commitment to sustain its availability as a practical sentencing alternative in the State of Illinois."

"Though far short of the 100 percent statutory mandate to reimburse counties for probation expenditures, these additional dollars will raise funding to a level which will avoid further erosion of probation's critical public safety mission."

If the statutory full amount of reimbursement to the counties for probation services were appropriated, it would be as much as \$95 million.

"We are grateful to the Governor for the increased allocation of funds for probation services," said Director Cobbs. "The Supreme Court and the Administrative Office will continue our fiscal stewardship of the additional funds to ensure probation services in Illinois are targeted to promote improved public safety."

In 2009, Illinois probation officers supervised more than 97,000 adults and nearly 15,000 juveniles. They also conducted more than 37,900 bond and pre-sentence investigations and staffed 16 juvenile detention centers with an average daily population of almost 500 youths.

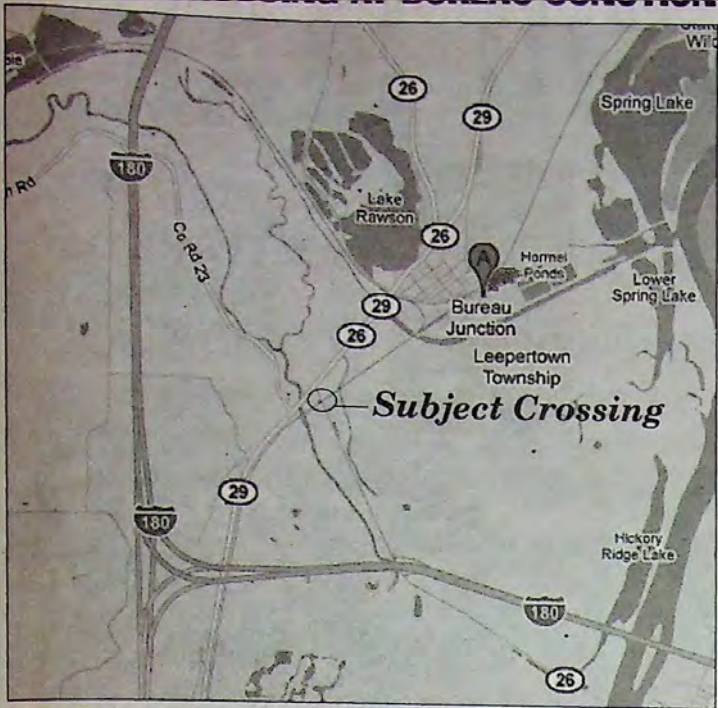

# Sharpshooter Fred Kessler of Putnam County

Frederick Heimrich Walter Kessler, 97, passed away July 28, of this year and was a very special man. Fred never talked about himself, although he had many reasons to do so. When he was in high school he played forward on the basketball team for Hopkins High. In one game he played against Magnolia High School on November 20, 1929 in which Magnolia won 1-0. This game is recognized by the IHSA and the National Federation Basketball Record Book.

During his life he also earned his pilot's license and flew small aircraft until

he switched his focus to trapshooting in the early 60's. He was extremely successful in shooting and travelled all over the United States becoming nationally ranked and shooting in the Grand American over 30 years.

Fred was born November 18, 1912 in Eden Township, LaSalle County, to Frederick Samuel and Elizabeth (Reinch) Kessler. After his H.S. graduation, Fred worked on the family farm in Granville Township. He also worked as a laborer on the Hennepin bridge, and later at Libbey Owens Ford in Ottawa and Dupont in Seneca. During this time he helped Jim Steele and Bud Donaldson learn the electrical trade.

Fred married Esther Kofoid September 15, 1934 at the Putnam County Courthouse. They had one son, Larry (Barbara) Kessler.

When WWII broke out Fred tried to enlist but was rejected due to problems with his hearing. He moved his wife and son to California and went to work in the shipyards at Long Beach as an electrician on mine sweepers. He relocated to the shipyards in Bremerton, Washington for a short time and then returned to California where he continued to work at the shipyards. In 1945, following the death of his father, Fred returned to take over the family farm.

He joined the electricians union and continued farming until his retirement in 1974. Mike Sandrolini of the Sports Weekly wrote this about Fred in 1984, "Fred Kessler of Granville

is a mild-mannered, and down to earth as one might imagine any 71 year old man would be. But when Kessler loads his single barrel shotgun and walks into a trapshooting course, he becomes as fierce a competitor as a budding 30 year old executive who's striving to make it to the top of the company he's

Zealand.

"It gets easier every year," Kessler said, "but when the competition gets tougher, I think I just try harder, that's all."

Kessler and three other shooters each hit 197 out of a possible 200 targets at the state tourney which forced a shoot-off round. Kessler won the shoot-off missing one target during the next event, while the runner-up missed two. That's how Kessler qualified for the Grand American.

Shotguns can be purchased anywhere between \$350 to \$150,000, according to Kessler, but the \$350 guns shoot just as well as the more expensive ones do. "It's not how expensive the gun is, it's the man

pulling the trigger," Kessler intimated.

The Putnam County Trap Club, which Kessler is a member of, has been in existence for 12 years. It was originally the McNabb Gun Club, then the Mark Gun Club for one year. The Putnam County Trap Club shoots every Sunday in the spring, summer and fall at the

course near the Standard dump. The Club has 35 members.

A second article written by News-Tribune outdoor writer, Larry Bird, on May 29, 1987 said, "74 year young Fred Kessler of Granville, a veteran shooter who gets better with age, has earned the honor to be on the 1987 amateur trapshooting associations for his shooting performance during the 1980 season. He registered a score of 3,800 for 16 yard targets, good for an average of .9363. He won the two classes at the Grand American in Vandalia OH where he was awarded two silver and two pewter trophies. This year, Kessler was one of two shooters to win more than one category award in the Southern Grand American Shootoff. Recently Kessler has been shooting more out west, with a lifetime total of 80,250 registered targets. Age has not changed his shooting style at all. 'I still shoot about the same as I always have,' Kessler said. But he shoots a better gun than before using a high rib Winchester trapgun. Whatever his technique, Granville's Kessler just keeps managing to get better and his impressive scores proved that." End of article.

Fred and Bob Kidd were close friends and Bob was also a member of the PC Trap Club. Bob donated his garage to the

gun club. I helped him move it out to the club. Bob also had Fred wire the new machine shed on the Kidd farm in 1970. My grandmother, Berthan (Kessler) Alleman was Fred's aunt.

The last few years Fred had attended the Corner Store Coffee Shop in Granville. A few times a week I have visited with the morning coffee drinkers there. One of my highlights was seeing Fred walk in for his one doughnut and cup of coffee. There is only one table there in the south corner of the store, and only two people can sit by the table. All other coffee drinkers sit on folding chairs and hold their coffee cups in their hands while sitting in a kind of circle by the table.

Fred always arrived early and sat on the left side of the table. If Fred was late, and someone was sitting in his seat, they would always stand up and wave to this reserved, unassuming gentleman to sit in his seat at the table. He was given this respect by everyone because he was such a respectable man himself.

I loved seeing him because he reminded me some of my own father, and it made me feel good. I liked when he spoke, because he had a little of that German accent that all the older Kesslers had.

working for. Right now, Kessler can be considered the best trap shooter in the United State in his age group. That's because Kessler won the senior veteran (70 and over) doubles class championship at last week's 85th annual Grand American Trapshooting Tournament in Vandalia OH. He won the championship trophy in his age bracket by defeating 1,300 other competitors. No, Kessler did not have a partner when he won the doubles event. In doubles trapshooting, a shooter tries to hit two targets at once instead of the usual one. Kessler ended up hitting 95 out of a possible 100 targets in doubles at the American tourney considered to be the World Series of trapshooting. In 25 years of competitive shooting, Kessler has qualified for the Grand American Tourney 30 times and you can bet that Kessler, who has retired for 10 years from a working man's life, isn't about to call it quits on the trapshooting circuit yet."

"If I wasn't shooting I don't know what I would do," Kessler said. "I always did like to shoot. I always went hunting a lot, but game around here was scarce, so I took up trapshooting. I enjoy the competition and once in a while you win something and it makes it all worthwhile."

Kessler estimates that over 5,000 shooters competed at the Grand American, the largest championship trapshooting event in the world which attracts top amateurs from all 50 states, Canada, Mexico, Europe, South America, Japan, Australia and New

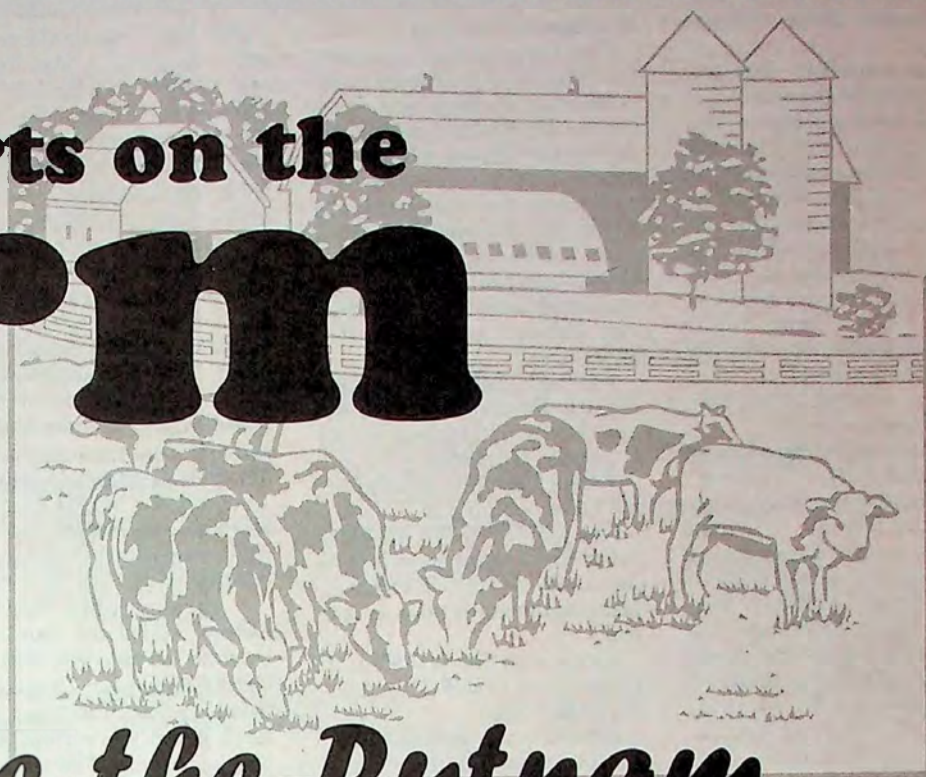

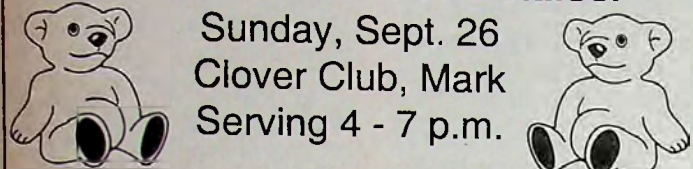

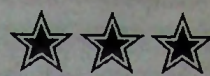

### Hear His Word

We have all met people that have made a big impression on us during our lives. One of the greatest people that I have had the honor of meeting was Mother Teresa. I was immediately drawn to her humility and compassion as well as the respect that she showed each person that she met no matter their political bent or their religious affiliation or the lack thereof. She saw in each person the face of Christ and treated them accordingly.

Even though Mother Teresa passed away on September 5, 1997, she has been in the news lately in celebration of her 100th year anniversary of her birth. Time Magazine published a commemorative issue about Mother Teresa. On August 26, 2010, the United States Postal Service commemorated her humanitarian work with a postage stamp. Atheists cried foul and boycotted the stamp because they said it was a clear violation of the separation of church and state. The postal service stated the reason for the stamp was due to her humanitarian work, not her religious affiliation.

A request was also made to have the Empire State Building lit up in blue and white in recognition of her birth but also her work among the poorest of the poor, but was denied by the same group who agreed last year to light the building in red to commemorate the 60th anniversary of the 1949 Maoist Communist Revolution.

Given the current climate of our world today I believe that we can learn much wisdom from Mother Teresa. Her only concern was to bring Christ's love to each and every person that she met. It did not matter whether they were Christian, Muslim, Hindu, Buddhist or even atheist. It also did not matter what life a person had led up to that point; a person could always change their ways. What was important was that each person should know God's love for them as well as being shown the dignity of being created in the image and likeness of God.

Mother Teresa began her work with the poorest of the poor in India. At first she had a rough time of it because the people were predominately Buddhists and Hindus and didn't trust the woman in blue and white because she represented Christianity. But over time the people not only began to trust her but she was constantly honored by the Indian government and even received a State Funeral when she died.

Mother Teresa became recognized the world over, not because she was a Catholic Sister, but for her fifty years of her work with the destitute. She received many honors in her lifetime including the Nobel Peace Prize in 1979, the Medal of Freedom from President Ronald Reagan as well as President Clinton granting her United States Citizenship. At the time of her death, the Missionaries of Charity were working in 610 missions in 123 countries.

Wouldn't the world be a better place if we could see the face of Christ in each and every person? Mother Teresa was an ordinary woman who by the grace of God led an extraordinary life. What made her extraordinary was the spirit of love that she showed to each and every person.

*Behold, I stand at the door and knock. If anyone hears My voice and opens the door, I will come in to him and dine with him, and he with Me. To him who overcomes I will grant to sit with Me on My throne, as I also overcame and sat down with My Father on His throne. (Revelation 3:20-21)*

## USDA Announces Loan Program for Farmers

United States Department of Agriculture Farm Service Agency (FSA) State Executive Director Scherrie V. Giamanco has announced the launch of a Conservation Loan (CL) program that will provide farm owners and farm-related business operators access to credit to implement conservation techniques that will conserve natural resources.

"This will give farmers who want to implement conservation measures on their lands a chance to do so by providing assistance with their up-front

costs," said Giamanco. "In return, these producers will help to reduce soil erosion, improve water quality and promote sustainable and organic agricultural practices."

CL funds can be used to implement conservation practices approved by the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS), such as the installation of conservation structures; establishment of forest cover; installation of water conservation measures; establishment or improvement of permanent pastures; implementation of

manure management; and the adaptation of other emerging or existing conservation practices, techniques or technologies.

Direct CLs can be obtained through local Farm Service Agency (FSA) offices with loan limits up to \$300,000. Guaranteed CLs up to \$1,112,000 are available from lenders working with FSA.

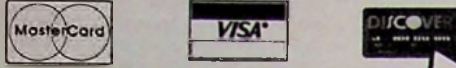



## PCHS Participates in Teen Traffic Safety Program from American Red Cross and U of I Extension

The Putnam County High School drivers ed. students were given a very unique and valuable opportunity. The American Red Cross and the University of Illinois Extension partnered to present a teen traffic safety program that combined the

American Red Cross Fatal Road Trip, Operation Destination and Teen Victim Impact Panel programs.

The high school students went through six different stations: Distracted Driving and Safety Belt Usage, Memorial Scene, Car Maintenance/Roadside Emergency Preparedness, Victim Impact Panel, Fatal Vision and Auto Skid.

The Fatal Vision Challenge was a physical and emotional challenge. By wearing a special pair of goggles, large rubber boots, and oversized gloves, the students were able to get a sense of what it would be like to function under the influence of drugs or alcohol. The challenge began as soon as they put on the goggles. They had to try and put on the boots, gloves and walk to the golf cart. Once in the golf cart, with a Red Cross volunteer at their side, they drove through an obstacle course. Many orange cones were run over throughout the challenge.

The Distracted Driving simulation was a challenge that tested the participants' concentration as more and more distractions are added to the environment. As simple task of matching colors and shapes became a huge task as noise and the responsibility of saying the alphabet were added. It was a great realization that just a few distractions while driving make a big difference.

At this station, the participants also learned several important facts about seatbelt safety.

Safe driving also involves driving a safe vehicle. M-P 4-H Volunteer, Jim Wall of Granville presented the Car Maintenance station. Here students

Bobby Cofoid, Putnam County Coroner, Andy Jackson, EMT Director and Kevin Moore Chief of Police, along with Red Cross Staff spoke with the students at the Memorial Scene station. After seeing photos of car crashes, the trio shared the challenges of helping families bury their teen child and how emotionally hard it is to prepare the bodies of teens. He spoke of his role in helping with the grieving process.

The emotional impact of alcohol related car fatalities is very strong in the Victim Impact Panel station. Mary Scroggs, a Red Cross speaker, shared her story of being hit by a drunk driver while on her lunch break outside of CAT Headquarters in downtown Peoria. Mary was pinned under the car and sustained a head injury. She has lost eye sight completely in one eye, has trembling in her right arm and leg, has no feeling on the right side of her face and has other physical challenges.

Matt Hostetter of Country Financial in Granville led a station in the computer lab utilizing an Auto Skid interactive DVD, provided by Country Financial. Auto Skid teaches new drivers about factors that affect their ability to stop a vehicle quickly, and how they can control those factors to become smart, safe drivers. Margy Mattern, Marshall-Putnam 4-H Volunteer also assisted at this station.

This program was made available by a grant provided by the Illinois Department of Transportation, Division of Traffic Safety. The Central Illinois Chapter of the American Red

Edgewood Golf Course provided a golf cart for the Fatal Vision station.

Along with Red Cross staff and volunteers, the following local 4-H volunteers assisted with the program: David McMullen, Mary Edgerley, Richard Ashdown, and MaryAnn Magnuson.

## Bureau & Putnam County Health Department Announces 2010 Flu Clinics

The Bureau & Putnam County Health Department will be offering flu vaccinations starting in October. The 2010-2011 flu vaccine will protect against both H1N1 and seasonal influenza viruses. Starting this year it is recommended that everyone 6 months or older get a flu vaccination to protect against the flu. It is especially important for the following groups to be vaccinated:

1. Pregnant women
2. Children younger than 5, but especially children younger than 2 years old
3. People 50 years of age and older
4. People of any age with certain chronic medical conditions
5. People who live in nursing homes and other long-term care facilities
6. People who live with or

care for those at high risk for complications from flu.

The following clinics will be for adults 19 and older, unless otherwise noted. Additional children's flu immunization clinics will be announced at a later date. No appointments are necessary for the clinics listed. Flu shots and nasal spray are available. Nasal spray can be given to healthy people aged 2-49 who are not pregnant.

The fee for the flu vaccine is \$25. Cash, check, and Medicare Part B are accepted. No other insurance is accepted for payment. Medicare Part B recipients must bring their card to the clinics.

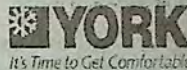

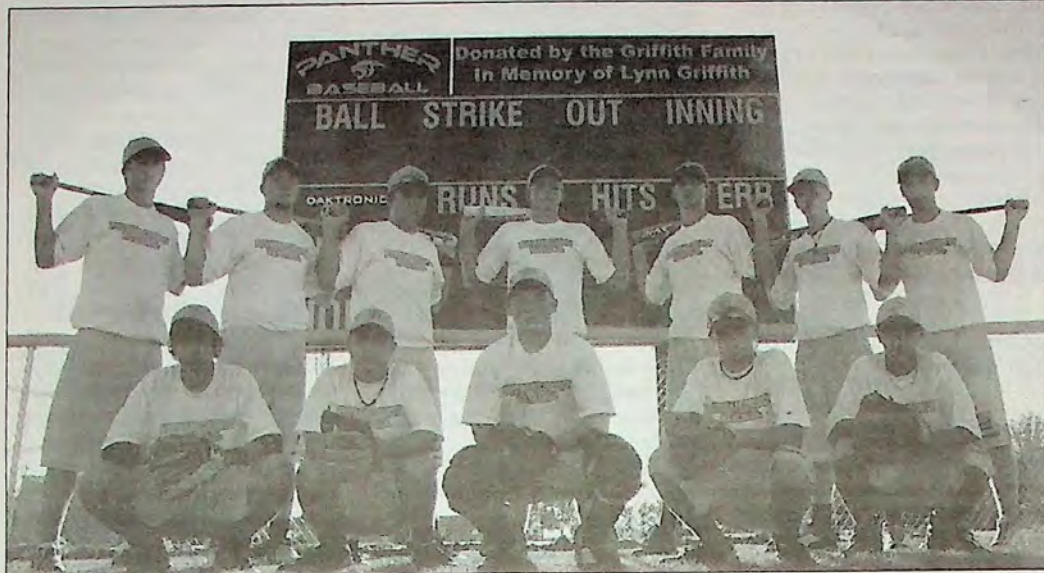

When we landed in the Quad Cities, they lined us up and then we were greeted by a guy playing the bagpipe and 500 people with U.S. flags. We were called the Honor Flight, but we were the ones honored."

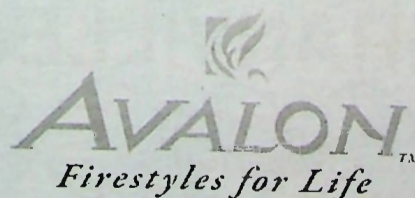

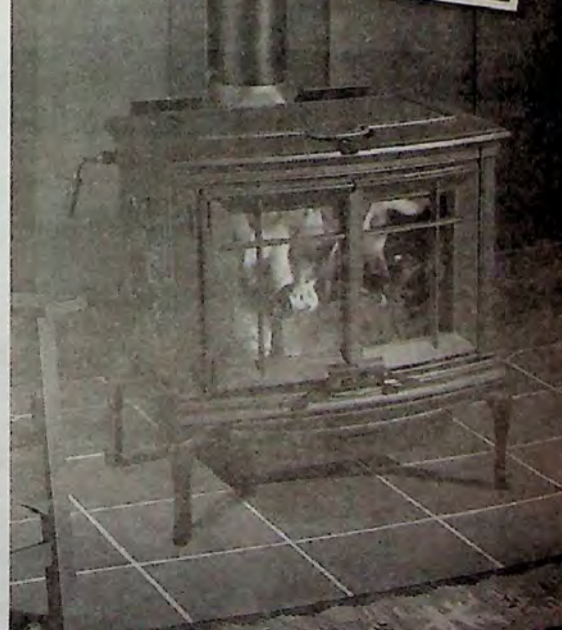

# Jesse White SECRETARY OF STATE

## •• Jesse White Encouraged by Reduction of Fatalities on Illinois Roads - Credits recent teen driving and BAIID laws as key contributing factors for lives saved

Secretary of State Jesse White credits two laws he recently initiated as key contributing factors to the reduction in traffic fatalities on Illinois roads in 2009. According to the National Highway Traffic Safety Administration (NHTSA), in 2009 traffic deaths decreased nationally by 9.7 percent and alcohol-related fatalities dropped by 7.4 percent. The reductions were greater in Illinois, with traffic fatalities dropping by 13 percent and alcohol-related fatalities dropping by ten percent.

"Illinois has become a national leader in traffic safety on many fronts," said White. "From our comprehensive teen driving program to our state's cutting edge laws cracking down on drunk driving, we have worked to serve as a model for others to follow. While these statistics show Illinois is ahead of the curve nationally in reducing traffic fatalities, our work is not done. I am hopeful our most recent new laws that target excessive speeders, that ban texting while driving and that outlaw cell phones while driving in school and construction zones will help further contribute to an even greater reduction of traffic deaths in Illinois in 2011."

White initiated a comprehensive teen driving safety law that took effect January 1, 2008. State and national traffic safety organizations applauded Illinois' graduated driver licensing (GDL) law as one of the nation's best. Since the law took effect in 2008, teen driving deaths in Illinois have dropped by over 50 percent. According to Illinois State Police, 146 teens died in traffic crashes in 2007. In 2008 the number of teen deaths dropped to 87. In 2009 teen driving deaths dropped to 71.

Partnering with the national office of Mothers Against Drunk Driving (MADD), White helped initiate a key law cracking down on drunk drivers. Effective January 1, 2009, all first-time DUI offenders who wish to obtain driving relief during the period of statutory summary suspension must install on their vehicle a breath alcohol ignition interlock device (BAIID). Motorists are required to blow into the BAIID, which measures their blood alcohol content level. The device is designed to prevent DUI offenders from driving after having consumed alcohol. MADD called this law one of the most important pieces of legislation Illinois has passed in years.

Last year White initiated legislation to strengthen the law on distracted driving by banning texting while driving and also banning the use of cell phones while driving in school and construction zones.

This year White initiated legislation targeting excessive speeders. The new law, effective January 1, 2011, will prohibit the issuance of court supervision to drivers ticketed for speeding 40 or more miles-per-hour above the posted speed limit. The measure also establishes as a Class B misdemeanor speeding violations of 30 - 39 miles-per-hour above the posted speed limit.

"The statistics released by NHTSA are encouraging and we can and should take some pride that our efforts have contributed to the reduction of deaths on our roads," said White. "But we cannot become complacent. Until traffic fatalities in Illinois reach zero, we have work to do."

# IL Hogs & Pigs Report

Total inventory of all hogs and pigs on hand September 1 was 4.40 million head, up 4 percent from last year. Market hogs, at 3.91 million head, were up 3 percent from a year ago, while breeding hogs, at 490 thousand head, were up 4 percent.

The June - August pig crop of 2.48 million pigs was up 7 percent from last year. There were 260 thousand sows that farrowed, up 6 percent from last year. The average number of pigs per litter was 9.55, up from 9.50 during the same period last year.

Hog producers intend to farrow 270 thousand sows during the September - November quarter, up 6 percent from the same period a year ago. The first intentions estimate for the December 2010 - February 2011 quarter is for 265 thousand sows to farrow, up 2 percent from the previous year.

### NOTICE OF PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT THAT WILL BE SUBMITTED TO THE VOTERS NOVEMBER 2, 2010

To the Electors of the State of Illinois:

The purpose of a state constitution is to establish a structure for government and laws. The Illinois Constitution provides citizens with rights and protections; creates the executive, judicial, and legislative branches of government; clarifies the powers given to local governments; limits the taxing power of the State; and imposes certain restrictions on the use of taxpayer dollars. There are three ways to initiate change to the Illinois Constitution: (1) a constitutional convention may propose changes to any part; (2) the General Assembly may propose changes to any part; or (3) the people of the State by referendum may propose changes to the Legislative Article. Regardless of the method of initiating change, the people of Illinois must approve any changes to the Constitution before they become effective.

The proposed amendment, which takes effect upon approval by the voters, adds Section 7 to the Suffrage and Elections Article of the Illinois Constitution. The new section would provide the State's electors with an option to petition for a special election to recall a Governor and for the election of a successor Governor. At the general election to be held on November 2, 2010, you will be called upon to decide whether the proposed amendment should become part of the Illinois Constitution.

#### PROPOSED AMENDMENT TO ARTICLE III — SUFFRAGE AND ELECTIONS Section 7 — Initiative to Recall Governor

- (a) The recall of the Governor may be proposed by a petition signed by a number of electors equal in number to at least 15% of the total votes cast for Governor in the preceding gubernatorial election, with at least 100 signatures from each of at least 25 separate counties. A petition shall have been signed by the petitioning electors not more than 150 days after an affidavit has been filed with the State Board of Elections providing notice of intent to circulate a petition to recall the Governor. The affidavit may be filed no sooner than 6 months after the beginning of the Governor's term of office. The affidavit shall have been signed by the proponent of the recall petition, at least 20 members of the House of Representatives, and at least 10 members of the Senate, with no more than half of the signatures of members of each chamber from the same established political party.
- (b) The form of the petition, circulation, and procedure for determining the validity and sufficiency of a petition shall be as provided by law. If the petition is valid and sufficient, the State Board of Elections shall certify the petition not more than 100 days after the date the petition was filed, and the question "Shall (name) be recalled from the office of Governor?" must be submitted to the electors at a special election called by the State Board of Elections, to occur not more than 100 days after certification of the petition. A recall petition certified by the State Board of Elections may not be withdrawn and another recall petition may not be initiated against the Governor during the remainder of the current term of office. Any recall petition or recall election pending on the date of the next general election at which a candidate for Governor is elected is moot.
- (c) If a petition to recall the Governor has been filed with the State Board of Elections, a person eligible to serve as Governor may propose his or her candidacy by a petition signed by a number of electors equal in number to the requirement for petitions for an established party candidate for the office of Governor, signed by petitioning electors not more than 50 days after a recall petition has been filed with the State Board of Elections. The form of a successor election petition, circulation, and procedure for determining the validity and sufficiency of a petition shall be as provided by law. If the successor election petition is valid and sufficient, the State Board of Elections shall certify the petition not more than 100 days after the date the petition was filed. Names of candidates for nomination to serve as the candidate of an established political party must be submitted to the electors at a special primary election, if necessary, called by the State Board of Elections to be held at the same time as the special election on the question of recall established under subsection (b). Names of candidates for the successor election must be submitted to the electors at a special successor election called by the State Board of Elections, to occur not more than 60 days after the date of the special primary election or on a date established by law.
- (d) The Governor is immediately removed upon certification of the recall election results if a majority of the electors voting on the question vote to recall the Governor. If the Governor is removed, then (i) an Acting Governor determined under subsection (a) of Section 6 of Article V shall serve until the Governor elected at the special successor election is qualified and (ii) the candidate who receives the highest number of votes in the special successor election is elected Governor for the balance of the term.

#### EXPLANATION

The Illinois Constitution provides the General Assembly with exclusive authority to remove a Governor through the impeachment process. The Illinois Constitution also provides that the order of succession to the office of Governor shall be the Lieutenant Governor, the elected Attorney General, the elected Secretary of State, and then as provided by law. The proposed amendment would provide the State's electors with the ability to initiate a special election to recall a Governor and elect a new Governor.

To begin the recall process, an elector must file an affidavit of intent to circulate petitions to recall a Governor no sooner than 6 months after the beginning of the Governor's term of office. The affidavit must include signatures of the proponent of the recall petition, at least 20 members of the House of Representatives, and at least 10 members of the Senate, with no more than half of the signatures in each chamber from the same political party. After filing the affidavit with the State Board of Elections, the proponent has 150 days to circulate a petition. The petition must include signatures equal to 15% of the total votes cast for Governor in the preceding gubernatorial election, with at least 100 signatures from a minimum of 25 counties. Within 100 days, the State Board of Elections must certify or reject the petition, and if the Board certifies the petition, a special election must be held within 100 days after the certification. The special election ballot shall include the question, "Shall (name) be removed from the office of Governor?". The Governor is immediately removed if a majority of the electors voting on the question vote to recall the Governor.

Persons seeking to be elected to serve as the successor Governor may circulate nomination petitions. A petition must be signed by 5,000 electors. If multiple candidates of the same party file petitions, a special primary election will occur on the same day as the recall election.

If a Governor is recalled, a special election to elect the successor Governor must take place within 60 days. An Acting Governor, as determined by the order of succession, shall assume the duties of the Governor until the electors choose a new Governor. The special election ballot will include the names of the candidates nominated at the special primary election, as well as any independent or new party candidates, on a special election ballot. The candidate receiving the highest number of votes shall be elected Governor for the balance of the term.

Voters that believe the Illinois Constitution should be amended to provide for a special election to recall a Governor and for a special election to elect a successor Governor should vote "YES" on the question. Three-fifths of those voting on the question, or a majority of those voting in the election, must vote "YES" in order for the amendment to become effective. Voters that believe the Illinois Constitution should not be amended to provide for a special election to recall a Governor and for a special election to elect a successor Governor should vote "NO" on the question.

#### Explanation of Amendment

The new section would provide the State's electors with an option to petition for a special election to recall a Governor and for the special election of a successor Governor. At the general election to be held on November 2, 2010, you will be called upon to decide whether the proposed amendment should become part of the Illinois Constitution.

If you believe the Illinois Constitution should be amended to provide for a special election to recall a Governor and for a special election to elect a successor Governor, you should vote "YES" on the question.
